Texas Teachers Meeting of District 9 To Be Held In Amarillo March 14th

Featured speaker of the Northwest Texas Conference for Education will be Dr. Linwood Chase of Boston University, Boston, Mass. Now a member of the School of Education at Boston University, Dr. Chase has had an inclusive experience ranging from teaching fifth grade, through elementary and secondary principalships, school superintendencies, headmasterships and demonstration teaching to his present place as professor of education.

He has served as a member of the Boston School Survey Staff, Strayer Commission, in 1944, and as a member of the New Haven, Conn. School Survey Staff, 1946-47. He is currently president of the National Council for the Social Studies and of the National Junior Town Meeting League, as well as being consultant for Gloucester, Mass., on social studies curriculum.
