**Grady Hazelwood & Uncle Jay To Attend Donley Farm Bureau Chicken Barbecue**

The Donley County Farm Bureau is having their annual chicken barbecue, at 5 o'clock on Friday afternoon, August 11, at the Lelia Lake School house. "It is the pleasure of the officials of the Donley County Farm Bureau to inform you that your Senator, Grady Hazelwood, and Uncle Jay are planning to attend," said Mr. J. Holley Wood, President of the Donley County Farm Bureau. "Senator Hazelwood is a farmer as well as an attorney, and will have something to say that will be of great interest to all of us." Everyone is invited, and the admission will be one-half chicken per person. The chickens should be left at the Consumer Frozen Locker plant in Clarendon and at Moreman Locker Plant in Hedley. The Farm Bureau will furnish all the trimmings to go with the chicken. All you need is one-half chicken per person to be left at one of the above designated places not later than 6:00 P. M. on the afternoon of August 10th. You do not have to be a Farm Bureau member to attend. Everyone is invited.

**Good Vote Cast Here Saturday In First Primary**

Approximately 1,715 qualified Donley County voters went to the polls last Saturday and cast their ballots in the first democratic primary. This election decided all county political positions as there was only four contested races and only two candidates running in either instance. The second primary will be held August 26 to decide the remaining state races. Allan Shivers was re-elected as governor with an overwhelming majority vote. There will be a run-off in the congressman's race with Walter Rogers and Altavene Clark being the two high candidate. Allen Harp was re-elected District Attorney for this district over W. M. Tucker of Wellington. In the county races that had two candidates, Guy Wright was re-elected Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector. Mrs. A. G. Lane was elected to succeed Mrs. Tom Crabtree as County Treasurer; J. R. Bulls was re-elected Commissioner Precinct No. 2, and C. Huffman was re-elected Constable Precinct No. 2. **Thugs Gathering Equipment For Bigger Jobs**

It looks like some thugs are getting prepared to go after larger sums of money. Tuesday night the Johnson's Welding Works was entered by breaking out a back window and the only things reported missing was a cutting torch and a tank of acetylene gas. Will Johnson also reported that his office was pilfered and desk drawers were left sitting out, but nothing else was missing as far as they could tell at present. The thugs apparently left here and went on to Lelia Lake where they entered Chenaults Welding Shop and took his cutting torch and hose that runs to the tank of gas. Another break-in was reported from Hedley but we have not been able to get a report from there as the Sheriff's department was checking on this call, but it is believed to be the same bunch that hit here and at Lelia Lake. According to the articles that were taken from both places it looks like some experts are really getting ready for some safe cracking or bigger jobs on down the line.

**A Statement From Gov. Allan Shivers**

To the People of Texas  
The Korean incident has caused the State Government to receive numerous letters, telegrams and telephone calls concerning various phases of civil defense. There is also a need now for recruits to take training as nurse's aides. A practical, an important, and a patriotic job is available for each one of us. I have no doubt that the citizenship of this State will respond to the calls made for their help in demonstrating to the world that the people of America are equal to any test which future time may bring. It is timely to advise the people of Texas as to the status of our planning and organization. A State organization has been in existence and active for a period of months. The State is in constant touch with the appropriate officials of the Federal government. When the invasion of South Korea occurred, a letter was in the mails from the Governor to the 713 Mayors and the 254 County Judges of Texas, outlining in detail the plans to effect local government. This personal letter will be followed by bulletins issued as frequently as necessary to keep local communities completely advised of developments. Private industry and business and public utility installations should take normal precautions for the protection of property, but we have no advices from the National Government which would indicate the need for special policing by State or local forces. There is much justification for concern over the international situation, but there are no grounds for excitement or hysteria. While the agencies of the government continue to strengthen their forces and facilities, the individual citizen might well show his or her willingness to participate in the total preparedness of our people for any emergency by

volunteering immediately to take the standard courses in first aid and care of the sick. This training will be of the greatest benefits to ourselves and to our neighbors no matter what kind of disaster befalls us.

There is also a need now for recruits to take training as nurse's aides.

A practical, an important, and a patriotic job is available for each one of us. I have no doubt that the citizenship of this State will respond to the calls made for their help in demonstrating to the world that the people of America are equal to any test which future time may bring.

**Price Support Announced For 1950-Crop Hay, Grass Seed, etc.**

The Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced a price support program for 1950-crop hay, pasture, and range grass seed, designed to encourage increased production to meet expanding requirements for soil-conserving crops during the next few years. Particular emphasis is put on the production of improved varieties of seed. The seeds included are alfalfa, various kinds of clovers, lespedeza, except Korean and Kobe, and a number of grasses. Price supports will be offered only to producers and will range from 3 1/2 cents a pound for common Sudan seed to \$1.25 a pound for certified Ladino clover. Farm-storage and warehouse-storage loans and purchase agreements will be available to producers from time of harvest through January 31, 1951. The accompanying table contains specifications and basic support prices for the various seeds.

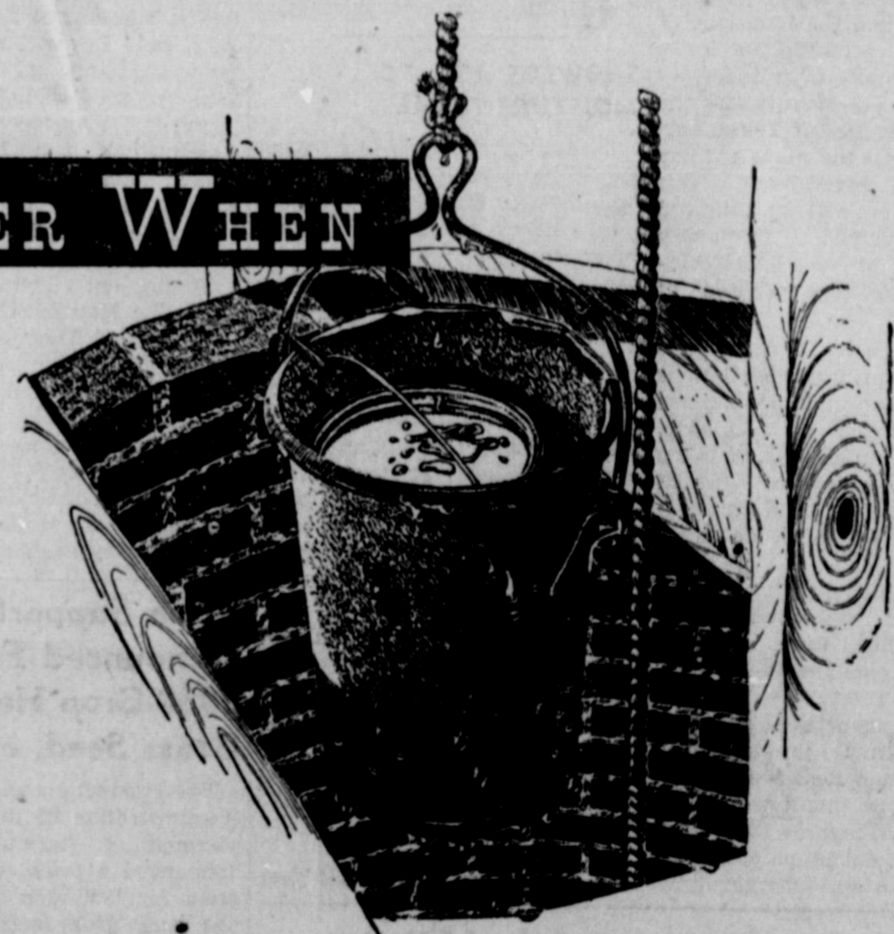

**Operation Anti-Polio Fighting With Fog**

Which community will paralyze next with a crippling epidemic? That is a question everyone asks and none can answer. But Texas is meeting polio's challenge with all the vigor and enterprise at its command. Throughout the State communities are waging comprehensive clean-up campaigns in an effort to forestall a recurrence of the 1948 and 1949 record total incidence rate.

In 1948 a record total of 1,765 cases were reported which affected 160 of the State's 254 counties, with the most severe polio outbreaks occurring in the Rio Grande Valley and along the Gulf.

In 1949 the cities of San Angelo and San Antonio felt the hardest impact of the crippling disease, with the incidence rate paralleling that of the previous year through the month of June. With polio then at the epidemic

stage, San Antonio hastily organized for the emergency and thru the coordinated efforts of the Public Health Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, State and City Health Departments, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, numerous civic clubs and fraternal organizations, military installations, intense and wide-spread publicity given the "Dollars-for-Dusting" drive by the San Antonio Express and San Antonio Evening News, and the dramatic use of the local National Guard Air Force with its planes flying "missions," alone and in formation, swooping low and spraying mapped areas of the city at intervals over a period of weeks, helped arouse public interest to the realization of the grave problem at hand. It encouraged the financial support of the citizens in providing ample funds for a subsequent and more thorough fogging of the city by ground-fogging units.

DDT fogging, as applied by TIFA (Todd Insecticidal Fogging Applicator), is recognized as the most effective, practical and economical method of fogging large, and often inaccessible areas, with insecticides and liquid solutions to kill or control disease-bearing insects and larvae, in that the fogging applicator is available as a single unit for mounting on a pickup truck, jeep, boat or other vehicles.

TIFA fog is not in itself a polio "cure," it is not a "medicine," and it is not a poison! It is harmless to humans, animals and vegetation! It is a very positive means of combating flies, mosquitoes and other disease-bearing insects which health authorities and epidemiologists now agree are car-

riers of poliomyelitis, infant diarrhea and other contagious viruses and infections.

Until final victory is won it is the responsibility of every citizen to avoid hysteria should this crippling disease strike his city, and to observe these five precautions recommended by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for safeguarding children from polio: Avoid Crowds; avoid Over - Fatigue; avoid swimming in Polluted Water; avoid Sudden Chilling; and observe the Golden Rule of Personal Cleanliness.

AUSTIN—Details of the fall antelope shooting season authorized for October 2 to 10 inclusive, by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, are being worked out, according to the Executive Secretary.

The final number of permits to be issued will be determined after results of the present antelope survey in the area west of the Pecos are compiled.

the number of special permits, which cost \$5 each, probably will be less than the 702 permits issued in 1948, the last season that antelope were hunted legally.

The total bag that year of male antelope was 629. The Executive Secretary explained that more than 90 per cent of the hunters usually get their antelope. Hunters again will make their application to the Game Department in Austin. Then, because the number of applicants usually exceeds the number of available permits, drawings are made to designate the lucky nimrods.

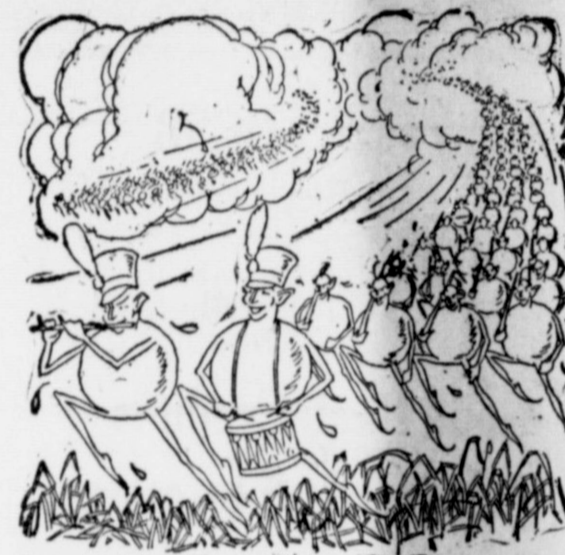
Present plans are to continue the arrangement whereby persons sending in their \$5 and being assigned a permit, may notify the department if they find they cannot make the trip so that their places may be taken by hunters who lost out in the drawing.

The hunt is arranged in day periods so that trained game wardens supervise the shoot. hunt covers from 30 to 100 in the nine counties. It allotted 20 per cent of so that they may friends and their family hunt. The kill on the ranges from five to antelope. The maximum may charge individual three-day hunt permit. Only one antelope may by each hunter.

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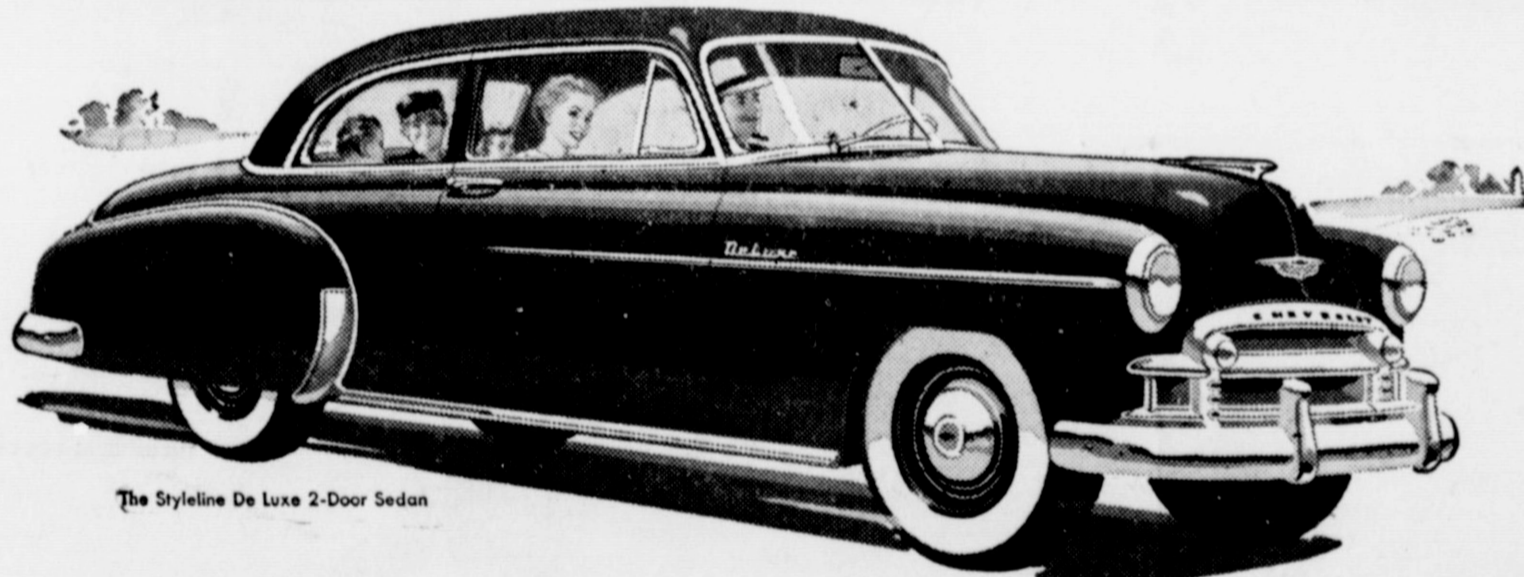

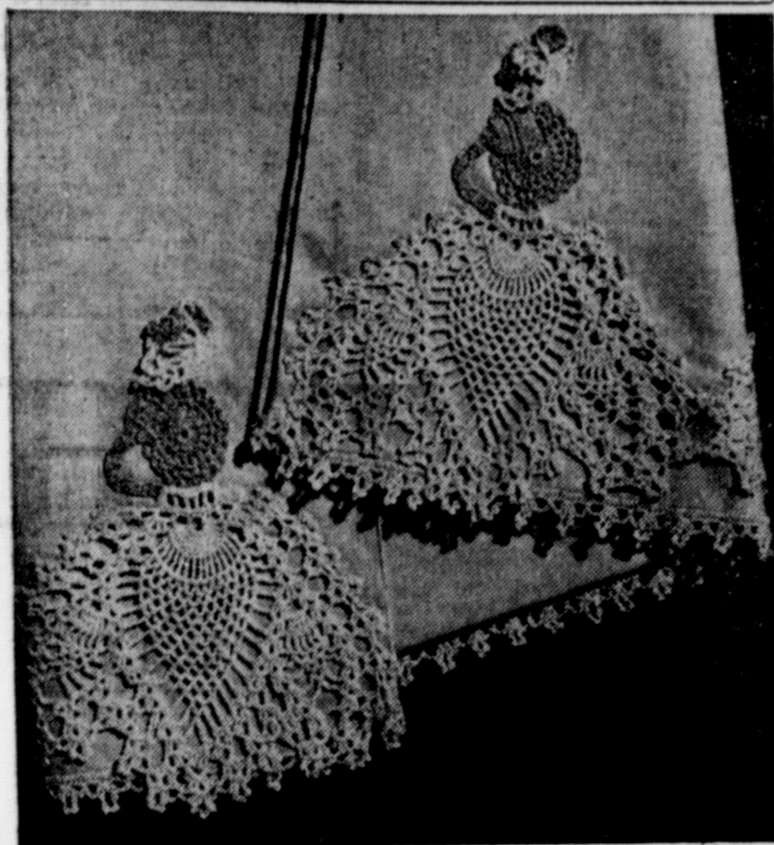

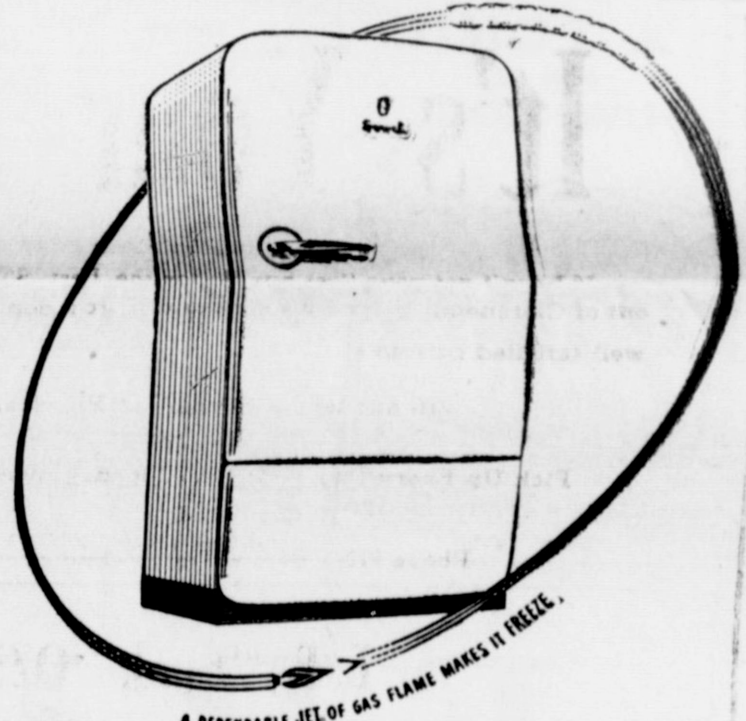

## FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

### REPORT ON COTTON MEASUREMENT:

We're sure everyone is interested in the progress of our cotton measuring crews. To date our crews have checked 342 farms in the county; this leaves 491 yet to be measured. Of these 342 measured farms some 72 farms were overplanted. Most of these farms are now in compliance due to the fact that the excess cotton has been plowed up. Our reporters mail in a card each day telling us how many farms they have measured and the time spent for each particular farm. This way we can keep an up to date account of our progress. When the weather permits a reporter averages measuring a farm every three hours. In the last two weeks the reporters have been slowed down considerably due to all the rain, but they do work fast and accurate when they can.

### WE'RE BROKE!!!

At the writing of this article our pocket book is empty. We've "scraped the bottom" to issue a few last approvals for small amounts of assistance, and we don't expect any allocations until this fall. If you have a practice in mind that you want to carry out, come by the office and let us take your application. Then, when we get some additional funds, we will be glad to help you.

If you have received a notice from this office asking you to get your practice completed and your approval turned in to this office, we would appreciate it if you would make every effort to do so. We need to have all our outstand-

ing practices completed by the later part of August. "Don't be a straggler."

### COTTON ACREAGE DOWN 31 PERCENT:

General farm-compliance with cotton acreage allotments is indicated by the Department of Agriculture's annual report on cotton acreage, according to B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State Production and Marketing Committee. In Texas, cotton acreage in cultivation on July 1 is estimated at 7,200,000 acres, 34 percent less than a year ago. Texas cotton acreage allotment is 7,637,029 acres. For the country as a whole, acreage in cultivation was generally below allotments — only slightly below in California, New Mexico, and Arizona; considerably below in the States from Alabama east; and moderately below in most of the other cotton States.
