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





PRE-MEASUREMENT

We told you in last week's article about Mrs. Joe Ritter, Mrs. F. G. Crofford, Douglas Lowe, and the County Committee making a trip to Childress to attend a meeting pertaining to pre-measurement of cotton land. At the present time the information we have goes like this: There will be a charge for pre-measurement service of \$6.00 per farm, plus \$1.25 per plot, plus 3c for each acre in the allotment.* Before a farm can be measured, the producer must come to the office and sign a request form for his land to be measured. The dates for coming to the office to sign the request

will be announced in next week's

OFFICE NOTES:

Be thinking of the practices you want to carry out this Spring and come to the office and put your application in. It won't be too long until planting time and we always have quite a lot of producers sign up for assistance on Strip Cropping, Mowing pasture, and seeding small grains on the contour. If you are interested in carrying out a practice, drop by the office and let us discuss matter with you.

We want to remind all those who have approvals for planting rye that April 1, 1950 is absolutely the last day that the rye may be grazed. The County Committee set this date several weeks ago and all those concerned were notified by letter.

Don't forget-you must have a Prior Approval before you can carry out a practice and receive assistance from this office.

The clerks have finished typing all the Applications for Payment and the checks should really be coming in soon.

We have had several farmers coming to the office wanting to know if we had received any information concerning the new law that Congress passed in connection with COTTON ALLOT-MENTS. For the benefit of those wanting to know, we have not received one bit of information in relation to this.

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

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

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
