## Large Number Farmers and Ranchers Attend Soil Conservation Tour

Wednesday, June 28th was the annual spring tour of the Donley County Soil Conservation District. A large number of farmers and ranchers met at the office of the county agent at nine o'clock in the morning and were given a brief discussion of the points to be visited by County Agent H. M. Breedlove.

The morning part of the tour included stops at the Claude Moore farm where grass plantings, sweep type plow and sprayer operations were viewed by the group. Carman Rhode, local conservationist for Donley County with SCS and county agent H. M. Breedlove explained each grass planting and brush and weed control operation. Bind weed control and weeping love grass plantings were visited at the Sam Lowe farm. The group saw good blue panic plantings on the Rhode and Gould farm at Ashtola and on the return to Clarendon a stop was made at the Vance Grey farm to see weeping love grass plantings.

The group then assembled at one o'clock in the afternoon and went to the JA Ranch to look over a one section mesquite control program. H. M. Breedlove, county agent secured the services of the Spur Experiment station to put on the test and the results at this time are almost perfect. A three county tour will be held next spring at this demonstration which will be entirely on mesquite control and Mr. Fisher of the Spur station will be present to talk to the group on brush eradication being conducted over Texas.

The entire tour was very educational and every one expressed a desire to have two such tours each year so that they can see work being done by their neighbors. The next tour will be this fall.

## Colored Bootlegger Caught Monday Morning

A hot tip can keep our law enforcement men on the job all hours as was evidenced here Monday morning when constable Colie Huffman intercepted a colored bootlegger near the city dump grounds at 4:30 a. m. After a shake down he found the man to be carrying 5 cases of whiskey valued at around \$250. He was fined \$250 plus costs which brought the total to \$269.40 and a grand total of \$519.40.

Constable Huffman reported that the colored man was from Amarillo and gave his name as Hugh L. McCullough. He was driving a 1950 Ford and seemed quite surprised that Huffman was up waiting for him at that hour of the morning. Huffman stated that he had been eluding officers in the area for around six weeks mainly by operating in the early morning hours.

## TWO LOCAL SCOUTS TO ATTEND NATIONAL SCOUT JAMBOREE

Saturday morning, John Miller Morris and Billy Carl Pittman left on the special Santa Fe train from Pampa to attend the National Scout Jamboree at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. The train, carrying the Scouts from Eastern New Mexico, Oklahoma, and the Texas Panhandle will go to Chicago, and from there to Washington, D. C., where the Scouts will spend one day seeing the places of interest. From Washington they will go to Valley Forge for the first National Jamboree since 1937. President Truman will address the 48,000 Scouts attending the encampment, and a huge celebration is planned for the Fourth of July. A pageant will be given with our boys from West Texas dressed up in their western clothes and taking part. General Eisenhower will be the main speaker for this occasion.

On the return trip, the Scouts will spend one day in New York City, sight-seeing and then go to Niagara Falls where they will see the sunrise over the falls. After that they will return home. John Miller and Billy Carl are members of the Explorer Post here in Clarendon.

## Methodist Youth To Hold Caravan Week

Caravan week, six days of worship, study, and recreation under the joint sponsorship of Clarendon Methodist Youth Fellowship and a visiting Methodist Youth Fellowship, will be held July 1-6 at First Methodist Church, according to Rev. John A. English, Pastor.

The visiting caravan is made up of Bill Turner, Touston; June Semple, Lawrence, Kansas; Bonnie Gene McCurdy, Conroe, Texas; Thalia Ruth Dixon, Vaughan, Mississippi; and the adult counselor, Miss Mary Jane Turrentine of Lubbock, Texas.

Each of these young people has completed at least two years of college. Miss Turrentine has taught school for several years, and was a caravan counselor in 1948. All serve without pay, and are giving seven weeks to this type of work this summer.

This group has received intensive training in all phases of the Methodist Youth Fellowship program. Their aim is to give direction and leadership to the development of a youth program which fulfills the high ideals and purposes of the MYF.

## Help Promote Safe And Sane Driving During The Holidays!

Once each year, we people of America pause from our every day work and take time out to celebrate our National Independence Day. Many years ago, a group of brave men gave their lives that we might enjoy this land of ours without fear for the safety of our lives and personal liberties.

On the 4th of July of each year, our pleasures of the holidays take a heavy toll upon us and our loved ones. Hundreds of people die a violent death due to accidents of every imaginable type. On a day of pleasure and joy we compile a terrific record of death and destruction because of the lack of a little planning and care on the part of each one of us.

We people of Texas can expect at least 100 of the citizens of our State to meet a violent death over the holiday weekend, from Saturday through Tuesday. Out of that ill-fated group of 100 men, women and children, approximately 36 will die in traffic accidents on our streets and highways. Drownings, firearms, fire-works, homicides, and suicides will all take their toll upon the people of Texas.

The Texas Safety Association states that if each of us would but stop and think and exercise a little care and a lot of good common sense, that many of these lives can be saved. Remember these few rules: When driving, drive defensively. Stop often and rest so that you may remain alert at the wheel. Check your vehicle carefully before starting on a trip. And remember that intoxicating drinks and driving do not mix. If you plan to go in swimming, know the place in which you will swim; Do not swim immediately after eating. Do not stay in the water after you become tired. If you cannot swim, stay out of deep water. If you must use firearms, handle them with care, know your target, and do not shoot in unprotected places. Refrain from horse play while carrying firearms. If you must celebrate with the aid of fireworks, remember that each little firecracker or skyrocket is potentially dangerous. Remember that fireworks are a very great fire hazard, and when using them, always respect the rights of other people around you.

Each person expects to have a day of pleasure on the 4th of July. It has grown to have that meaning in the minds of each of us and we fail to remember that our holiday might be spoiled by an accident or tragedy involving either ourselves or one of our loved ones. The best insurance against accidents is to use care and caution in all daily activities, regardless of how simple they may seem.

The Texas Safety Association feels that if these few simple facts and rules are kept in mind, that each of us will be safely back on the job after another enjoyable holiday weekend.

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ANOTHER STRIKE

AGAINST THE PUBLIC AND INDUSTRY AND AGRICULTURE SERVED BY FIVE WESTERN RAILROADS

President Truman's EMERGENCY BOARD recommends a 40-hour week and a pay increase of 18 cents an hour, or \$1.44 a day for switchmen represented by the Switchmen's Union of North America.

In face of Board findings to the contrary, union leaders insist on 48 hours pay for 40 hours work. This would be an average increase of 31 cents an hour, or \$2.48 a day. So Union leaders have called a completely unjustified strike on 5 Western railroads, effective June 25.

On June 15, an Emergency Board appointed by President Truman under the terms of the Railway Labor Act recommended the railroads grant switchmen a 40-hour week and a wage increase of 18 cents an hour, or \$1.44 for an 8-hour day. Despite the added financial burden involved, the railroads are ready to accept these recommendations, as they have always accepted Emergency Board recommendations on national issues.

But the leaders of the Switchmen's Union refuse to accept! They demand an average increase of 31 CENTS AN HOUR OR \$2.48 A DAY—although their present earnings are substantially higher than these of workers in other industries!

Board Says Demands Unjustified

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advantage over other groups of railroad employees, and would add too great a burden to railroad costs.

Here is another case of a railroad union flouting the findings of an Emergency Board—another case of calling a crippling

strike in an outrageous and reckless attempt to force demands which the Board clearly labels as unjustified!

Leaders of the Switchmen's Union are calling this strike in defiance of the Board—in defiance of the facts—and at the expense of the public!

In its report on this case, the Board made this statement:

"The railroad industry, the Board believes, needs above all else a period of relative stability to adjust and adapt itself to present competitive post-war conditions."

Despite this warning, the leaders of the Switchmen's Union are upsetting the apple-cart—forcing a completely unjustified strike against everybody who uses the railroads.

**OLD PATHS**

All who talk on the matters of the Bible at all use such terms as "first covenant" and "second covenant," "new covenant" and "old covenant," "new testament" and "old testament," "new institution" and "old institution," "better covenant," which implies one not so good. In the use of those terms we have Moses on one side and Jesus on the other; the law on one hand and the Gospel on

the other; the letter on the one hand and the spirit on the other. We can not talk on the matters of the Bible without using these terms. The ideas contained in these terms run through the entire revelation from God to man, and, whether men understand them or not, they are continually using the terms.

By these terms we have two institutions brought to view—the old and the new. The old was by Moses and the new is by Jesus; hence, Moses represents the one and Jesus the other. The law sometimes stands for the one and the Gospel the other, the letter, in some cases, stands for the one and the spirit for the other; the old covenant, in some cases, stands for the one and the new covenant for the other; the old testament in some instances, stands for the one and the new testament stands for the other. No matter which of

these terms is used, on either side, the same thing is meant. One is the old dispensation and the other the new; the old institution and the new—the former by Moses and the latter by Jesus. It then becomes a matter transcendent importance to determine distinctly, all the time, what belongs to the old institution and what to the new; what belongs to the better covenant and what belongs to the inferior—to determine where the one terminates and the other begins.

During the past hundred years the world has been furnished with some speculations touching the matters here introduced. It would be unbecomingly to pass all these speculations in silence, therefore a respectful attention shall be given some of them. One of them starts out as follows: "God made a covenant with Abraham, and that covenant has been perpetuated to the present time, and is the Gospel covenant." The arguments to sustain this theory are styled "arguments to prove the identity of the covenant." What is meant by the identity of the covenant? "Identity" is not similarity. Two things may be similar, but cannot be identical. To be identical, it must be the same thing, and not two things. It is, therefore, nonsense, to talk of the identity of the two covenants. There must be no two in the case, but the one identical same covenant, made with Abraham, perpetuated through the Mosaic and Christian institutions. It would be well, before going further, to inquire into the im-

portance of sustaining this theory of the identity of the covenant. What is to be gained by it? One replies that "there were infants in the Abrahamic covenant, and it proved that the same covenant has been perpetuated to the present time, and is the Gospel covenant, infant church - membership is sustained." If that is the purpose, it would be well enough to look into the matter a little closely and see if it is right. (Continued next week).

**Research Salvages Oil and Wax**  
A process to salvage valuable oil and wax from the settlings, or waste material, in the bottom of petroleum storage pits and tanks has been developed by the Bureau of Mines, in cooperation with several oil companies. A test with 2000 barrels of waste stored for several years in an open pit, recovered nearly 600 barrels of clean oil containing 15-18 per cent of valuable micro-crystalline wax.

**New Idea In Tank Transport**  
The task of moving a bulky 3,800,000-gallon storage tank to a new location didn't faze one oil company. A bulldozer scooped out a ditch 1,000 feet long and two feet deep. Water from a nearby pond was pumped into the miniature canal. The tank was floated to its new site.

**Ben Guill Reports To The People**

(Congressman, 18th District)  
In my report to you folks recently I mentioned that on August 2, 1945 the Tidelands Bill, which would have prohibited the Truman administration from stealing our submerged lands away from the Texas school children, lacked only seventeen votes of being passed in the House over the veto of the President.

A Jeffersonian Democrat friend of mine wrote a piece suggesting the Republicans co-operate with the Solid South in over-riding the veto. This caused me to look up the facts as to what happened in the past in the Congressional Record. The facts are astounding. They show that members of Congress from the Solid South, by and large, voted with the Administration and against the Tidelands Bill. They also show that, with the honor and future of our State at stake, Half the members of the Texas delegation didn't bother to cast a vote either way.

The total vote to over-ride the veto was:  
Yea 139  
Nay 95  
The "Yeas" included 35 Democrats and 104 Republicans. The "Nays" included 86 Democrats, 1 Progressive, 1 American Laborite and only 7 Republicans.  
Only 33 Congressmen from the Solid South voted to over-ride the veto in this vital States Right's measure, while 35 Congressmen from the Solid South voted to support the President against the claims of the Tidelands States. The fight against the Tidelands Bill was led on the floor by Representative Sam Hobbs, a Jeffersonian Democrat from Alabama.

Hobbs, a constitutional lawyer of some ability and considerable vehemence, is the Congressman Texans can blame most for losing her oil-rich tidelands. If he had not prevailed, and if the President's veto had been over-riden, the Supreme Court would have been powerless to rob the school-children of Texas of their rightful heritage.  
Surprised at Texans  
It is a somewhat difficult thing for a Party man to vote to over-ride the veto of the President when the President is the nominal head of his Party. But, it seems to me that in an issue like the Tidelands Bill, justice and the principle involved should be much more important than mere Party regularity.

Nonetheless, of the 1946 Texas delegation in Congress, only 10 representatives voted to over-ride the President's veto. Ten other Texas Congressmen simply failed to vote. Since the issue was settled by a mere 17 votes, the failure of the non-voting ten was a serious and even tragic matter. (I am proud to say that Judge Gene Worley was one of the ten Texans with the courage to vote his convictions. Gene voted to over-ride the President's veto along with Congressmen Fisher, Gossett, Kilday, Lanham, Patman, Pickett, Poage, Summers and Thomas.)  
Political parties (and I do mean both political parties) are necessary in the operation of a democracy but, in my humble opinion, the importance of the Party must always be kept in proper perspective. Parties are the servants, not the masters, of the people. A man belongs to a Party because he believes in most of the principles of that Party, but that doesn't mean he should vote as the Party leaders dictate when such a vote is at variance with his own conscience. If he does that he ceases to be a statesman. He becomes a rubber stamp.  
The Texas delegation, being solidly Democratic, were faced with a dilemma on August 2, 1946. They knew that a vote to over-ride the President's veto would anger the Administration and perhaps interfere with their personal advancement in Washington. A vote against over-riding the President's veto would mean political suicide in Texas. Ten Texas Congressmen had courage to stand up and counted. The other ten ducked the dilemma completely. They simply failed to vote. That's what too much party regularity can do to you.

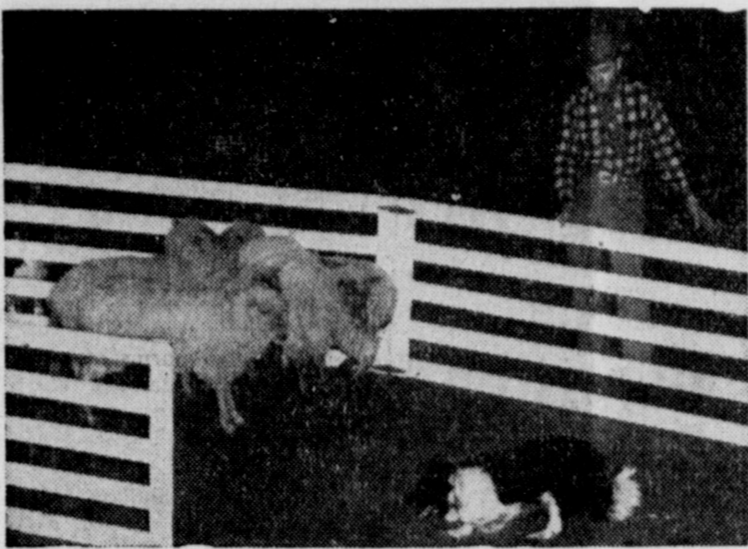
### Reed Making Vigorous Race For Lt. Governor

Reed, former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, declared this week as he vigorously pushed his campaign for Lieutenant Governor. as-you-go law which put Texas on a cash basis and prevents the Legislature from spending money it does not have. While Reed was Speaker in 1947-48, he directed legislation which resulted in a surplus of over \$90,000,000 in the general revenue fund at the end of his term.

"As your Lieutenant Governor," Reed stated, "I pledge that I will strive to give the people of Texas the same progressive debi-

free government that I helped direct when Speaker of the House of Representatives in 1947-48."

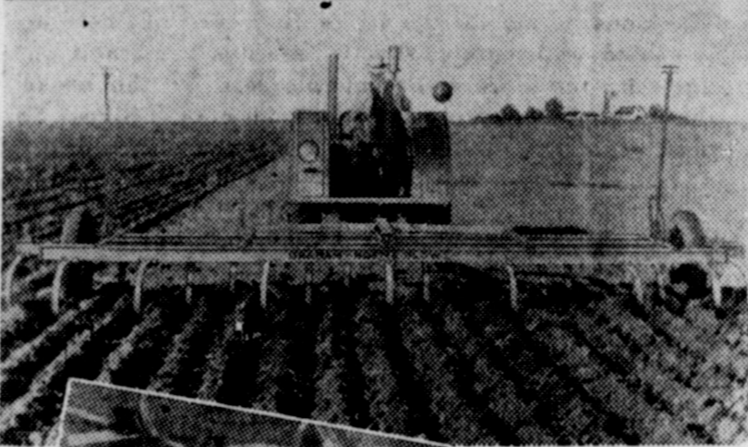

### El Paso Lake Is Renovated

AUSTIN — The largest lake renovation project in Texas history promises to improve the fishing sport for residents of El Paso in the extreme southwestern area of the state.

Under the supervision of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, Ascarate Lake which comprises about 60 acres, has been rid of all fish life so that a new and balanced stock of game

fish may be placed in the waters.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist who handled the undertaking recommended that the lake be closed to fishing until next May. That will allow ample time for the new supply of fish which will be distributed about August 1, to get a good start.

The old fish population which had deteriorated so that carp and shad predominated, was cleaned out by spraying the waters with a chemical substance which causes fishes' gills to swell. They are forced to the surface where, in the case of the El Paso project, they were seized by thousands of persons attracted by the rare handout. There were a very few game fish.

A new stock of game fish will

comprise bass, catfish and crappie. A filter system will be installed at the inlets to the lake to keep out the undesirable species.

The El Paso county fish restoration project was financed by funds raised through a former local license law. Under that statute, now replaced by the statewide fishing statute, El Paso County retained at least 80 per cent of money obtained through sale of licenses to fish in that county.

"Did you ever see a farmer fixing up his land for a long-trip—a trip from which the land will not return? If the land is to go by air the excess baggage must be kept down. There can be no sod or clods. The soil should be well pulverized. Soil particles must be prevented from grouping together. It should be dry and fine so that when a good wind comes along, the tiny particles can take off with a minimum of difficulty. If the land is to go, the water

route, it likewise should travel light. It's difficult—if not quite impossible—to transport any great amount of soil that is loaded down with sod or tree roots. A finely pulverized soil—practically free of organic matter and humus—and not hindered by field strips or windbreaks—has priority for air travel. It is first in line when the winds come sweeping across the country. Likewise, pulverized soil with little or no vegetable cover, free of organic matter and with natural channels in the up-and-down-slope furrows, is all set to leave with the next heavy rain. In this indirect way we are trying to emphasize the importance of keeping land in condition to stay on the farm. Heavy loss of topsoil by dust storms in some areas and by floods in others serve as a warning that constant protection through conservation practices is necessary to keep land from taking off. AND, soils which start on these air and water journeys travel on a one-way ticket—THEY DO NOT COME BACK."

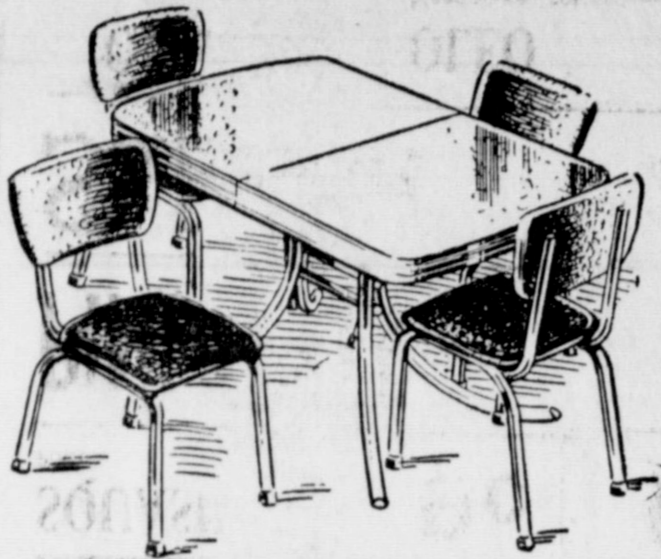

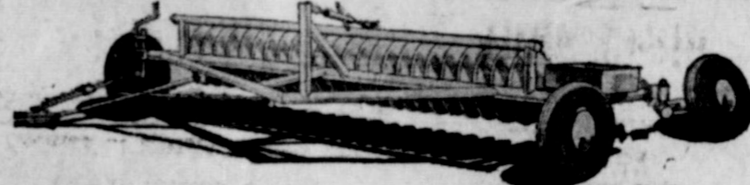
