Shamrock Jaycees Offer To Furnish Crows For Truman-Pollsters Banquet

Shamrock's Second Annual Jaycee Crow Shoot received much publicity last week-end when a lengthy Associated Press story went out over the wires stating that the local Junior Chamber of Commerce had offered to supply the crows for the Washington Post's proposed "Turkey-Crow" banquet.

Here's how it happened. Following last week's election, the Washington (DC) Post issued an invitation to President Truman, pollsters, wrong-guessers and campaign opponents to attend a "Turkey-Crow" banquet - - - President Truman would dine on the finest turkey available while the other visitors would dine on "breast of tough old crow en glace."

The Jaycees seeing an opportunity to publicize their crow shoot set for November 20 and 21, notified the Washington Post they could solve the crow prob-

lem.

W. A. Sims, president of the Jaycees, sent the following wire to the managing editors of the host newspaper:

"Regarding your proposed turkey-crow banquet for President Truman, pollsters and political opponents, the Shamrock Junior Chamber of Commerce is staging its second annual Crow Rodeo November 20 and 21. We will be able and happy to furnish you (FOB Shamrock) any number (up to 10,000) crows you might need for your banquet. If all eligibles accept your invitation, the demand for crow meat should be great but we are confident of being able to fill the order without difficulty."

"We also could furnish the turkey but we'll let some of the other boys in on the banquet," Sims remarked. He also ventured the guess that the crows would be the genuine Kansas variety.

"They're so doggone thick they couldn't have come from any place but Republican Kansas," Sims said. "They'd make good

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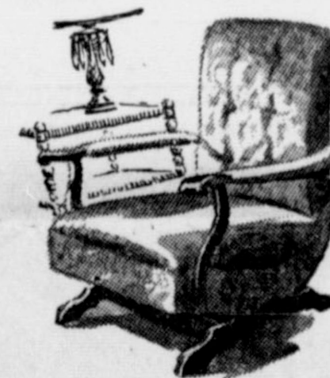

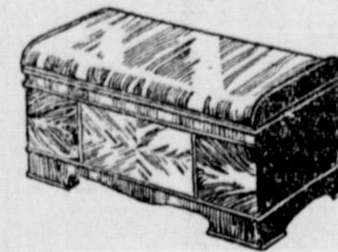

More Than 1,000 Hunters Expected To Take Part In Annual Crow Rodeo

The Shamrock Junior Chamber of Commerce has plans well underway for its Second Annual Crow Rodeo which is slated to begin Saturday, November 20, and end Wednesday, December 1. Big things are being arranged for the two days marking the beginning of the shoot, Saturday and Sunday, November 20 and 21. Invitations are being mailed to all interested hunters in the Panhandle to gather in Shamrock November 20, for a morning turkey shoot, the releasing of the banded crows in downtown Shamrock, a barbecue dinner, the crow hunt itself and a dance.

Johnny Lannon, chairman of the barbecue, has arranged for the services of the Shamrock Parent-Teachers Ass'n. That group expects to feed more than 1,000 hunters during Saturday and Sunday.

W. A. Sims, president of the Jaycees, heads the registration committee. Harris B. Zeigler is in charge of publicity.

It is the responsibility of Harry Clay to get the crows, and from Harry comes the report that he is having difficulty catching the big black birds by the usual trap method. Some of the Jaycees are accusing Clay of trying to slip up

on the crows barehanded. If this fails, he declares he will try salting their tails.

Designated to obtain sponsors of the crows are Bob Holmes, G. P. Davis, Bob Douglas, Bill Walker, Lyle Holmes and Billy Holmes.

The Wheeler County Commissioners' court has agreed to band 25 crows, each of which will be worth \$25.00 to the hunter who brings it down. Gene Howe of the Amarillo News-Globe will band a \$100.00 crow.

The Sportsman Clubs of Amarillo and Pampa have entered into the spirit of the hunt. They will contest each other during the rodeo, and the loser will give a sizable donation to Boy's Ranch. The Amarillo Sportsman Club will band a \$25.00 crow and give several door prizes.

The Amarillo Times is offering an 18-inch trophy to the hunter killing the most crows.

Shamrock merchants and individuals and Wheeler County farmers are sponsoring more than \$2,000 worth of crows. The Jaycees hope to band more than 100 crows in the amounts of \$25.00, \$50.00 and \$75.00 each.

W. H. Walker has been asked to serve as master of ceremonies at the releasing of the banded crows in downtown Shamrock. The event will take place at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon, November 20.

Harry Clay has been named chairman of a committee to guide out-of-town hunters to the areas where the crows are more plentiful.

It will be the duty of the nominating committees to nominate fourteen men whose names will appear on the ballots of each Community. The farmers from each community will elect three from the fourteen to the office of Community Committeeman for 1949, two to serve as alternate members, and one to serve as the Delegate to the county convention. We want to point out again the responsibility of the individual farmer to exercise his voting privilege. The Agricultural Conservation Program is operated in accordance with your vote. If you are satisfied with the way the program has been administered, let us know by re-electing your committeemen. If you are not satisfied, help change it by electing someone who you feel will do better.
