Swearing-in Ceremony For County Officials Held Saturday Morning

County officials of Donley County were sworn in during ceremonies at the courthouse here Saturday morning, January 1st. Some of the officials will serve for four years while others will be starting two-year terms, as specified in a constitutional amendment that was approved in the November general election.

The constitutional amendment provided for increasing the two-year offices to four years, effective with the general election in 1956. Two offices, those of county school superintendent and district judge, were extended to four year tenures several years ago.

Officials who took the oath of office, to inaugurate four year terms are: Jack Gray, county judge; P. C. Messer, county & district clerk; Mrs. A. G. Lane, county treasurer; Ed Mooring, commissioner of Precinct No. 2; Jess Finley, commissioner of Precinct 4.

Beginning two-year terms were: Truett Behrens, Sheriff-Assessor-Collector; R. Y. King, county attorney; Hubert Rhoades, commissioner of Precinct 1; F. M. Murray, commissioner Precinct 3; G. A. Anderson, Justice of the Peace, precinct 2; Frank Kendall, Justice of the Peace, precinct 3; R. C. Hill, constable precinct 2. Miss Ruth Richerson was re-elected School Supt. two years ago and has two more years of her regular term; Allen Harp of Childress, started another two-year term as district attorney; District Judge Luther Gribble of Wellington was re-elected to a four-year term two years ago.

W. G. Word was sworn in as deputy clerk; Mrs. Hazel Guy moved up as head office deputy in the tax office and Miss Barbara Banister is the new deputy in the tax office.

RIT MORRIS OPENS LAW FIRM IN CLAUDE

Richard S. (Rit) Morris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wylie Morris of Clarendon, has opened a new Law and Abstract firm in Claude. Rit is retiring Armstrong County judge.

Mr. Morris finished high school here and was a graduate of Clarendon Jr. College prior to attending the University of Texas where he was admitted to the Bar in 1934. He served as county attorney of Armstrong county 7 years and as county judge 9 years.

Carl C. Wood, better known to readers of the Leader as Uncle Zeb, succeeded Morris as county judge of Armstrong County.

Former Resident Dies In California

N. N. Martin, 89 of Santa Ana, California passed away on December 23rd after two months illness.

A native of Virginia, Mr. Martin moved to Texas in 1892, settling first near Old Clarendon. Later he moved to the Martin Community where he established one of the first registered Hereford herds in Donley County. In 1907, he sold his ranch and moved to Clarendon to educate his children. He and Mr. A. W. SoRelle were associated together in the real estate business for many years.

In 1923, he moved to Santa Ana, California where he established his home and had lived there for 31 years. His wife passed away several years ago and he has lived with his youngest daughter most of the time since. He was a member of the Spurgeon Memorial Methodist Church. Funeral services were held on December 27th with burial in the Fairhaven Mausoleum.

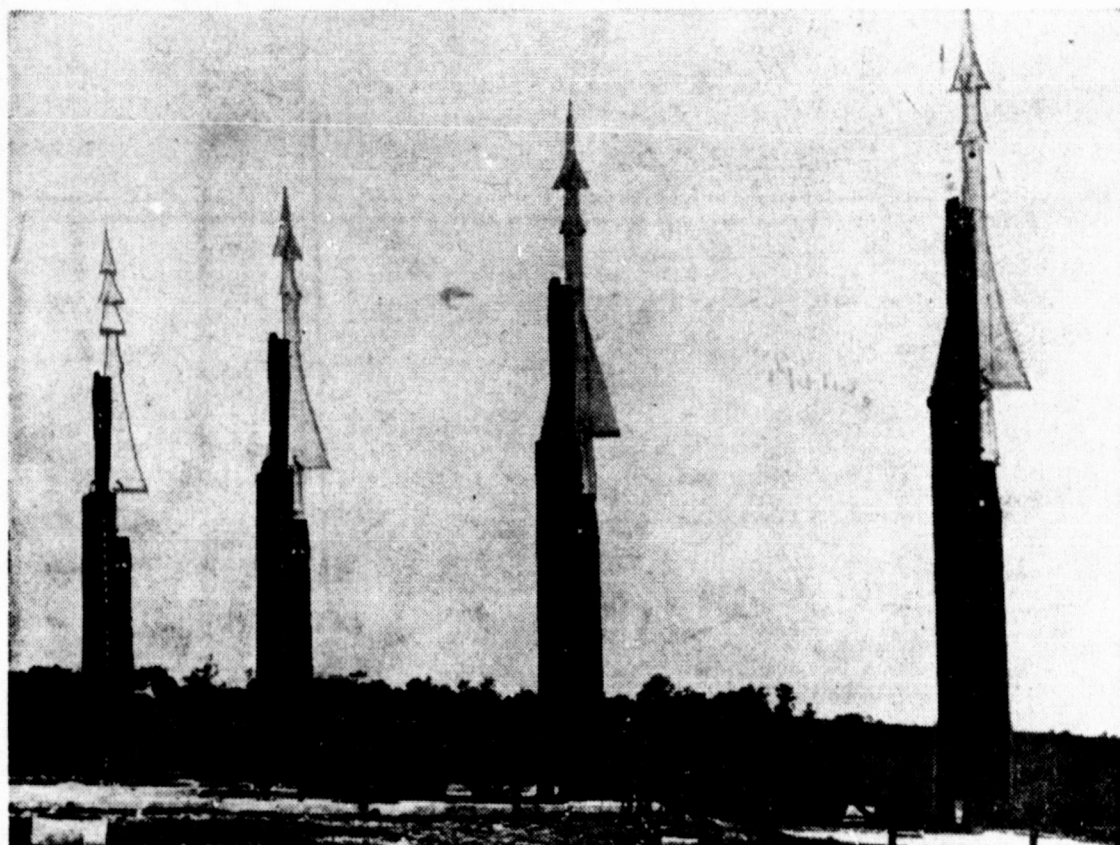

This is to remind each and every producer who has an approval on any 1954 ACP practice, except Rye, Deferred Grazing, and special Grass Seeding practices, that a report of performance must be made by January 7, 1955. If you have an approval which was not carried out by December 31, 1954, please write or come by this office in order that our individual farm records may be closed for the 1954 fiscal year.

Please attend to this matter immediately.

1955 FEDERAL COST-SHARING:

Applications are still being taken for 1955 practices to be carried out during the month of January. The budget for January is \$4000.00. Applications will be accepted for January as long as funds are available. For practices to be carried out in February, we will start taking applications on January 20th.

1954 WHEAT AND GRAIN SORGHUM LOANS:

To date there have been 209 Grain Sorghum loans made amounting to \$209,168.35, and 99 Wheat loans amounting to \$126,704.97. January 31, 1955 is the last day for making either Grain Sorghum or Wheat loans. March 31, 1955 is the maturity date for both of the above mentioned commodity loans.

Sale of Poll Tax Receipts Very Poor

According to Mrs. Hazel Guy, deputy tax-collector, only 461 have paid their poll tax to date. This figure is approximately 1,000 under the usual number for an off-election year.

The deadline for paying your poll tax is January 31st, and it is always a good idea to pay your poll tax, for numerous important issues can come up in the way of special bond elections, etc. Remember too, that your poll tax was not included with the tax statement you received for current taxes. You pay this tax separately from the other, so think about it seriously before deciding not to pay yours. Don't wait and get involved in the last minute mad rush.

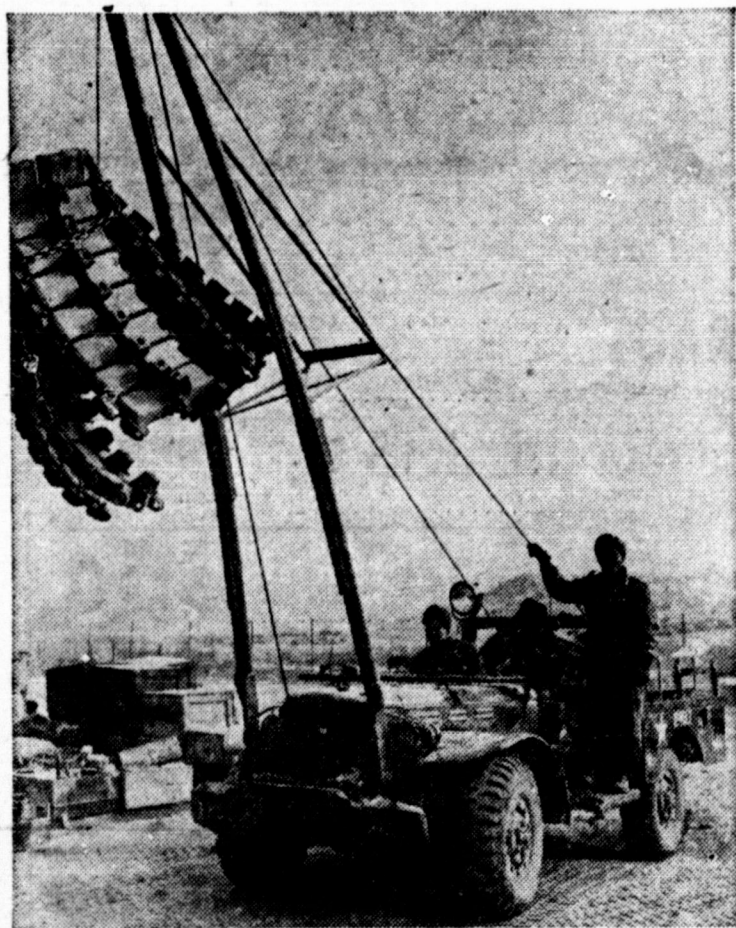

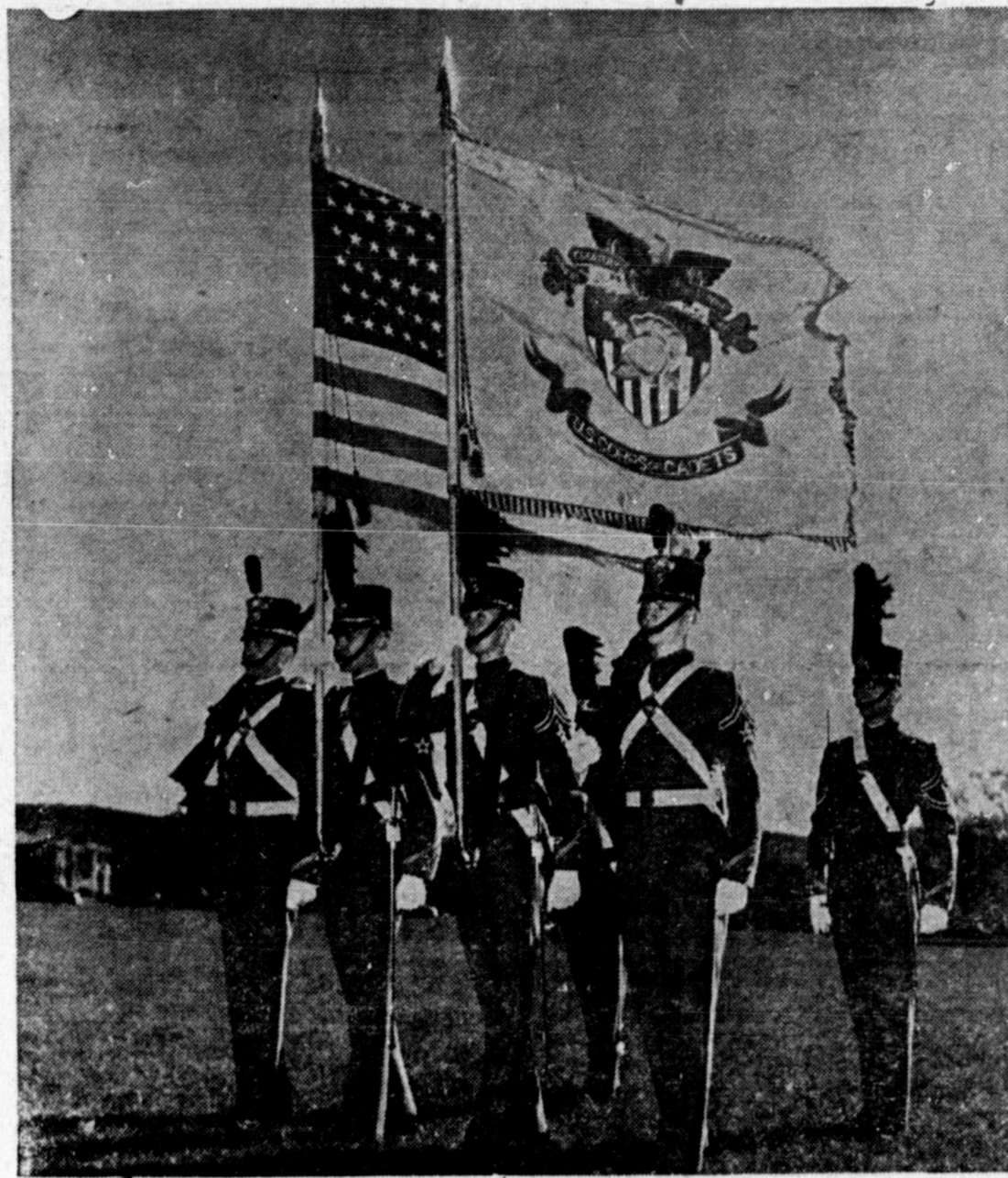
spring, and Oldsmobile dealers will begin to make deliveries shortly thereafter.

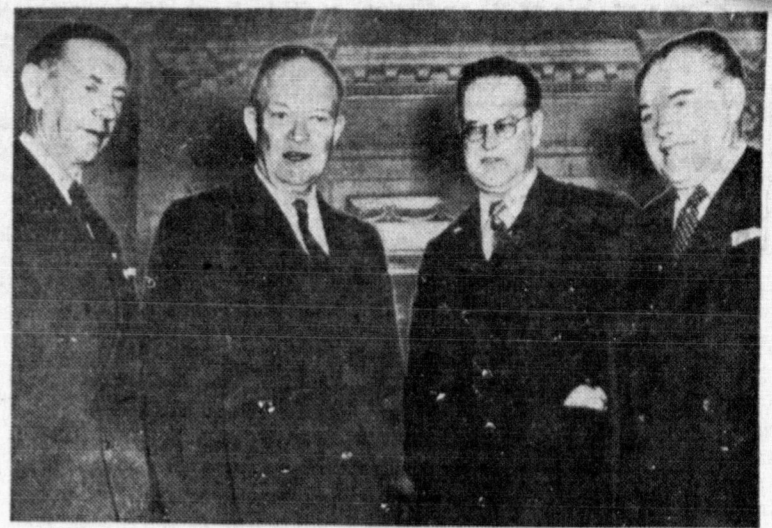

These loans may be made for the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, and for other essential farm and home operating expenses. Emergency loans may not be made to pay existing debts. Ordinarily, emergency loans to meet current operating and living expenses are expected to be repaid out of the year's income. Amounts advanced for crop production purposes are repayable when the income from the sale of the crops produced with the loans is received. No loan is made unless it appears that an applicant has reasonable prospects for success.

The Government obtains the best security obtainable for each loan made, including a first lien on all crops to be produced with the loan.

While emergency loans cannot be used to refinance existing debts, the loans can include funds to pay for the annual depreciation on chattels serving as security for prior loans.

AUSTIN—A CIO blast at Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has been answered by the latter. Shepperd said "certain fanatics in CIO have never yet admitted that they made a mistake in bringing the Communist DPOWA into Port Arthur in 1953".

At a CIO convention here, John V. Riffe, executive vice president of the national CIO, called for an immediate settlement of the Port Arthur strike. He sent a telegram to 11 Port Arthur businessmen

asking for a "peace conference." Port Arthur people declined to meet with the CIO.

Riffe said he hoped to find an end to the long dispute while he was in Texas. At the same time he asked Shepperd "to use his good influence" to bring about a settlement.

Shepperd stated that he and Governor Shivers were willing to meet anywhere at any time with labor and management representatives to seek a settlement of the strike.

Meanwhile the CIO set aside \$200,000 to finance continuation of the 13-month-old labor dispute.

Land Board

A decision on what to do about \$1,167,758 of South Texas land deals said to be fraudulent was delayed by the State Veterans Land Board.

Three South Texas land companies had offered to assume liability on that amount of land transactions which the firms promoted during the last four years.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, who said the land sales showed evidence of fraudu-

lent misrepresentation, told the Land Board that acceptance of the offer would violate the State Constitution.

The Board agreed to a one-week investigation period before announcing its decision.

Mental TB Patients

An increase of 1,100 beds for Texas TB patients and better treatment of mental cases has been urged by Governor Shivers.

Two other steps advocated to a state hospital advisory committee by Shivers included:

1. Making provisions for at least 50 beds for children under six suffering from tuberculosis.
2. Abolishing procedure of trials by jury to determine a person's sanity, with admission to mental hospitals based instead on medical examination.

Turnpike Funds

Texas Turnpike Authority members have authorized the issuance of \$58,500,000 in revenue bonds to finance the Dallas-Fort Worth toll road.

Members voted to make an offer to the Republic National Bank of Dallas to be one of the three trustees for the bonds.

After approval by the Attorney General, the bond issue is ex-

pected to undergo a Texas Supreme Court test to determine its legal validity.

Oil Money

Financial problems facing the Texas legislature have been slightly eased by oil production boosts.

A 257,307 barrel increase permitted for January in oil allowances brings to about 400,000 barrels the total boosts allowed since October.

As a result, state tax revenue will be \$1,500,000 a month higher.

Oil Outlook

Prospects have never been brighter for the state's oil industry than in 1955, says Railroad Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson.

Thompson said that heavy demands for gasoline and distillate fuels were responsible for the optimistic outlook.

Marriage Ban

Abolishment of Common Law marriages in Texas has been asked by a State Bar committee meeting in Austin.

Judges on the executive committee of the Bar's judicial section said the law would reduce the problem of illegitimacy and would help save welfare funds.

Insane People

"Not all the insane people are in the asylums" says Mrs. Richard Bergen, coordinator of Volunteer activities for the Austin State Hospital.

As proof, Mrs. Bergen submits evidence of some of the gifts sent mental patients for Christmas. They include unwashed under-clothing, dirty neckties, ripped dresses, shattered plaster plaques, cigar butts, used facial tissue, worn-out gloves that don't match, soleless shoes covered with paint, lots and lots of junk costume jewelry and some lewd articles—all of which came wrapped as Christmas gifts.

More than one-third of the 6,000 gifts sent the patients were of this nature.

"Some people apparently think the hospital is full of nothing but raving maniacs who don't know the difference between a decent gift and a piece of junk," says Mrs. Berger. "They couldn't be more wrong."

"Midland Man", Human Remains Found Near Midland

AUSTIN—"Midland Man," human remains found near the city of Midland, probably is a woman, University of Texas anthropologists announced.

Careful measurements of the skull proportions, brow and mastoid formation, teeth and finger bones indicate the remains are those of an Indian woman who died about age 30, Researcher Alex Krieger said. Her age was estimated by examining the closing of sutures, or anatomical cracks in her skull. The sutures

at a given age grows older. Krieger and Dr. ... of the New Mexico Museum announced chemical tests support other archeological evidence that Midland Woman was one of the earliest known residents of the Southwest.

The tests of fluorine, nitrogen and other chemical contents in Midland Woman's remains match similar tests of elephant, horse, camel and giant wolf and bison bones found in the same excavation. Any approximation of the woman's total age must await tests by machines which measure radiation disintegration in artifacts.

Texan Relates King Buck Yarn

AUSTIN—How he hunted and bagged the world's record white-tailed buck trophy is described by Henderson Coquat of San Antonio in the December issue of Texas Game and Fish Magazine.

The giant white-tailed, officially recognized by the Boone and Crockett Club, had a rack spread of 27 inches. It was taken in Webb County in deep South Texas in the fall of 1949 but it was not formally designated as the king of the white-tails until last March.

Coquat bought the scene of the historic harvest—the Old Apache Ranch—from the government in the fall of 1948. The ranch, on the east bank of the Rio Grande about fifty miles north of Laredo,

was part of a bombing ranch during the last war. It bore so much shooting evidence that the new owner said he doubted "that much game had survived the mighty bombardments of our eager young pilots!"

The champion went on in his narrative: "But I had not given full credit to the cunning and the courage of the whitetail. Not only had a goodly number of them survived, but they had learned what a man with a gun meant, and how to outwit him."

Coquat related how he had become increasingly intrigued by the tall tales brought back by his guests who referred to the enchanted bucks "with rocking chair-like heads that stared them into inaction."

Here is Coquat's own description of the climax to his quest: "I was alert and quick in feeling that a huge, ghostly, gray deer was threading his way through the chaparral and cactus about 200 yards away. He may have been sneaking through the chaparral and cactus about 200 yards away - - but whatever his busi-

ness, he sensed my presence just as I sensed his, and started in the opposite direction with that quick, crazy, dodging motion that has saved the lives of millions of his kind.

"But I had seen his horns and realized in that millionth of a second that he was the deer I had hunted all my life. All the years of hunting experience, and all the hunter's instinct, surged up in me in that flashing moment, and my 250 began to talk. The first two shots had hollow sounds, and I knew they had not touched him. Then just the right shot showed at just the right instant, and the touch of the trigger was synchronized as happens in the best (or the luckiest) shots. The crack of the rifle was followed by the thud of the bullet that said success. Down went the great rack of horns, and all was quiet except my pounding heart."

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

WELCOME 1955

We will always welcome the New Year because man instinctively looks forward, not backward. He looks forward with great zest to new horizons, new experiences, new adventures, and the opportunity to meet the challenges that these present. 1955 will bring many new problems to supplement the old ones that have not yet been solved. New approaches will be employed and many of the old problems will be solved in whole or in part, as

well as many of the new ones. All of man's problems will not be solved in 1955, or in any other year, but great progress will be made in all fields.

The international situation will continue more or less as it is. Red China will continue its efforts to force its way into the United Nations or to destroy that organization altogether. The imprisonment of the American fliers by Red China is, in my opinion, part of the master plan conceived in the minds of the Russians and the Red Chinese to force the recognition of the Red government and the ultimate admission of that government into the United Nations to replace the Nationalist regime that now represents China there. There is little chance that any major armed conflict will occur. We can expect local hostilities in several places, the exact locale to be chosen by the Russian and the Red Chinese governments. It can be expected that Red China will increase the tempo of its campaign to take Formosa. The intensity of this increase will depend upon what Red China thinks the United States will do in a showdown. The European countries will gain strength in 1955, and there is an excellent chance that the barrier against the encroachment of communism in that section of the world will be measurably strengthened.

On the home front, we can expect the following from Washington:

The administration will press for much additional public housing. This is a proposal that will probably be softly worded so as not to unduly offend those supporters of the administration.

These moves will be fought by the Department of Agriculture and perhaps by the administration.

We are also expecting an early move in Congress to bring about tax relief for the individual in the form of an increased individual and dependent exemption. This will also be fought by the administration, and may not go through this year. One of the main arguments against it will be that taxes on corporations due to be decreased this year will be extended at the request of the administration.

The possibility of getting direct federal aid to education will no doubt be tested by the administration during this session of Congress. The results of the test will determine whether or not legislation for such direct federal aid to education will be pushed.

There will be several items on the legislative calendar designed to decrease the powers of boards and bureaus. Many of us are most anxious to see what will happen to these if they pass the Congress.

Robert Naylor left Thursday after spending the holidays with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otis Naylor. After visiting friends in Amarillo and Canyon he resumed his teaching duties at Hereford.

Additional foreign aid funds will be requested but will no doubt be cut down measurably. The recent action of India in creating itself into a socialistic state will create a foreign aid problem that will cause many furrowed brows in the State Department.

Efforts will be made by the Congress to bring about early readjustments in the farm program.

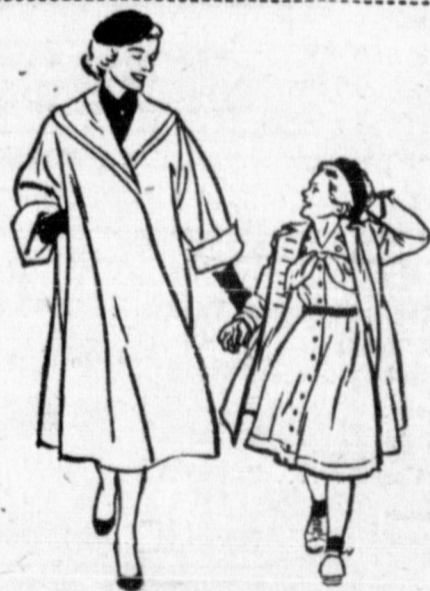

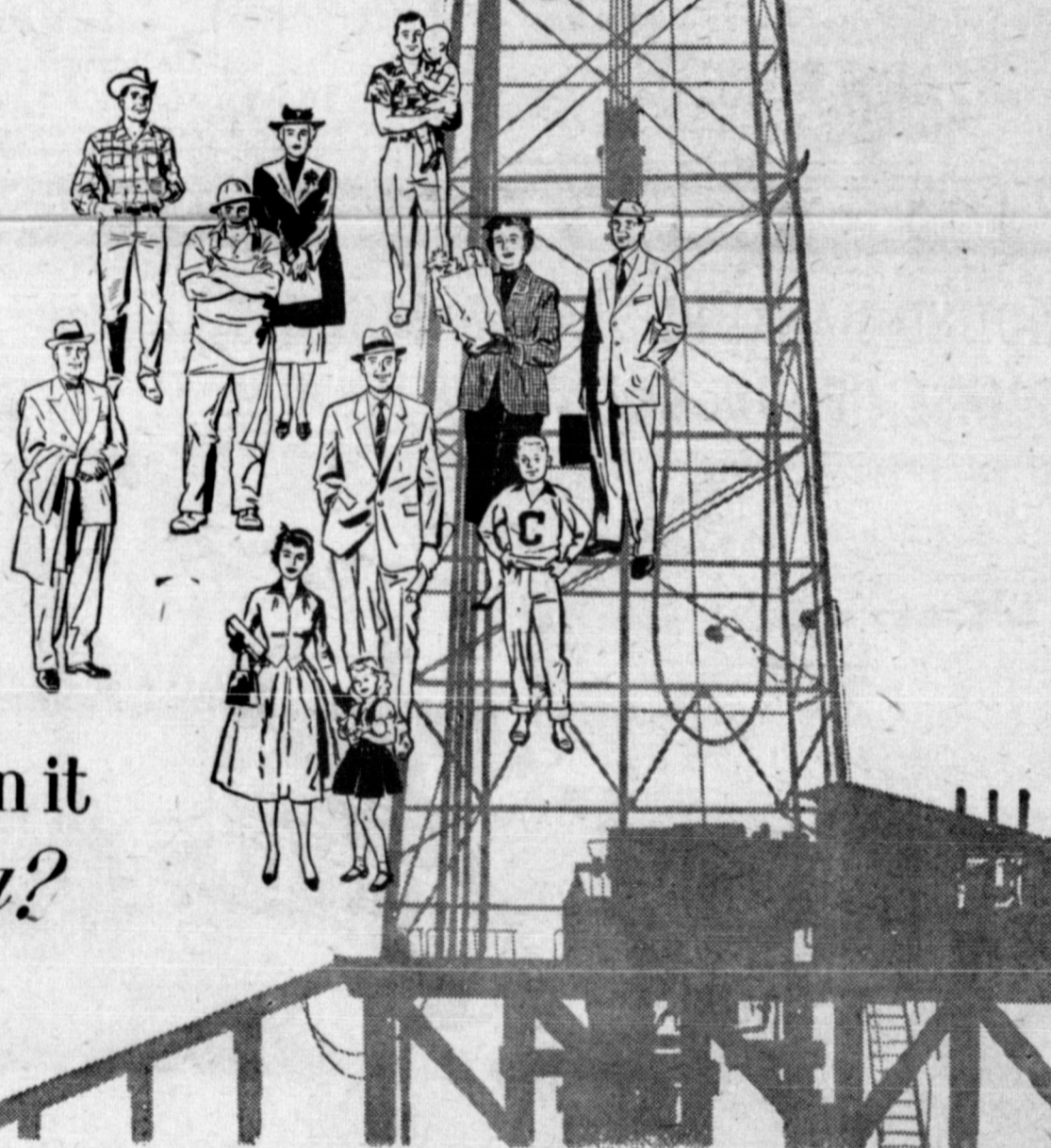

boll-weevil problems, and for some way to defoliate cotton stalks so mechanical pickers can be used.

The answer to both of these problems, Bureau officials say, may lie in the use of helicopters instead of the less maneuverable, conventional airplanes. The helicopter, using the advantage gained in its "downwash" from the overhead propeller, can spray much more thoroughly than airplanes, and "hard-to-get-at" places are virtually eliminated. The helicopter's maneuverability even enables the pilot to fly at night under favorable weather conditions.

The Bureau reported that farm cash income from cotton was 29 per cent greater in the first nine months of 1954 than in the same 1953 period.

Texas Cotton Farmers Average Almost Half Bale to Acre

AUSTIN—Texas cotton farmers averaged just under one-half bale to the acre this year, in spite of the drought, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

The average yield was 242 pounds per acre, well over the 200-pound record which stood for 37 consecutive years, from 1912 to 1949, the Bureau points out. Some individual areas (notably Central and East Texas and the Blacklands) did not fare so well, but their deficiency was more than made up with high-grade, long-staple cotton from irrigated sections in the Trans-Pecos and El Paso areas.

When the new Congress convenes in January, Texas cotton acreage allotments are expected to be increased, the Bureau notes. If this happens, there will be an even greater demand for methods of fighting the boll-worm and

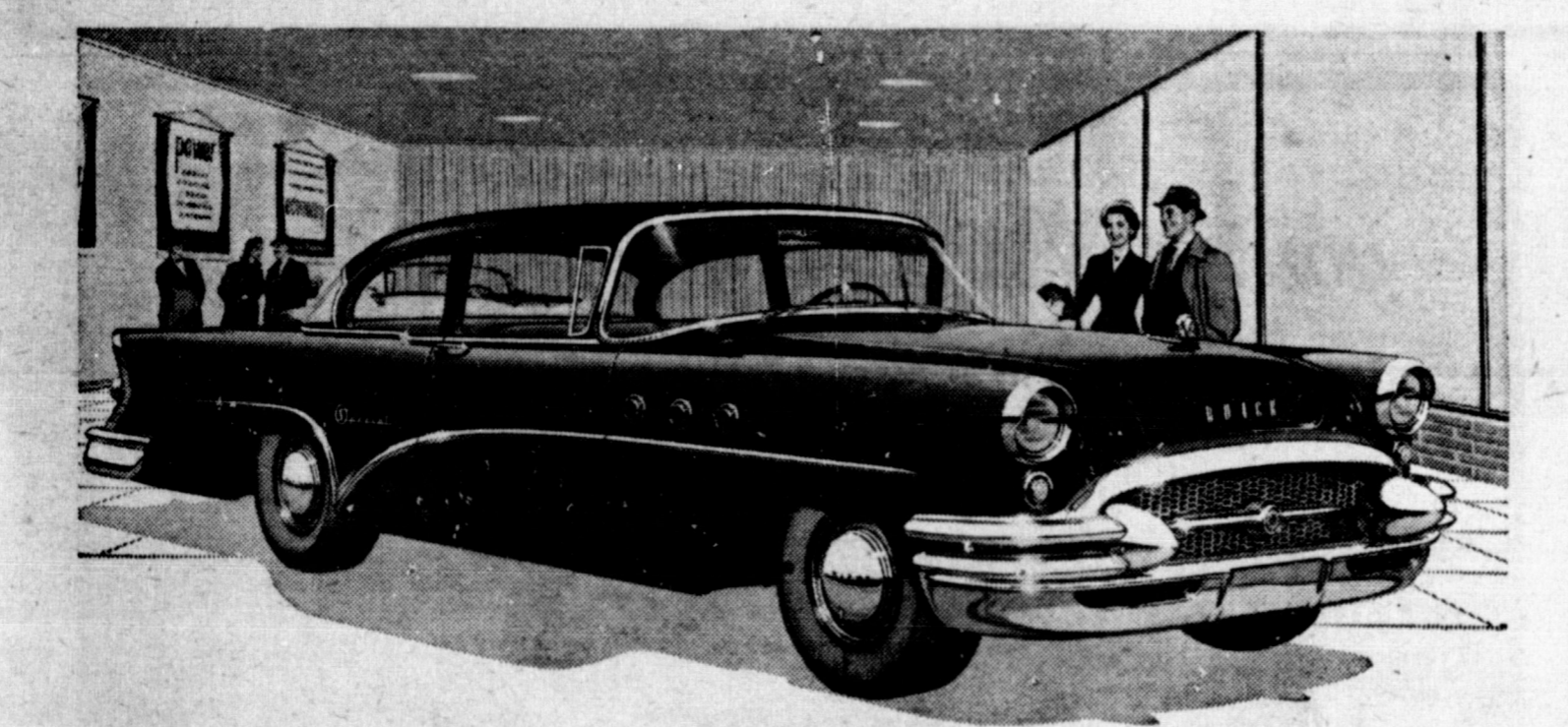

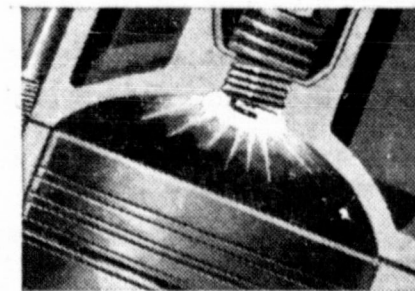

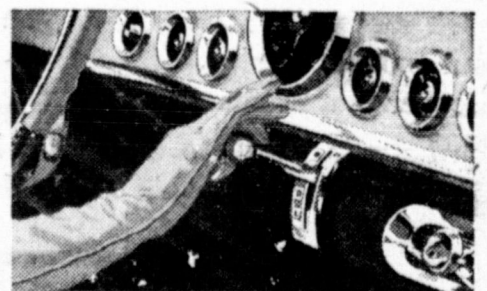
