## Intermediate Casing Set On Test Well

According to R. C. Rowden, tool pusher for the Rip C. Underwood Drilling Co. and Corsica Oil Co., the V. W. Carpenter No. 1, test well is at a depth of 3788 feet. Drilling was halted at this depth and intermediate casing was run to a depth of 2755 feet. The formation at the 3788 depth was brown dolomite. Testing operations at this depth were scheduled before drilling was to be resumed.

## Bronchos Scared McLean Tigers But Lost 35-28

The Clarendon Bronchos won the confidence they had been lacking in most of their games after they scored their second touchdown in their game with McLean here Friday night and came within seven points of tying the top rated Tigers, the final score being 35-28 in favor of McLean. This was the most points that had been scored against McLean all season and at the time the Bronchos were leading in the game 8-7, it was the first time that the Tigers had been behind their opponent during any game so far this season.

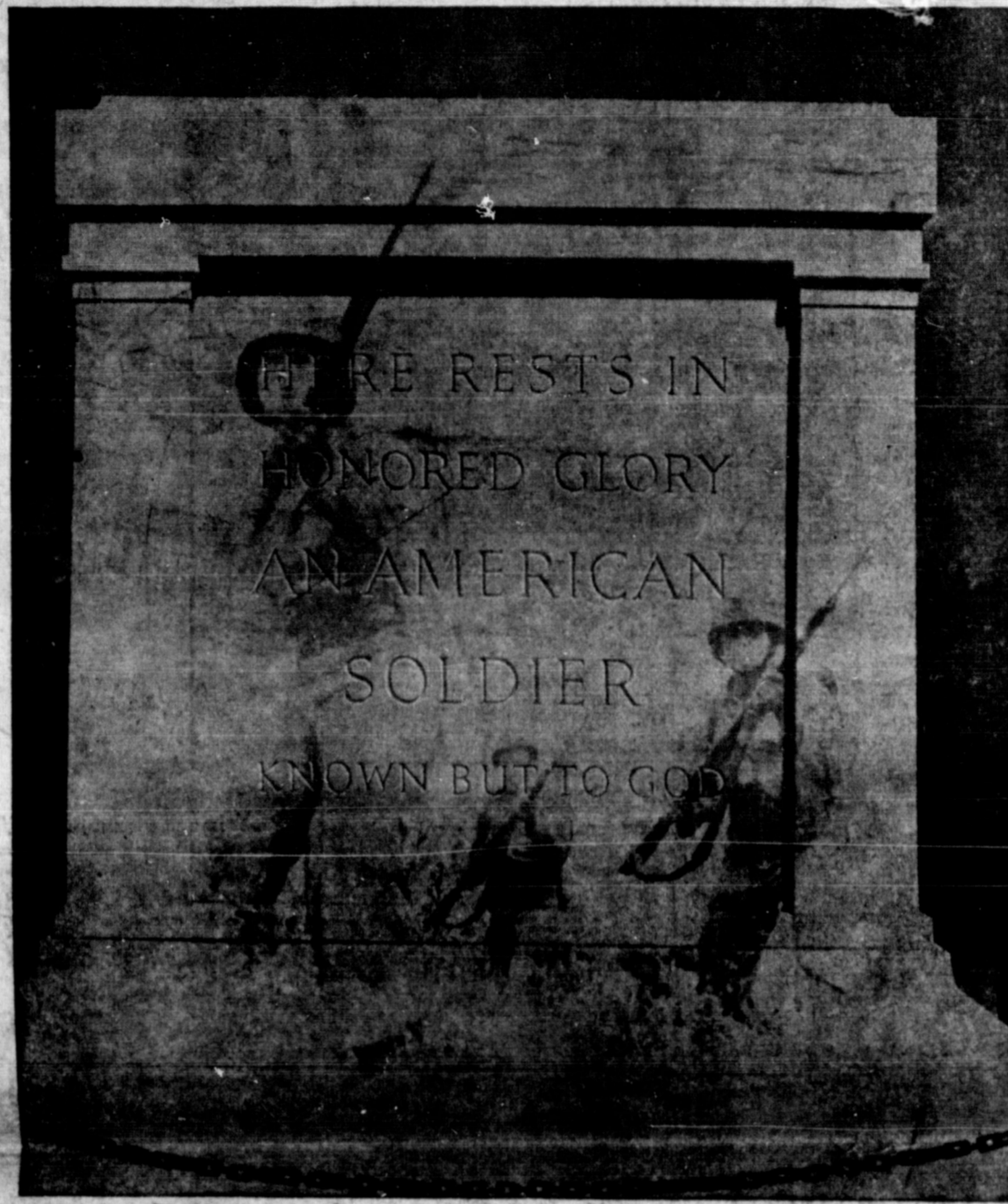
The entire Bronco squad seemed to take on new life and power after the Bronchos had scored their second touchdown early in the third quarter and the McLean fans as well as the Tigers became worried as the Bronchos were trimming down their lead as the minutes flicked away.

The Tigers scored 7 points in the 1st quarter, 14 in the second and 14 in the third period with the Bronchos holding them scoreless in the fourth.

The Bronco scoring started in the first quarter when Graham and Wilson tackled Mantooth in the end zone for a safety. Bobby Phillely was the first Bronco to cross the Tiger goal line for a touchdown. He scampered around right end for 39 yards and pay dirt. The next tally came in the third period when Martin took a pass to the 2 yard line and B. Johnson plunged over. Johnson passed to Jimmy Phillely for the extra. The next score came in the fourth period on the tail end of a 64 yard drive and a Bronco aerial barrage; Johnson passed to Martin for 38, to Jimmy Phillely for 10 and Bill Dale Hill went over from the 10 yard line; Hensley kicked for the extra. The Bronchos final tally came soon after with Max Johnson going around right end for 6 yards.

The entire Bronco squad played heads-up football and toward the end of the game, was showing much more power than the Tigers. The largest crowd of the season was on hand to witness the game with both the north and south stands completely full. Clarendon fans were proud and happy even though the Bronchos lost, for they showed the type of competitive spirit that makes football the sport it is today.

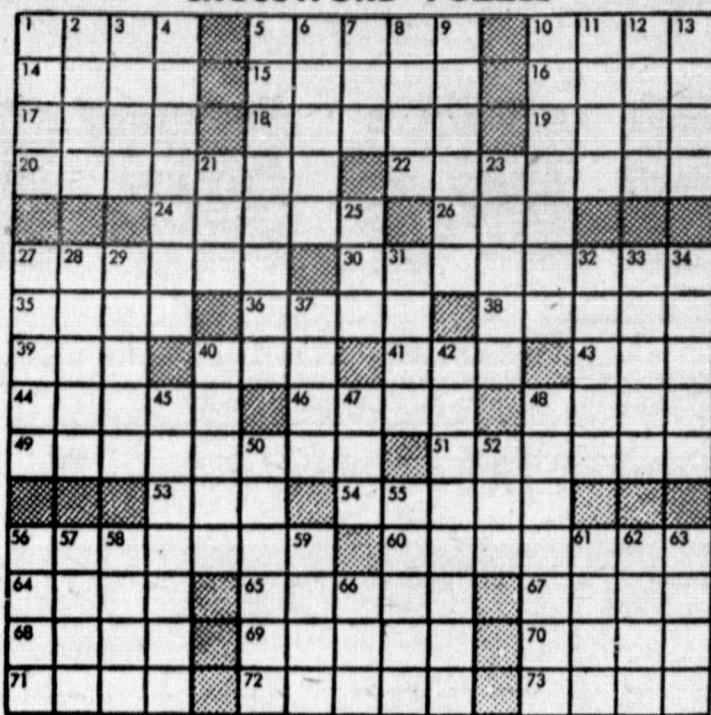

# Mygments and Sidelights State CAPITOL

**AUSTIN**—Taxes - - how much and where from?

State legislators and employees asked that question this week as the problem of meeting increased state expenses became a topic that might well dominate the 1955 legislative picture.

The Texas Research League, at request of Governor Allan Shivers, started a survey to determine how much is needed, checking state income, spending, and sources of additional revenue.

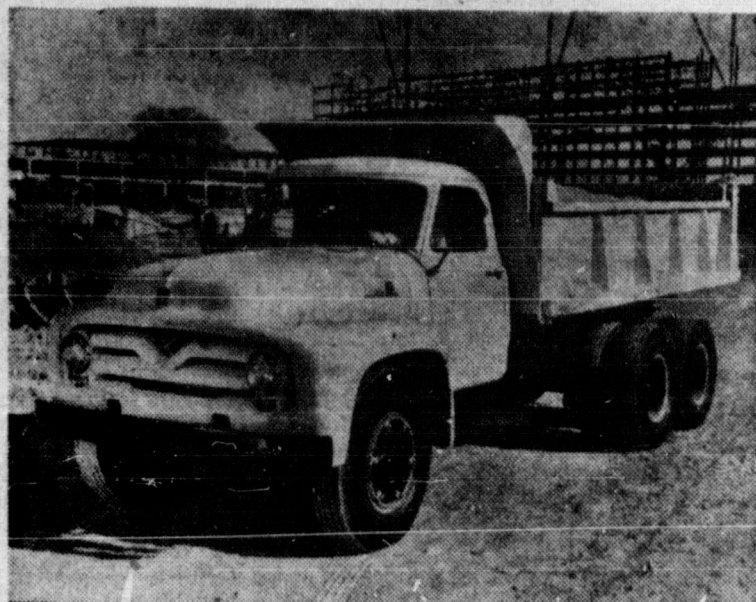
Considered as eliminated from the prospect list are only a general sales tax and a state income tax, both opposed by Shivers. However, legislators going back

to jobs in January are expecting plenty of taxation recommendations to fly. Major taxation may be held until the League makes its report.

**Governor Addresses League**

Speaking before the annual meeting of the Research League, Shivers stressed that Texas is entering an era of greatly increased spending. Advance planning is needed to get the most of each dollar spent and to prevent hurried spending in which the full dollar value is not obtained, he said, complimenting the research group for its report on the hospital system.

Shivers also commented that Texas has fewer jobs than other states, plus a State Treasury

surplus of \$39,000,000 and a very low debt, in contrast with deficits in many states.

The Research League now is conducting studies of public school financing, the state hospital system and the University

of Texas System. Two new studies have been added to their work list. One will be on operation of the Department of Public Safety and the other on tax-supported library services of Texas.

Asking For More

Already hammering for a boost in budgets are state hospitals, Highway Patrol, water conservation agencies, and the prison system.

Definite receivers of additional money are state teachers and schools.

No definite figures as to what is needed have been set although State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported that government costs increased \$108 million in the year ending August 31.

One tax proposal, boosting gasoline taxes from four to five cents, has been made. It would provide \$33 million for roads and schools but general state spending wouldn't benefit.

**Schools Get More**

Calvert said preliminary estimates show that the state will spend about \$30 million more on schools this year because of increased teachers' salaries and enrollment. School expenses in 1953-54 amounted to more than \$265 million, he said.

Also considered in taxation plans will be requests of the State Highway Commission and State Hospitals and facilities for handicapped children.

The hospitals, which received \$42 million, are seeking increases of \$32 million for the next two years.

Highway commissioners are asking an additional outlay to put highways in first class condition.

**Water Conservation**

Latest newcomer to join the "more money" bandwagon was the Texas Water Resources Committee which advocated a \$100 million state bond issue for water resources development and a three cents property tax to help pay off the bonds.

Both will be recommended to the January legislature after two years of study by the Committee.

**Texas Prison System**

Money for an effective parole and probation system is being asked by four state agencies.

Recommendations of the Board of Pardons, Department of Public Safety, Texas Prison System and State Auditor C. H. Cavness's office seek \$249,661 in the 1955 fiscal year to start the program

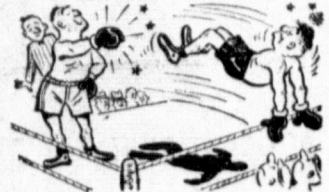
and \$345,232 the following year. Cavness said that the Texas parole system, while not rated as among the worst, is not among the best. He said the situation could be remedied if the legislature okays the request.

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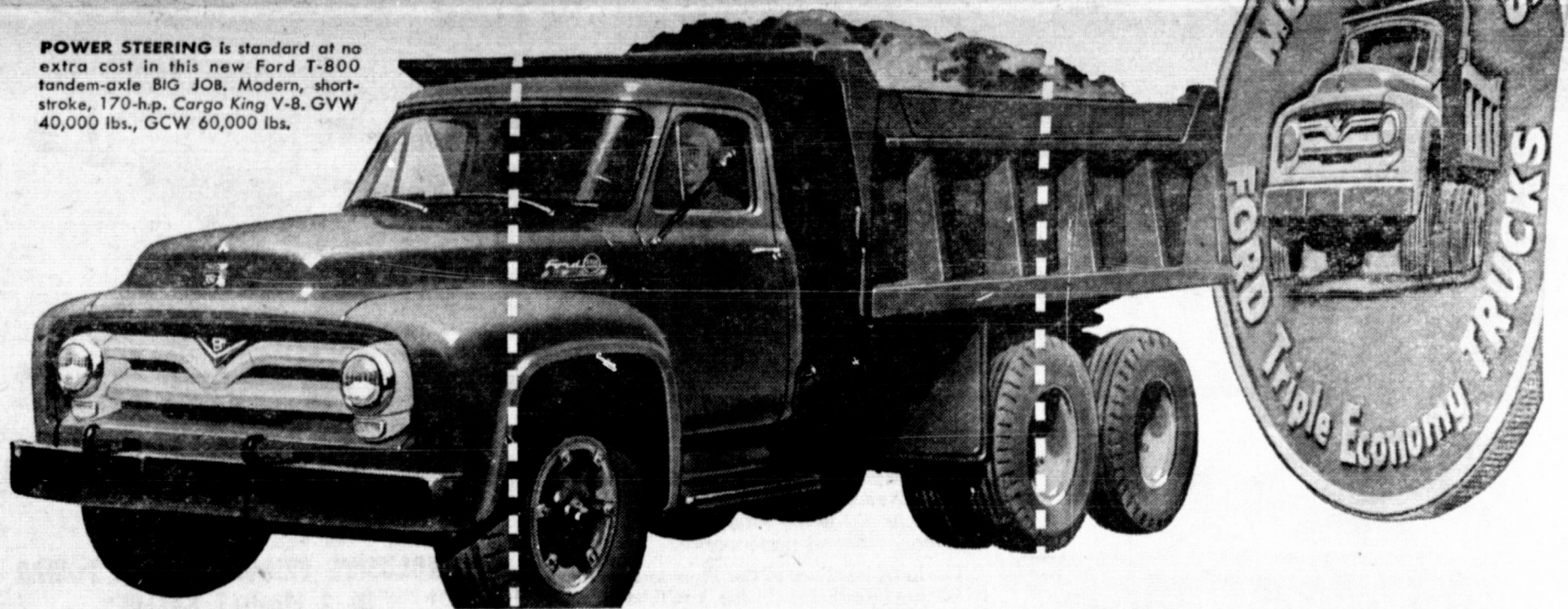

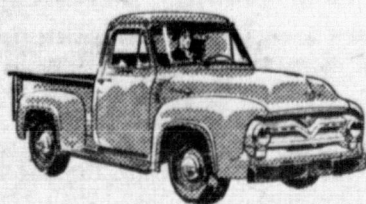

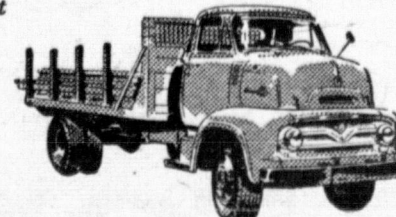

#### ATTENTION: Farmers Interested in Irrigation

There has been a change in the procedure concerning declarations of areas as eligible for soil and water conservation loans under Public Law 597. Formerly,

the eligibility of an area was based on available information and recommendations of the Director of the Extension Service, State Soil Conservationist, Chairman of the Board of Water Engineers, and the official in charge of the USGS Water Resource Branch. At a recent meeting of the State Advisory Committee and representatives of the above agencies, the entire state was designated for approval of soil and water conservation loans for the development of underground water for irrigation based on test hole drilling and soil and water analysis showing that sufficient water of acceptable quality for the purpose intended can be developed within an economic depth.

The trend toward irrigation in this country is becoming more apparent all the time. It will probably mean that some marked changes will have to be made in the farm programs within the next several years in order to

prevent discrimination between irrigated and dry land sections and in order to maintain a balanced food and fiber production throughout the entire country.

#### Cheese And Diplomacy

The committee for a National Trade Policy, Inc. is sending out reprints of an article which appeared in "Collier's", September 3, 1954, written by William H. Draper, Jr. The entire article would indicate that the United States is losing customers to Communist Russia because of an unstable tariff policy. The writer uses Danish blue cheese as an example to show that U. S. diplomatic relations suffered seriously when a quota was placed on imports of cheese. The article charges the action of Congress to pressure from American dairymen. It points out that the Mutual Security Agency of this country had taught the Danes how to make and package cheese to suit American taste. It also contends that the action resulted in a large monetary loss to the Danes, a loss of one million dollars to the Mutual Security Agency and

therefore, the tax-payers, the delivery of a Danish tanker to Russia, and some other consequences. It was claimed that U. S. relations with Denmark were strained and that our subsequent negotiations with that country have not been the best. You can expect to hear a great deal in the near future about free world trade. Weigh it and analyze it very carefully.

#### West Germany

The agreements signed at Paris on October 23rd, which, if ratified, will change the status of West Germany, were protocols

to three treaties, as follows: (1) Protocol of Accession of the Federal Republic of Germany to the North Atlantic Treaty. (2) Protocol of the Brussels Treaty. This will bring Germany and Italy into the Brussels Treaty and will provide the machinery with which to control armaments. (3) Protocol granting sovereignty to the Federal Republic of Germany. The fourteen NATO countries and the Federal Republic of Germany are involved in these agreements. No new commitments were

made by the United States in the Paris agreements. However, we have a general commitment under the North Atlantic Treaty to the effect that an armed attack on any one of the NATO nations will be considered an armed attack on all. Another, which has not yet been expressed, but which will probably be our main commitment, has to do with keeping our troops in Europe. If the European Defense Community had come into being, we were committed to furnish our fair share of forces for the defense of Europe. We have not yet repeated that commitment under the Paris Agreements, but Secretary Dulles has stated that he would recommend that we do so, if the new arrangement is approved. West Germany will have about

500,000 men in their three divisions in the Air Force of proper strength, and some navy which will probably be. They will not be allowed to manufacture atomic, or biological weapons.

**Livestock Market News Service**

Texas Dept. of Agriculture

A new market reporting service on livestock auction rings in West Texas will be inaugurated by the Texas Department of Agriculture in mid-November.

The auction sales report will cover activities at 16 livestock sales each week. Eleven cities in West Texas will be represented on the report.

This new service resulted from a demand from the livestock trade for recognition in the auction ring. Reporting of auction sales in Texas is a comparatively new feature on a state-wide basis. Amarillo was the first to be reported when a similar service was begun early last spring. Previously, the auction sales received only local publicity.

The Texas Market News Service will distribute sales information throughout the state through radio and newspaper coverage. West Texas points where sales will be reported are: San Angelo, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Vernon, Brownwood, Lubbock, Goldthwaite, Lamesa, Colorado City, Eastland and Big Spring.

Mail bulletins will be available to those who request the service. In addition to the auction markets, the bulletins will carry activities at the livestock centers in Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston and Kansas City.

Livestock auction reporting is one of many services offered by Texas Market News, a branch of the State Department of Agriculture. The division also reports prices on poultry and eggs, fruits and vegetables, rice, pecans and turkeys.

**Schools Cooperating In Child Traffic Safety Program**

"Young people need the 'know how' to survive in traffic today." Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Adviser for the Gulf Oil Corporation, made this statement recently as he outlined the role of the schools in teaching traffic safety to children.

He was speaking in connection with the child traffic safety program which is being sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the National Safety Council.

"The schools are cooperating fully with this child safety program, because they realize the drastic need for safeguards to youngsters' lives in modern traffic," he said.

He said that the entire safety educational program of the schools is planned both to protect today's children and develop tomorrow's drivers.

"In the classroom," Col. Tilley said, "children get lessons in safe walking habits and attitudes from kindergarten on up. And in high school, instruction quite naturally includes material on the safety responsibilities of both pedestrians and motorists, since many of our older students are beginning to drive."

"In this way," he said, "the schools are helping make the roads of the future safer, for when each motorist realizes and accepts his responsibility for the safety of other drivers and walkers, there will be fewer accidents on our streets and highways."

"However, no one must forget the immediate problem," he warned. "We all must work to prevent accidents—and save children's lives—now!"

"While the schools do their best to teach children safe traffic behavior," Col. Tilley said, "we realize that young people sometimes forget safety and caution. Then it often is only the watchful, wary motorist who can prevent another traffic tragedy."

"That," he said, "is why all drivers should pay particular attention to the slogan being featured in the child safety program of the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the National Safety Council: 'Watch Out for Kids.'"

**The Atom Goes To Sea**

A new G-E documentary film stars the "Sea Wolf," the atomic submarine for which General Electric is building the reactor. How an atom sub works and why a submarine was chosen for the first application of atomic propulsion are explained in animation. Combined with this are live action scenes taken at the Knolls Atomic Power Laboratory in Schenectady and the reactor test site at West Milton.

In production 18 months, the motion picture shows work at the test site from the time ground was broken for the giant sphere which houses the test reactor. Since the project is still under way, the film is actually a progress report, kept up to date by adding or substituting new footage as security restrictions permit.

Beginning Sep. 1, the 12-minute, 16-mm version of the film is available free of charge to the

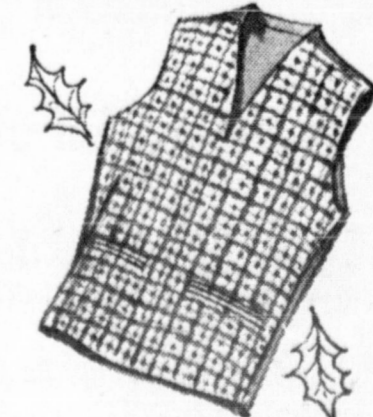

**GRAIN SORGHUM LOANS**

We have been making a lot of grain sorghum loans the past week, which is due to a good crop of which has not been raised in Donley County for a number of years. If the grain reached the elevators (to which the local grain dealers ship) after October 10, 1954; it will net the producer around \$2.12 per hundred weight. This is due to a 7 1/2 cent per hundred weight reduction in freight rate to the terminal elevator. To date we have made 62 loans and it looks like there will be several more.

**WINTER LEGUME PRACTICE**

Some producers have possibly not seeded their Austrian Winter peas and Hairy Vetch, which was handled under the CMS Program. The seeding has to be done by November 15, 1954. 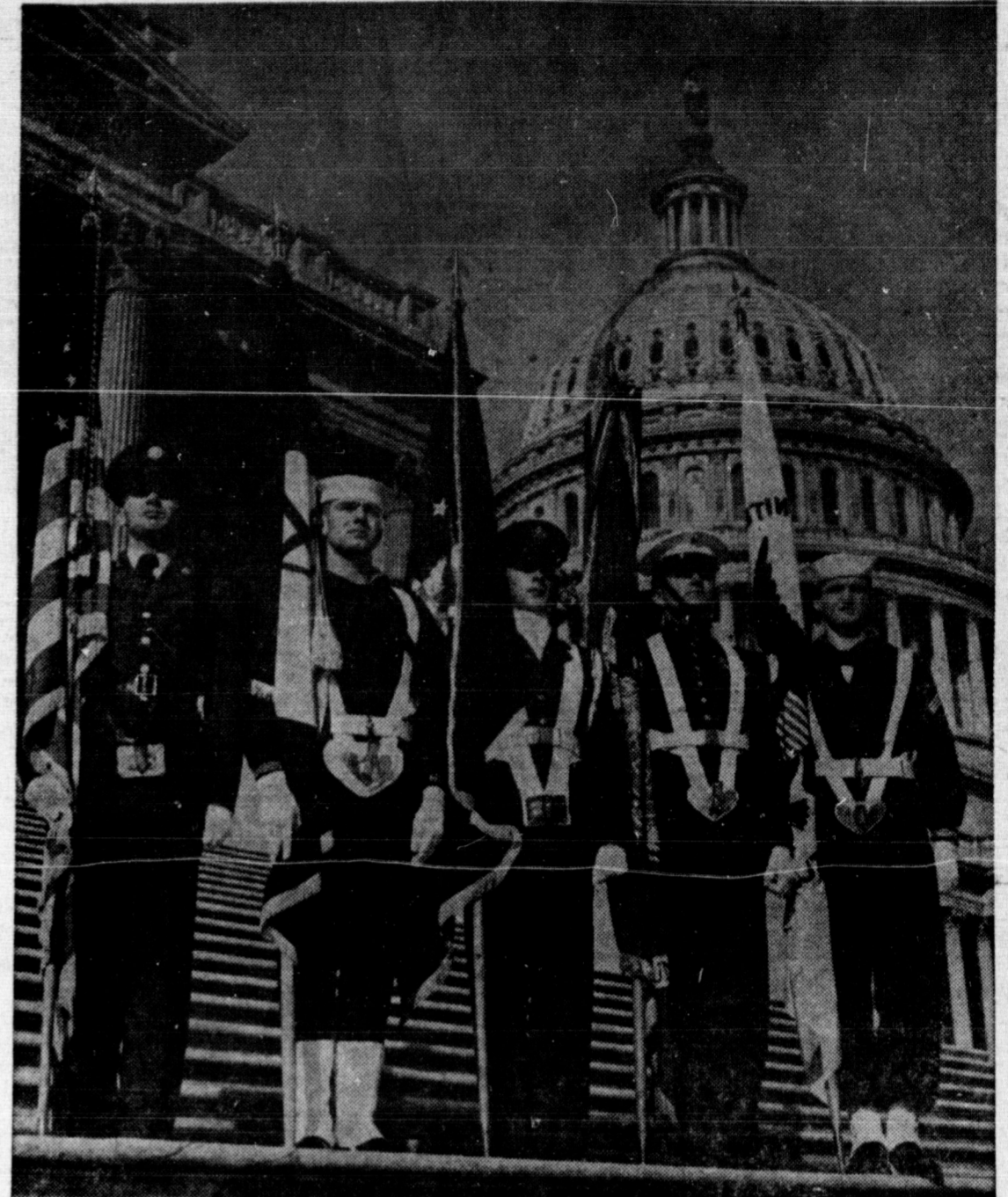

### Duck Hunters Gain In Texas

AUSTIN — While Texans indulge in the annual fall waterfowl harvest, game management technicians are seeking the answer for the surge of interest which has sent the state to the top in the number of Federal duck stamps sold.

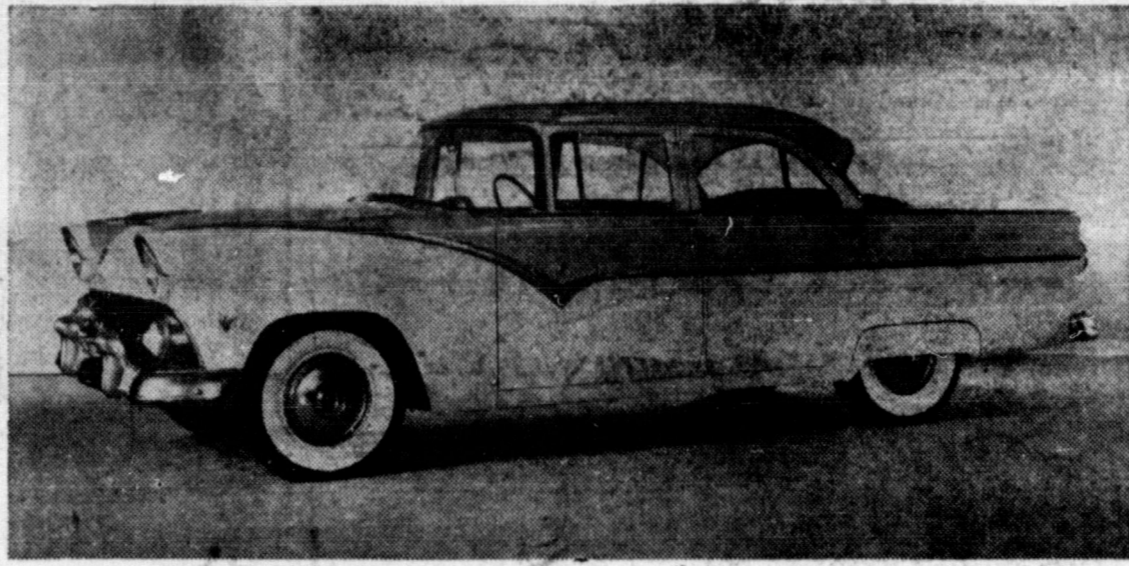
The United States Fish and Wildlife Service reports that Texas last year took the lead from California in the sale of duck stamps with a total of 230,391 stamps bought.

This represented an increase of

79,271 duck stamps sold to Texans and that is the figure that intrigues the wildlife people.

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission suggested that the slump in native game population, such as quail, from the historic drought, might have converted many upland game hunters to hunting waterfowl.

W. S. Jennings, Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Commission, who has given special attention to waterfowl, said, "Recent waterfowl hatches have been above normal. Wide publicity has been given to this trend and what it means to the hunter. Perhaps the primary fac-

tor in the high hunter interest was the abundance of fresh water for the 1953 season. Ducks that normally would have migrated on through Texas to Mexico wintered on the Gulf Coast."

J. R. Singleton, Wildlife Biologist specializing in waterfowl, said "The summers of 1952, 1953 and 1954 saw excellent hatches of waterfowl. This information was passed along to the public. Along the Texas Gulf Coast, in December 1953, the waterfowl population was more than 70 per cent greater than that for the preceding december. Distribution of the game was good. This was because of abundant water in areas which could not support sizeable water-

fowl populations previously.

"Mr. Hunter became aware that something new had been added. Areas of the inland rice belt observed major flights of birds—more surface water in fallow fields and prairie potholes resulted in a wide choice of feeding grounds. So, hunters saw ducks and geese in many areas for the first time in many years, and took advantage of the good thing."

Thus, according to the Executive Secretary, increased surface water could provide the answer for last year. But the increase has not been maintained during dry 1954 and observers will watch to determine if the duck stamp sales fares accordingly.

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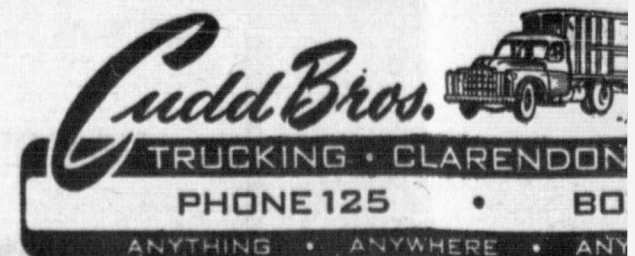

**Fertilizer-Pesticide Mixtures**

A time and labor saving plan to combine two separate crop spraying jobs into one operation is being studied by agricultural experts in the southwest.

The eventual goal is to work out a practical method for applying both pesticides and fertilizers at the same time. If it proves practical, it may also mean a better net profit for the farm through lower production costs.

Since the end of World War II the use of pesticides and fertilizers on crops has far outstripped the research end of the projects. The demand has been so great for yield-increasing farm practices that new ideas are put to work in the fields before a complete, controlled study has been made of both. The same goes for the dual pesticide-insecticide operation.

As a result, there are wide differences of opinion even among soils specialists on the merits and practical feasibility of the mixtures. Recommendations concerning their use vary widely from state to state, and sometimes even between agencies in the same state.

Despite lack of experimental data on use of fertilizer-pesticide mixtures the demand for them seems likely to continue. It probably will even increase in volume so long as their use affords a convenient economical and reasonably satisfactory way of combining crop fertilization with insect control.

But many problems are still unsolved. Paramount among these are:

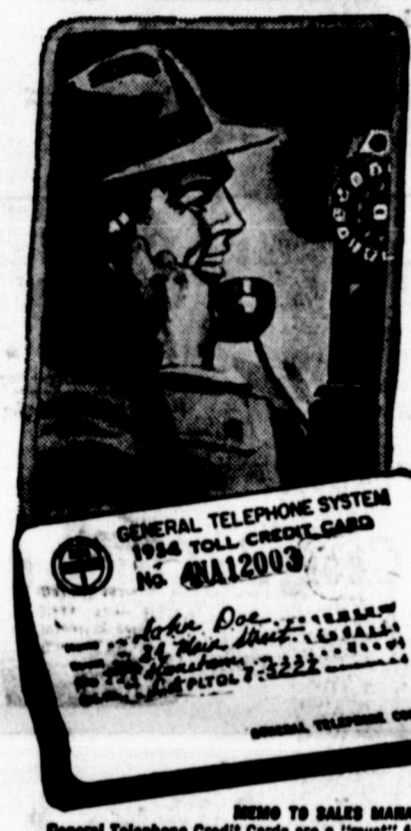
(1) The type of mixture that will supply the desired quantities of both pesticide and plant nutrients at the desired rate per acre.

(2) Timing of the pesticide application to fit the time for applying the fertilizer to achieve best possible benefits from both chemicals.

(3) Attaining the best method of applying the pesticide—which may not conform with the most effective or practical method of applying the fertilizer.

(4) Development of new equipment for applying the materials. When these "kinks" are ironed out, the results should prove to be a real boon to Texas farmers.

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
