The railroad commission ordered the Fort Worth & Denver City Railroad Saturday to hold off its proposed "Whistle Stop" schedule for Clarendon and seven other West Texas towns. The commission blew the warning whistle just in time as the schedule would have gone into effect last Sunday, May 1st.







"Then direct your efforts to eliminating all fly breeding places such as open garbage pails, open privies and other filth that offers the fly proper warmth, moisture and food. Flies thrive on filth, and inasmuch as one female housefly will lay from 600 to 1000 eggs per season, it can easily be seen that one breeding place left available in a community, can be responsible for a tremendous horde of flies."

Dr. Cox recommended organized community efforts as being effective in ridding a community of flies, and emphasized that no matter how clean one family's home and premises are, they are still not safe if another home down the street leaves exposed



March Retail Sales Above February

AUSTIN-Texas retail sales for March climbed 21 per cent above February to an estimated \$434 million, preliminary tabulations made by the University of Texas, Bureau of Business Research showed.

Shoe stores, increasing 39 per cent, and lumber and building material dealers, 35 per cent headed the list for largest advances over the previous month.

Gaining impetus from the approaching Easter, March sales of women's specialty shops went up 28 per cent over the preceding month. General merchandise sales followed with a 27-per-cent rise for the same period. Other monthly increases over February were men's and boys' clothing stores, 23 per cent; department stores, 23 per cent; and filling stations, 20 per cent.

Rising 24 per cent over February, March sales of durable goods stores outranked nondurable goods stores which registered an 18-per-cent increase.

Retail sales throughout Texas fell 2 per cent in March below March 1949. Durable goods store sales presented a healthier business picture, with a 7 per cent advance over the 12-month period, than non-durable goods store sales, which slid 10 per cent in March below a year ago.

Mottor vehicle and farm implement dealers turned in increases of 21 and 10 per cent, respectively, over March a year ago, while sales of other durable goods stores decreased. Jewelry store and lumber and building material dealers' sales dropped 15 per cent; hardware stores, 8 per cent; and furniture stores, 7 per cent.

March sales were from 1 to 25 per cent under a year earlier in all types of nondurable goods stores. Florists' sales declined 25 per cent; family clothing stores, 22 per cent, shoe stores and men's and boys' clothing stores, 19 per cent; and department stores, 14 per cent.





What is he preaching? The sacred historian says "He preached to him Jesus." That is certainly a brief history of what he was preaching, but equally plain. It is certainly what might be expected, that the officer believed what was preached. What did he believe then? The sacred writer says "As they went on their way, they came to a certain water." Water is not the theme now: faith is the theme. What did the officer believe? This is the matter in hand. The officer said. "See: here is water! what doth Philip answered, "If you believe with all your heart, you may." And he said, "I believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God." Acts 8: 36, 37, 38. On this belief the evangelist received and immersed him; and on this belief all the first converts were received and immersed.

On pentecost, on hearing one Gospel discourse, three thousand believed and became Christians in one day. Nor did they join Sunday. Church without believing, or knowing what they were doing.
