DONLEY COUNTY FAIR DATES SET FOR SEPTEMBER 17-18th

The Donley County Fair board met in the office of County Agent H. M. Breedlove on the afternoon of July 21st and set the dates for the county fair to be September 17-18th.

The departments for the county fair this year will be the community agriculture exhibits, home economics department, flower show, cake bake department, poultry department, rabbits, boys swine, sheep and the horse show.

Regulations and instructions for the above departments will be the same as the 1952 county fair catalogue. The new catalogue will be printed and ready to distribute over the county as soon as the ads are sold. The only means for financing the county fair is by selling ads to the Donley County fair catalogue and the individuals and business men of the county are the ones who make this fair possible.

All communities in Donley County are taking interest again in the county fair and all promise agriculture exhibits at the county fair. Breedlove will take the county exhibit to the Amarillo Fair from products shown by the communities at our local fair.

The fair board decided to have the entire fair in the McMurry building and Pat Slavin has offered the building for the county fair. It will be where more people can see the fair and located in a better position.

Last Sunday Hedley defeated the Pleasant Street Greenhouse team of Amarillo there by the score of 4 and 4. Raymond Neeley pitched for Hedley.

However, the game was forfeited to Amarillo. The playing field was changed and only 7 players found their way to the field. Using two unsigned players Hedley went ahead and played but league rules say all players must be signed by the July 1st deadline, so the game was forfeited. This leaves Hedley with 8 wins and 3 losses in league play.

Lelia Lake To Add Vocational Departments

J. C. Step, Lelia Lake School Supt., has announced that Lelia Lake High School has been approved for new courses in Vocational Home Economics and Vocational Agriculture. This will be the first year these courses have been offered in the Lelia Lake Schools. Since the courses are special vocational courses the teachers do not count against the regular teacher load and there will be two more instructors in Lelia Lake Schools this year than in the past. The state provides these two teachers with very little additional cost to the local school.

Mrs. Fred Bourland, Quail, a graduate of Texas State College for Women, will have charge of the Vocational Home Economics department. Mrs. Bourland is well known throughout this section and formerly headed the vocational home economics department of the Quail Rural High School.

The Vocational Agriculture Department will be under the supervision of J. R. Gillham, Clarendon. Gillham has completed approximately one year of graduate work since receiving his Master's Degree from Texas A&M. During the eleven years he taught vocational agriculture in Clarendon, the Clarendon F.F.A. Chapter was selected as the top chapter in Texas three years and as top chapter in the nation two years. For the past seven years he has had charge of the G. I. Vocational School Program under the direction of the Donley County School Board. Gillham has been very active in state and national livestock organizations as well as a local civic worker. At the present time he is president of the board of directors of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association, a member of the board of directors of the Texas Jersey Cattle Club and of the Texas Holstein Cattle Club, and he is the director of the American Dairy Association from the Panhandle region.

Quite a few farmers and ranchers were made happy this past week with the moisture received while others are looking forward to more moisture to save their crop in some instances and make them better in others. Points around Ashtola received moisture last Thursday night. Ben Lovell reported .26 inch at that time with the amount heavier in spots this side and beyond Ashtola. He reported only a sprinkle Tuesday night. Parts of the JA Ranch received good moisture Monday night.

The frontal system, moving across early Wednesday morning dropped .56 inch here in town with the amount heavier to the south and southeast. Mrs. Joe Ritter reported 1 inch at Sandy Camp and Lois Putman five miles southwest reported .60 inch. Sam Dale reported .22 at Goldston; Willard Knox reported .11 for Lelia Lake and good moisture was reported in the Hedley area.

The above is the report of the good weather the past week and here is the bad. Sunday, July 25th was the hottest day of the year so far according to Joe Goldston, official weatherman. It was a hot 110 degrees; Monday cooled down to 109 with another drop to 104 Tuesday. Mr. Goldston stated that the 104 Tuesday completed four weeks of 100 or over for each consecutive day during that time. Crops have stood up mighty well considering that report.

Large Vote Cast In First Primary Election Here Saturday

Lelia Lake F.F.A Group Planning Summer Tour

Approximately twenty-five members of the newly formed Lelia Lake Chapter of the Future Farmers of America are planning a trip through points of interest in New Mexico. According to J. R. Gillham, adviser for the group, they will leave Lelia Lake early on the morning of August 8th and will journey to Raton, Cimmaron Canyon, Eagle Nest Lake, Red River, Taos, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Socorro, Carrizozo, Ruidoso, Roswell, and the Carlsbad Caverns. The trip will be for six or seven days. Each member will take his own bed roll, and the group will camp and eat out on the entire trip.

Another meeting of the group will be held at the Lelia Lake School at 8:30 P. M. on the night of August 5th for the purpose of completing all plans for the trip. All members should attend this meeting and any members who have not already made plans to take part in the trip will have an opportunity to do so at this meeting.

An exceptionally large vote was cast here Saturday in the first Primary Election compared with the number of Poll Tax receipts and exemptions issued this year which totaled 1450. The top vote cast Saturday was 1822. Two years ago in the big election the top vote was only 2005 which shows that much interest was taken in both local and state politics.

There will be four run-off races to be listed on the Second Primary ballot with this election coming up August 28th. The hot race will be between Gov. Shivers and Ralph Yarborough and plenty of fireworks is expected to break loose between now and August 28th. The final report of the Texas Election Bureau Tuesday gave Shivers a total of 666,226 votes and Yarborough 642,374 votes. Other offices to be decided will be Chief Justice Supreme Court Place No. 1 between Few Brewster and Alfred M. Scott and the Court of Criminal Appeals between Lloyd W. Davidson and Alan Haley. The Election Bureau gave Brewster a total of 461,167 votes and Scott 318,372 and in the other race Davidson received 328,800 and Haley received 241,002. The other run-off race will be a local affair between Jess Finley and George Preston for the commissioners office in Precinct 4.

Jack Gray being re-elected with a total of 937 votes against 843 for H. T. Burton; Helen Churchman was unseated by P. C. Messer in the District & County race 1117 to 656; Mrs. A. G. Lane was returned to office with a majority vote over Mrs. Melvin Cook of 1164 to 631; R. C. (Bob) Hill retained his office of Constable Precinct 2 over C. Huffman by a vote of 611 to 362; F. M. Murray stays in as commissioner of Precinct 4, polling 349 votes against 190 for F. L. "Tige" Hill. In the Precinct 4 commissioners race, Jess Finley led the ticket, lacking only one vote eliminating a run-off race against the incumbent George Preston. Finley received 46, Preston 32 and H. W. (Shorty) Burr 15. Both Finley and Preston have stated that they would make the run-off campaign. Other totals for unopposed county officials were as follows: County Attorney, R. Y. King 1790; Sheriff, Assessor-Collector, Truett Behrens 1816; Commissioner Precinct 1: Hubert Rhoades 154; Precinct 2, Edd Mooring 1013; Justice of Peace Precinct 2, G. A. Anderson 1002; Justice Precinct 3, Frank Kendall 401; and county Chairman W. M. Patman 1793.

Pampa Defeats Dusters Here Sunday 11-6

The sixth and seventh were the decisive innings that the Dusters were unable to cope with Sunday afternoon when the Pampa Junior Oilers defeated them 11 to 6. The Pampa team was trailing 2 to 3 up until the 6th when they mustered four runs and followed up in the seventh with five more. The Dusters started out with 2 runs in the first, one in the 3rd, one in the 7th and 2 in the ninth. Toots Walker, appearing on the mound for the first time this year with the Dusters, did a fine relief job. Skinny Putman was robbed of a home run when the ball barely caught the top of a right field post to pop back inside.

In other games played Sunday, Groom defeated Amarillo Laundry in both games of a double header at Groom and Hedley outscored Pierce St. Greenhouse of Amarillo at Amarillo but forfeited the game due to some of the regular players being unable to find the playing field which had been changed to another location for this game.

Progress Report On Greenbelt Dam

Officers and directors of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Improvement District met at the Electrical Co-op Building in Memphis Tuesday evening to hear a report on the progress toward construction of a dam to impound 100,000 acre feet of water on Salt Fork River near the Collingsworth-Donley County line. Besides the regular officers of the Association, interested citizens from Memphis, McLean, Shamrock, Clarendon, Hedley, Childress were present.

Mr. R. A. Underwood of Dallas introduced Mr. Freeze, of the firm Freeze and Nichols of Fort Worth, by stating that all financing of projects of this nature was dependent upon the findings and recommendations of competent and trusted engineers.

Mr. Freeze stated that he had continued the work begun by Mr. A. H. Woolverson upon whose findings the district was created. He stated that it is feasible to construct a dam that will furnish a dependable supply of 25 million gallons daily of good quality water.

Mr. Underwood stated that contacts with a number of important industries indicate that sufficient water can be sold to make the financing of the project possible.

Plans were made to carry on an educational program in each town based on all the facts available. When the people of the various towns thoroughly understand the issues, an election will be called to determine which towns wish to become a part of the district.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, elections may be held by providing for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas; and providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxing voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall be in favor of such election, the Assessor-Collector of Taxes shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other county officials.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

IMPORTANCE OF DISPOSING OF EXCESS COTTON:

All cotton producers who have been notified that their measured acreage is more than their allotment, are reminded that it is most important that the excess cotton should be disposed of within 20 days from the date of the overplanted notice.

The statement in the overplanted notice reads this: "Under the provisions of the Act you may dispose of the excess acreage within 20 days of the date of this notice, or such later date as approved in writing by the County Committee, so as to adjust the planted acreage to the farm allotment. The cost or re-checking any acreage disposed of must be paid by the producer."

The charges for measuring excess cotton acreage is \$3.00 per farm plus \$1.00 for each plot over one.

As soon as you have disposed of your excess acreage, please notify this office in order that a recheck may be made of your acreage.

1954 WIND EROSION CONTROL PROGRAM:

Applications are still being accepted in the County Office for approvals to carry out the following practices:

Pr. No. 36-B—STUBBLE MULCHING—This practice is limited to land now seeded to small grain or land to be summer fallowed in 1954. The acreage must be worked with a sweep type implement. MAXIMUM FEDERAL COST-SHARE—\$1.25 per acre.

Pr. No. 36-E—SEEDING GRAIN SORGHUM, SWEET SORGHUM, SUDAN GRASS, MILLET, BARLEY, OATS OR RYE TO ESTABLISH A COVER FOR THE CONTROL OF WIND EROSION.

Volunteer crops and crops planted prior to July 10, 1954 will not qualify. A crop will not qualify if grazed or harvested for any purpose.

MAXIMUM FEDERAL COST-SHARE:

- (1) Sorghums in rows—\$1.00 per acre.
- (2) Crops drilled or broadcast—

\$1.25 per acre. Pr. No. 36-F — PITTING OR CHISELING GRAZING LAND FOR WIND EROSION CONTROL. MAXIMUM FEDERAL COST-SHARE: 75c per acre. WHEAT MARKETING QUOTA REFERENDUM RESULTS FOR DONLEY COUNTY

Wheat farmers in Donley County voted Friday, July 23rd, by a margin of 51 to 5 to continue federal marketing quotas and acreage allotments on their 1955 wheat crops. The vote was part of the nation-wide referendum and required a two-thirds margin for approval.

The Donley County ASC Office records show that 300 were eligible to vote in the referendum in this county.

By voting in favor of quotas, farmers here indicated their desire for supports at a fairly high level. However, the level of supports has not yet been determined by Congress. The level probably will be established at somewhere between 75 and 90 percent of parity, or at present rates, a support price of from \$1.87 to \$2.25 per bushel.

Fire Department Starts Campaign Fire Safety

Knowing the danger of fire and the disaster it causes, the Fire Department started a two weeks campaign Monday, July 26, to put Fire Extinguishers in every home in Clarendon. The extinguishers they have selected are the products of Power-Pak Products Inc., of Buffalo, N. Y., who make only CO-2 (carbon Dioxide) extinguishers under strict supervision of the Interstate Commerce Commission and include household units which can be hung in any room in the house, all being finished in white enamel, fire alarms and extinguishers for the automobile, barn, truck, tractor and combine.

Carbon dioxide is the best known element for extinguishing gasoline, oil, grease and surface fires. It is perfectly safe to use, being non-poisonous and will not stain nor discolor the finest of wall paper nor linens and leaves no mess to clean up after its use.

C. W. Bennett, Chief of the Fire Department says, "We have mailed letters to all the homes in Clarendon explaining that we will call on them with sample extinguishers so that they may choose the kind of extinguisher they will want. We the Firemen know that every home in town should have an extinguisher handy in case of an emergency, because if a fire can be extinguished as soon as it starts, hundreds of dollars can be saved in property damage and lives might be saved. He says further, "It may be that we have inadvertently overlooked someone in our mailing, if so it is a mistake on our part and we are sorry, so if anyone who has not received a letter wants an extinguisher will kindly call the Fire Department a Fireman will call on you with sample extinguishers so that you may select the kind of extinguisher you want."

Chief Bennett also says, "Every farm home, barn, truck, tractor, automobile and combine should be equipped with one of these extinguishers, so we have placed on display in a show window at Clarendon Electric a sample of each of these. Packages of

"Safety" for you to see. You may either leave your order at the place of display or at the Fire Department.

In doing this service for the community Chief Bennett says, "We of the Fire Department are on the job twenty four hours of the day to put out fires and we always respond as quickly as we can after an alarm has been turned in, to save as much of your property as is possible; but if you have one of these extinguishers handy you might extinguish a blaze without any damage and we will be grateful if you will cooperate with us. You know we will come if you have a fire; but it takes time, and fires don't wait."

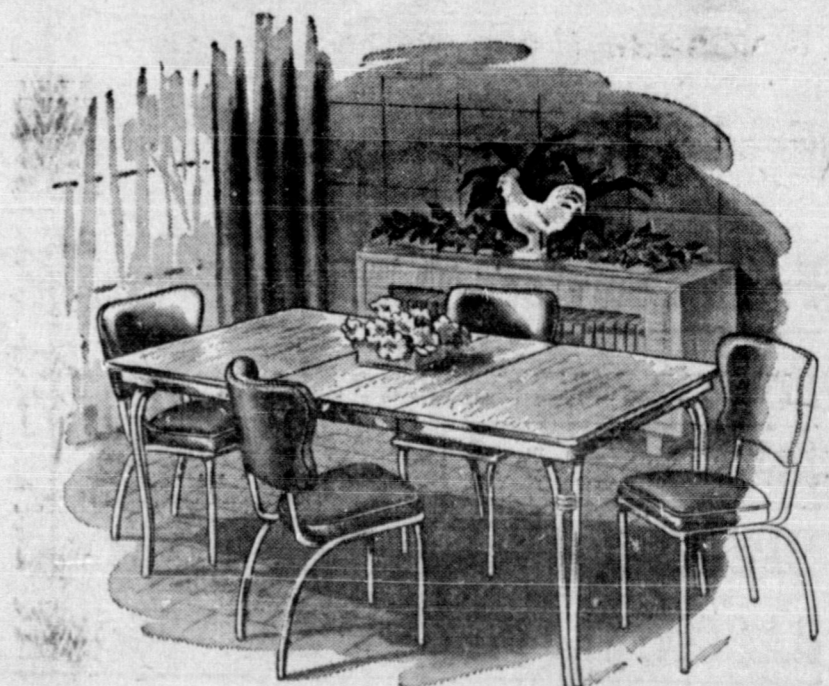

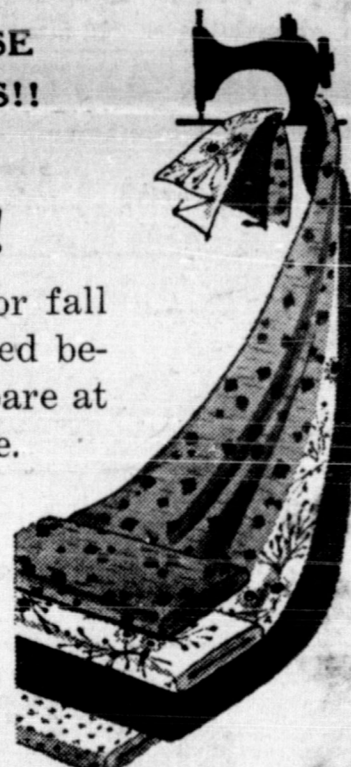
