LaMaster & Caravan Of Boosters To Visit Here Friday

PERRYTON, Texas — LeRoy (Pete) LaMaster will head an automobile caravan to bring the final week of his campaign for Congress to the grass-roots voters of the 18th District October 29 and 30. LaMaster Headquarters here revealed that the tour will originate in Amarillo early Friday morning, Oct. 29, and will visit more than 30 towns in the district Friday and Saturday.

The Perryton farmer-stockman plans to meet as many citizens personally as possible on this tour and explain his program and the issues to the Panhandle voters. Confident of a comfortable margin of victory over his opponent and what LaMaster terms a "do-nothing" record, the Congressional candidate said he has been handshaking with thousands of voters who have urged him to bring out the truth of his opponent's voting record in Washington of 61 per cent against President Eisenhower's program. "The mandate of the people," LaMaster pointed out, "who voted 60 per cent for President Eisenhower in 1952 and the mandate of his own Democratic Party which supported Eisenhower against Adlai Stevenson has been ignored by the incumbent." LaMaster added that his opponent publicly supported the Truman-Stevenson ticket then and "a look at his record since will show the people of the Panhandle that they have had no adequate representation in Washington since then," he said.

The itinerary for the two-day caravan includes a stop in Clarendon at 5:25 Friday afternoon, October 29th.

Water Cut-Off Warning!

Orville Housden, City water supt., announced yesterday that the entire Clarendon water system would be cut off Sunday morning, October 31st at 8 a. m. (weather permitting) to replace one of the key water valves which is located at west 3rd and Parks. Several reasons brought about this time to make the repair.

At the present time we figure the job will take approximately six hours as the old valve will have to be cut out and a new one put in with lead which necessitates a complete draining of the mains, Housden stated. If we encounter trouble, the job could take longer than six hours but we are planning on finishing it sooner if at all possible, he added.

Be sure and remember to turn up your water before Sunday.

Bronchos Defeat Grubbs 32-13

The Clarendon Bronchos took an easy conference win over the Gruber Greyhounds here last Friday night 32-13 with the second team playing almost half of the game. They could have pushed up a much higher score but the coaches chose to keep it down and give the second team some more much needed experience.

The Bronchos scored 13 points in the first quarter and 19 points in the second quarter. They crossed the goal line on two other occasions which were called back due to infractions and drew penalties instead. One was in the second quarter when Noblet went over from the 20 and the other was in the third quarter when Jimmie Philley went thru the line for 51 yards but Clarendon was off-side on the play.

The Bronchos first score came at the beginning of the game when Bobby Philley raced 40 yards to the goal line, fumbled and Ronnie Martin recovered for the TD. The next was made by Max Johnson from the 10 yard line and Noblet converted for the extra. The third TD was made on the first play of the second quarter with Bobby Wilson going over from the 5 yard line. Noblet went over from the 2 for the next six points and a short time before the half, Ronnie Martin intercepted a Gruber pass and went over from the 28. Wilson ran the extra point.

Both of Gruber's TD's were made in the fourth period against the second team which had held them scoreless during the third period.

Drilling Started On Test Well

The drilling rig for the deep test well on the V. W. Carpenter place 4 1/2 miles southwest of town, was moved in the latter part of last week and drilling operations were started Tuesday night after the surface casing was set the first of the week.

The test well is being drilled by Rip C. Underwood Drilling Co. and the Corsica Oil Co., supported by Phillips. Proposed depth is 6,500 feet or granite.

Inspection was made of the City's modern Sewage Disposal Works and the methods used for the safe disposal of sewage.

In general many questions were answered for the group pointing out just how the state cares for our health thru water.

Fifty-four students were present for the trip.

The Halloween fun Clarendon has in mind is not a TRICK or TREAT, it's a chance to TREAT the needy kids from Chile to Bengal."

Friday evening children in costumes will ring doorbells and knock on doors in Clarendon as usual and say "Trick or Treat"—but they will wear arm bands bearing the letters UNICEF, and will say "We want a treat for all the world's children."

This United Nations Children's Fund activity is being sponsored by the Sims Parent-Teacher Association in conjunction with their annual Carnival activity.

Instead of filling a bag with candy and cookies Clarendon's children will carry jars or cartons for coins collected. No coin larger than a dime is to be given. This Halloween "Trick or Treat" project offers youngsters an opportunity to share in the work of UNICEF, the United Nations' program which is the world's largest international effort to improve the health and welfare of children and their mothers. Thanks to UNICEF, Korean boys and girls in unheated schoolrooms and homes will have a glass of warm milk every morning this winter. In Burma, Thailand, Indochina and Hong Kong, fewer mothers will have to stand by helplessly and watch their babies and youngsters die from preventable diseases. Fewer children in South America or India need suffer malaria or yaws for want of 15 cents worth of drugs. Children and parents in 80 countries all over the world know the meaning of UNICEF.

The fire whistle will blow at 6 o'clock Friday night to signal start of the march. At 7 o'clock it will blow again and all workers will meet on the Court House lawn for the counting.

Last year 1349 communities in the United States participated in this "Trick or Treat" Halloween project, and turned over to this United Nations Children's fund \$99,000.00. This Friday's march by our children will give the people of Clarendon an opportunity to participate in this humanitarian effort for the welfare of children in a peaceful world.

Have your dimes, nickels, and pennies ready, but do not make a contribution to any person not wearing the UNICEF arm band.

In the event a child fails to reach you during the hour set aside for this drive, a booth will be provided at the Carnival on Saturday evening for your contribution.

Johnnie is a member of the high school Junior class here.

This was the first serious case of polio to be reported here in quite some time and the first case to be reported here this year that we have record of.

General Election Is Tuesday, Nov. 2nd

Donley County voters, along with voters from all over the state, will go to the polls Tuesday, November 2nd to vote for their favorite candidate and to vote for or against 11 constitutional amendments which appear on the lengthy ballot this time. These eleven constitutional amendments are summarized on page two of this issue of the Leader so all you who are not acquainted with their contents may look them over before casting your ballot.

Outside of the Constitutional Amendments, this election is a race between candidates of the various political affiliations of which the Democratic and the Republican parties are the main two.

The race which is drawing most attention in this section is the Congressional race between the Republican candidate LeRoy (Pete) LaMaster of Perryton and the Democratic candidate, Walter Rogers of Pampa. LaMaster has been conducting a very active campaign and is expected to give Rogers plenty of opposition as he is seeking the vote of Ike supporter who held the majority in Donley County in the Presidential election.

In the Governors race, Allan Shivers is opposed by Republican Tod R. Adams. In the U. S. Senators race, Lyndon B. Johnson is opposed by Republican Carlos G. Watson and Constitution Party candidate Fred T. Spangler. For Congressman at large, Martin Dies is opposed by Tom Nolan, Republican; Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White is opposed by Republican Harry W. Linderman and Constitution party E. E. Wells. These are the only party contested races listed on the ballot although it is permissible to write-in a candidate for any of the races.

There is no party opposition in any of the county or district races.

Be sure and go to your voting box next Tuesday and cast your ballot. Your vote may be the deciding vote in any race. Vote for the person you think best qualified to fulfill the duties of the office and you will have done your duty as a qualified voter. If you stay away from the polls, you have no place to gripe about anything.

Car And Plane Accidents Claim Four Lives

A collision involving three cars at the Y where highway 70 intersects 66 north of Jericho last Friday morning claimed three lives and another died in a plane crash a short distance from the scene of the first accident Monday.

Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Johnson of Elk City, Okla. and Mrs. Charlotte E. McCoy of Kalamazoo, Michigan died as a result of the car collision and their bodies were brought to Clarendon by the Murphy Funeral Home. The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were taken to Elk City Friday evening and services were held there Sunday afternoon. The body of Mrs. McCoy was sent by rail Sunday morning by Murphy Funeral Home to Kalamazoo, Michigan.

The fourth person to die in connection with this same accident was Fletcher Pope, Amarillo photographer who was taking aerial pictures of the first accident shortly after noon Monday. The plane struck a power line across the highway and crashed. The pilot, Cecil Kinerd, received only minor injuries. Both were taken to the Groom hospital in a Murphy Funeral Home ambulance where Pope died about an hour and a half later.

Sheriff Truett Behrens reporting on the plane accident, praised the quick work of Lonnie Walker, local manager of the West Texas Utilities Co. and L. M. Smith, lineman, who arrived on the scene to remove the danger created by a power line that fell across the highway and a fence.

AUSTIN—Widespread interest is gradually being developed in the 11 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted on at the general election, November 2nd.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10, would create a State Building Commission with broad authority, subject to Legislative direction, to erect buildings for State purposes.

The Governor's salary is now set by the Constitution at \$12,000, the Attorney General's at \$10,000, and the other four officials involved are paid \$6,000 a year.
Under this amendment the Legislature could not reduce salaries below these amounts, but could set them at higher rates.
Opinion does not appear to be so nearly unanimous about this part of the proposed amendment. Some people are troubled by the apparent power of the Legislature to change the salaries at will, and they point out that the Federal Constitution and many other state constitutions prohibit a change in salary during the term to which an official has been elected.

They would be required to pay their poll taxes and could vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the services.
HJR No. 8
The last proposal on the ballot will be House Joint Resolution No. 8, which is a permissive type of amendment allowing taxpayers in counties of less than ten thousand inhabitants to vote on the question of whether they would prefer to have a separate full-time office of tax assessor-collector.
Duties of the tax assessor-collector are now performed by the Sheriff in these counties.

next few nights.

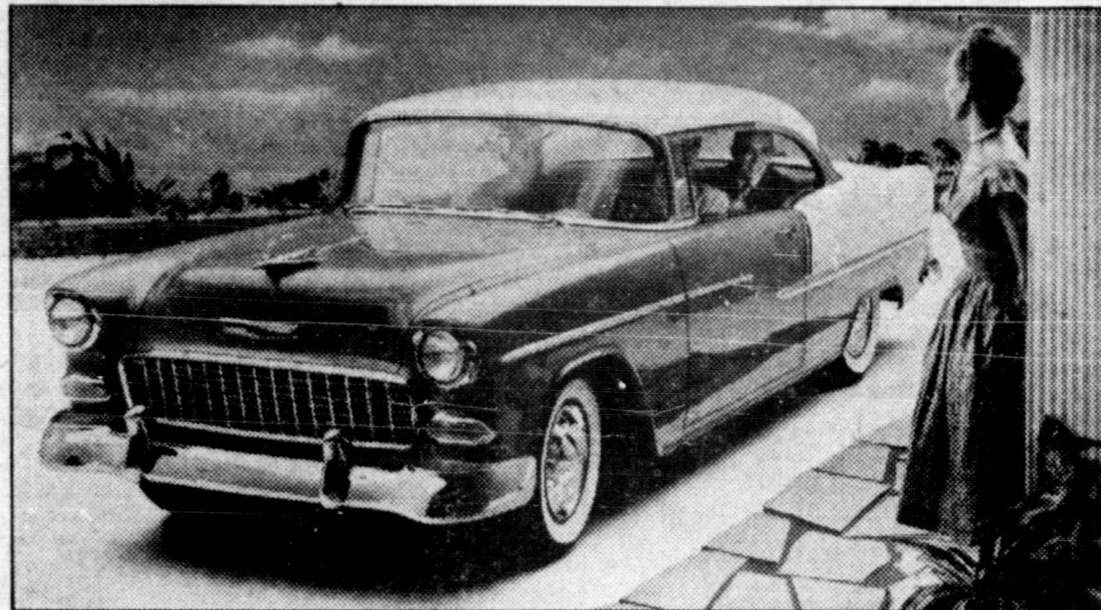

Attacking Rogers' voting record on foreign aid legislation, LaMaster said, "In the past few years we have thrown away over 90 billion dollars on foreign aid trying to buy something that was never for sale — friendship. My opponent voted for a great many of these appropriations, but when the bill came up to transfer one million tons of price support wheat to Pakistan, a friendly country, how did he vote? The bill, which passed by 310 to 75, showed Rogers from Texas voting 'Nay!'"

The Republican congressional candidate said, "I would much rather give away our surplus wheat than our hard-earned tax dollars. That would help both wheat farmers and taxpayers." LaMaster said that he was not for any give-away program, however.

Hunter Survey Gets Underway

AUSTIN—The first questionnaires in a state-wide hunters' survey are being sent out by the Game and Fish Commission in an effort to determine effectiveness of present regulations governing the wildlife harvest.

The Executive Secretary said that, if the selected list of Texans cooperate, far-reaching changes may be effected, probably toward liberalizing harvest rules, such as increased bag limits and hunting periods.

The Commission made a random choice of 7,500 names from game license records, without relation to residence locations and areas hunted.

These 7,500 persons now are receiving the first of two questionnaires. Both are printed on ordinary postcards and are self-addressed and stamped to facilitate the return.

The first card, now being distributed, lists seven major species and bears printed instructions requesting that the recipients indicate which species they plan to hunt this season.

Later, a second card will be sent out, asking for information on the hunters' luck, what they bagged and, equally important, if they bagged nothing.

The Executive Secretary pointed out that the questionnaires should not be signed. Names are not necessary, and thus persons squeamish about stating their own luck publicly will be accommodated. In any event, the cards should be returned promptly.

ly. "Almost every Texan has a secret desire to have something to say, about hunting regulations," said the Executive Secretary. "Well, for the 7,500 whose names have been selected, here is their chance. They certainly will be more than a mere statistic. We apparently are having a die-off from overpopulation among some species. If true, this slack should be taken up by the hunter."

This is the first time the Commission has undertaken a state-wide survey. Success of such studies on a regional basis prompted the present undertaking.

Calculations made from replies from the select list will be used to determine figures on the amount of game taken. Technicians explain that there have been apparent major discrepancies in the inventories of available game compared to the amounts taken and that confirmation of this report could lead to liberalized hunting regulations.

The Texas survey, in the case of waterfowl, will parallel that in the other states in the Central flyway. Technicians believe that duck hunters would be the first to benefit from a successful survey.

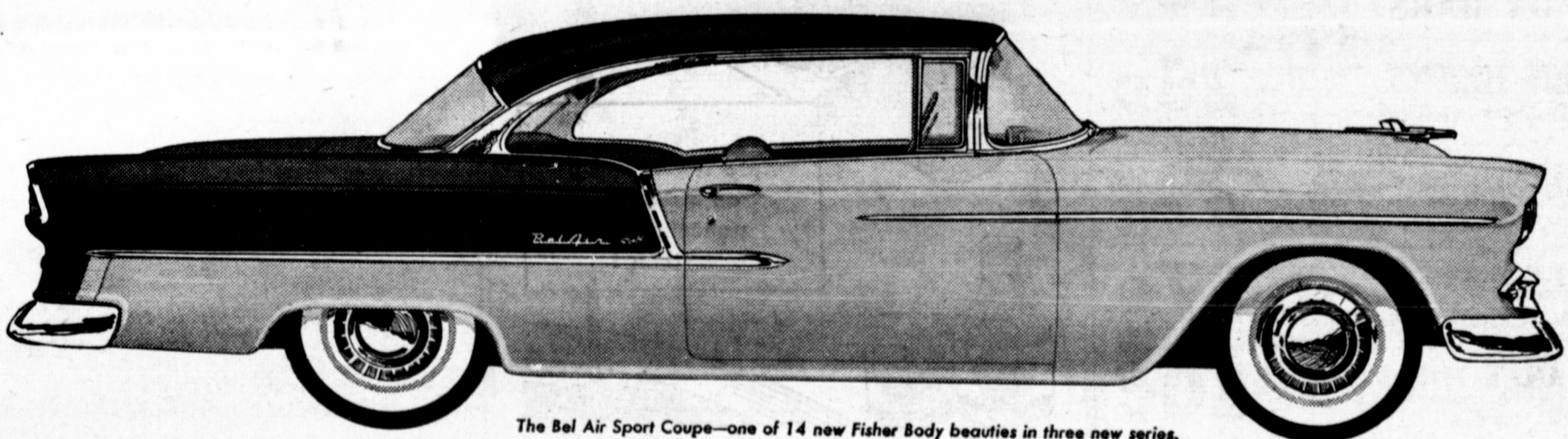

GRAIN SORGHUM LOANS—1954

We have had 25 applications for grain sorghum loans and more are coming in to the office every day. Most of the grain sorghum loans are netting as much as \$2.04. The storage rate goes down every 10 days and that will determine the amount of net profit the loan will bring.

Under the law of the State of Texas, the landlord holds a lien on the crops produced by the tenant. The tenant's loan cannot be approved by the County Com-

mittee unless the landlord's lien waiver is secured releasing any claim to the tenant's share of the crop. This matter was recently discussed at the State level, and we have been informed that because of the State legislation, it must be enforced. The County Clerk will make you out a lien certificate at the court house.

1955 COTTON ALLOTMENTS

At a recent meeting of the County and Community Committeemen, the 1955 basis for establishing cotton allotments was discussed from several view points. It was agreed that the percentage of cropland would be used again for 1955. The Committeemen felt that this was the best route to help the major portion of the cotton farmers in Donley County. Work on the listing sheets has

been started and it should not be too long before the County allotment will be in the office.

1954 ACP PROGRAM

Some producers have tentative approvals which you may not use for cost sharing in the ACP program. This year is nearly over and if you do not plan to use them before December 31, 1954 please let us know so that we may reissue the funds to some one else that might take advantage of them.

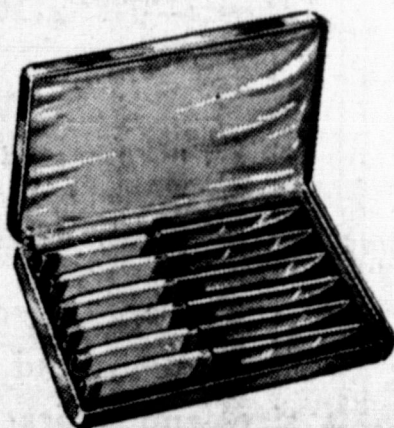

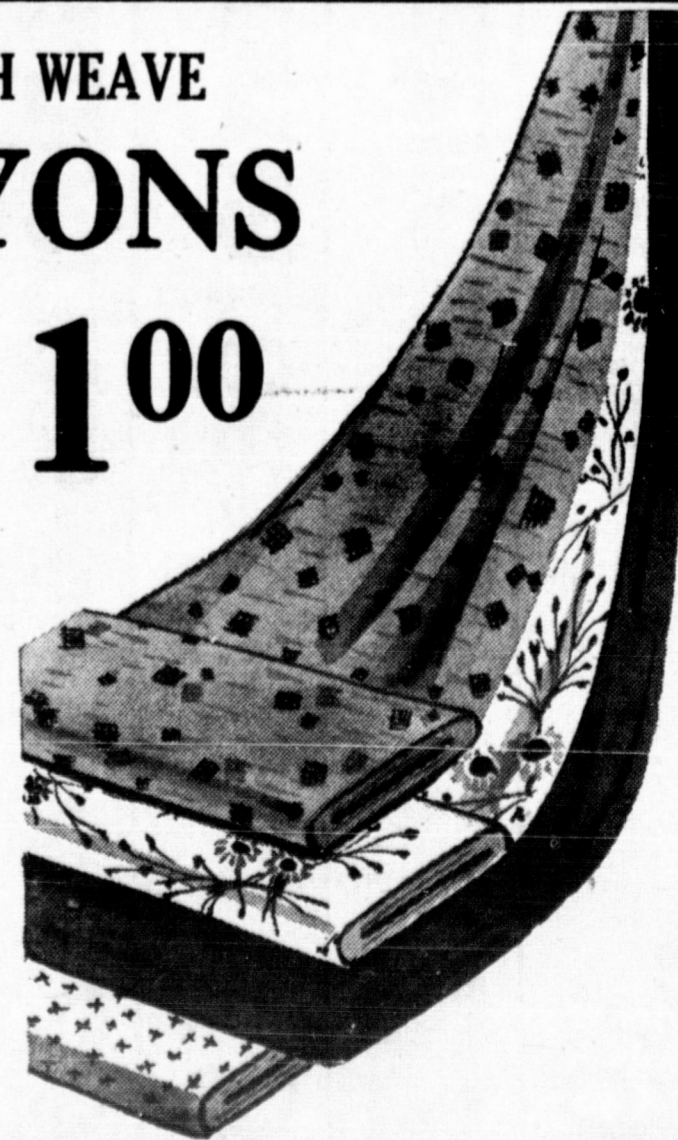
