



The first large-scale seed stock production of hybrid grain sor-Glenn's Jewelry in Donley ghums will be initiated in Texas this year by about 100 seed growers, paving the way for commercial stocks by 1957.

This will be good news for farmers interested in new hybrids. Comparison tests show increases in production of from 20 to 30 per cent over sorghum varieties now commonly grown.
