POLLING PLACES ANNOUNCED FOR WHEAT REFERENDUM

On July 23rd (This Friday), at 3 different polling places, wheat growers of Donley County will vote for or against marketing quotas for the 1955 crop.

The referendum, according to Ross Springer, Chairman of the Donley County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, will determine whether or not the quota program now in effect will continue for next year's crop.

Two-thirds of those who vote must approve quotas before they can be put into operation. The current program, which was voted on a year ago, was approved by 87 percent of voters—390,221 to 57,536.

Chairman Springer urges every eligible wheat grower in Donley County to vote. A producer is eligible to vote if he will have more than 15 acres of wheat on his farm for harvest in 1955. In other words, he can vote if he would be affected directly by quotas, which apply only to farms with more than 15 acres of wheat.

If quotas are approved, there will be marketing penalties on any "excess" wheat—produced outside the acreage allotment—and the full level of price support authorized for 1955 will be available for those who comply with their allotments. If quotas are not approved, there will be no quotas or marketing penalties, and price support for those who stay within their allotments will be at 50 percent of parity.

Farm allotment notices, as well as an explanatory leaflet giving the essential facts of the 1955 program, were sent out on July 9th to Donley County wheat growers of record. The following voting places in the county will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. on Friday, July 23rd:

- Jericho Post Office Building, Jericho, Texas.
- Donley County ASC Office, Clarendon, Texas.
- City Hall, Hedley, Texas.

FARM NEWS

FEDERAL COST-SHARE CHECKS ARRIVING IN THE COUNTY

305 Farmers and Ranchers in Donley County have received a total of \$19,786.35 in checks for the Emergency Wind Erosion Control Practice. Around 300 more checks will be arriving in the county in the next few days. These payments are for the Emergency Program passed by Congress to assist the farmers and ranchers in their efforts to control wind erosion on Donley County land.

COTTON MEASUREMENT MORE THAN TWO-THIRDS COMPLETE

Producers who have not heard from the county office with reference to the amount of cotton planted on their farms this year, will be notified as soon as possible after the maps are brought to the office. Performance reporters are doing an especially good job this year and the planimeter operators in the county office are working fast to get each farm measured and the reports mailed out.

WHEAT MARKETING QUOTA REFERENDUM OUTCOME WILL NOT AFFECT WHEAT ALLOTMENTS

There still seems to be a good deal of misunderstanding among farmers regarding the effect of the coming July 23 wheat quota referendum on acreage allotments.

Whether quotas are approved or not, the wheat allotment proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture will be in effect for the 1955 crop. The controlling legislation requires the establishment of wheat acreage allotments every year, unless they are suspended because of emergency conditions.

Allotments are the basis for quota administration when quotas are in effect, but when there are no quotas the allotments are still in operation.

Producers must comply with acreage allotments in order to be eligible for price supports—with or without quotas. If quotas are not in operation, there is of course no "marketing penalty" involved in exceeding acreage allotments—the only penalty is the loss of price support eligibility.

The vote on the 23rd will decide about marketing quotas for next year. This is a vitally important decision for wheat farmers. It will affect their operation, the degree of production controls and the level of price support which is available. But the vote on quotas will have no direct effect on acreage allotments.

OVER-PLANTED COTTON STATEMENTS

Producers who have carried out regular ACP practices and the Emergency Wind Erosion Control Practices must come to the office to sign a statement to the effect that they are not over-planting or have not over-planted their cotton allotment before any application for payment can be submitted to the State Office. Nine Producers who carried out the Emergency Wind Erosion Control Practices have been notified to come to the office to sign the above mentioned statement, but have failed to do so. The application for payment is being held here in the county office and will stay here until the Statement is signed. If you are one of those nine, and if you need the payment you have earned, then do come to the office to sign the statement.

Financial Statement Shows Celebration Clears Money

Our annual July Fourth Celebration is always considered an overall success when a complete financial statement is prepared showing the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association came out in the black instead of the red. Considering drought conditions, harvest time and all other factors, the Association did exceptionally well to come out with a clear profit of \$576.36 in addition to paying a repair and painting bill for the Rodeo arena which amounted to \$571.95. The total income from all sources for 1954 was \$7,373.78 and the total disbursements was \$6,797.42. Total gate receipts from the four rodeo performances amounted to \$3,394.39.

"A number of people have asked about the profits from our recent celebration, and our records show a profit of \$576.36 and an itemized statement can be had by contacting W. W. Noblet. In behalf of the Outdoor Entertainment Association, I would like to thank everyone who contributed in time, labor and in other ways to our celebration," stated J. H. Lowest bidder on two stretches of highway south of here in Briscoe County was Bryan and Hoffman Construction Co. of Plainview, it was found, when bids were opened recently by the Texas Highway Commission in Austin.

Palmer Massy of Childress, district highway engineer, said Bryan & Hoffman's bid was \$171,175. The two stretches consist of 5 miles on Highway 70 which will complete the gap between Clarendon and Turkey, and 5.8 miles on highway 256 which will complete the gap between Clarendon and Silverton. These two highways will fork a few miles south of the Red River bridge which is located southwest of Brice. Both paving projects should be completed by the first of the year.

Very few people need to be reminded that Saturday, July 24th is election day, for the way state and local candidates have been making the rounds, voters have had little opportunity to forget.

Political fever in several state races as well as six county races has reached a high pitch and will continue today and tomorrow. There has been lots of campaigning and considerable interest in all contested races this year and voters in Donley County are expected to go to the polls almost 100 percent. Voting interest is evidenced by the 82 absentee votes cast this year compared with 48 two years ago.

For the convenience of all voters that you may look over the entire list of candidates, a sample ballot is being published in this issue of the Leader through the courtesy of P. C. Messer. The election board with county returns will be displayed in front of the Bob Moss Pharmacy. You can watch this board Saturday night and see what the outcome may be. Your vote will be important so be sure to go vote.

In downstate races, Gov. Allan Shivers and Ralph Yarborough are verbally slugging it out; Ben Ramsey seems to be the top candidate in the race for Lieutenant Governor and the same can be said for John Ben Shepherd in the Attorney Generals race. Lyndon B. Johnson seems to be receiving very little opposition for United States Senator. In the 18th district Congressional race not very much has been heard from Walter Rogers' opposition on the democratic side, but more will be heard in the race before the November election. In the race for State Representative for the 88th District, Elbert Reeves is running a strong race with very little campaign opposition from his opponent Jimmy Faulkner who is running against Reeves for the second time. Reeves has made a good record in Austin and this will go a long way toward returning him to the office with a larger majority this time.

In the various county races there is a possibility of a run-off in only one race and that is the commissioners race in precinct 4 with three candidates listed on the ballot. Other contested county offices is for County Judge with Jack E. Gray and H. T. Burton making it a hot race this time; P. C. Messer and Mrs. Helen W. Churchman are the candidates for County and District Clerk and Mrs. A. G. Lane and Mrs. Melvin W. Cook are the two candidates for the office of County Treasurer.

County Attorney R. Y. King and Sheriff Truett Behrens are unopposed. Only two precincts find opposition in their commissioners races with F. M. Murray and F. L. "Tige" Hill in the race for Commissioner of Precinct 3; H. W. (Shorty) Burr, Jess Finley and George Preston are the candidates for Commissioner Precinct No. 4. In the Constable race for Precinct 2, R. C. (Bob) Hill and C. Huffman have been doing some strong campaigning. Other uncontested races are: Hubert Rhoades, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, and Edd Mooring, Precinct No. 2; G. A. Anderson, Justice of the Peace Precinct 2; Frank Kendall, JP of Precinct 3, and W. M. Patman for County Chairman.

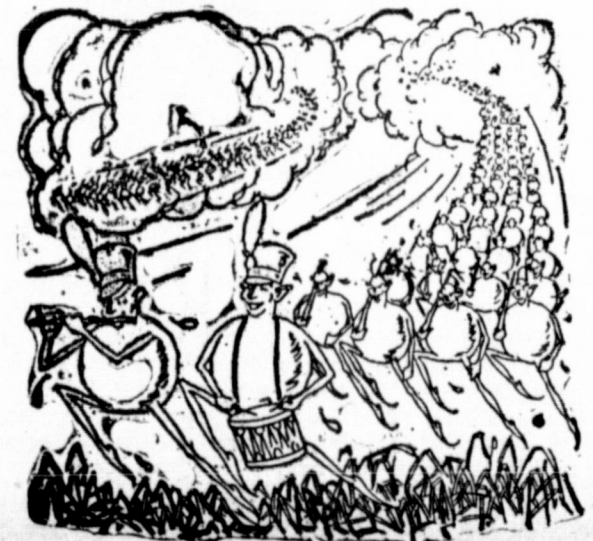

General Berry 1955 State Chairman March of Dimes

AUSTIN—Major General Kearie L. Berry, Adjutant General of Texas and Commanding General of the Texas National Guard, has accepted the State Chairmanship of the 1955 March of Dimes in Texas.

In accepting the post General Berry said: "Having been a prisoner of war for 40 months, I have some idea of the feelings of people who are prisoners of an iron lung. It took an all-out war to get myself and the other released—so let's mount an all-out attack against polio."

Robert J. Smith of Dallas, volunteer state director of the March of Dimes campaigns in 1953 and 1954, praised the acceptance of General Berry of the annual fund raising campaign. "Although we made great progress in Texas during those two years in which I was privileged to lead the campaigns, I anticipate even greater advances in 1955. In General Berry you have a man who, by his everyday work, is interested in

the well-being and safety of Texans. I wish him every success and stand ready to assist him in every way possible."

With the polio incidence in Texas rising to a figure almost double the 1953 total for this time, General Berry feels that early organization for the coming campaign is most important. "We must plan, we must practice, we must smooth every rough edge so that when we set the March of Dimes into motion we will be certain that it will be one of the greatest," he stated. "Even though the National Foundation is on the right track, we can't let ourselves become overconfident. Fighting polio is worse than fighting a war—we can't see our enemy."

Holder of the Combat Infantry Badge, the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star and the Purple Heart, General Berry served with distinction as commander of the 1st Division of the

Philippine Army in the Pacific Theater. With the fall of Bataan he was made a prisoner of war and was held in camps in Luzon, Formosa, Kyushu and Manchuria. Returning to the United States in October 1945, following his release, he served in various posts until his retirement from active service on June 30, 1947.

Appointed Adjutant General of Texas in May 1947, he was reappointed in 1949, 1951 and 1953. As Commanding General of the Texas National Guard, he directs military activities for many thousands of servicemen on a year-round program.



Mothers and children in the 26-county Texas Panhandle area received \$69,582 of the \$233,563 in monthly social security insurance payments in the Panhandle in December, 1953, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office announced today.

The largest group of beneficiaries under the social security insurance program, however, continue to be retired workers, Sanderson said. In December, 2,879 such beneficiaries in the Panhandle received \$130,734, not including payments to wives and children of such workers. There was an increase of more than 27% over the number of all beneficiaries in this area compared with December, 1952.

Many people think of old-age and survivors insurance as a program for retired workers and their dependents exclusively. As these figures indicate, however, survivors benefits are an important
