**Pioneer Zephyr Observes 15th Birthday**

Last Saturday, April 9, Burlington Lines' Pioneer Zephyr, truly a pioneer in a new era of diesel-electric, streamline transportation, observed its 15th birthday.

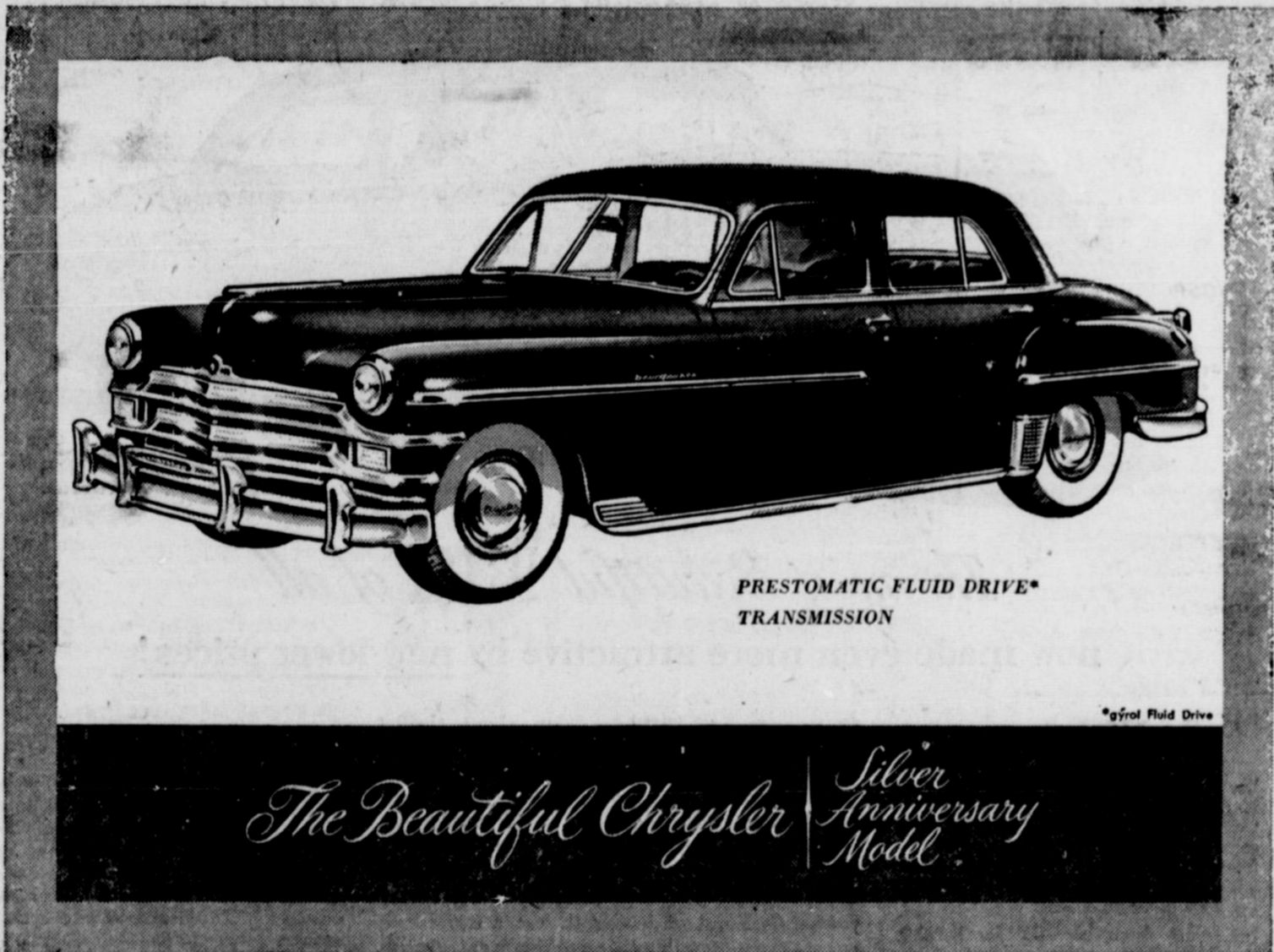

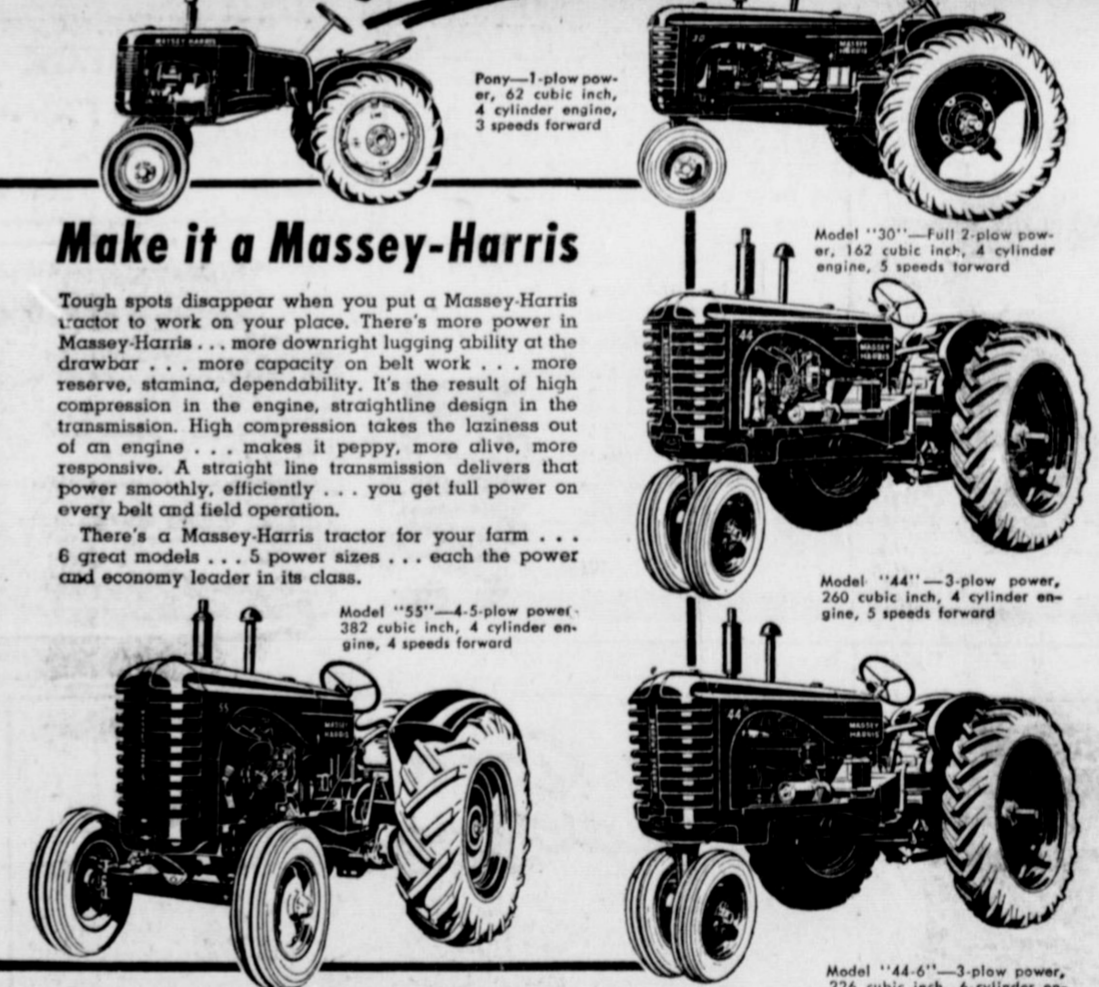

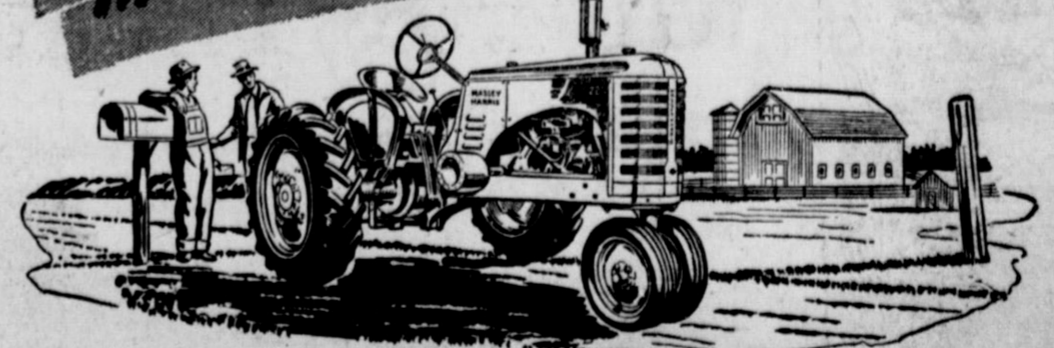

**AN EDITORIAL**

Radioactive materials are proving to be a powerful new weapon in cancer research and treatment. Because of the recognized progress in this field, a bill was introduced in the Texas Legislature which provided \$1,350,000 for the construction and equipping of a Radiologic Institute and Atomic Energy Research Laboratory as part of The University of Texas, M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research.

This Hospital was founded by a Legislative act in 1941, prior to the advent of radioactive isotopes; hence no provision was made for their use. The act did provide for a statewide facility for cancer research and education, and a hospital unit for developing the latest advances in cancer treatment. To date, while still in temporary quarters, the Hospital has cared for patients from 166 counties in the State of Texas.

The present proposed legislation is vital. The lives of many of us actually depend upon the passage of this bill. If it passes, Texas will have a complete well-equipped facility for the use of radioactive materials. In this center men can be trained to use these substances in other hospitals throughout the State. As it is now, Texans are largely deprived of the benefits of this new means of cancer research, diagnosis and treatment. Over 7,000 Texans will die of cancer during 1949; another 40,000 are suffering from this disease. The magnitude of the need, therefore, is apparent.

There is great danger, however, that funds will not be provided for the establishment of this Radiologic Institute and Atomic Energy Research Laboratory. In a recent committee meeting in the Senate, all provisions for the building and equipping of this institution were deleted from the bill. Hence, in order to assure establishment of this institution, the appropriations for it must be reinstated in the Education Appropriation Bill for Institutions of Higher Learning (Senate Bill 134), and then passed by both the Senate and the House. If the appropriation is not provided, the citizens of Texas will continue to be deprived of this new method of combating cancer.

You are urged, therefore, in the interest of your afflicted fellowmen, to wire or write your State

Senator and Representative expressing your desire that the Radiologic Institute and Atomic Energy Research Laboratory be established. Your communication should contain a statement to this effect: "Urgently request that the appropriation provided for The University of Texas Cancer Hos-

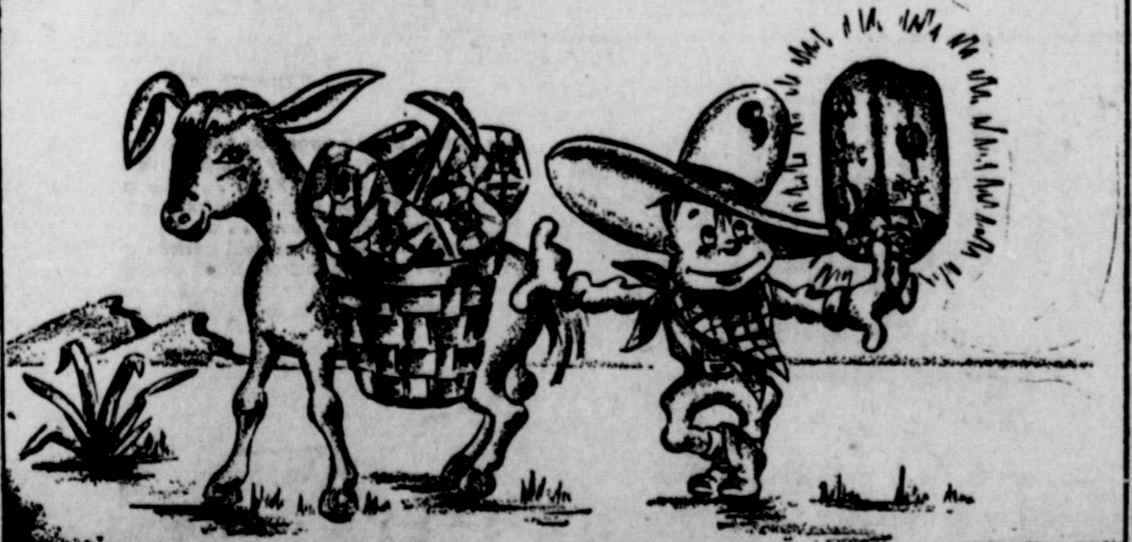

## Veterans News

**Questions and Answers**  
Q—I interrupted my training under the GI Bill and now would like to resume training at once. May I go back to my classes anytime?  
A—Before you resume your interrupted training, you should get a supplemental certificate of eligibility from VA.  
Q—Are patients in Veterans Administration hospitals permitted unlimited participation in competitive sports?  
A—Patients may participate only with the permission of the doctor in each case. An average of 43,000 veterans per month have been participating in various sports at hospitals and homes.  
Q—I wish to take on-the-job training. Where should I apply?  
A—Apply at your nearest VA office. Take along a certified or photostatic copy of your discharge papers. If you are married or have one or more dependents and want subsistence allowances, take along your marriage certificate and other documents that will establish your dependency claim.  
Q—I have completed my on-

the-job training course and have some entitlement left. I would like to take another course. May I enroll at another school?  
A—You may use any remaining entitlement either for on-the-job training or for educational training with VA's prior approval.  
Q—Will VA pay my bill if I go to a private hospital in my home town instead of a VA hospital in a distant city?  
A—Yes, but only for a service-connected disability and if you have secured prior approval from VA.  
Q—My brother plans to go to school this summer for the first time under the GI Bill. I am already attending a school under the same Bill. I wish to attend the same school my brother attends this summer. Do we have to make application in advance to attend summer school?  
A—Yes. Your brother should apply now for a VA certificate of eligibility; and, if you intend to continue your education this summer in a different school, you should apply as soon as possible for a supplemental certificate of eligibility.  
Q—I am a disabled veteran and would like to know on what basis compensation for service-connected disability is granted?  
A—The disability must result from disease or injury incurred in or aggravated by active military or naval service, in line of duty.  
Q—What interest rates are lenders permitted to charge on business loans?  
A—In most cases, 4 percent is the maximum. However, the interest rate may be slightly higher for certain types of insured business loans.

"Check and be sure that your own immunity is established, as well as that of your children", he advised parents.

### Health Notes

AUSTIN—With the appearance of an unusual number of smallpox cases during the past week, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has issued a warning that this dangerous, disfiguring and often fatal disease can once again become a widespread health problem unless vaccination is used to protect the public against it.  
Four cases of smallpox were reported from one county, and while that number may not seem great, it is nevertheless the same total as was reported for the whole State during the entire year of 1948.  
"Smallpox vaccination, which affords complete immunity from this disease, is a painless, inexpensive procedure, which should be used to protect every individual in the State," Dr. Cox said. "When we grow lax about our vaccination and allow susceptible persons to be exposed to smallpox, it follows that the disease

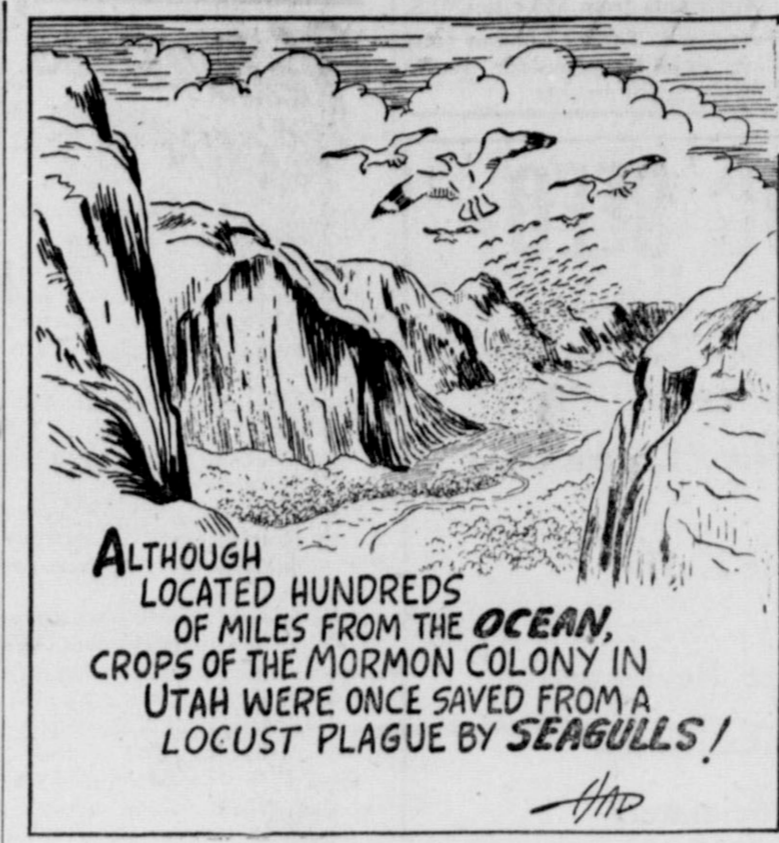

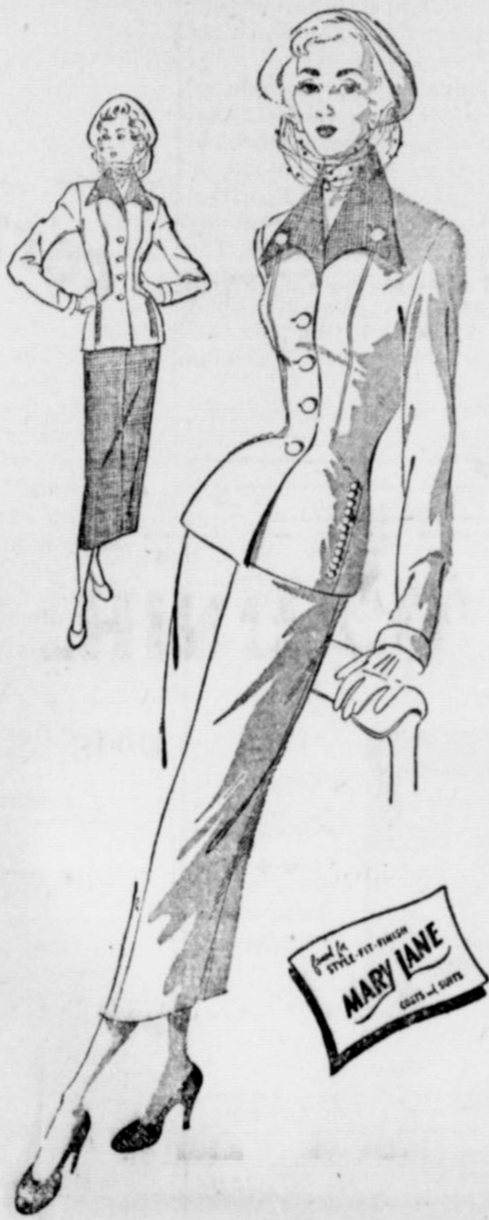
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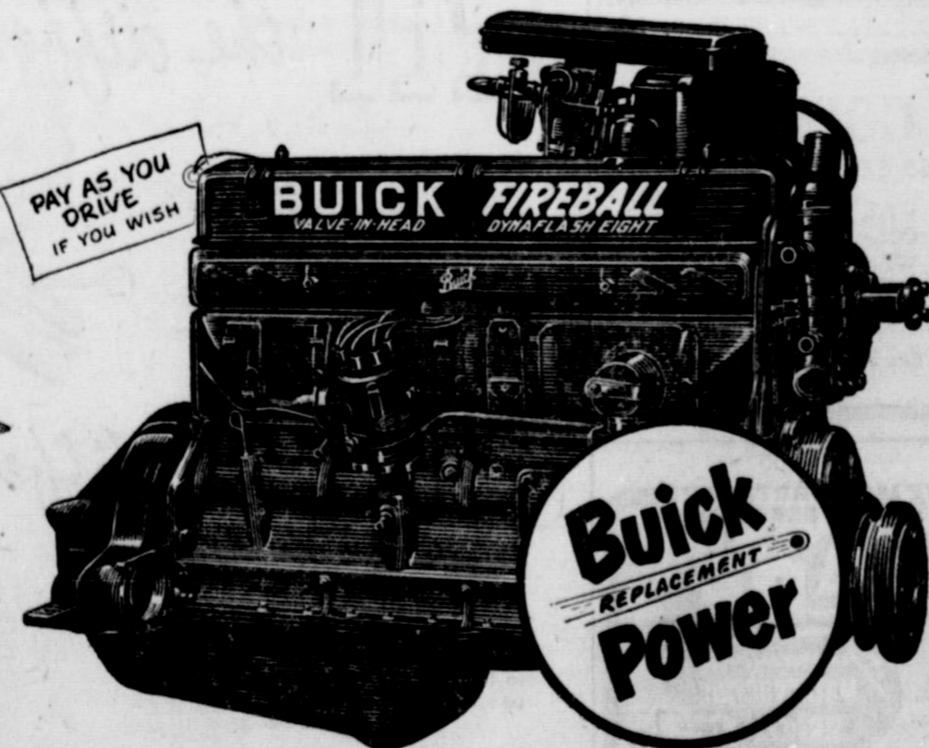
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
