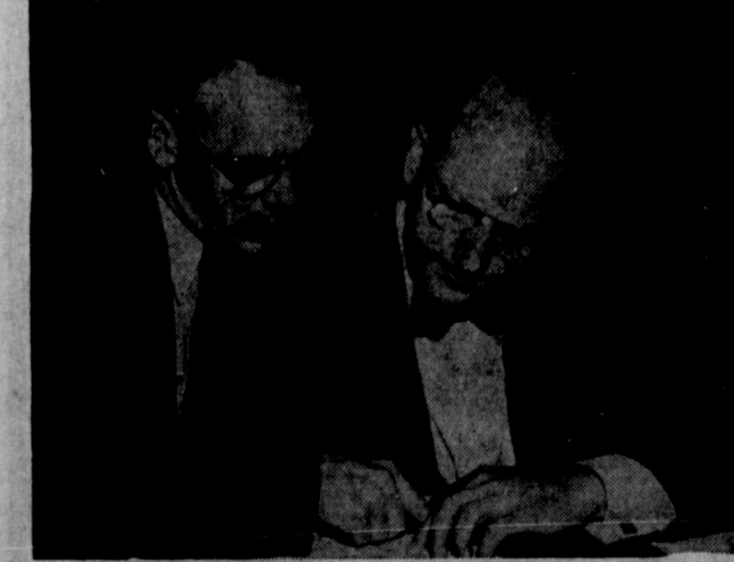
Beautiful weather was encountered on the entire trip.

## United Gas Corp. Common Stock To Be Distributed

SHREVEPORT — Distribution was to begin today of 5,316,682 shares of United Gas Corporation common stock to former preferred and second preferred stockholders of Electric Power & Light Corporation, it was announced by N. C. McGowen, United Gas President, at general headquarters here.

The distribution of this large block of stock results from action originated nearly 7 years ago when the Securities and Exchange Commission ordered dissolution of Electric Power & Light pursuant to provisions of the Public Utility Holding Company Act of 1935. A plan for compliance through exchange of securities by Electric Power & Light was approved by the SEC

and ordered enforced by Federal court.

United Gas Corporation and its subsidiaries are principally engaged in the production, transmission and distribution of natural gas in the states of Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Southern Alabama and Northwestern Florida.

At the end of 1948, United Gas was serving 399 cities and towns and had more than 333,000 customers on its lines. The firm was organized in 1930, with the merger of a number of natural gas companies. Since that date, an integrated pipeline system has been built, composed of more than 6,000 miles of main transmission lines, more than 7,500 miles of distribution and service lines and 1,000 miles field lines. Assets of the system were in excess \$383,000,000, at the end of 1948, and dividends have been declared and paid continuously since 1944, and have been on a basis of 25 cents per quarter since October 1, 1947.

Commenting on the transfer of stock, McGowen said, "This means that thousands of people living in all parts of the Nation will become the owners of United Gas. United Gas is expanding its facilities in an orderly and healthy manner, and anticipates continued steady growth."

In addition to the United Gas stock, security holders of Electric

Power & Light will receive stock in Middle South Utilities, Inc., which is a firm newly organized to acquire securities of Arkansas Power and Light Company, Louisiana Power and Light Company, Mississippi Power and Light Company, New Orleans Public Service Inc., and Gentry Development, Inc., a corporation owning certain real estate in New Orleans.

Each share of \$7 preferred Electric Power & Light stock will entitle its holder to 6.5 shares of United Gas and 4.5 shares of Middle South Utilities stock.

For each share of \$6 preferred stock, holders will receive 5.9 shares of United Gas stock and 4.1 shares of Middle South Utilities. Holders of second preferred stock, Series A (\$7), will receive 6.25 shares of United Gas, 4.3 shares of Middle South and \$5.25 in cash.

Preferred stock holders of Electric Power & Light have been advised to present and surrender their stock certificates to the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, Corporate Trust Division,

which is exchange agent on the plan.

The plan provides that the remainder of the United Gas Middle South Utilities stock be distributed within 60 days, holders of Electric's common stock and options warrants.



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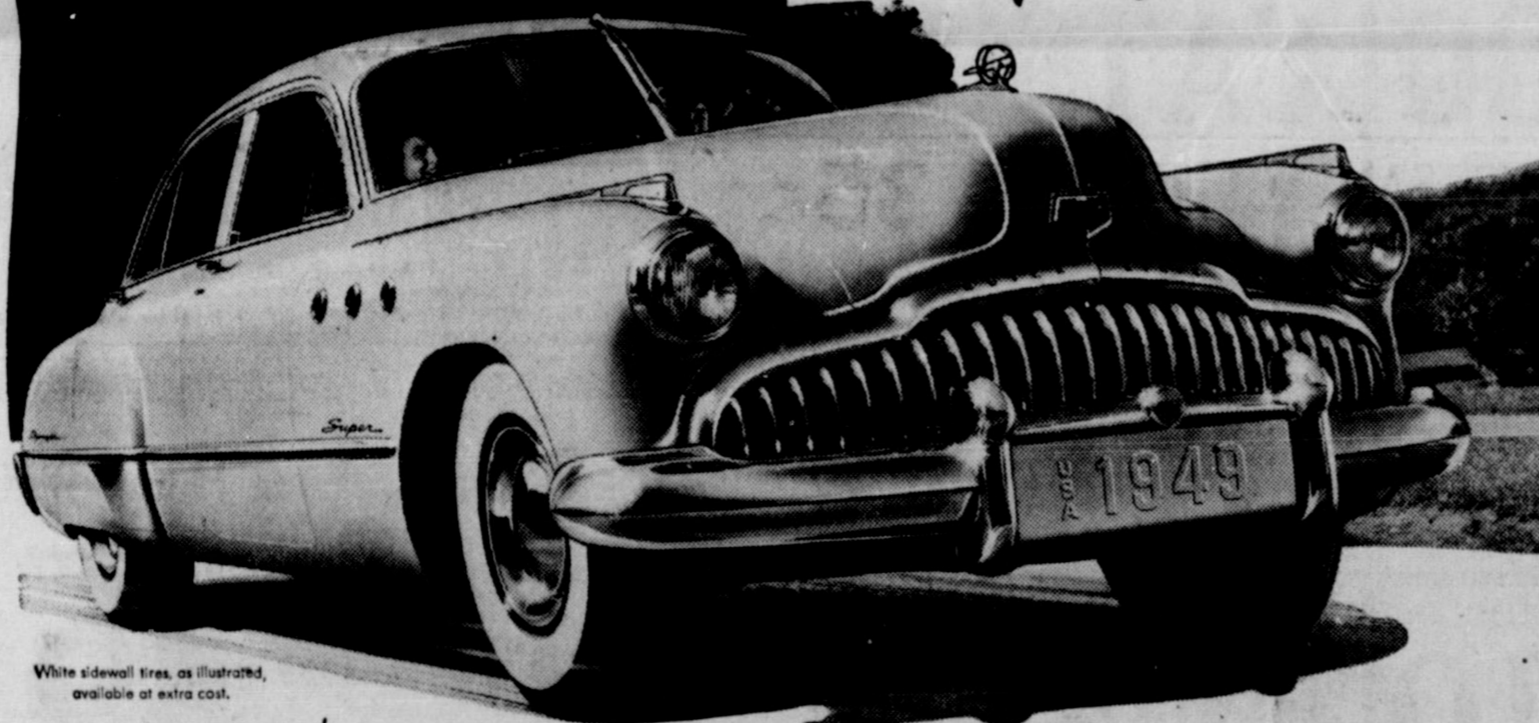

**Health Notes**

AUSTIN—During the first seventeen weeks of 1948 there were only 55 cases of poliomyelitis reported to the State Health Department, while in this same period for 1949, there have been 142 cases reported from different sections of the State, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Seven cases were reported in the past week, with three from one county.

"Poliomyelitis is one of the most dreaded of all diseases", Dr. Cox said, "and justly so. It is more often a crippler than a killer, but in either case it takes a heavy toll among young Texas citizens, and is a health menace against which our children should be carefully guarded."

Immaculate cleanliness of person and homes is urged as a precautionary measure against polio, and community hygiene assumes a place of major importance when the disease makes its appearance. Clean communities, clean homes, and strict personal hygiene all play a part in helping to prevent the spread of diseases, and Dr. Cox advises close inspection of home screens for keeping out flies, and unremitting efforts in rodent control, and the extermination of roaches.

"Until it is definitely understood just how polio is transmitted, it is well to guard against all household pests and eliminate all insanitary conditions", Dr. Cox said. "We do not know with certainty how polio may be spread, and filth, which affords a breeding place for germs, should not be tolerated."

**Better Buys In Butter**

COLLEGE STATION—"You'll get a better buy in butter if you'll look for a U. S. graded product," Myrtle Murray, extension home marketing specialist of Texas A&M College points out.

Today's packaged butter cannot be tasted for quality, as grandmother used to do before buying by the crock or in the bulk. The modern homemaker, however, has an even more reliable guide to quality—and that is the U. S. grade.

"The letters U. S. in front of the grade on the carton or label mean that the butter has been graded by an authorized grader, under the continuous inspection of the U. S. Department of Agriculture," Miss Murray explains. "These graders are highly trained experts, with special training for the job and keen senses of taste and smell."

The highest grade under U. S. standards is U. S. Grade AA or 93 score butter, which is tops in quality and has a fine, highly pleasing flavor. Ranking next is

U. S. Grade A or 92 score, which is good quality with a pleasing flavor. U. S. Grade B or 90 score is satisfactory table butter but lacks some of the finer characteristics of the two top grades.

"U. S. graders also carefully examine butter for body, color and salt before giving it an official grade," Miss Murray concludes. "If the homemaker buys either of the two top grades, she can be sure that the butter will be delicious, warm or cold, served as a sauce, melted on waffles, or spread on a slice of bread."

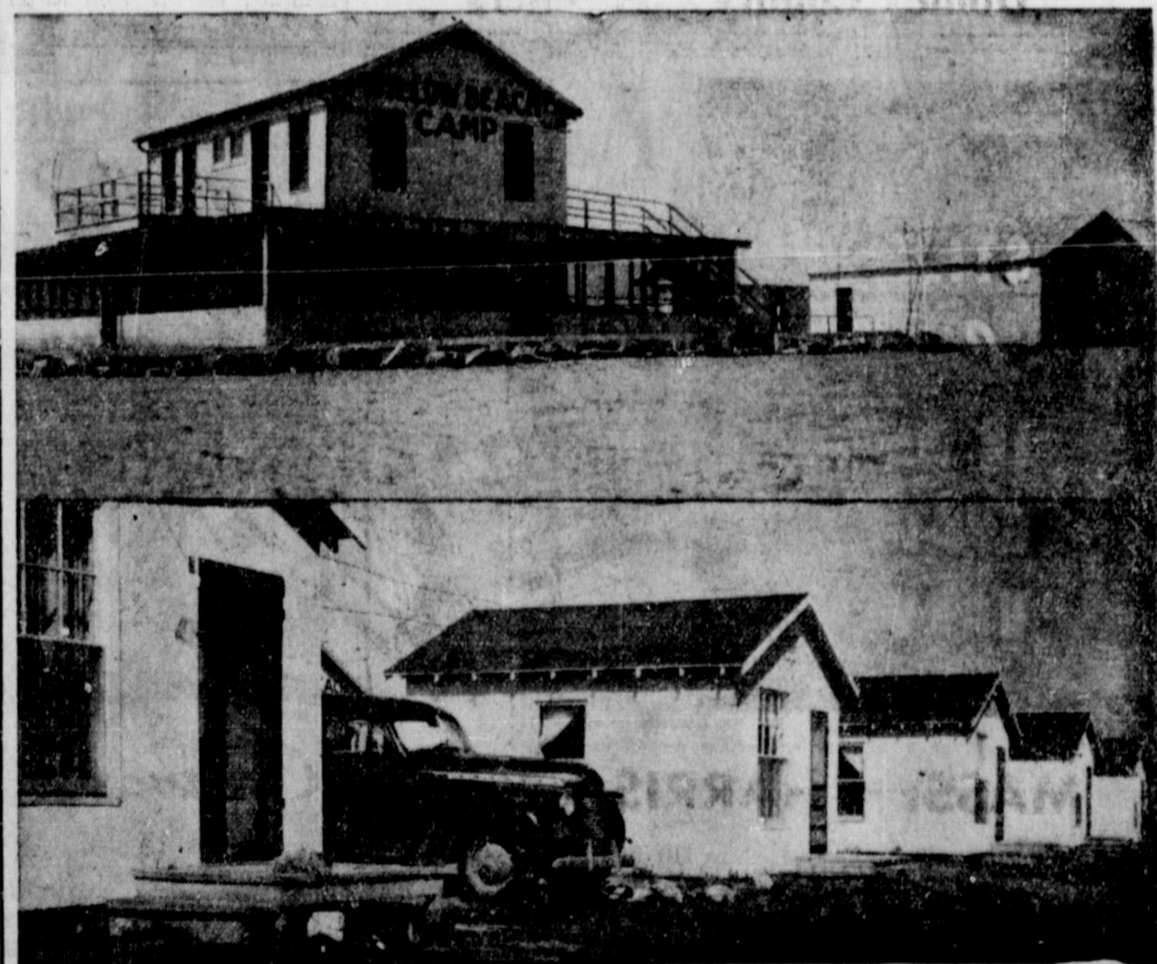

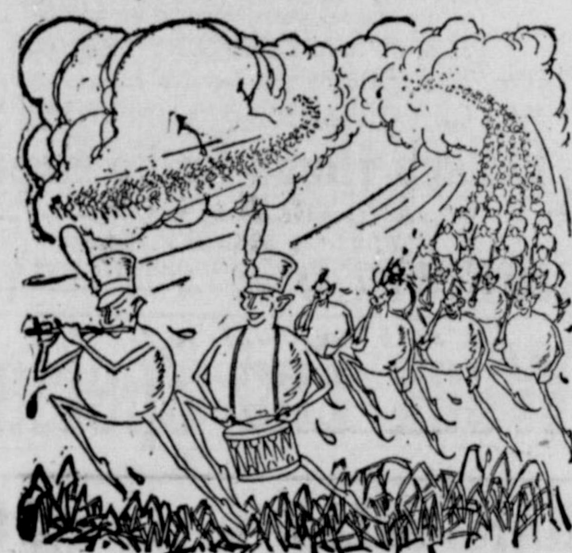

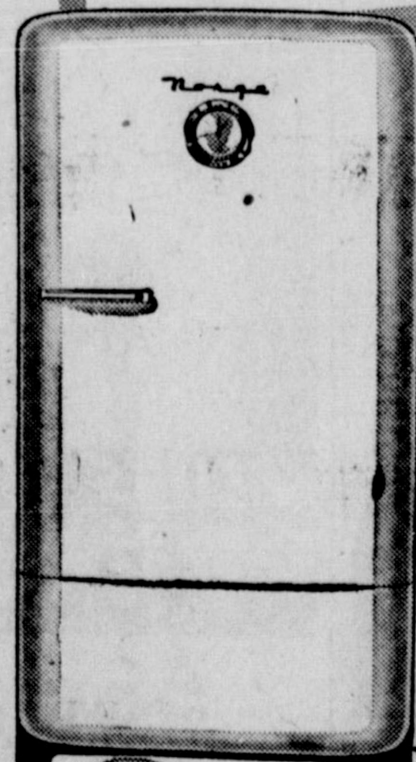

Christians are to be living and walking examples of Christ. They are living epistles "known and read of all men." II Cor- 3: 2. When intelligent people are driven to disgust and infidelity, by seeing corruption in the church, who will bear the blame? Which is worse, infidelity in life or teaching?


