Clarendon High School announced the names of its top honor students this week. This year's Valedictorian is Nathan Sears, and the Salutatorian is Larmie Cruz.



Celebrate tax freedom

Rejoice! As of Tuesday, most of us have worked enough to pay off the government for this year.

May 11, 1999, marked national Tax Freedom Day according to Citizens for a Sound Economy (CSE). Up until this time, every penny earned by the average American went to pay federal, state, or local taxes. But now we are all working for ourselves, theoretically.

According to CSE, Texans are really lucky because Tax Freedom Day in this state was really on May 4 due to our lower state and local taxes. On the national scene things are not so rosy unfortunately.

Peggy Venable, Director of the Texas CSE, said: "Since Impeached. president] Bill Clinton took office, federal tax revenues have grown by 7.9 percent per year - 52 percent faster than personal income growth. This is wrong. Government's income should not grow faster than the people it serves."

How right she is.

Meanwhile, another freedom-minded group, Americans for Tax Reform, has figured up what hidden taxes are costing us. These "invisible" taxes are part of what raises the price of different products at each step of production - i.e. energy taxes, gas taxes, workers compensation, property taxes, etc.

Here is what they found as reported at www.self-gov.org: Taxes account for 31% of the cost of a loaf of bread, 28% percent of the cost of a restaurant meal, 38% of the cost of a pizza, 46% of the cost of a firearm, 43% of the cost of a beer, 72% of the cost of liquor, 40% of the cost of an airline ticket, 54% of the cost of gasoline, and 26% of the cost of electricity.

Those figures help bring into perspective why we have all had to work the last 41/2 months to pay our taxes. Wouldn't it be nice to see Tax Freedom Day pushed back to about February 10?



Legislation tries to get a handle on Y2K costs

D.A. addresses proposed change to 100th district

Dear Editor,

On Sunday, May 9, 1999, the [Amarillo] Globe-News printed an article concerning HB 3120 which would give the Carson County Attorney felony jurisdiction and remove it from the 100th Judicial District. As the 100th Judicial District Attorney, I am in the best position to know the potential effects of this bill on all five counties of the 100th Judicial District. There are too many issues to cover them all in writing, but the following are a few which are verifiable by looking at a map and/or coming into my office.

Geographics are less of an issue in these days of telecommunications, which includes telephones (home and cellular), pagers, fax machines, and email. Further, Carson County officials have had to travel to other parts of the district on very few occasions and no more than the other counties travel. The district judge and district attorney rotate through the five counties on the same schedule. Should HB 3120 pass, the judge will still be in Carson County only once every five weeks;

therefore, travel will still be required.

Carson County does not account for one third of the felony cases in this district. Carson currently is the least busy of the five counties. There are approximately fifty-eight felonies pending which is close to twenty percent of the felonies district wide; however, of these fifty-eight, thirty-three are fugitives from justice and another half dozen are in custody on other charges in other jurisdictions. There are approximately twelve cases available for action at this time and of those approximately half have been on the courts docket only twice (less than three months old).

Carson County is not the only county along the I-40 corridor that does not have this special prosecution provision. Oldham and Deaf Smith counties have it while Potter, Carson, Donley, Gray, and Wheeler do not.

Passage of HB 3120 will result in a financial impact to the State of Texas of \$81,000 not to mention the domino effect of other counties requesting this special treatment. A negative

financial impact to the remaining four counties will also occur and I was obliged to advise them of such.

This is not a "personal" issue for me; it is business. Why would a house bill that doesn't affect my salary and to some extent reduces my workload be a personal issue? Anyone, who personally knows me or has taken time to discuss District Attorney business with me, knows business is business and I do not take such personally. The question is "Do the benefits of HB 3120 outweigh the negatives?" I will gladly address this question with anyone. My concerns with this house bill are based on what I believe to be the best for all five counties in the 100th Judicial District. I was elected to represent the 100th Judicial District as your District Attorney based on my experience and my willingness to work full-time as district attorney. Failure by me to discuss issues affecting this office or this district would not be doing the job you elected me to do.



Links on the Internet make your PC a personal weatherman

The recent, severe storms in the Midwest prompted me to update my list of weatherrelated sites. Until now, I didn't realize how much I depended on the Internet for up-todate weather information. Did I say, "up-todate?" I meant "up-to-the-minute!"

Today, you don't have to be a trained meteorologist to predict the weather; just an informed Web surfer. I have four websites that epitomize the best the Web has to offer in the weather arena: Intellicast, the Weather Channel, AccuWeather, and the National Weather Service.

No matter how many other sites I check out. I just can't seem to get enough of Intellicast (http://www.intellicast.com). Their comprehensive coverage of thousands (yes, I said "thousands") of cities allows any traveler to pack smartly. Their graphical four day forecast gives me an instant summary of upcoming weather trends. In addition, their radar images are some of the most colorful, accurate graphics I've seen on the Web. When you get to their site, click on "USA Weather" in the left column.

A large USA map appears allowing you to select any region. Of course, if your city is not listed, scroll down, choose your general region and click on "More Cities." Information for each city includes current conditions, a four-day forecast graphic, and a narrative forecast. Clicking on "radar" in the left column shows you a current image. Be careful, though. The radar images are only updated every fifteen minutes or so. If you have time (and a fast modem), click on "Radar Loop" in the left column. You'll see the last five hours of radar played like a movie, allowing you to determine the path of that large storm.

Another great site comes to us from the largest Weather Network on Earth: The Weather Channel (http://weather.com). Besides their easy to remember web address, the Weather Channel offers the fastest means of determining conditions in any city. Two blanks in the left column allow you to enter the city, zip, and/or zip to search for. Each city's forecast is five days (compared to Intellicast's four-day). Links to local and regional Doppler radar are also available,

although they aren't as large and detailed as the ones on Intellicast.

Moms will especially like the "School Day Forecast" (accessible from the left column). Easy to read maps and weather descriptions make planning Junior's wardrobe choices a breeze. But, perhaps, the most useful feature of this site is the Weather Glossary (http://www.weather.com/glossary). Next time my local TV meteorologist describes the radar picture as an anomalous propagation, I'll know what he means. Hundreds of terms are defined in normal

A relative newcomer to the online weather field is AccuWeather (http:// www.accuweather.com). While they don't excel at Web-based weather delivery (at least not compared to my first two picks), they do offer a service I use every day: AccuWeather Direct. Basically, each morning when I get to work, a beautiful, fully graphical forecast is delivered to my e-mail box. You can set the delivery to be any time you want on any day. It is VERY flexible, and of course,

where the warnings and watches are can be lifesaving information. The National Weather (http://www.nws.noaa.gov) constantly revises this information, making it available online to any surfer. National, state, and county weather watches can be viewed from anywhere. Another interesting link at this site takes you to a huge historical archive of weather information. What was the hottest day ever? Find out here.

If websites and e-mail delivery aren't enough, check out some of the great shareware you can download. As with the sites, I have some favorites: Wetsock, Weather Express, and WinWeather.

Wetsock (http://www.locutuscodeware. com/wetsock.htm) sits quietly in your System Tray monitoring the weather for you. A small graphic lets you know the basics. Moving your cursor over the graphic gives you a small summary of the current conditions for your area. Wetsock is shareware and runs \$15.

Weather Express (http://www.weatherexpress.com) is another utility offering much of the same functionality as Wetsock. In for ARNet, Inc.

When severe weather strikes, knowing addition, it can be configured in a number of screen sizes, allowing you to see as much (or as little) detail as possible. Up to ten cities can be tracked simultaneously, providing you the most personal forecasts available. Weather Express costs \$20.

Finally, WinWeather (http://www.igsnet. com/igs) gives you instant access to local radar pictures and even WebCams. One of the features that caught my eye was "sound alerts." When certain weather conditions arise, this software can "warn" you via a number of sounds. It's almost like having your own 24-hour meteorologist on hand. Oh, and did I mention the ski reports, hurricane and earthquake reports, and flood warnings? WinWeather can be purchased for \$19.95

Regardless of whether you want to be drowned in meteorological minutiae or just want today's temperatures, the Internet can be of service. The key, of course, is to get the information from your computer before you

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- *the market or special appraised value placed on your property;
- *the unequal appraisal of your property;
- *the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll;
- *exemptions that may apply to you;
- *qualification for an agricultural appraisal;
- *the taxable status of your property,
- *which local governments should be taxing your property;
- *the ownership of property;
- *the change of use of land receiving special appraisal;
- *you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property at any time prior to the day of the Appraisal Review Board Hearings tentatively set for July 16, 1999, at the Donley County Appraisal District office. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 307 S. Sully or P.O. Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment: If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 307 S. Sully or P.O. Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, TX 78711-3528. DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed). The deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Boll Weevil Counts -In Donley County

By Leon Church, County Agent

The Donley County Extension Service is monitoring boll weevil counts and will continue this monitoring throughout the growing season. Six pheromone traps are placed throughout the county at strategic locations. These traps are monitored on a seven-day interval.

Trap locations are: Trap #1 FM 2362 approximately six miles west of Clarendon; Trap #2 intersection of FM 2362 and Hwy 287, Ashtola; Trap #3, 11/2 miles south of Clarendon on Hwy. 70; Trap # 4, 1/2 mile east of FM 1754 on County Road W in Lelia Lake; Trap #5, approximately two miles east of FM 1755 on FM 2471; and Trap 6, east of Hedley.

Trap counts for the week of May 3 were: Trap 1 — 11 weevils, Trap 2 - 1 weevil, Trap 3 - 2 weevils, Trap 4 — 55 weevils, Trap 5 — 5 weevil, Trap 6 — 6 weevil, Total — 83 weevils/trap, Average 13.6 weevil/trap.
