Summer Courses In Homemaking Now In Progress

The summer courses in Homemaking are off to a good start in both the high school and adult classes. These classes are meeting in the Study Hall, since the Homemaking Department is being enlarged. The room is cool and there is sufficient room for any size class that we might have.

Thirty high school girls are working this month on various projects for 1/2 credit. Their workshops are on Tuesday mornings at 9 a. m. They include:

1. June 3—Evaluate last year's program; work out program for 1958-59.

2. June 10—Making taffeta pillow tops or stuffed toys. (Bring 1 yard of taffeta to the meeting or a pattern for a stuffed toy as well as material for making it.)

3. June 17—Making belts, earrings, bracelets and ruffled doilies of plastic. (Bring 3 packages of plastic doilies or 50¢ for supplies to make belts, bracelets or earrings.)

4. June 24—Evaluation Day; Projects must be finished; Picnic and swimming party. Since the kitchen in the Homemaking Department is under construction now, no immediate plans have been made for a Cooking School. This will be announced later.

The adult clothing classes will be divided into two classes this year. If you feel that you are a beginner or would like to sew with the group who has sewed very little you should attend the first class Friday night, June 6th in the Study Hall. This time was chosen in order that some women who work outside the home might attend.

The advanced sewing class meets again Friday morning at 9 a. m. in the Study Hall. We are studying pattern adjustments and making a basic pattern in class. This will eliminate the necessity of trying on a garment so many times while you are making it. Some of the ladies are making them for themselves and others are making them for a teenage daughter who is always "out of pocket" when needed for fitting. Demonstrations are given at each meeting on special problems requested by the class. There is no fee or tests for these classes. They are given under the guidance of the Homemaking teacher in your interest. You are sure to enjoy the association with the class members.

In addition to being Salutatorian of the 1958 senior class, Wayne was secretary-treasurer of the Future Farmers of America of the Lelia Lake Chapter and was a member of the basketball team. He had been a resident of Lelia Lake all his life and was a member of the Calvary Baptist Church here in Clarendon. He was 18 years of age.

Funeral services for Archie Wayne Aten were held Monday afternoon in the First Baptist Church at Lelia Lake with Rev. Ernest Phillips, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church and Rev. Donley Farmers Start Poisoning For 'Hoppers'

Several farmers have already started poisoning for grasshoppers, says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. The infestation of young 'hoppers at this time is the worst in several years says the county agent.

Breedlove warns all farmers who have poison spraying machines or who can borrow one, to get it at once and start spraying because in a very short time the 'hoppers will begin to move on crops and will cause a great deal of damage. Breedlove says that he is trying to contact airplanes spraying companies at this time so that if the situation gets critical then planes can be put to use. We can avoid a great expense later says Breedlove if we get our ground equipment to use at once and poison the 'hoppers while they are still young.

Aldrin and toxaphene are the best poisons to use and will control the 'hoppers very effectively. Now is the time, today, to poison the 'hoppers before they get in our crops.

Breedlove is now contacting the state department of agriculture to see if funds are available to assist farmers in poisoning of the 'hoppers, and if they are, he is asking that Donley County be included.

'Frontier News Flashes' To Begin This Week In Texas Newspapers

HOUSTON—Colorful 100-year-old Texas history is to be brought to the pages of the modern newspapers by the department of journalism and graphic arts of the University of Houston. Highlights, including politics, farm news and advertising, are taken from the yellowed pages of 100-year-old newspapers for weekly releases to newspapers over the

state. Knowing that Texas folks are intensely interested in the history of their state, Billy I. Ross, assistant professor of journalism at the University, conceived the idea of preparing historical-type human interest bits of news, to be made available — at no cost — to all weekly and daily newspapers over the state.

"The response has been tremendous, and the first releases are being made for use the first week in June," Ross said.

Charles Aycock, senior journalism major at the University, is doing the research and preparing

copy that is distributed. Ross said, if the interest by newspaper editors is any indication throughout the state, Texas history in our schools is far from lacking in student interest.

AUSTIN—A fresh task force is being organized by Gov. Price Daniel to attack the state's monetary problems.

With oil production still hovering at a historic low and a price source of state revenue partially throttled, Texas government is, for the time being, at least, "living beyond its means."

Governor Daniel named a six-man committee of executive department officials to study ways of bridging the gap between income and outgo. Members are Sec'y of State Zollie Steakley, Treasurer Jesse James, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Auditor C. H. Cavness, Budget Officer Jess Irwin and Col. J. T. Ellis Jr. of the governor's administrative staff.

They are expected to work cooperatively with the State Tax Study Commission, a group of legislators and outside experts who have been surveying the state's fiscal position for some months.

Under the present spending pattern, it is estimated the next legislature would have to scratch up upwards of \$100,000,000 in new revenue to balance the books.

As in a family that comes up short at the end of the month, the state's advisors, both official and unofficial, are divided between

those advocating getting more money and those favoring less spending.

Governor Daniel urged his executives to try both angles. Specifically, he suggested exploring:

1. Every possible economy in use of state funds.
2. Possible elimination or combination of duplicating services among state agencies.
3. Compilation of a list of non-recurring expenses in the present appropriation.
4. Every possible source of additional state revenues which may be available without the levy of additional taxes.

OPEN SEASON

Most major candidates have held their opening rallies and will be campaigning with little let-up between now and the July 26 primary.

But in many areas of the state an even more intensive struggle is going on at the grass roots for control of the precinct conventions. They'll be held right after the primary, on the evening of July 26.

It's a small-time battle with big-time stakes. Whichever group of the Democratic party gets out the "mostest" to the precinct conventions will control the state convention in the fall. This means taking over the official machinery of the party for the next two years—leading up to 1960 and presidential nominating time.

Governor Daniel has said he will personally lead "conservatives, moderates and all other Texas Democrats who believe in majority decisions." He's been assured of vigorous opposition from the liberal Democrats of Texas led by Mrs. Frankie Randolph of Houston, Texas' national committeewoman.

DOT will have a statewide rally in Austin May 31 to draw at-

tention to its efforts to oust the governor from official party leadership.

For the average citizens the precinct convention poses a more ticklish problem than primary voting. It may mean voting, publicly, against a neighbor who's running for precinct chairman.

'WARS' WATCHED

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson says his office is keeping close check on the gasoline and milk price wars that have broken out in major cities.

In some areas gasoline prices dropped as much as 10 cents per gallon below normal, and milk has been sold at a fraction of the usual charge.

"Texas anti-trust laws do not prevent price wars which are the free working of competition," Wilson commented, "but they do prohibit agreement or conspiracy to fix or cut prices and selling below cost to eliminate competition."

MORE BUILDING

Effect of the drought's end is being seen in more building in smaller towns dependent on agriculture for prosperity.

UT's Bureau of Business Research reports a 10 per cent rise in the January-April building volume for towns with less than 10,000 population.

BBR's report reflected a fairly general brightening of the building picture. Construction authorizations for April were up 3 per cent from March and 22 per cent from a year ago.

Home builders were found to be cautiously optimistic. Most, BBR reported, hadn't actually experienced much of an increase in home sales. But they were busier than they'd been in months building up a supply for an expected pick-up in buying by fall and next year.

Easier credit and, in some cases, lower costs of materials are expected to make house-buying more alluring.

Arsenal Deer Crop Increased By Management

AUSTIN—A conclusive example of efficient and successful wildlife management is found in a report of the program at the Red River Arsenal in Bowie county, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

This report has been made by Major Bobby J. Brewer, Military Advisor, and other members of the advisory group of the Red River Arsenal, and covers the history of the management program at the arsenal.

According to Major Brewer the arsenal and the Lone Star Ordinance Plant was established in 1941 on 36,000 acres of agricultural land on which the game population had been practically depleted. Agricultural development and timber cutting had seriously damaged desirable habitat.

In 1945 a restocking program was begun. The Game Commission moved 49 deer of mixed sex into the restricted area.

The herd increased and in 1954 the first arsenal deer hunt was authorized. In five days 89 hunters killed 29 bucks. In 1955 the same number of hunters got 26 bucks.

By 1956 the herd had increased to a point that was dangerous to the carrying capacity of the land. The command requested the

Game Commission for a survey. As a result, it was shown that approximately one deer to 12 acres. In some concentrated areas there was one deer to 7 acres. The total population was estimated at 2083. Biologists recommended an overall stocking ratio of one deer to 15 acres.

In 1956 a total of 656 hunters took 324 deer. The sex ratio was 46 per cent does and 54 per cent bucks. In 1957, 600 hunters killed 170 deer. It is estimated, that by the opening of this year's season, the total population will be more than 3,000 deer and that it will be necessary to kill more deer than previously.

FROM THE RANGERS

Battle with the Indians!

76 OF THEM KILLED!

From the following letter, from Camp Runnels, it will be seen that Captain Ford, with 213 Rangers and friendly Indians, had a fight with the Comanches on the 12th inst.

The engagement took place in the Wichita country, eight days' march from Camp Runnels. Our correspondent does not give the number of killed, wounded, etc.; but we learn from the official report of Captain Ford to the Governor, (which) we would publish but for the length, that seventy-six Comanches were killed, eighteen taken prisoners; and of our men, only two were killed, (Robert Nickel and a Waco Indian), and three slightly wounded.

STATE NEWS

We learn from the LaGrange True Issue, that wheat in Fayette county is suffering from the rust.

The Bonham "Independent" says, strawberries are abundant all over the prairies in that region.

A deck hand named Henry Clark, fell overboard from the steamer J. H. Bell, in the Trinity river, on the 20th ult., and was drowned.

The engine of the steam mill on Mr. J. W. Schimpf, on Buffalo Bayou, burst its boiler one day last week, injuring two men considerably.

We learn from the Texas Baptist that an interesting revival of religion is going on in Anderson. Several have been added to the different churches.

A new Post Office has been established in Fayette county at a place called "Cistern," on the road from Bastrop to Gonzales, and A. D. Kendall appointed postmaster.

The Waco Southerner speaks encouragingly of the crop prospects in McLennan county, and says the wheat is turning out splendidly, and that engagements are being made to deliver flour in Waco

at \$3.00 per hundred.

The citizens of Young county have been driven by necessity to protect themselves against Indian depredations. At a recent public meeting they resolved to raise a company of Minute-Men to act as scouts to consist of 24 white men and 4 Indians. A subscription has been raised for the purpose of defraying all expenses. So says the Dallas Herald.

The Houston Telegraph is informed by the Agent of Redding & Co's. Express, that two men went to the plantation of General Welborne, in Fort Bend county, on Friday night, and represented themselves as clergymen, and asked permission to preach to the negroes. The overseer refused. They then asked to stay all night. The overseer informed them that the family was residing in town, and the house was locked up. In the altercation they seized upon the overseer, and while one held him the other gashed him in an awful manner with his knife. The overseer is not expected to live.

Washington, May 18—In the Senate today, the bill for the admission of Oregon into the Union was passed by a majority of 18.

The bill providing for the running of the boundary line of the State of Texas, without the making of scientific investigation was passed.

FARM NEWS

from the County ASC Committee

1958 Acreage Reserve Payments

Producers with 1958 wheat or cotton Acreage Reserve agreements may receive their payment as soon as they have planted all of the soil bank base crops that they intend to plant this year. This means crops such as cotton, grain sorghum, perennial grasses for harvest, and others classed as soil bank base crops.

1959 WHEAT ALLOTMENTS

Donley County was allotted 18,347 acres for 1959 wheat allotments. This is a decrease from the 19,360 which was allotted last year. The individual farm wheat allotments for 1959 were mailed June 4th. You should receive your allotment soon if you have not already received it. Any question you may have concerning your wheat allotment will be discussed with you at the Donley County ASC Office.

COVER CROPS FOR COTTON AND WHEAT ACREAGE RESERVE LAND

Participants in either cotton or wheat Acreage Reserve for 1958 should be interested in cover crops. Under the regular ACP Program you may receive cost-share for Hubam, Guar, Chinese Red Peas, New Era Pea, and Cowpeas. Any of these will afford fine protection from erosion.

If you have or will have soil bank base crops growing on Acreage Reserve land to be used as a cover or nurse crop, it must be destroyed prior to maturity.

CHANGE OF FARM OPERATORS

If you are operating a different farm than you did last year, or if you are operating a farm for the first time, please notify the Donley County ASC Office of the changes so that our records may be corrected.
