### Harrison & Hudgins Show Champions In Donley County Calf Show

Troy Harrison, Donley County 4-H Club member from Quail, exhibited the grand champion and Don Hudgins, a Clarendon F.F.A. member from Brice exhibited the reserve grand champion steers at the Donley County Annual Calf Show held at the County Show Barn last Friday, December 27th.

Both of the champion steers were Angus calves and this is the first time in the history of the event that an Angus has been grand champion and set a special precedent when both the grand and reserve champions were Angus. Nineteen Angus and 14 Hereford steers were shown at the annual event. Donley County 4-H Club members exhibited all of the Herefords and six of the Angus and the remainder of the steers were all shown by members of the Clarendon F.F.A.

Stanley Anderson, professor of animal husbandry at Texas Tech, placed the steers. Mr. Anderson judged the Iowa State Fair this fall and will place the steers at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show in January. He is one of the most popular young judges in the southwest and is coach of the Texas Tech Livestock Judging Team.

Three hundred and fifty dollars in premium money was divided among the young exhibitors. The money was donated by business firms and individuals from over Donley County. J. R. Gillham and his Clarendon F.F.A. members had charge of raising the premium money for the spring shows. The last part of the spring event will be held January 17th with over 100 Clarendon, Lelia Lake, and Hedley F.F.A. youths exhibiting 300 head of pigs and 25 head of lambs at the county show barns.

Rep. Walter Rogers notified the Leader Friday that the President has approved an allocation of \$600,000 for special disaster relief in three Texas Panhandle counties.

The grant will be divided among farmers who suffered severe damage to their terracing in Hall, Donley and Collingsworth counties. Farmers in the three counties had requested a disaster grant in excess of one million but \$600,000 was the initial amount approved.

## Auto And Truck Owners Urged To Obtain New Inspection Stickers

With only one-tenth of the motor vehicles in Texas inspected for the year 1958, automobile and truck owners were urged today to obtain their new inspection stickers before the holiday season.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, called upon motorists to obtain their 1958 inspection stickers as soon as possible in order to alleviate the last minute rush on the 4,200 inspection stations in Texas.

Garrison said only about 450,000 of the four million registered vehicles in the state have been inspected and approved.

"While this number exceeds that for the same period last year," he said, "the present rate of inspection will not prevent inspection stations from being rushed again during the last few weeks of the inspection period ending April 15, 1958. Vehicle owners who complete their inspections before the holiday period will avoid the inconvenience of waiting at the inspection stations."

The state police director also said that early inspections will be of benefit to motorists who plan trips during the Thanksgiving to New Year's period by eliminating mechanical defects.

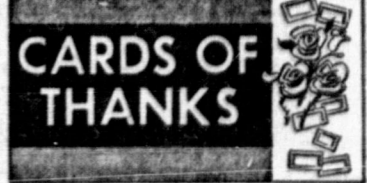

## Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

By VERN SANFORD  
 Texas Press Association  
 AUSTIN — Things have been popping under the State Capitol dome throughout 1957.

**1. WATER PROBLEMS**  
 Floods, tornadoes and hurricanes brought 10 years of drought to a close. Reservoirs then filled to 91 per cent of capacity—a two-years supply. But Lampasas, Dallas, Silvertown, and other towns added up damage toll of more than \$100,000,000. Pasturage flourished, but many crops washed away or rotted. Water's importance couldn't be ignored. Result: Legislature passed two major measures. People approved \$200,000,000 bond-selling amendments for water conservation projects.

**2. ICT FAILS**  
 BenJack Cage became a household word after the crash of an empire he had built with heavy investments from organized labor. Losses were estimated at \$4,500,000. Two legislative committees and two grand juries spent months trying to untangle ICT's fantastic history. Cage was indicted. After his return from South America, he was convicted on embezzlement charges and still faces trial on other indictments.

**3. EX-OFFICIALS ENMESHED**  
 Former Insurance Commissioners J. Byron Saunders and Gerald Smith, were accused of receiving money from ICT while they were in office. Both were indicted on perjury charges. Trials are pending.

**4. INSURANCE REORGANIZATION**  
 Texas insurance regulation must start over with a "clean slate," declared Gov. Price Daniel shortly after taking office.

Over strong opposition he pushed the insurance reorganization bill through the Legislature. It enabled him to appoint new officials to the battle-scarred department. But more static developed in the special sessions. Senate tried to oust the new commissioner, William A. Harrison. Attorney General's opinion said they had no say-so over Harrison's appointment. However, the Insurance Department still faces continued critical surveillance from disgruntled senators.

**5. COX CONVICTED**  
 Things talked about for years erupted into the open with the sensational resignation, indictment and conviction of Rep. James E. Cox of Conroe. A tape recording of a conversation between Cox and a Naturopathic Association leader was the prime evidence used to back up a charge that Cox had agreed to accept a \$5,000 bribe. This provided extra fuel for the reform drive. A code of ethics and lobby registration laws were passed.

**6. NEW SEGREGATION LAWS**  
 East Texas legislators put plenty of steam behind proposals designed to preserve local authority over school segregation. Futile filibusters caused delays, but five bills were passed. They'll probably be in the news again as opponents bring them to tests in courts.

**7. OIL SAGS**  
 Violent fluctuations in Texas oil production gave everyone the jitters. Pressure from the Suez Canal crisis forced production allowable to an all-time high of 18 producing days in March. But Suez reopened and foreign oil came flooding back into the U.S.A. Texas' allowable had tumbled to 13 producing days by July, skidded to an all-time low of 12 in September. President's order for voluntary import cuts brought some hope.

**8. RAIDS**  
 Attorney General Will Wilson padlocked Galveston gambling houses with less repercussion on the Pleasure Isle's economy than expected. Latest Wilson raids rounded up naturopaths on charges of violating the Medical Practices Act.

**RESERVOIRS URGED**  
 Construction of new reservoirs should have first priority in state water planning, say engineers. Some 25 consulting engineers from over the state met with the Water Board to help get the new planning program rolling. It authorizes the first state effort at topographic mapping since the 1920s. Since there's not enough money to map everywhere, engineers urged mapping areas where reservoirs are needed.

Retiring Board Member H. A. Beckwith will direct the mapping. Beckwith was hired by the board as a \$10,000-a-year engineer.

**MISSILES**  
 There is little doubt but that the subject of guided missiles will be number one on the important matters for action in the early days of the next session of Congress. Efforts will be made to force the coordination of the activities of the several Services and to effectuate a concentration on early accomplishments that will put this country ahead of Russia. This can and should be done.

**FOREIGN AID**  
 The highly controversial foreign aid program will receive much attention during the entire session. Great stress will be laid

to the argument that it is the only way we can keep our friends in Europe and other sections of the world. As concerning Asia, the pitch was anticipated in a New York Herald Tribune (European Edition) editorial that appeared on October 12 and 13, 1957. This editorial was entitled, "The Stake in India Is Asia". This editorial warned Congressmen that the \$600 million loan needed by India to carry out its second five-year plan should be granted. The editorial indicated very strongly that if the \$600 million loan was not made, it would mean the loss of Asia to the allies. That failure to make the loan could result in India falling into the Communist orbit, thereby creating almost a solid Communist front in Asia. The editorial said, and I quote, "The Soviet Union, which has turned itself into a modern country in one generation, provides a beautiful daydream for many Indians—a daydream which soothingly blurs over the totalitarian horror on which Soviet industrialization was based. Communist China is on the threshold of a similar blood-and-sweat transformation. The temptation is strong. The State of Kerala, which embraces some of the best educated people in India, recently elected a Communist government. Economic disaster would open the door to Communist control of all India". You can see from this that it will be necessary for the Congress to weigh very carefully all arguments both pro and con on the foreign aid program whether it be in direct grants or in loan authorizations.

**CIVIL RIGHTS**  
 It is anticipated that the proponents of the so-called civil rights legislation will act in the early days of the session to enact into law those sections that were deleted from the original bill which was passed during the first session of this term of Congress. This will mean a bitter fight. Although it was generally thought that the Administration would not want to precipitate another fight on this issue, the proponents served advance notice some time back that they would immediately move for legislation giving much stronger powers to the federal government.

**EDUCATION**  
 There will definitely be a strong movement to expand the activities of the federal government in the field of education. Efforts will be made to prevent legislation limiting eligibility to integrated schools. The proponents of the federal aid program feel that they have a much better chance to pass the bill if the question of segregation or integration is left out of it. Some feel that if they can get this bill passed, there will be plenty of time later on to limit eligibility for participation to integrated schools. Others feel that the President could do this by Presidential directive.

**TAXES**  
 This is a subject that everyone is worried about. The Chairman of the Ways and Means (taxing) Committee, the Honorable Jere Cooper, passed away last week. He was a grand fellow and a very

agle tax expert. He had been in Congress almost 30 years and came from the State of Tennessee. Because of his death, the Chairmanship of the Committee will be assumed by the Honorable Wilbur Mills, a very able and conscientious Representative from our neighboring State of Arkansas. Mr. Mills has had a great deal of experience in tax matters and is considered by many in this country as one of the leading experts on the subject. He is a fine gentleman and will unquestionably make an outstanding Chairman of this Committee.

### Hot Wire Stops Mountain Lion At Sheep Pen

AUSTIN—A "hot wire" from a six volt battery was sufficient to change the mind of a mountain lion recently at the Black Gap Wildlife Management in Brewster County, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration of the Game and Fish Commission.

According to Tom Moore, Superintendent of the area, the workers picked up the tracks of a big lion and followed it to the 7 foot fence around the Big Horn Sheep area. Large claw marks on fence braces indicated the big cat had attempted to jump the fence and had hit the hot wire.

Hair on the wire and torn up ground were evidence that the electrified wire had paid for itself in protection of the sheep. The sheep, three ewes and two rams, are wild broodstock transported from traps in Arizona. The Mountain lions evidently have their taste set for sheep meat. The following morning another lion trying to find its way into the pen, was trapped. Foot measurements indicated it was not the same animal that got the shock treatment.

### EXTENSION OF AVAILABILITY DATE FOR PRICE SUPPORT

Information has been received from the Washington Office that in order to allow producers more time to find storage, the availability date for price support on 1957 crop grain sorghums has been extended through February 28, 1958.

### 1958 COTTON ACREAGE RESERVE

Applications for 1958 Cotton Acreage Reserve will be taken starting January 13th through March 7th. Every cotton producer should have received a notice of the payment rate for his farm. The average payment for Donley County is \$27.00 per acre.

### GRAIN SORGHUM

Through December 27th farmers had put 126,165.50 hundred weight of 1957 crop grain sorghums under price support. This represents 310 applications as of this date.

### 1958 ACREAGE RESERVE PAYMENTS TO BE MADE EARLY

Payments under the 1958 Acreage Reserve Program will be made as soon as performance can be determined, according to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. According to the Committee certificates earned by farmers for compliance with 1958 Acreage Reserve program provisions will be issued without delay, farm by farm, as soon as compliance is completed and no indication of possible violation.

### AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION PROGRAM

The 1958 Conservation program will be very much like the program for 1957. Deep breaking of soil, building terraces, earthen dams, and other major practices will be along the same order as in the past year. Applications for 1958 ACP practices will start with January 1st.
