MAHAFFEY AND GRAHAM WIN TOP STATE F. F. A. AWARDS

James Mahaffey and Doyce Graham, Jr., brought top honors to Clarendon and Donley County from the state F.F.A. Committee meeting held at Austin, June 2-4th. Mahaffey was selected by the group as the second top ranking Star Lone Star Farmer of the entire state for the 1957-1958 school year. This is the second highest honor the state F.F.A. organization can offer its members who have qualified for the state F.F.A. degree. There are approximately 40,000 members in over 900 schools in Texas and this honor won by James is the second highest honor that could be awarded him.

James served the past year as Clarendon F.F.A. Chapter president and as president of the Greenbelt F.F.A. district composed of chapters from Childress, Paducah, Memphis, Wellington, Quail, Samnorwood, Turkey, Estelline, Lakeview, Lelia Lake, Hedley and Clarendon. The award is based on project program, F.F.A. and school activities, scholarship, and citizenship. Mahaffey has been outstanding in his project program and has shown champion animals at all the major livestock shows in the southwest. One of his top honors was the exhibition of the grand champion barrow of the Texas State Fair over all breeders and club youths.

Doyce Graham was selected as the state's winner in the Sante Fe College Scholarship award for members of the Texas F.F.A. organization. This award is based on scholarship and F.F.A. leadership. Doyce was one of the top F.F.A. members of the Clarendon Chapter, the Greenbelt District Area I, and the entire state during his enrollment in Vocational Agriculture at the Clarendon High School. He was third ranking lone star farmer in Area I in 1955-1956, and one of the leaders in this area. The award is for \$350 and can be used at any school of Doyce's choice.

Mahaffey, and Doyce Graham, Jr. is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyce Graham, Sr. This is the first year that two students from any one chapter have won two of the state's top awards and marks the first time any chapter in the state has had two of the top ranking star lone star farmers two years in a row. Harold Lindley of the Clarendon Chapter was third ranking star lone star farmer in the state last year.

Grasshopper Fight In Full Swing

The grasshopper fight is in full swing says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. Farmers are using aldrin more than any other type of poison because it is just effective and is much cheaper. Three fourths of a pint of aldrin per acre will really kill the hoppers; this is added to water as a spray.

Breedlove says that he has arrangements with Mr. Campbell of Claude for him to use his airplanes to spray fields and pastures any time that farmers prefer that type of control. The cost for airplanes is between seventy five and eighty cents per acre and Mr. Campbell furnishes everything. Breedlove says to contact him if you want a plane and he will make the arrangements for you at once. It is best to have a block of at least two hundred acres for airplane spraying because they can not afford to move in for smaller acreage.

Farmers are urged to group together and spray several farms at a time and this will sure give the best type of protection. Get those hoppers before they get big enough to migrate.

Approximately twenty men and women met at the Legion Hall last Thursday night to discuss the possibility of securing a municipal swimming pool for Clarendon. It was pointed out by some in attendance that a large number of Clarendon youth journey to neighboring towns to use their pools, and the majority of those in attendance seemed to feel that a municipal pool for Clarendon would be an asset for the town. It was pointed out that probably the only way to finance and operate a pool of desirable size would be through a municipal project which would call for a bond issue for the city of Clarendon.

Sweet Potato Program Coming Along Fine Says County Agent

The sweet potato program is coming along fine says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. Three hundred thousand slips will be planted this year. Breedlove and Horace Green made two trips to Martins Mill, Texas and brought back two hundred and fifty thousand slips and Mr. J. N. Weaver brought back fifty thousand from Portales, N. Mex.

Mr. Nelson Seago, president of the association, says that next spring the Donley County Sweet Potato Growers Association will bed out their own slips and have plenty available for all farmers in Donley County.

Sweet potatoes under present conditions have been showing twice the net profit per acre over cotton and will make a wonderful crop for Donley County farmers to go along with cotton for a cash crop. The plan of the association is to cure out the potatoes in vacant buildings in the county after they have been crated. Sweet potato slips this year were hard to get because of so much spring rain and cool weather, but the Donley County association has a good start and will have a fairly large acreage for the first year.

Breedlove says that many farmers in the county have indicated they will want sweet potato slips for next year from local growers. The varieties used in the county are the best drought and disease resistant. Dark Skin Gold Rush, Red Gold, Candees and All Gold are those being planted this year.

A new court house is about being erected at Belton, which will cost over thirteen thousand dollars.

The Quitman Herald of the 19th says the health of Wood county is remarkably good.

The same paper also says, for weeks past there has hardly been

a day that we have not seen some one hunting a home in Texas. We learn from the Bonham Independent that the rust is doing great injury to the oat crop in many portions of Washington County.

The Jefferson Gabbette of the 29th inst., mentions the discovery of silver in the upper portion of Cass county, which has created considerable excitement in that region.

Great numbers of sheep are annually raised in Northern Texas and shipped to the New Orleans market, where they are sold readily at from four to five dollars a head.

We learn from the Pioneer that the crops in Freestone county are backward, owing to the excessive rains. Wheat and rye look tolerably well; but the oat crop it is said will be an entire failure.

Nine persons, it is stated have recently been killed by the Indians, about twenty five miles from Weatherford, Parker county. On Keechi Creek in that county, the people are building forts for protection.

A large drove of sheep, numbering 1200, passed through town yesterday. They were purchased in Mexico, at one dollar per head, we were told; we did not learn their destination.

POLITICAL PARTIES—TWO OR TWENTY?

For a number of years it has been argued in this country that there is a need for more political parties or a complete realignment of the two controlling political parties which we now have. Some argue that there is a definite need for a third party to counteract certain philosophies now present in both the Republican and Democratic. Others argue that we need a complete realignment of the two major parties so that the so-called conservatives will all be in one party and the so-called liberals will all be in the other. Still others argue that we need a group of political parties—each representing a particular political philosophy—in order to have a true expression of sentiment on a pure democratic basis.

I discuss this matter at this time because I feel that much history is being written at the present time in France concerning this particular issue. The tragic political difficulties in France did not come as a surprise to students of politics. The surprise was that France had been able to avert the present crisis for so long. The 4th Republic was built on political sand. It would seem that the architects of that Republic concerned themselves too much with the philosophy that everyone be allowed to do as they pleased with a total disregard as to how such action might interfere with the rights of others and create a chaotic conflict that would result in complete impotency of France as a nation. Instead of two or three well-balanced political parties with the strength to fully debate issues, to provide for the bringing about of a final decision, and for the subsequent enforcement of that decision, France found herself with a large number of splinter parties made up of subscribers to every conceivable philosophy known to mankind. The governing body—The National Assembly and the Senate—became infiltrated with

these different groups, some of which would be joined by lesser groups in political issues that came up. The result was that France had a government in name only. It had a parliament in which all of the issues could be thoroughly debated, but in which no final decision could be made with any degree of patency. Under the circumstances, the government was wholly impotent insofar as enforcing any controversial decisions. France floundered for a number of years under this loosely knitted scheme of things, and the 4th Republic was able to survive only because of help from French allies including its major benefactor, the United States. However, I feel that the situation which has developed over recent years in France has made a major contribution to the science of government. The advance of civilization has been by trial and error. The political situation in France has furnished us with a most valuable source of information on governmental questions.

I think that it has definitely proved the merit of our system in this country of two major political parties, with both parties being well-balanced, and counting among the membership of each, students of divergent political views. A system by which issues can be threshed out, thoroughly

considered and acted upon. A system wherein Independents are free to move into either party or to cast their votes solely as independents. And probably most important, a system wherein the possibility of the military taking over is at a minimum.

UNKNOWN SOLDIERS
Last week the nation paid tribute to all the brave and valiant men who gave their lives for their country in the Korean War and in World War II. The last remains of two servicemen, their identity known but to God, were interred in Arlington Cemetery alongside the Unknown Soldier of World War I.

The flag-draped coffins lay in state in the Rotunda of the Capitol from Wednesday morning until Friday afternoon, Memorial Day, where thousands of Americans paid their respects. At the Capitol, the caskets rested on the same bier on which the body of Abraham Lincoln lay in state after his death in 1865. On Memorial Day, they were borne to their final resting place.

Disability benefits, however, will be reduced by the amount of any workmen's compensation payments or any other Federal disability benefit except payments made to veterans for service connected disabilities. For example, Sanderson explained if a disabled person became entitled to a disability benefit of \$80 under the social security law and he was receiving \$60 a month from workmen's compensation it would reduce the amount of his social security disability benefit so that he would receive only \$20 from social security.

Sanderson at the same time pointed out that disability payments from private agencies do not reduce or affect the amount of the disability benefit. The reduction is made only for workmen's compensation payments and for a Federal disability benefit other than compensation paid by the Veterans Administration for service connected disabilities.

If any eligible person has failed to file an application to establish a period of disability, he should do so at once. All applications filed before July 1, 1958, will be effective to freeze a workers social security record as of the beginning of his disability period. Applications filed after June 30, 1958, may not be retroactive more than a year. Workers who have been severely disabled for a long time and who do not file before July 1, 1958, may lose their rights to have their social security record frozen and to receive disability insurance benefits.

To avoid any loss Sanderson advised persons severely disabled to contact their nearest social security district office as soon as possible. "Delay" he said "may result in loss of some or all future benefit payments."

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Persons who are severely disabled and have worked under social security for a certain length of time now have protection under the social security law. Mr. John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Office stated that disabled workers under 50 years of age may have their social security records frozen to protect their future benefits. A disabled worker who is age 50 or over may be paid monthly disability insurance benefits.

be many voters whom I will not personally be able to meet to discuss my own qualifications for the office despite the fact that by election time I will have extended my campaign into every part of the state," he continued.

"For the benefit of those I may not meet, I offer the record of my 19 years in the general practice of law and my 11 years service on the district court bench as the basis for my candidacy," the judge said.

The veteran Jurist presides over the 133rd District Court in Houston where he has been re-elected three times since 1948 without opposition.

He was first elected a special district judge in 1946 in a special election held by the Harris County Bar Association to name a temporary successor to the late **Judge Roy Campbell** who was ill at the time.

In 1947 Judge Hunt was appointed judge of the newly created 133rd District Court by Governor **Beauford Jester.**

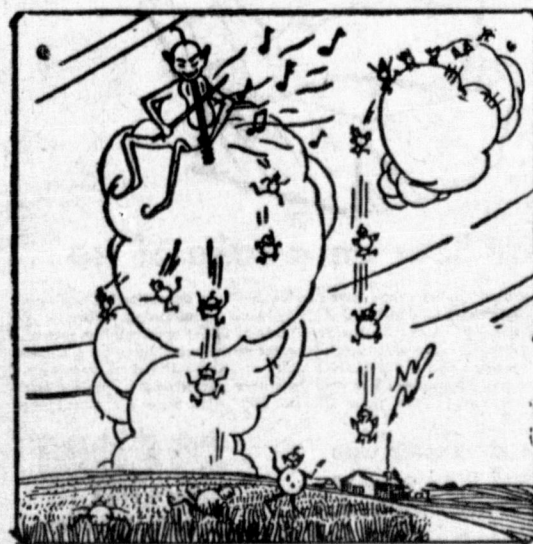

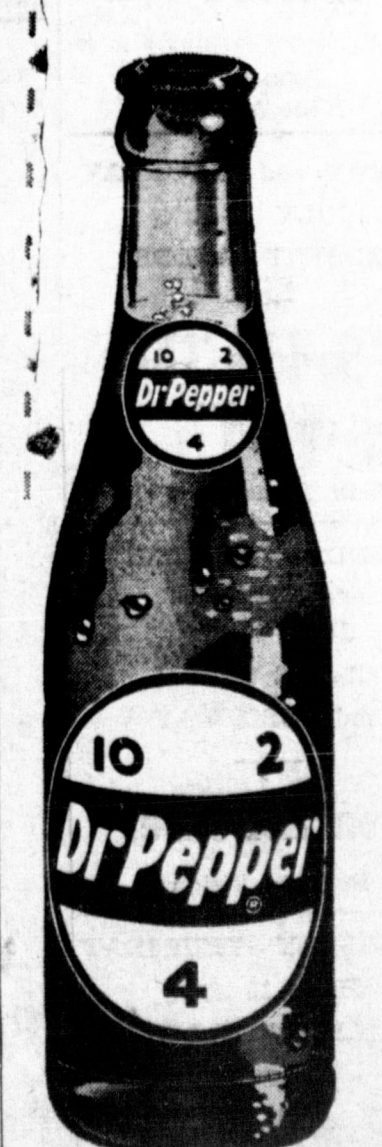

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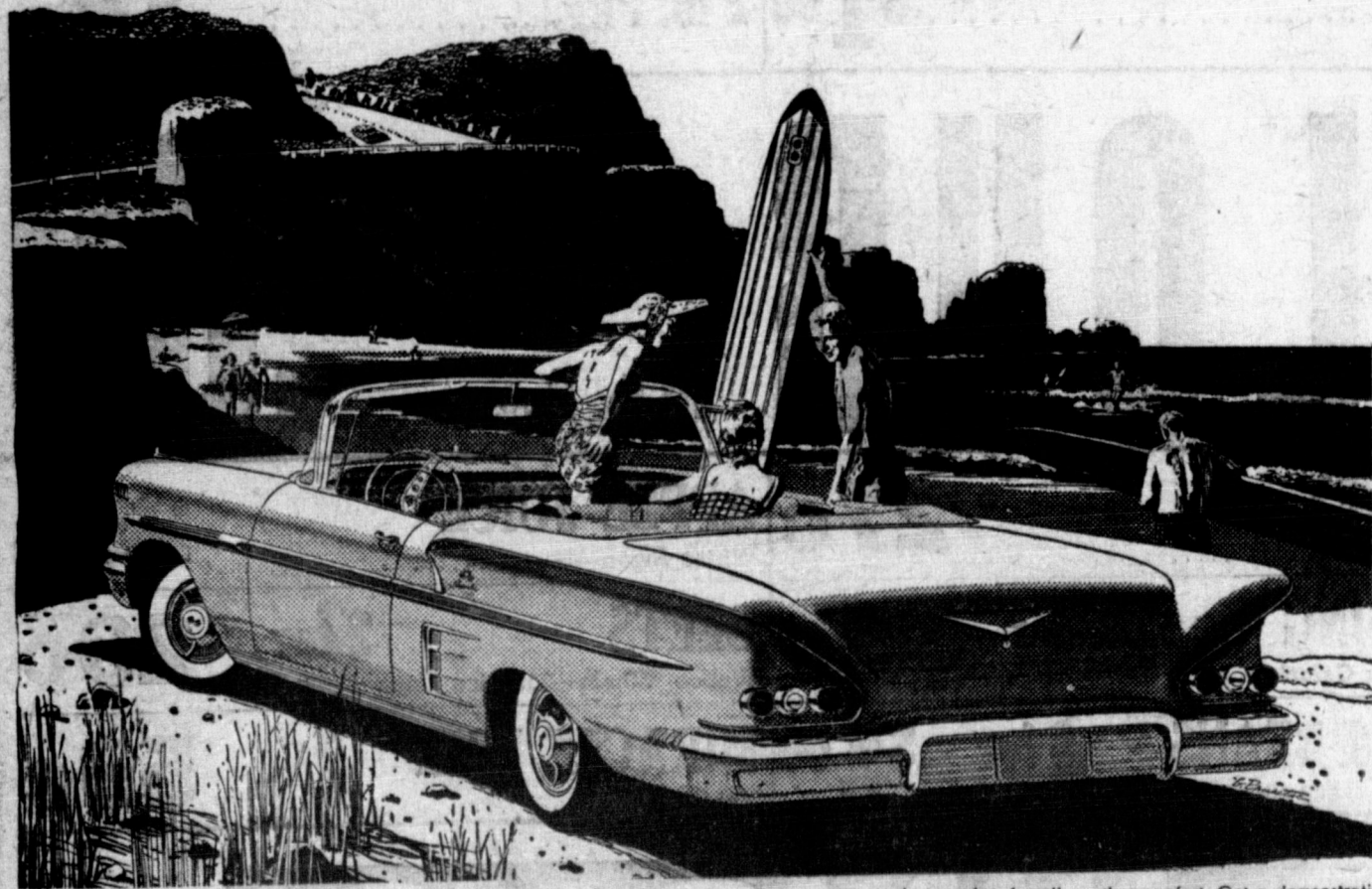

FARMERS TO MAKE IMPORTANT DECISION IN WHEAT REFERENDUM

Donley County wheat farmers will help make an important decision when they vote June 20 in the national wheat marketing quota referendum.

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve quotas for the 1959 crop, the wheat program will include acreage allotments, marketing quotas with penalties on "excess" wheat and price supports at a minimum national average of \$1.81 per bushel or 75 per cent of parity.

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of those voting, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties, but allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support. The price-support rate would be about \$1.20 per bushel, or 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

Marketing quotas and acreage allotments operate only in commercial wheat states which are those with allotments of more than 25,000 acres. Texas has an allotment of 4,099,094 acres for the 1959 wheat crop.

All farmers are eligible to vote if they will share in the 1959 wheat crop from a farm in the commercial wheat area on which the wheat harvested for grain in 1959 will exceed 15 acres and provided they did not take part in the 1958 wheat program.

Caution Urged In Weed Killer Use To Prevent Damage To Crops

AUSTIN—Extreme caution in the use of chemical weed killers on the farm or ranch was urged today by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Some 4,000 acres of cotton were recently damaged severely in the Coastal Bend where 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T were used to kill weeds in nearby rice fields. The incident resulted in the banning of the chemicals in that area until crops were harvested.

Commissioner White reminded farmers and ranchers that hormone-type herbicides are excellent for weed control but they can be dangerous to surrounding broadleaf plants. The chemical spray can be carried long distances by wind, damaging and sometimes destroying cotton and other crops in the vicinity.

The recent ban on herbicides in an area of the Coastal Bend was the first time such action had been necessary there in five years. "We have had so few cases of mis-handling of the chemicals that people are apt to forget how potent they really are on susceptible crops," said White.

Even a small leak in spraying equipment being towed down the highway has been known to damage crops for miles down both sides of the road. The chemicals of hormone type spur the plant to such rapid growth that they literally "grow themselves to death" in a few days time.

White pointed out that many Texas counties are regulated by the state Herbicide Law which requires permits if more than ten acres of land are sprayed during any one year. Those applying herbicides commercially must be bonded in addition to having a permit.

Some 161,000 acres were sprayed in the state last year, with a total of 196 licenses issued to dealers.

Proper use of the chemicals can achieve excellent results in weed control, said White. However, anyone who has not had previous experience with weed killers is advised to hire a reliable commercial firm to treat the land.

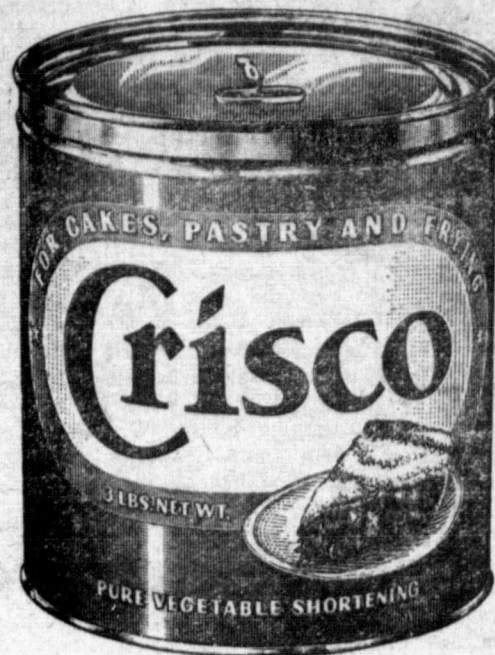
