DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Is guar a soil improving crop? Mr. Ashcraft thinks so from what he has seen while working for Hall Hardin. He reports that last year Hall Hardin had a strip of guar across one field of the Runder place and this year planted cotton in rows that crossed this strip where guar was last year. According to Mr. Ashcraft the cotton is four to six inches taller in the strip where the guar had been than it is on the land where guar has not been.

It will be interesting for those considering whether or not they should plant guar as a soil improving crop to check on this area and form their own opinion as to its value.

A number of good reports have been received on the value of

guar by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Donley District, and it is hoped that factual information on increased yields and pictures can be obtained this fall.

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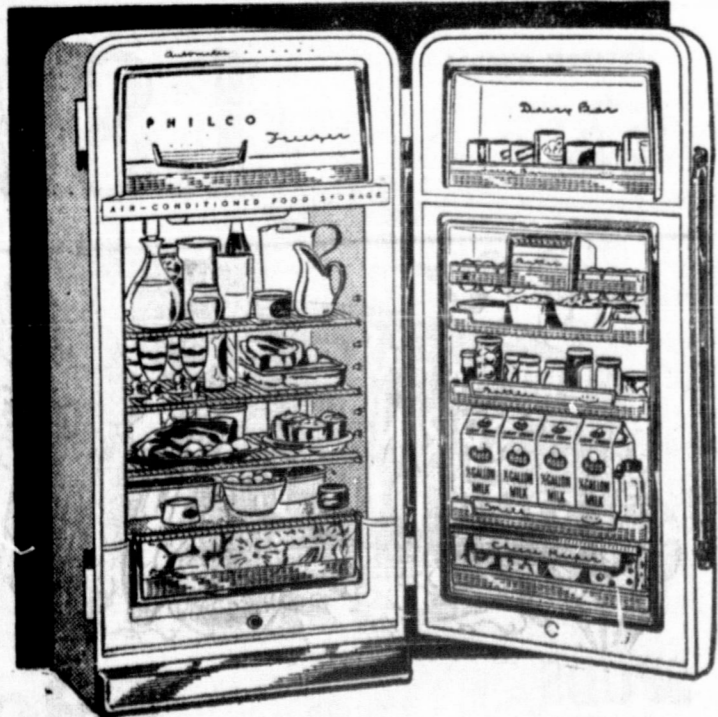
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**Former Resident Wins Pikes Peak Race**

A non-smoking vegetarian won the race up and down 14,110 ft. Pikes Peak August 10th in an endurance test against smokers.

Red-haired Monte Wolford, 28, a Colorado Springs physical culture enthusiast and former Lelia Lake and Clarendon resident, finished the 24.6 mile run into the clouds and back—one of the most gruelling marathons ever devised—in 5 hours 39 minutes 58 seconds. He is a son of Monte Wolford of Clarendon.

Fifteen runners, aged from 15 to 56, turned out for the event on the steep peak more famous for auto climbs.

Only three were smokers. One dropped out after making it to the top, the other two ran several hours behind the leaders.

The race was the idea of Dr. Arne Suominen, 56-year-old tobacco-hating physician from Delray Beach, Fla., who challenged smokers everywhere to a run up and down the rugged mountain.

Dr. Suominen, once a distance runner in his native Finland, finished third in 6 hours 36 minutes 28 seconds.

The lean, muscular physician with a blonde mustache was happy over the outcome but disappointed that only three cigarette puffers accepted his challenge.

"Sniffing unhappily at the cigarette smoke of bystanders, the doctor said, "smoking definitely lessens the endurance of a runner."

The second finisher was Tom Brewster, 17-year-old Colorado Springs athlete, whose time was 6:21:51.8.

Wolford, the winner, was a University of Miami (Fla.) sprint-

er in 1948. He munched protein tablets and carrots on the run.

**HEED THE WARNING!**

In the City of Childress a general telephone rate raise was granted effective September 10, 1951. The ordinance passed on that date included two rate raises both of which are now in effect and amount to an increase to the residential telephone user from \$2.50 per month to \$4.75 per month. The raise granted almost doubled the rate. Mr. Forbis, a junior member of Williams, Broughton & Forbis was City Attorney during the time the hearing was held before the City Council. Mr. Broughton, a senior member of Williams, Broughton & Forbis, represented the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company at the rate raise hearing. You can be the judge of who won the case. At the time of these hearings the City Attorney's salary was made payable to Williams, Broughton & Forbis. As a matter of fact, the salary was so paid until January 31, 1956, when the salary payment was changed and made payable to John T. Forbis. (They must think the public is really gullible.) This law firm is not content with its hold on the City of Childress and Childress County but now seeks to elect its junior member District Attorney. Do you want the District Court operated in the manner of the City of Childress?

Forbis has stated in open court on several occasions, a couple of years ago, that he had no interest in criminal law; that he didn't want anything to do with criminal law and that the District Attorney's job was one job he wouldn't have under any circumstances. WHO caused him to change his mind and WHY? Of course, the additional revenue and other advantages of the office appeal to the law firm of Williams, Broughton & Forbis. On the other hand there is the Childress Political Clique which has attempted to control Childress through the years and are now attempting to grasp power in the District Court. We believe that the people of Donley County will defeat them in this effort by defeating their favorite candidate for District Attorney.

**HARP'S OPPONENT**

The law firm of Williams, Broughton & Forbis does only civil practice and does not do criminal practice. You say, what is the difference? The difference is this—take two doctors, one is a dentist and the other a medical doctor. There is as much difference between criminal and civil law. The District Attorney handles the more serious criminal offenses for which a person may be sent to the penitentiary. It is an office of purely criminal law. Mr. Forbis has never tried a criminal case. According to officials of our District Court he has never had the full responsibility for trying any contested civil case in the District and very limited courtroom experience of any nature.

... does not represent any corporation or any other interest that might conflict with his duties as District Attorney.  
... served Childress County for two years and three months as County Attorney before becoming District Attorney.

THE FORBIS PAMPHLET

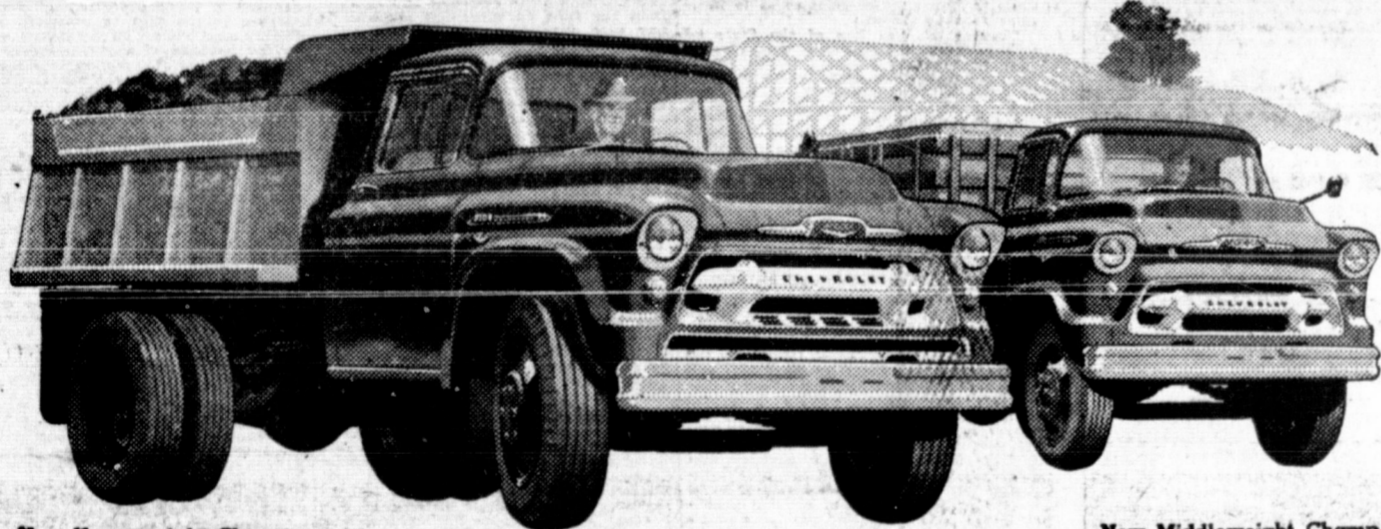

will the new legislature 'go'—Conservative or Liberal?"

First primary voting results assured substantial turnovers in both houses. Fifty-four newcomers are certain in the 150-member House. At least seven "freshmen" are assured in the 31-member Senate.

Second primary returns could boost the turnover to 65 in the House, 11 in the Senate.

One astute, non-partisan observer hazarded a guess that the 55th Legislature will be "slightly more liberal." But he emphasized this was only a guess, necessarily based on campaign statements. Many things can happen to change these positions.

Only way to be sure, he commented, is to "watch 'em vote a few times." This is especially true, he pointed out, for the newcomers.

Senate newcomers include three men who defeated incumbents outright. They are Charles F. Herring of Austin, who won over Sen. Johnnie B. Rogers; Henry B. Gonzales of San An-

tonio, who defeated Sen. O. E. Lattimer, and Hubert R. Hudson of Brownsville, victor over Sen. Rogers Kelley.

In the Lubbock area, Ex-Rep. Preston Smith and Rep. Carroll Cobb are in a runoff after both edged out Sen. Kilmer Corbin.

Two other senators are in runoffs. They are Sen. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, contested by Rep. Joe Pyle; and Sen. William Shireman of Corpus Christi, opposed by Bruce Reagan.

Rep. Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford won the post of the late Sen. Wayne Wagonseller. Two other senators did not run again. Sen. Gus Strauss of Hallettsville will be succeeded by Culp Krueger of El Campo. Sen. Warren McDonald will be replaced by Rep. Bill Wood of Tyler.

Long-range guesses are that the conservative-liberal balance in the Senate will be "about the same as before." But the House is termed "still a jig-saw puzzle." Both conservative and liberal forces in the House will be without some of their staunchest advocates in past sessions.

Forty-three representatives retired. Among them were such liberal leaders as Reps. Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, Maury Maverick Jr. of San Antonio and D. B. Hardeman of Denison.

Twenty-eight men have been elected to fill vacancies; 15 are yet to be decided in the second primary.

Eleven incumbent representatives were voted out in July. Casualties included such known conservatives as Reps. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield, W. G. Kirkin of Odessa and Stanton Stone of Freeport. Other conservatives were among the 11 incumbents involved in runoffs.

This year's House turnover is only slightly larger than the average of one-third. Largest in recent history was in 1939, the year W. Lee O'Daniel first became governor and the House got 91 new members.

## DANIEL CITES NEGRO VOTES

Bloc voting in negro precincts, dominated by members of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, will be a major issue in the runoff campaign. So stated Sen. Price Daniel in an Austin speech to campaign workers.

The candidate for governor cited election returns to show that big-city Negro precincts, where the NAACP is stronger, gave his opponent, Ralph Yarborough, 87% of the votes, compared with only 5.8% for the Senator.

Typical of the Negro boxes, said Daniel, were Box 157 in Houston, which gave Yarborough 398 votes to only 2 for Daniel.

Others mentioned were Box 68 in Houston, with Yarborough receiving 926 votes to Daniel's 35; Box 120 in Fort Worth, where Yarborough scored 458 to Daniel's 6; Box 59 in Fort Worth; Yarborough 454, Daniel 3; Box 309 in Dallas; Yarborough 436, Daniel 3; Box 226 in Dallas; Yarborough 322, Daniel 8.

## POLIO VACCINE FOR ALL

State Health Commissioner Henry Holle reports that federal allocation of Salk vaccine had ended. Shots are now available commercially for any person of any age. More-than-adequate supplies make the change-over possible.

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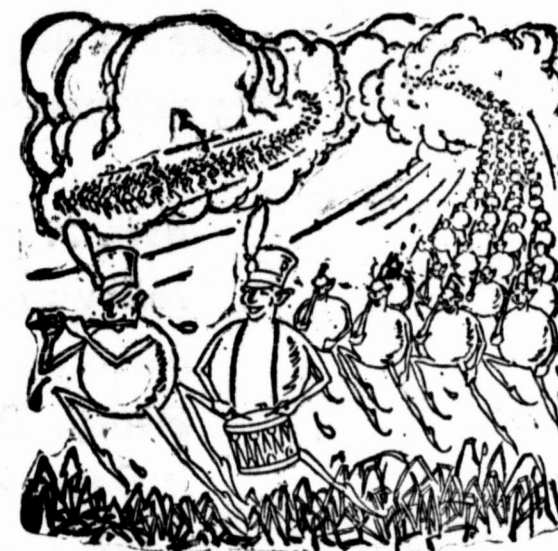
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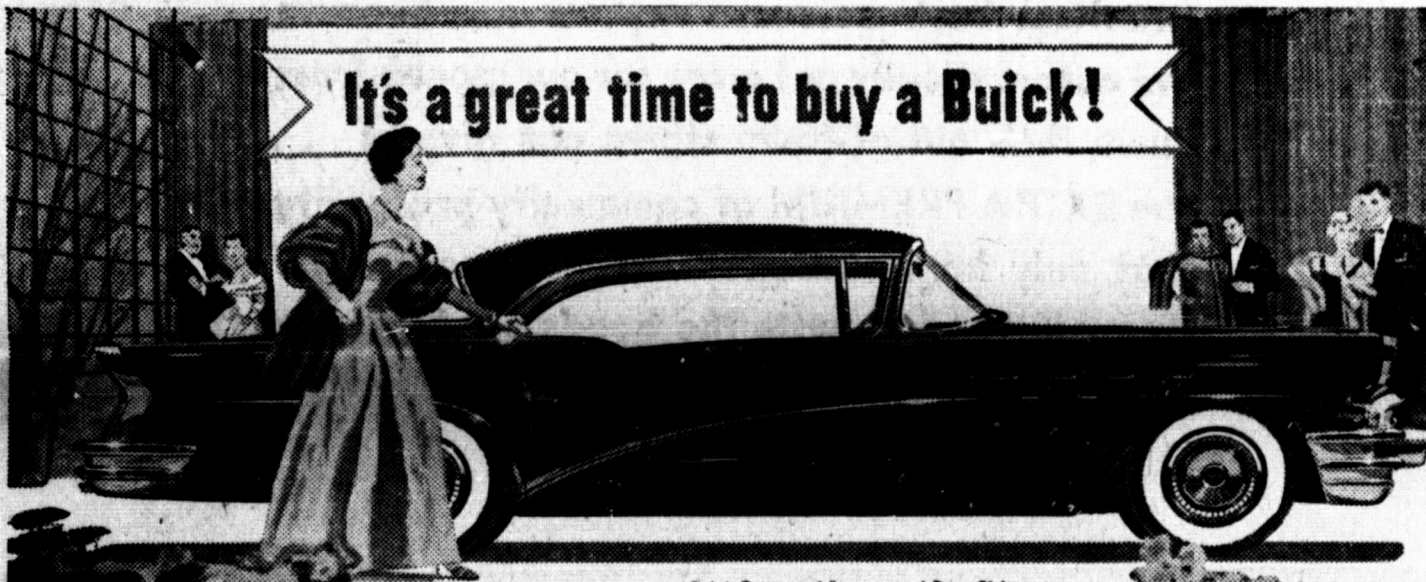

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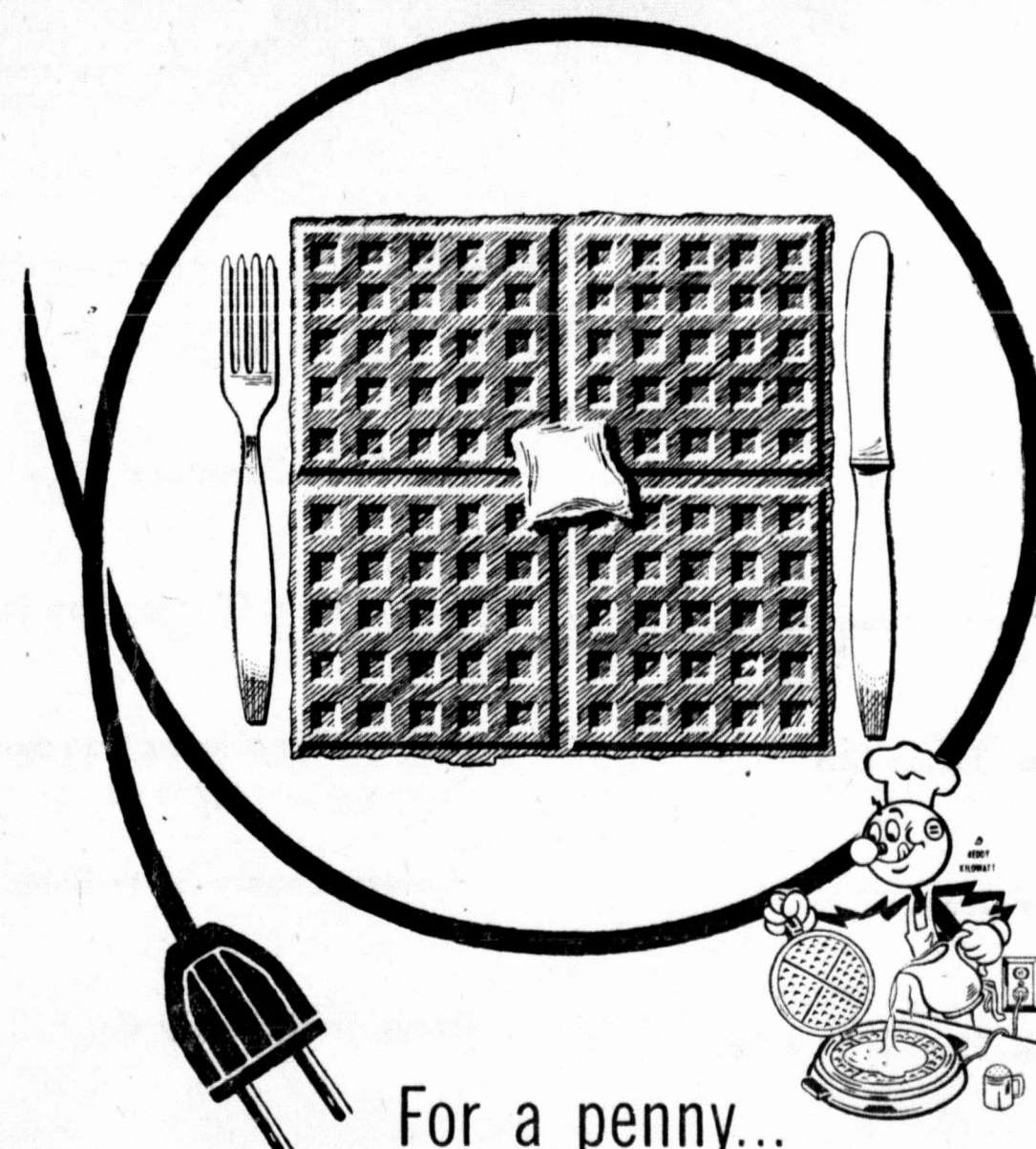
