They are resistant to most insecticides in common use and can be applied through high-pressure spray nozzles without too great a degree of mortality. This makes it likely that both the nematodes and insecticides could be used simultaneously for in-

Despite the promise of a successful "bacteria war" on serious insect pests, a lot more research must be done before it can become of real value to farmers. Much remains to be learned about the best time, mode of treatment and eventual effectiveness of the parasitic nematode in protecting our crops.

from erosion. The deep roots of sweet clovers also open up tight soils aand allow more water to soak into the soil to be stored for future plant use. The nitrogen fixing bacteria in the root nodules of clover can add up to 15 pounds of nitrogen per acre to land and will greatly increase the yields of following crops.


This coming spring will be a good time to open an account in that soil saving bank by making a fertility deposit by growing a legume. Assistance for this practice is a part of the Donley County ACP program, and with the present price of clover seed, the cost to the farmer should not be very great. With favorable growing conditions, this small investment can be multiplied several

fold by future increased yields.


