By what "rule of faith" did the millions of Christians live during those 1500 years? The answer is, of course, that

the teaching of the Church was the rule of faith for the Christian

world. And St. Paul reminds us that Christianity consists of "one Lord, one Faith, one Bapeisse (Eph. 4:5). "God is a God of peace, not of disorder," Sc. Pani said further (1 Cor. 14:33). Yet today we have nearly 300

different religious denominarions. all calling themselves Christian ... all professing the Bible as their rule of faith ... and all differing to some extent or another in their understanding of what the Bible means, Could Christ have left "rule of faith" that would permit such confusion? Would He have left the interpretation of His Word to the fallible and changing judge ments of men-when our very soul depend on a correct understanding and observance of the things Chrise






