

#### THE DUTY of THE DISTRICT ATTORNEY

is to prosecute all felony criminal cases (those cases for which a person may be sent to the penitentiary) and to assist the peace officers and grand juries in making investigations to determine whether or not a criminal offense has been committed.

#### The Duty of The County Attorney

is to prosecute all misdemeanor criminal cases (those cases for which a person may be fined or confined in the county jail) and to assist peace officers and grand juries in making investigations to determine whether or not a criminal offense has been committed. In addition to this the County Attorney is charged with the duty of acting as legal adviser to the County Commissioners Court.

#### The Duty of The Grand Jury

is to make investigations to determine whether or not there has been a violation of our criminal statutes and to further determine whether or not the fact: 'ustify an indictment. No man may be tried in Texas for a felony offense unless he is first indicted by a grand jury.

#### Theft Is A Felony or A Misdemeanor

according to the value of the property stolen. The theft of property of a value of \$50.00 or more is a felony. The theft of property of a value of less than \$50.00 is a misdemeanor and may be tried by the County Attorney upon a complaint without a grand jury indictment. Each theft is an offense and a number of misdemeanor thefts cannot be added together to make one felony offense.

### **During the Grand Jury Investigation** of Donley County Affairs

last year, the County Attorney assisted me in presenting the facts to the Grand Jury. All facts that were available to me were presented and I feel sure that the County Attorney did not withhold any facts known to him. No person other than members of the grand jury are permitted to be present in the grand jury room while the grand jury deliberates and determines whether or not an indictment shall be returned. No indictments were returned but the grand jury did issue a statement which was published in the Donley County Leader. The District Attorney does not have the authority to suggest in any manner whether or not a grand jury shall return an indictment. I have adhered strictly to this rule as any grand juror will attest who has served with me. I like the grand jury system. So long as we have it, one person cannot exert dictatorship over the reputation, life and property of any citizen. I have faith and confidence in the citizenship of Donley County from whom our grand juries are selected. I believe that the citizens of Donley County who have been selected as grand juriors in the past have acted in good faith for what they thought was the best interest of law enforcement in Donley County. I believe that those who may be selected in the future will act in the same manner. A jury commission selects the grand jurors and I have nothing to do with the selection of the jury commissions. If the county attorney finds that a theft of county property of a value less than \$50.00 has been committed surely he will not only tell the people but will prosecute the offender. Should he find that there has been a theft of \$50.00 or more, surely he will cause a complaint to be filed on the examining docket of the grand jury and assist in presenting the facts to the grand jury for their consideration.

#### As Your District Attorney

I do not make the facts. I only present them. This I have done to friend and foe alike. A prosecuting attorney who would use the office to punish an enemy or to aid a friend is not only an undesirable official but an undesirable citizen. I have bowed before my Maker many times asking for the wisdom, strength and guidance necessary to so conduct myself in prosecuting cases. Since not all people are konest it necessarily follows that some public officials may be dishonest. However, under the law a person is presumed to be immosent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of competent jurisdiction. Even a public official should be accorded the same consideration.

### Not Any One Person Holds a Corner on Honesty

Dishonesty raises its vile and ugly head in many forms. A person who maliciously misrepresents things and spreads erroneous rumors that reflect on the good name of another person is no more honest than a person who steals property belonging to another.

It is my sincere hope that the service rendered by me as your District Attorney will merit your vote for my re-election.
