It couldn't happen anywhere except in America. Well, maybe in a few other countries where democracy is doing all right, but certainly it could not develop into such an issue. More than any other people of the world we're famous for exploiting incidents pertaining to the equality of men.

Referring to the Patton case, of course. A national hero, one of the most colorful, resourceful and successful generals of our armed forces suddenly flares up in an unjustified rage, strikes a hospitalized private and further humiliates him with a barrage of profane invective such as only he can deliver. A perfect publicity story. An opportunity for us to proclaim to the world that nobody is big enough to mistreat even the least important of us.

The only trouble is that, as usual, we over played the incident. Over zealous people, yes, and quite a few patriotic four flushers whose service to their country is limited to loud talk, demanded the general's dismissal. Even some of the congressmen wanted to poke their noses into the affair. Fortunately it settled down to its real status. A breach of military discipline to be dealt with in the usual military manner. What a mess we'd have if congress of the American public started dictating disciplinary policies to our top generals. And what a conceited attitude on the part of these self appointed judges to presume that their judgement is better than that of men who were specially selected because of their proven ability to lead and administer.

We can be happy that the clamor constitutes only a sordid dev-elopment of what actually is a good story reflecting more credit than harm to the American system, the army and General Patton himself. The significant point is not that a general mistreated training at San Diego. a private, but that a general apologized to a private. That's what makes us proud to be Americans.





WAR DECLARED ON CATTLE GRUBS

Cattle grubs take a tremendous toll from Cooke county livestock and dairymen yearly. But the heavy money loss to producers is incidental to the waste in meat, hides and milk caused by grub in-

To conserve this waste, a county wide cattle grub control campaign is on and every one who owns an infected cow is urged to take part. An average of two pounds of meat is trimmed from the loins and ribs if each carcass. This waste in Texas, which cannot be replaced, equals 1,680,000 pounds of the choicest meat and would feed 4,600 soldiers for one year — and after trimming, the loins and ribs are devalued two cents a pound.

Moreover, the grubs destroy enough Texas hides yearly to provide leather to equip one million soldiers with shoes one year. The pests do this by cutting holes through the thickest and best part of the hides. Grubby hides are devalued one cent a pound. The total of these packing plant losses average \$3.86 an animal.

Heel flies, the adult of the grub, and the grubs themselves cause as much as a twenty-five per cent reduction in milk flow in dairy cows along with other indefinite losses which are difficult to estim-



Consumers now get pork and bacon two points cheaper per pound following an Office of Price Administration announcement reducing the point value of all items listed under pork and bacon on the consumer point table.

All items listed under "ready to eat" meats are reduced two points with the exception of corn beef BOXOFFICE OPENS 7:15 brisket, dried beef and tongue These have not been reduced in point value

Canned meat prices are not changed, regardless of pork content. The reduction of point values on pork products resulted from the War Food Administration's desire for faster movement of the bumper hog crop, it was stated. At the same time, to keep far-

mers' returns on hogs from being driven too low, the government extended price supports to all hog OPA emphasized that the pork

point reduction will be for a limited time only, and applies only to pork and 100 per cent pork sausage. It does not change the present point value of lard and other products rationed under the
