## Early Deadlines Announced for Christmas Mail

Suggested Christmas mailing deadlines for domestic parcels and letter mail have been advanced because of an exceptionally high mail volume, according to Postmaster Virgil Henscheid.

The suggested Christmas mailing deadline is now December 3 for domestic parcels and December 10 for letters and greeting cards intended for delivery by Christmas.

"The impact of greatly increased mail volumes generated by the 15-state United Parcel Service strike in the East and South, and its residual effect on other parts of the country compels us to ask the public to mail even earlier than normal," Henscheid said.

He said that while letter mail will continue to receive priority treatment, the increase in mail from the general public, on top of the unprecedented business mail volume generated by the strike, could result in the use of many postal facilities normally dedicated to letter mail to prevent an unmanageable backlog of parcels.

"I strongly urge the public to deposit parcels by December 3 and letters and greeting cards by December 10 to assure they are delivered by Christmas," Henscheid said.

Customers are also urged to deposit overseas packages and greetings immediately, and to send them by airmail if they want to assure delivery by Christmas.

## Drive Extended For Ambulance Service in County

The membership drive currently conducted in the county by Professional Ambulance Service has been extended 30 days. The continuation is endorsed by representatives of the Muenster and Gainesville hospitals as well as the county commissioners and the Gainesville City Council.

At this time the campaign is about 1400 short of its goal of 3600, the number needed to justify keeping two ambulances on duty in the county.

Emphasized at the meeting was the fact that the subscription system presently is the only way to provide ambulance service. Persons who prefer to pay for it if and when they need it should consider that no ambulance will be here unless the membership drive succeeds.

County Judge Larry Sullivant added that the commissioners court is opposed to subsidizing the service.

## Hornets Wallop Pottsboro 30-6 for Bi-District Title

Hornets Power was the big difference Friday night at Sanger as the Muenster High boys romped over Pottsboro's Cardinals by the convincing count of 30-6. For that achievement they received a magnificent trophy symbolizing the bi-district championship of UIL loops 13-A and 14-A.

After a few nervous minutes, in which they staked their opponents to a 6 point lead, Coach Jones' boys dominated the game almost completely. The over-all result, besides a big margin in the score, was a lead of 17 to 7 in first downs and 268 to 116 in rushing yardage. Along with that they had a pair of touchdowns, involving a lot of additional yardage, called back for infractions of the rules.

Tension was high in the Hornet lineup at the opening kickoff and resulted in a fumble on the second scribbage play, giving the Cards a set-up only 26 yards away. Next two tries gained to the 16 where a loss of 3, a gain of 4 and a penalty of 5 put the

phide on the 20. That is where Randy Leaton lobbed a nice pass to Charlie Smith in the end zone. A try for extra point failed. The Cards led 6-0, and the lead came much to easy for comfort.

Nor did the situation change in the following moments when MHS, on two plays plus 5 free yards, were inches short of first down then lost ground on a bobbed pichout and had to boot out of trouble. It had fans wondering whether the Cards were hot or the Hornets cold.

The answer to that question started shaping up on the next series in which three tries got nowhere and Pottsboro had to kick.

Following that Muenster got going from its own 34. The 86 yard drive needed ten plays, Mark Sicking making 49 in eight carries and Tim Wolf 17 in two carries. Sicking's score was from the 1 was the first of three touchdowns that counted plus another that did not count. His rushing yardage for the game was 112.

Following the TD, Nick Walterscheid put the Hornets in front with the first of three extra point kicks.

On first series after kickoff the Cardinals had to kick, after which the Hornets started their second drive, which went fine for 58 yards to the 10. On next play Sicking scooted into the end zone but a holding penalty nullified the TD and moved the ball back to the 25. After Wolf's gain of 4 and an incomplete pass Nick Walterscheid booted a 38 yard field goal.

On the Cardinals' next series Tim Wolf intercepted giving the Hornets a start on their third scoring drive. With 28 to go, Sicking and company did the job in seven plays overcoming an offside penalty along the way. Gary Hennes carried once for 7 and Sicking did the rest, including a scoring dive from the 4.

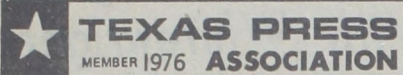

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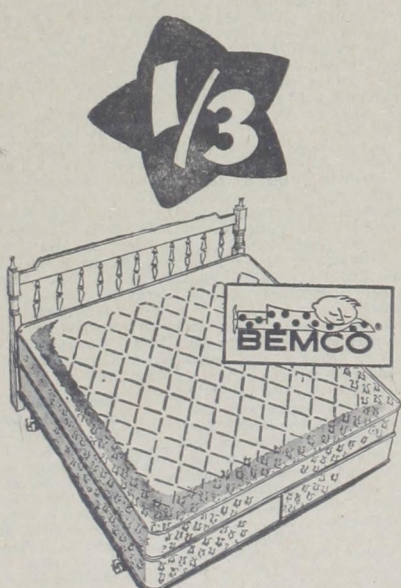
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### Training Sessions For 4H Leaders Set for December

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Woodworking Project. A pre-registration should be made with the 4-H and youth office by November 24. Registration is by 11 a.m. December 4 and the cost is \$14. Blankets and linens are furnished.

Lapidary workshop will focus on selection of stones, cutting, polishing, and mounting. Junior, teen, and adult leaders will work on visuals for method demonstrations and talks in the graphic arts section. Mr. Tippie, 47, will transfer December 5 to Storrs, Connecticut from Ohio, where he has been deputy state conservationist for more than a year.

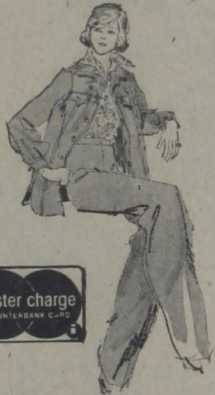

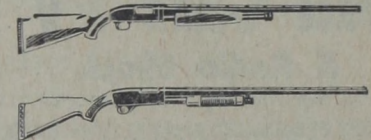
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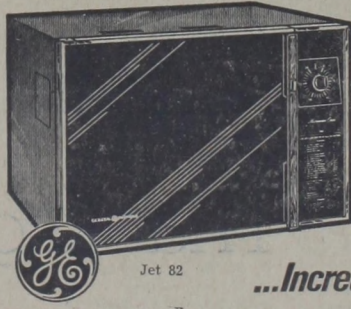
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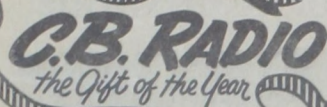
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### Public School Happenings
