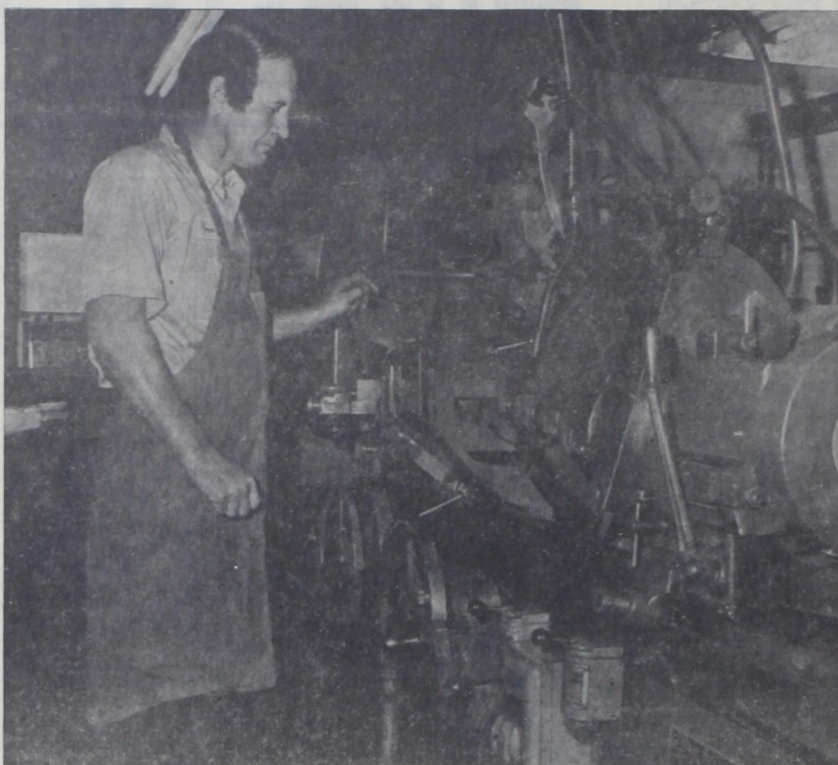

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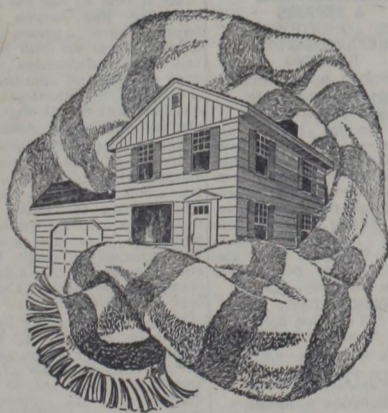
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Deborah Popp and Thomas Hartman United in Double Ring Ceremony

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Changes Noted in Preparation of Income Tax Return

While most taxpayers have until Apr. 15 (actually Apr. 17) to file their 1977 income tax returns, the filing date for farmers and ranchers is much sooner.

"Agricultural producers who did not file an estimate of their income by Jan. 16 and did not pay the estimated taxes must file their tax returns and pay due taxes by Mar. 1," points out Dr. Richard Trimble, economist in management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, if farmers filed an estimate, they have until the Apr. 17 deadline to file final returns."

Trimble notes that several changes were made in the income tax law during 1977 which should be of interest to Texas farmers and ranchers.

A major change was the elimination of the standard deduction and the low income allowance. These two items have been replaced by a flat amount called "zero bracket amount." This amount depends on your filing status. "The zero bracket amount is not a separate deduction, but the equivalent amount is built into the new simplified tax tables and tax rate schedules," explains the economist. "This is true if you file the 1040A or 1040 income tax forms. However, a person who chooses to use the 1040 form and itemize deductions will need to make an adjustment if his itemized deductions exceed the amount allowed for his particular filing status."

Another change is that the deduction of \$750 for each exemption and the general tax credit have been built into the new tax tables, so there is no need for the taxpayers to determine these. The general tax credit has also been revised to consider exemptions for use and blindness, adds Trimble.

Filing requirements have also been changed for the 1977 tax year. For example, an individual must file a return if his gross income is \$2,950 or more and a married couple under 65 years of age must file if their joint gross income is more than \$4,700. If both are 65 or older, they may take \$6,200 before being required to file a return.

There are many other minor changes, and Trimble suggests several publications that may be of help. One is publication No. 17, "Your Federal Income Tax," 1978 edition, from the Internal Revenue Service. Another, publication No. 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," 1978 edition, is also available from the IRS or from any county Extension office.

Don't Delay Filing SSI Application

The date you file your application for Supplemental Security Income is extremely important, according to Gus Jones, Manager of the Sherman Social Security Office.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments cannot be made for any month before the month you file the application. SSI payments do not have any retroactivity. Jones added that you should file in the first month you can qualify for SSI so that you do not miss payments.

Jones urges everyone who might qualify for SSI payments to contact the Social Security Office. People in social security offices will do everything possible to make sure that you get payment for the first month you qualify, but these people cannot help you until you make the application.

The Sherman Social Security Office is at 810 North Travis. The phone number is 665-0770. Office hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday, except national holidays.

A representative may be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Federal Building.

Incorrect SS No. Can Delay Refund On Income Tax

An incorrect Social Security number will hinder the processing of a tax return and can delay any refund due, the Internal Revenue Service said.

To help avoid this problem, taxpayers should use the peel-off label included in the tax package received in the mail. This label contains the name, address, and social security number of the taxpayer. If the social security number or other information listed is incorrect, the correct information should be written in right on the label.

If a taxpayer has had a change in name since last year, a local office of the Social Security Administration should be contacted so that the taxpayer's new name will correspond to his or her social security number.

IRS Will Compute Tax for Taxpayers

The Internal Revenue Service compute the income tax for single taxpayers having an adjusted gross income of \$20,000 or less and married taxpayers filing jointly with an adjusted gross income of \$40,000 or less when deductions are not itemized. Taxpayers can use either the Form 1040A or Form 1040 to request the tax computation by the IRS.

The taxpayer's income must be solely from wages, salary, tips, dividends, interest, pensions and annuities for the IRS to compute the tax. To take advantage of this IRS service, the taxpayer need only complete certain portions of his or her tax return, attach all W-2 forms, sign the return, and mail it by April 15 to the address listed in the tax instruction booklet.

The tax will be determined from the proper tax table and the taxpayer will either receive a refund for any overpayment or be notified of the amount of any tax due. Exact details of which portions of the return must be completed in order to have IRS compute the tax appear in the tax package instructions mailed earlier to each taxpayer.

YOU CAN BANK ON IT!

Getting right down to it, money management may be more important to retired persons than to any others. With fixed incomes, retirees still must meet constantly rising costs. Some women who have made little or nothing could face especially difficult times.

But help may be on the way! It won't happen for a year or so, but Congress is thinking about a Social Security formula that would provide benefits for housewives. The system under consideration would split credits between husband and wife. Under this plan, a husband who had earned a lot and a wife who had earned little or would get separate but equal retirement benefits. A housewife who gets divorced would take her share of retirement credits with her. Under present law, a divorced housewife gets nothing from Social Security unless she has been married at least 20 years.

It's another big boost for the rights of women.

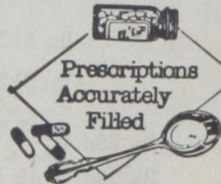

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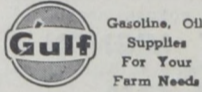

'Rule of 72' Tells How Soon Saving Account Doubles
Use the "rule of 72" to determine the approximate length of time it will take to double savings dollars, says Dr. Carolyn McKinney, family resource management specialist.

Dr. McKinney is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

To use the "rule of 72", simply divide the interest rate into 72 — the number obtained is the number of years required to double the investment, the specialist continues.

For example, if \$1,000.00 is placed in an account earning 6 percent annual interest, divide the interest rate (6) into 72 and find that it will take about 12 years to double the initial investment to \$2,000.00, Dr. McKinney explains.

Aged Needy Can Get Federal Funds For Home Repairs

The Texoma Regional Planning Commission has announced that the Texoma region expects to receive \$53,560 in federal funds to be used in a weatherization program in Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson Counties. The program will consist of minor home repair with first priority being to stop heat loss by patching roofs and walls, caulking cracks and joints, weather stripping doors and windows, and repairing broken windows. The second priority will be to install energy-saving home improvements such as insulation, storm windows, and storm doors. Heating systems may also be repaired or adjusted where needed.

According to a Commission spokesman, those eligible for the program must be 60 years of age or older or handicapped, have an income at or below poverty level (according to Office of Economic Opportunity Poverty Guidelines), and own the home in which they are living. OEO Guidelines set the poverty level at \$2,970 annually for one person. The figure is raised by \$960 for each additional family member. Eligible homes must be occupied by the owner or as no funds are available for rent homes.

Persons interested in participating in the program may apply at their local Senior Nutrition and Activities Program (SNAP) Center or at the Gainesville Housing Authority between Feb. 20 and March 17. Valley View residents may apply at the Senior Citizen's Center on Tuesday, February 21. Applicants should bring with them proof of their annual or monthly income.

According to the Texoma Regional Planning Commission, an average of \$200-\$400 will be spent for purchase of materials on each home participating in the program. Funds for the program will be provided by the Federal Energy Administration and the Community Service Administration, both are units of the federal government. The program will be administered by the Texoma Regional Planning Commission.
