Last Thursday was a sad day in the history of this nation. By a vote of 68-32 the Senate ratified the first of two treaties involved in giving the Panama Canal to the Torrijos dictatorship of Panama. It was an act which cannot be comprehended by the vast majority of people in this country, which was passed by senators who admitted that their mail from people back home was decisively opposed to it, and in spite of the fact that the Marxist dictator of Panama is strongly allied with Communists of Russia and Cuba who, like him, are dedicated to our destruction.

We've heard some strange excuses for giving away the canal, probably the most absurd being that we never owned it in the first place; that the money paid annually these many years was only rent payment. It's amazing that this wild idea ever came forth when US history plainly states that the Canal Zone was purchased from both Panama and Colombia, and then the individual landowners were compensated for the land they gave up. If this does not constitute valid ownership, what does? How can anyone question this title and accept the claims based on conquest in the communist satellites? And, of course, our claim was strengthened by enormous investment in building the canal.

Considering all that one would expect senators to understand that, regardless of an alleged flaw, our title is still better than those in other areas of the globe.

Another ridiculous contention is that the canal is obsolete because it cannot accommodate the nation's largest aircraft carriers nor some super tankers. Well, it is far from obsolete in relation to all of the other ships. It saves them the time and expense of a long trip around South America. It is important to the nation's commerce and vital to its defense.

Supporters of the treaty tell us that we have no worries in that respect. They say we have Panama's word that we can go on using it as before, a statement that is most questionable to anyone who is familiar with the Communists' long record of breaking promises. The fact is that they are not known to keep their word unless it serves their purpose.

Well, it is hard to imagine in this case that fairness to us will be in their interest. It is far more likely that the red conspiracy will take every possible opportunity to deal misery to our country, anything from harassment to sabotage.

No matter how a person looks at the treaty it appears to be strictly a one-way deal, with Panama getting all of the benefits and the US getting absolutely none. Furthermore, we have done this for people who claim emphatically that their goal is to dominate the world, especially the US. By their own words they are our enemies, and what our Senate has just done amounts to aiding the red conspiracy to the detriment of our own country's welfare. That used to be regarded as treason.

Of course it's different in these times. We ignore the long term threats as well as frequent violations of detente and rationalize that we have no enemies because we are not at war... hence the canal give-away can't be treason. Semantics makes the difference. Nevertheless there are people who wonder whether the word applies anyway. It will be interesting to learn a generation or two from now what the historians will have to say about this.

Moreover, the public has a right to question the way in which the deal was promoted. The administration and other treaty supporters have been conspicuously guilty of failing to clarify the issue. For instance the word was out that some \$2.7 billion of taxpayer money will be given to Panama along with the real estate. The report further points out that Torrijos is indebted to American bankers for that approximate amount, and the money paid by US in the deal is to pay off the debt. It is a serious charge which, apparently, the pro-treaty people chose to ignore. (Continued on Page 12)

Junior Stock Show Animals Sell High

The annual Junior Livestock Show put on by 4-H and FFA members of Cooke County was a big event and the auction which followed made it profitable as well. A total of \$101,759.80 was paid for 306 steers, hogs and sheep which passed through the Gainesville sale barn, all bringing premium prices in addition to the regular market value.

Library Reports 7884 Circulation During Past Year

The annual Library Report prepared by Librarian Mrs. Mary Moser and released this week shows a total of 12,000 books on the shelves and a steady increase in circulation as compared with past years.

Circulation in 1977 was 7,384. Circulation in 1976 was 6,704 and in 1975 was 5,687; therefore 1977 shows an increase of more than 2,000 over 1975 and more than 1,000 over 1976.

More books were checked out in June of 1977 than any other month and the least number in December.

Projects and special programs during the year included the preschool activity for 9 months in the Community Center. Mmes. Emily Klement and Sharon Walterscheid were co-chairmen with one assistant appointed each month. Average attendance was 35-40.

The Summer Story Hour in June was held for five one-hour sessions for primary students. Mmes. Margie Wimmer and Annette Anderle were co-chairmen. Total attendance was 111.

The Library subscribes to twelve magazines and receives an additional seven magazine gift-subscriptions and one newspaper. Also received was a \$100 gift from the Mrs. Jos. A. Luke Estate and a \$100 gift from the Catholic Daughters of America.

Mrs. Mary Moser is Librarian of Muenster Public Library and Mrs. Teresa Fowler is Assistant Librarian. Others on the staff are Mmes. Evelyn Schilling, Victoria Gremminger, Betty Felderhoff, Regina Pels, and Mr. and Mrs. Lee Toothaker who have now retired.

Hours volunteered by the staff are Teresa Fowler 998; Evelyn Schilling 335; Betty Felderhoff 402; Regina Pels 108; Vic Gremminger 115; Lee Toothaker 217; Elizabeth Toothaker 80; and Mary Moser 1,067. Total hours worked by the volunteer staff 3,322.

Spring Crashes In With a Hailstorm

Spring came in like a lion Monday evening. As if to remain consistent with the rough weather of preceding weeks, the opening day of the new season featured a hail storm that did extensive damage here as well as in Lindsay and Gainesville.

The storm area generally included a strip several miles wide through the north part of the community and extending past Gainesville. A number of damages have been reported in the north part of town but little if any in the south part.

According to Earl Fisher and Ed Endres, insurance agents, they have received some fifty reports of damage to local roofs and windows.

SH Girls Score Grand Slam at Saint Jo Relays

With a grand total of 149 points, the girls track team of Sacred Heart High took over the Elm Creek Relays at Saint Jo Saturday, and returned home with the champ trophy plus three relay trophies.

They had seven first places, including the relays which counted for 20 points each. In addition they had 2 second places, 3 thirds, 4 fourths and 6 fifths.

Eight teams competed, with second place going to Paradise for 75 points. Next were Alvord with 70 and Muenster with 62. Along the way the girls also set new school records in the 80 yard hurdles, the 440 yard dash and the mile run.

and more are expected. Fisher adds that claims are also filed for a dozen or more cases of car damage, mostly to car bodies and a few broken windshields. Investigation of home damages are already under way in order to get repair work started promptly, the intention being to expose leaking roofs to as little rain as possible.

Cars will have to wait until the homes are cared for. That is the policy of the insurance company because they are less subject to further damage. Another reason, Fisher said, is that hail dents in cars frequently pop out in a few days of warm weather and the damage will decrease. This does not apply to the chrome trimming, however.

The hailstorm here was the most severe in a number of years. It was as much as two inches deep in many places and hailstones were generally the size of golf balls. Gardens and flower beds took a beating. So did fruit trees, some of which are already budded, however the actual extent of damage remains to be seen later. As regards grain crops the prevailing opinion is that it will have time to recover.

The melted down measure of the hail was .07 inch on Steve Moser's gauge. Combined with previous readings it brings the month's total to 1.68 inch and the year's total to date is 6.92 inches.

Temperature has been delightful, bringing out the Spring flowers and pushing fruit trees on to blooming. The low-high readings were recorded as follows by Steve Moser: March 15th, 40 & 62; 16th, 33 & 64, 17th, 35 & 80; 18th, 43 & 86; 19th, 50 & 82; 20th, 58 & 82; 21st, 50 & 78; 22nd, 56 & 82.

Sales Tax Rebate Reflects Boom in Local Business

The latest sales tax rebate check received by the City of Muenster from State Comptroller Bob Bullock was a whopper, in the amount of \$11,540.17.

According to Bullock it is one of 915 sent out to Texas cities as their share in \$69.2 million paid out in March, which top the 1977 checks by 17.4 per cent. He added that the state's year-to-date total is \$101.5 million as compared with \$89.4 million last year.

"This increase, which represents increased retail sales, is just another indicator of the bullishness of the Texas economy," he said. To a great extent the check reflects business during the Christmas season.

The check brings Muenster's total-to-date to \$15,775.96 as compared with \$12,171.79 for the corresponding period last year... a gain of 29 per cent.

Payments to some other cities of the area and their percentage of change for the year to date were listed as follows by Bullock:

Gainesville \$94,820.33, up 12%; Lindsay \$4,901.50, up 19%; Nocona \$20,078.82, up 32%; Pilot Point \$5,967.91, up 19%; Saint Jo \$4,502.87, up 20%; Sanger \$4,671.38, up 8%; Whitesboro \$14,746.65, up 19%.

Hearing Held on Nocona-Saint Jo Highway Project

A public hearing concerning improvements on Hwy 82 was booked for 2 p.m. Thursday, March 23, in Nocona for persons interested in the proposed road from the east city limit of Nocona to Highway 59 near the west city limit of Saint Jo.

The existing roadway is a 24 foot facility with unpaved shoulders. The plan is to construct an additional 24 foot roadway with surfaced shoulders. The right of way, usually 240 feet wide, except where fill sections or drainage channels require more, will include the existing 100 foot right of way.

Five family dwellings and one business dwelling will need to relocate because of the project.

His recipe follows:
MIX:

POUR IN:
1 1/2 cups buttermilk
1 egg
2 tablespoons Mazola shortening
BAKE: in a hot greased pan at 425 degrees until brown.

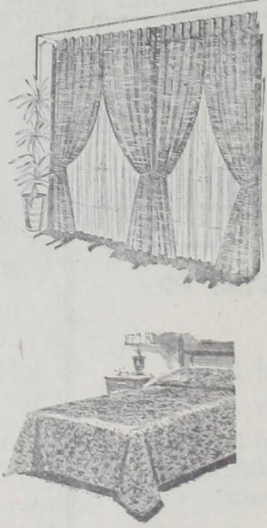

Camp Sweeney Diabetic Educational Training Center for diabetic boys and girls (6 through 16 years of age) will open for the 29th year of operation May 28, 1978 with 3-week sessions as follows: May 28 to June 17, June 18 to July 8 and July 9 to July 29.

Camp Sweeney is located 9 miles east and 1 mile north of Gainesville, on 338 acres of rolling timbered hills with three dormitories for boys and three for girls; a non-denominational chapel; a modern hospital, a 39 acre lake for boating, fishing and water-skiing; a sanitary swimming pool, tennis courts, recreational pavilion, target range and 20 gentle saddle horses.

Under the supervision of a specialized medical staff, dietitian and counselors children are taught their proper diet with regulated exercise, how to take their own urine tests and give their own insulin injections. Of major importance, through this group association with other young diabetics, they realize they are not alone with their disorder and with proper knowledge and instruction they can learn how to live with their lifelong companion — Diabetes.

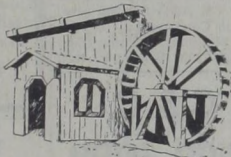

Fire Safety Advice

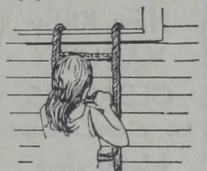
Insurance experts suggest that this is an opportune time to survey your home for fire hazards that could cost not only financial losses but imperil the safety of your family.

Patrick Genovese, loss control property manager for CNA Insurance, says that over 12,000 Americans die in fires each year with 4,400 of these fatalities occurring in fires in one- and two-family dwellings. Approximately 75 per cent of these fires were caused by simple human error.

In preparing your home for the winter ahead, Genovese warns that homeowners should take precautions when turning to extra sources of heat.

Place a metal mesh screen completely over fire-place openings keeping the draft open as long as a fire burns or smolders.

Don't substitute fuels in heaters. However, in an emergency, diesel fuel can be burned safely in an oil heater without damage to equipment.



Don't bring liquid propane gas containers into the house — it is dangerous and in many places against the law to store such containers indoors.

One way to insure invaluable time for your family to make an escape in case of fire is by installing smoke detectors in the home.

According to Genovese, about 60 per cent of all fatal household fires occur between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Since smoke tends to flow along the ceiling, a smoke detector placed on the ceiling or wall of a hallway leading to bedrooms should provide adequate fire warning in most houses or apartments.

Check with your insurance agent to find out if your homeowners insurance policy allows a premium discount for smoke detectors properly installed and maintained.



Genovese also advises that fire extinguishers be kept handy in the kitchen and workrooms. Escape ladders made of rope or metal can be purchased inexpensively and may be an invaluable aid in escaping from bedroom windows in case of fire.

Above all, do not panic in case of fire and be sure that your family is prepared in advance with an escape plan and a designated point outside the house to meet for "roll call."

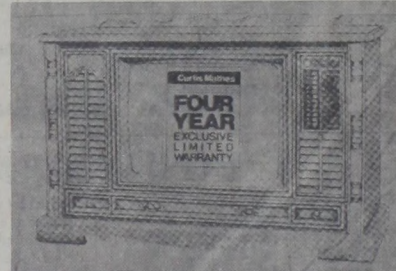

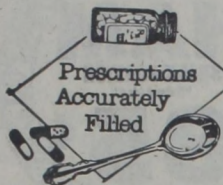

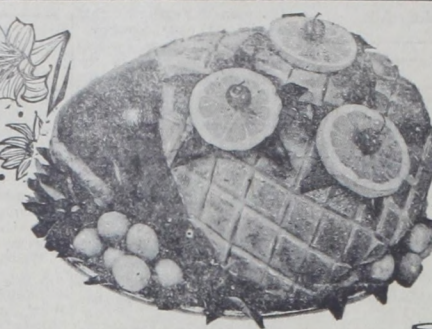

Don't Toy With Life



The American Veterinary Medical Association urges you not to give your children rabbits, chicks or ducks for Easter. Excitement and enthusiasm over the gift often result in broken legs and crushed wings.

The injury or death of the animal is a traumatic experience for the child. Animals that survive generally end up in an animal shelter. It is impossible to place them all. Many have to be destroyed.

The veterinarians remind parents that these are outdoor animals. They cannot be housebroken and may cause serious housekeeping and health problems. Public health authorities warn that children and adults in close contact with these animals may be exposed to salmonellosis, a severe

gastro-intestinal infection.

Salmonellosis is rarely fatal, but often requires medical treatment including hospitalization. Other pets as well as family members may become ill.

Because of the problems surrounding these animals, many communities have passed laws prohibiting the sale of rabbits, ducklings and chicks as pets.

Easter and the coming of spring should be a time of joy and rebirth, not a period of physical illness, psychological trauma and the needless deaths of young animals. The American Veterinary Medical Association urges parents to leave rabbits, chicks and ducks on the farm and give their children stuffed toys and chocolate bunnies instead.

Food For Thought

WASHINGTON—Many of the Nation's farmers in Washington last week to discuss with government leaders the cost-price squeeze in agriculture complained that most listened, but too few heard.

Unfortunately, this has been the case for years. American agriculture has borne the burden of supplying food for the world since the industrial revolution made America the world's most productive nation.

In lean years, when world production has been incapable of meeting demand, the farmer has demonstrated through high yields the technological heights America is capable of achieving. In these years, the American farmer has prospered because world demand triggered higher prices for food stuffs sold.

In other years, however, when world demand has been met by world production, surpluses developed, and the prices the American farmer received for his labors plummeted—sometimes drastically. In an effort to bolster the sagging farm industry in these years, government provided target prices and other programs to tide farmers over until better times.

Boom and bust years have been accepted by the farmer. In the present world economy, however, higher prices for fuel and fertilizer, inflation, and scarcities have combined with inept government programs to shortchange farmers to the point where many now face financial ruin.

Prices farmers have received for their crops have been well below the cost of production, a condition which ultimately spells collapse for any small businessman or industry if left uncorrected.

It has been just these concerns farmers have attempted to voice in Washington over the last few weeks, though many believe their pleas have fallen on deaf ears in official Washington.

Just what does the American farmer want? Those farmers with whom I have met over the last few weeks and months want only what any businessman wants—the opportunity to sell a product and realize a reasonable rate of return on investment.

Their concerns are the concerns of every businessman—inflation, the high cost to them of a government regulated market, and the political atmosphere which affects such policies as export and import markets.

The legislative proposals they have submitted to me address these concerns in comprehensive fashion, though not all will be viewed as practical. Their recommendations center on removal of both direct and indirect subsidy payments for farm products and the substitution of a market place price protected by law at not less than 100 percent of parity, which will allow farmers to peg prices with costs like all other segments of the economy.

Their proposals also call for the establishment of a National Board of Agricultural Producers to give those farmers most affected a greater voice in production and marketing policy. Of equal merit is the recommendation for strengthening our international trade policies, particularly in the area of import quotas, inspection standards, and labeling requirements.

What should concern us all is the impact on the economy if farming continues to be unprofitable. A continually depressed farm economy would place a drag on other important sectors such as the steel industry and manufacturing, while eliminating jobs and upping still higher the price of food. Indeed, the ripple effects would leave no segment untouched.

The farmers have been talking. We should all hope Washington is listening.

In the absence of any official denial on that point, a person has to wonder. And if the charge is true one also wonders whether it is right to make us taxpayers compensate the billionaire money-lenders for a bad investment. According to our understanding this is a proper subject for a crack-down by the Justice Department.

No matter how one looks at it, this deal appears to be shabby. Watergate is a trifle by comparison. That affair was only a matter of political

shenanigans no worse than the accusers themselves had committed. The canal deal could be the beginning of national catastrophe.

The Reds keep telling us they will eventually take over. This treaty could make a person wonder whether they have already done it.

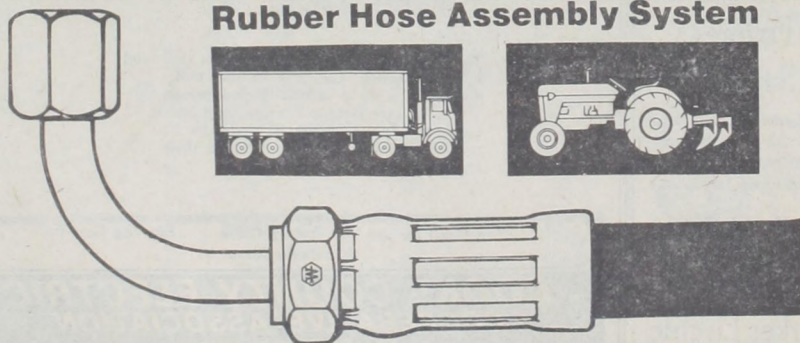
