For many years the students of world history have been telling us that US is making a great mistake in failing to learn from past generations. As pointed out recently by Dr. George Benson of the National Education Program, historians have done an excellent job of explaining what caused the downfall of Greece and Rome, but people who should be busy avoiding the same mistakes do nothing about them.

He says that good writers are explaining what's happening in England today, and why. The country's downfall began at the opening of the present century when a group of people formed an organization that was dedicated to the spread of socialism through industrialized nations of the world.

Promoters of that philosophy saw World War II as the opportunity to put their theory into practice in England. "With grave concern" Benson says, "I watched their veiled attacks upon Winston Churchill as he struggled to lead England successfully through that terrible war. Almost alone he inspired their superhuman effort against the German blitz."

While Churchill was leading his people to survival and victory, those political enemies were plotting his overthrow and the socialization of the country. According to their propaganda line Britain had been in a long, hard war, endured privation and saw its factories converted to military production. With the war over, they needed to return to an all out civilian lifestyle. They also preached that Churchill, though a fine war leader, was not a good peace time leader.

Furthermore the schemers insisted on an early election while Churchill was busy with the international affairs of treaties, exchange of prisoners, etc.

Their scheme succeeded. Churchill was thrown out in 1945 and an unknown, Mr. Atlee, was named the prime minister with a mandate to take over the Country's industries. That was the beginning of the end of England's greatness. The new socialist government nationalized the coal industry on January 1, 1946.

At that time the country had enough coal on the surface to supply it for the remainder of the first winter. However the next winter brought the first coal famine. Half of the nation had been shut down by a power shortage. Finally the new government had to import foreign workers to operate the coal mines.

Next in the socialization process was the take over of railroads and coastline shipping, then other industries one by one until gradually almost all industry except farming was in the hands of the government. The nation's production fell off more and more, and the national economy got progressively worse.

Trying to relieve this situation of food shortage, national deficit and high taxes, the government adopted a national health care program. The cost went much higher than estimated and government people explained that England was much sicker than she realized.

But the country keeps on getting sicker. Workers are so sick of total government control that they do not hesitate to strike against it. Neither of the political parties is able to restore order. The nation is broke and some writers are predicting that finally a dictator will take over the government.

All these dire circumstances are in plain sight for the world to see, and the consequences are equally obvious. One would think that with such warning our country could see what to expect, but it continues to follow merrily in (Continued on Page 10)

## Germanfest Preparations Reported on Schedule

All attention was on the Germanfest as members of the Muenster Chamber of Commerce held their regular meeting at noon Tuesday. A progress report following Monday night's meeting of the Chamber officers and committee members with the concessions operators indicated that all concession spaces have been reserved and preparations are on schedule.

As before, most of the booths will be located under the big tent and remaining space will be beside the park driveway. The tent will be located on the tennis courts.

Another special preparation is the construction of rest rooms adjoining the swim pool. Johnny Fisher, who is in charge of the work, says there will be ample time to finish it unless a rainy spell interferes.

Principal emphasis at the meeting was in publicizing the event and creating a festive atmosphere of German flavor. Hundreds of buttons, many with rosettes and streamers, proclaim the festival and are encouraged for daily wear until then. Tyrolean style hats in gay colors are likewise being promoted to help give the community a Germanfest look.

And there are other pretties galore. Display Streamers are described as more attractive than last year, and a variety of decorative pictures, etc., is new to the scene. Another new item, a sure attention compeller, is a mural some five feet deep and fifteen feet long showing German attire and scenes. If not used as full size murals they can be cut apart and used in separate areas.

The Chamber's hope is get an early response to the suggestion to wear buttons and hats and display the streamers. As John Pagel said "we want to make visitors as well as ourselves very much aware that Germanfest is coming".

## School Crossings Get Flash Signals

A traffic safety measure which has been developing for several months was completed last Friday when the Department of Highways and Public Transportation completed installation of flashing signals on Main Street at 5th and 8th, along with two painted crosswalks.

The flashing yellow signals are operated automatically by clocks from 7:30 to 8 and 3:15 to 4 on school days. During those times traffic is expected to slow down to 20 miles per hour between the signs. When not flashing the regular speed of 30 miles per hour is allowed.

The installations are intended especially for school children crossing Main at 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th before and after school.

**OPINION**

On the 1st day of April, 1978, came on to be heard the above cause wherein the Defendant was charged by complaint filed with a violation of Tex. Dev. Civ. Stat. Ann. art. 6701d Section 33 (c) 1, running a red light, and, the cause

having been regularly reached on the docket, came the Defendant and entered a plea of nolo contendere to the charge; whereupon, the Court, after explaining to the Defendant the effect of said plea, proceeded to receive testimony. The Defendant testified that she had stopped at the red light in question and, having waited an inordinately long time, concluded that it was malfunctioning. She then checked for oncoming traffic in all directions and, finding none, after taking a referendum among her passengers as to the operation

of the light, proceeded democratically through the intersection. The arresting officer testified that he had driven up behind the Defendant and had himself stopped behind her; whereupon, to his surprise, she had proceeded through the red light. No other traffic was present. Arrest and the filing of this complaint followed. The testimony was, thus, unanimous that the Defendant had, in fact, stopped at the intersection.

The complaint, which was in a form in general use in municipal courts of this State, reads in part that the Defendant was operating a motor vehicle and:

"... the signal then and there showing a steady red colored light controlling the actor's direction of movement and actor facing the same, did then and there fail to stop before entering the intersection, the actor not having been directed to proceed through the red light by a Police Officer, and not then and there he operator of an authorized emergency vehicle." Emphasis added.

Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. Art. 6701d section 1, reads in pertinent part:

"Vehicular traffic facing a steady red signal alone shall stop and may then turn right or, . . . may turn left. . . . Traffic not so turning shall remain standing until an indication to proceed is shown . . . ."

The complaint merely alleged a failure to stop on the part of the Defendant. Had it contained the following language after the emphasized portion:

"or having stopped and without executing a lawful turn, failed to remain standing until an indication to proceed was shown . . . . there is little doubt that the complaint would have been sufficient to hold the Defendant on the violation of Section 5101, when combined with the proper deletion of any surplus words. Because of the wording of the applicable section, it would be necessary in a form complaint to delete either the "failure to stop" or the "having stopped" language in order to provide the requisite notice to the Defendant as required by the Sixth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

The Court, upon the evidence finds that, as a matter of law, the complaint is sufficient to charge an offense as it stands, but that the Defendant did not in fact fail to stop. The Defendant is, therefore, found NOT GUILTY and is ordered DISCHARGED.

Defendant found not guilty, ordered discharged.

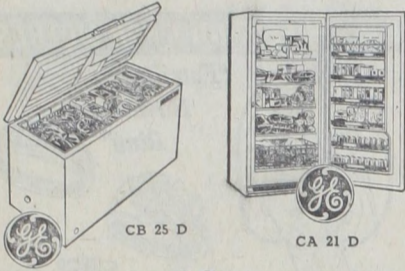
