Refreshments of pudding cake and coffee were served to 15 members and two guests, Mrs. Yeatts and Gladys Kennedy.

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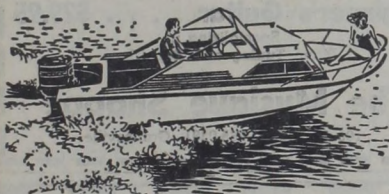
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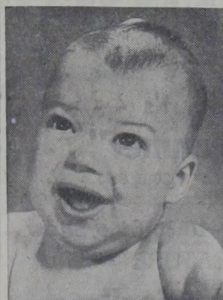

Texas Utilities Get Edison Award For Lignite Use

The Texas Utilities Company System has received the electric utility industry's highest honor, the Edison Award, for innovative development of lignite fuel resources in the generation of electricity. The System includes Dallas Power & Light Company, Texas Electric Service Company, Texas Power & Light Company, Texas Utilities Fuel Company, Texas Utilities Generating Company and Texas Utilities Services Inc.

The award was presented to T. L. Austin, Jr., Chairman of the Board of Texas Utilities Company, by Karl H. Rudolph, Chairman of Edison Electric Institute, at its 46th Annual Convention here today.

The Texas Utilities Company System was cited for "demonstrated foresight and aggressive action in reducing its dependence on natural gas from 100 percent of electric generation in 1971 to 66 percent in 1977, for development of lignite as a low-cost fuel alternative, and for conducting exemplary reclamation of the land mined for lignite, all representing highly constructive steps in making the best use of fuel resources, meeting energy needs and accomplishing environmental goals to the benefit of its customers and its service areas."

Texas Power & Light Company president R. K. Campbell expressed great pleasure with announcement of the award.

"For many years," said Campbell, "the employees of Texas Power & Light and our affiliate companies have worked diligently to provide for the electricity requirements of our customers. This Edison Award, the electric utility in-

dustry's highest, belongs to the men and women who have helped make the company what it is today."

The Edison Award is presented annually to an electric utility company "for distinguished contribution to the development of the electric light and power industry for the convenience of the public and the benefit of all."

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

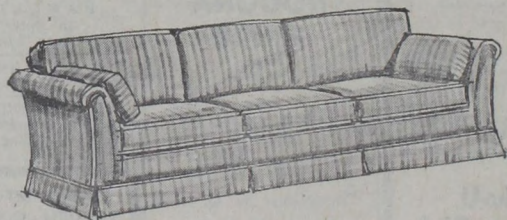


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Garden Club Sees Program on Home Flower Arranging

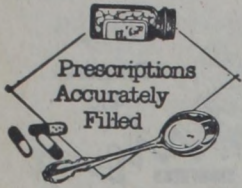

than experienced over the past several years. It does represent a substantial part of the cost of doing business to the cooperative. In 1977 the cooperative spent 77.2% of its total revenue for wholesale power, which included fuel and purchased power adjustment costs.

"Service reliability on your Cooperative's system in 1977 was good with a continuity factor of 99.98% with the number of outages declining as well as the duration of each outage.

"On this occasion I cannot resist mentioning the fact that this year your electric cooperative celebrates its 40th anniversary. In 1938 a group of seven individuals applied for and were granted a charter for the Cooke County Electric Cooperative, a cooperative organization, to own, construct, operate and maintain an electric distribution system to the people of this area who were not receiving it.

"One of these seven original directors survives today, Mr. Casey Jones of Forestburg. Other people besides the original seven directors, were, also, very instrumental in bringing this organization into existence, one of which was Mr. J. M. Weinzapfel, a businessman of Muenster, Texas. There were many other people involved in one way or another in getting operations under way once the organizing functions were completed, some of whom were the electricians who wired the unserved residences so that electricity could be used once

it was made available. One of these electricians was Mr. Ervin McKee who still resides in the Dye Community southeast of Gainesville.

"I think that it is the nature of we people to view the present problems as being very difficult and to look upon those that have been overcome in the past as relatively insignificant or in some way less taxing.

"There were problems to overcome in the early days of this organization and for us to judge them may not be quite fair to those whose responsibility it was to solve them, but I am sure that the early problems were not easy and the pioneers in this business had to have a lot of faith, as well as put forth a lot of cooperative effort to overcome these problems. By having faith and putting forth cooperative effort as did the founding fathers of this organization, I feel confident that we can and will continue to grow and serve the consumers of the cooperative with dependable electric service at a reasonable price consistent with sound business management."

The large crowd heard Lee Herring, senior vice president of Grand Prairie State Bank, deliver a humorous address which dealt with a number of stories almost everyone could relate to.


