National reaction to the tax cut voted by the people of California has dominated the media ever since . . . a very welcome sign that the country is in the mood for major fiscal changes. The problem is not only that it keeps getting harder to make ends meet, but there's the ever increasing danger that inflation will lead to a breakdown of our whole economic system.

An organization dedicated to doing something about this crisis before it becomes a catastrophe is the National Tax Limitation Committee. It reminds us that in effect we started working for ourselves on June 2. Until then the average American worked entirely for government . . . local, state and federal. That's a way of figuring it from the fact that 42 cents out of every dollar earned goes to the government in taxes.

Tax Foundation, Inc., is less severe in its estimate, saying that the average person worked for government until May 6. Or, putting it another way, 2 hours and 45 minutes out of a worker's 8 hour earning goes into taxes. Regardless of the disagreement, the plain fact is that we the people are being ripped off.

The reason for this outrage is apparent in the record of expenditures of the three levels of government. Tax Foundation tells us that spend has increased ten fold since 1950. It was \$70.3 billion then, \$757.2 billion now . . . which is an average of \$9,960 for every household of the country.

Needless to say, the 28 years referred to were almost all years of deficit, which kept adding to the national debt as well as speeding inflation. As pointed out recently in Farm Bureau's bulletin: it took 168 years of US history for the debt to reach \$200 billion. It took 18 years for the debt to increase \$100 billion to \$300 billion; nine years to reach \$400 billion, and four to climb to \$500 billion; it took only one year to increase another \$100 billion to \$600 billion, two years to increase to \$700; and the next two years (until 1979) is expected to increase the national debt beyond \$800 billion.

All of this is borrowed money for which our government is paying interest . . . in an amount that was more than sufficient to pay the total cost of government only a few decades ago.

The thought of this enormous obligation, and of the 42% tax bite on the nation's earnings to finance current government operation, leaves no room for doubt that the National Tax Limitation Committee is on the right course. Something has to be done to avoid disaster.

That organization's immediate goal is to have other states follow the good example of California in limiting their taxes . . . as now being considered in Texas, Colorado, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Florida and Massachusetts. And after a sufficient number of states has adopted the amendment the next step is to continue the momentum on to Washington and have it added to the US Constitution.

It would be most assuring to see the end of deficit spending, with government living within its means like we individuals have to. After that it might be possible to reverse the trend we have been following and even start at paying off that big debt. In the bargain it should be possible to restore integrity, with special alertness for graft, waste and pork barrel legislation.

In those latter respects alone our legislators have great opportunities for budget relief (such as refusing to spend \$215,000 to find out what a burro eats.) Many of the appropriations, like this one, are more than just asinine, they are so absurd, sometimes so questionable morally, that allowing them has to violate conscience.

This tax relief talk is more than just theory. According to Senator Tower's latest newsletter, our own recent history tells us that it will work. He refers to the 1963 reduction proposed by President Kennedy, an across-the-board tax cut for both business and individual taxpayers. It worked then and it can work again. The expected loss of tax revenue actually be-

## Andy Waltescheid, Dies Suddenly of Heart Attack

Funeral service for Andrew C. Waltescheid, 56, was held Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock in Sacred Heart Church with Father Stephen Eckart officiating at the Mass of Christian Burial and also at the graveside service.

Burial was in Sacred Heart Cemetery directed by Nick Miller Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Maurus Hacker, Donald Eckart, Leonard Vogel, Gene Yosten, Dale Walterscheid, Glenn Walterscheid, Leon Walterscheid and Ricky Walterscheid.

Rosary service was conducted at 4 and 8 p.m. Monday in the chapel of Miller Funeral Home.

Andy Walterscheid died, apparently of a heart attack, about 9:30 a.m. Sunday at his home west of Muenster while tending his livestock. His body was found a short time later by Leonard Vogel.

He was born at Muenster, December 13, 1921, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Walterscheid. He was unmarried, a lifetime resident of the community, and a farmer all of his adult life.

Survivors are three sisters, Mrs. John Hacker, Mrs. James Eckart and Mrs. Lee Roy Yosten, all of Muenster; and three brothers, Norbert, Raymond and Henry, also of Muenster.

The newly acquired freedom is a strange experience, he said. He has not decided yet how to use it, but he has started by playing it one day at a time. To date he has been partial to fishing as a past time.

Dick's career includes 45 years with the same company except 45 months in the Army during World War II. A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Trachta, he started work on June 1, 1932, at the age of 18, for Shamburger Lumber Company under management of the late Henry Luke. It was to be the only employer of Dick's lifetime. While changes were made in his assignment and business ownership, he carried on without interruption.

The first change of ownership came in 1962 when the Shamburger chain of lumber yards was absorbed by National Building Centers. The next was in 1972 when NBC became a part of Lone Star Industries. All the while the Muenster unit ranked among the best in the extensive chain of stores . . . with credit to efficient operation as well as a prosperous community.

Dick worked in the Muenster store for two years before being transferred in June 1934 to Stamford, Texas, as assistant manager. He worked there until 1940 when he returned here as manager following the retirement of Henry Luke.

Slightly more than a year later came the attack on Pearl Harbor and World War II. Dick was one of the many of Muenster who entered the service. During his 45 months of absence Jerome Pagel had charge of the Shamburger store.

Returning to Shamburger after the war Dick resumed his position as manager and continued on the job until January 1972 when he responded to the urge for less pressure. He traded places with Rufus Henscheid. Since then Rufus has been the manager and Dick the assistant manager.

Besides spending 45 years with the company, Dick has two sons following his footsteps. After graduation at North Texas State University, Wayne spent a year with the company at New Braunfels and is now in his third year in the Norman, Oklahoma, store. Glenn worked at Waco for two years after graduation at NTSU and is now in his second year at Stamford.

## Harvest Switches From Grain to Hay

Small grain harvesting in the community is complete, after closing out Monday and Tuesday with only an occasional load being delivered to local grain buyers.

So, the current big job is harvesting a lush hay crop. The principal crops are sudan and coastal, which are some of the best of recent years and compensate for the below average grain crop.

Spring rainfall apparently ideal for the feedstuff. Sudan growth is abundant and colored a beautiful deep green, and the same applies to the bermuda. Corn likewise is exceptionally good at the roasting ear stage, lots of it being gathered for the home freezer. A good crop is assured where the corn will be cut soon for silage. Also a fair yield is already in sight if the crop has to mature without more rain, but it can be improved by another timely shower. Milo fields also are fine at this stage and can use more moisture for ideal growth. Overall, this is a good crop year.

A problem in baling is a shortage of baler wire. Farmers who had it on hand are doing all right, but the others with wire balers are in trouble. Twine ad plastic tie machines are being called to relieve the strain.

Resurface OK'd on US 82 West of Town

A recent report from the Department of Highways and Public Transportation indicates that a seal coat project is authorized on two lanes of US 82 from near the west city limit of Muenster to a point 4.2 miles west. The estimated cost is \$37,700.

The project is included in the State Highway Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement program for 1979, at a total cost of \$70.5 million to "improve safety and to protect the public's investment on 3,766 miles of state maintained highway facilities.

Also included in the program are improvement jobs on four FM roads of the county. Work consists of resurfacing, widening, base repair and spot safety improvements.

## Hospital Is Debt Free

A great day in the history of Muenster Memorial Hospital was reached this week when directors of the hospital district announced that all bonds issued by the district have been called in and retired.

But that is only a part of a happy story. Making the final payment on a debt, always a welcome event, was most significant in this case because the schedule of payments and the amount of interest paid were both reduced by more than 50 per cent.

As originally scheduled on November 15, 1965, the hospital's bonded debt of \$327,000 was to be paid off in 1991, a total of 26 years, and the total interest was to be \$204,540. However, the actual duration of indebtedness, until May 1978, was less than 13 years, and total interest actually paid was \$94,359.19. The saving realized by district taxpayers is \$110,180.83, which is 54 per cent of the scheduled interest debt.

With no more tax required to meet the debt, only a token tax will be needed in the future . . . to provide for the care of indigent patients,

as required by the legislation which originally created the hospital district. The tax of the past 13 years has cared for indigents as well as the debt service.

The directors stated that no tax for indigents will be needed this year, but minor levies will be imposed from time to time as the need requires.

Muenster Memorial Hospital, built with funds provided by the Muenster Hospital Authority and a Hill-Burton federal grant, was opened in 1964. The following year Muenster Hospital District was created by an act of the State Legislature and ratified by voters of the area. It was authorized to issue bonds for purchase of the hospital and its facilities, and to assess and collect taxes for the purpose of retiring bonds, paying interest and caring for indigent patients. It was not authorized to levy a tax for the hospital's operation, and no tax money has ever been applied for that purpose.

The hospital district issued bonds in the amount of \$327,000 on November 15, 1965, with the first \$10,000 to mature May 15, 1968. The bonds bore interest of 4% payable on May 15 and November 15 of each year. Following the first maturity date of May, 1968, the schedule of retirements was in amounts of \$10,11 and 15 thousand, then \$20 thousand each year thereafter with the last bonds to mature in May 1991.

Of the \$327,000 raised, some \$300,000 were used to retire the obligation of Muenster Hospital Authority, and the remaining \$27,000 to satisfy other debts of the hospital.

The directors resolved to retire the district bonds as fast as possible and to that end they adopted a higher tax rate than required by the

JCs Asked to Give Jet to Museum At Sheppard AFB

The F-84F jet fighter which has been on display for several years in the Muenster City Park, may be moving soon to more impressive surroundings. Sheppard Air Force Base, which presented the plane to Muenster Jaycees, has asked for its return so that it can be restored and mounted in a museum of jet fighter aircraft at Sheppard AFB.

The request was made in a letter to Mayor Leonard Endres, explaining that models of pre-Vietnam war vintage, such as this one, are scarce and the museum relies mainly on the good graces of local communities to acquire them. The writer also said that "Historically, static display aircraft situated in remote locations have invariably become targets of vandals. They soon don't do much for the Air Force image and often become dangerous to children that play on and around them."

The city council has referred the request to the Jaycees. If returned to Sheppard AFB it will be transported by base personnel and when mounted it will have a plaque indicating that it came from Muenster Jaycees.

schedule of payments. They pointed out that early retirement of the bonds would substantially reduce the total interest payments.

Though none of the bonds were to mature until 1968, the first \$25,000 were retired in 1967 at the request of the holder. That occurred again in 1968, 1969 and 1970. In 1971 all bonds became subject to involuntary retirement and the pace of retirement already established was followed until the final closeout. The following is a list of bond retirements by years: 1967, \$25,000; 1968, \$15,000; 1969, \$30,000; 1970, \$35,000; 1971, \$45,000; 1972, \$35,000; 1973, \$16,000; 1974, \$10,000; 1975, \$24,000; 1976, \$49,000; 1977, \$10,000; 1978, \$33,000.

When the bonds were issued their maturity schedule was set up on the tax rate of 35 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. However the directors chose to apply a rate of 70 cents, just under the 75 cent maximum authorized by the legislature. 65 cents of the amount was for bond service and the remaining 5 cents for indigents.

The rate continued for 3 years, after which the 5 cent assessment for indigents was omitted for eight years, then assessed at 10 cents for the year 1976. During the 13 years there have been only four assessments to provide for indigents, and the total of the four assessments was 25 cents.

During the first nine years the debt retirement tax was steady at 65 cents per \$100 and total valuation of the district was steady at slightly more than \$6 million. In 1974 valuation increased to \$8.4 million and directors reduced the tax rate to 40 cents.

Expansion of the district in 1975 upped the valuation to over \$11 million and directors reduced the rate for debt service to 20 cents for the next two years. However the 10 cent assessment for indigents in 1976 made a total tax rate of 30 cents that year.

Finally the county wide revaluation in 1977 increased total valuation of the district to almost \$18.4 million, and the 30 cent assessment that year was sufficient to finish paying the hospital debt.

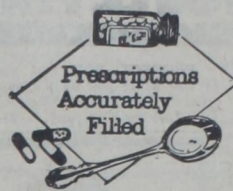

## Vacationing Selbys Visit 17 States of East and South

Kenneth and Prue Selby have returned home after vacationing in 17 states and driving 4,000 miles. They included portions of the Midwestern and Middle Atlantic regions and all of the states in the Southern Region.

Their first stop of interest was "Opry Land, USA" in Nashville, new home of the Grand Ole Opry. In Louisville they enjoyed horse racing at Churchill Downs and in Columbus, Ohio, they saw the National Drag Racers Association finals.

A delightful scenic drive through the Appalachians of West Virginia and Pennsylvania was culminated by a most interesting visit with several Amish farm families.

They live on small (approximately 60 acres) but fertile farms south of Lancaster, Pa. The Amish belong to a Protestant group which evolved from the Mennonites.

According to one young Amish farmer, the price of farmland is approximately \$5,000 per acre and hardly ever available for purchase. The uniqueness of the Amish people is that they have maintained the basic tradition of "living off the land", impervious to all modern conveniences.

They do not use electricity, telephones, automobiles, nor modern mechanized farming equipment. Their farming power is furnished by horses and mules. Their means of transportation is by horse and buggy.

Essentially, all men dress alike. Their clothing is similar to overalls, but blousy in appearance and of a dark gray color. All males also wear straight brimmed straw hats, long bobbed hair and long beards.

The Amish women wear almost ankle length, plainly made dresses. They cover their hair with a net, snood-like head covering.

The Amish maintain their own one room schools up to the 8th grade. The basic curriculum consists of the 3 Rs, German and religion. After completing the 8th grade they go about the business of strictly learning to be a good provider and homemaker, in preparation for marriage.

Information obtained by visiting these farmers led the Selbys to Isaac Petersheim, an Amish harness-maker, where they purchased a gift for their son-in-law and daughter, Bill and Kathy Endersby, which will be delivered at a later date. It is a mirror framed by a horse collar, with hames highlighted by solid brass knobs.

Some Amish people are gradually leaving the Lancaster area due to the commercialization of their lifestyle by large chain restaurants and hotels.

From the calmness and tranquility of the Amish community to the "madness" of rushing people trying to enter the Royal International Casino in Atlantic City, New Jersey, was a sharp contrast. Patrons and sightseers were 5

abreast and 3 blocks in length on the Boardwalk trying to gain entrance to the only Casino east of Las Vegas. To a visitor it seems the majority of the locals feel that a gambling enterprise will be a great asset to the apparent declining economy of Atlantic City.

Continuing their trip through the remaining Middle Atlantic Region on down through the Southern States, the Selbys went to New Orleans for a night in the French Quarter and a traditional tour of Bourbon Street.

Texas-bound, the last night was spent in Kilgore visiting Prue's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin A. Smith. The next day Kenneth made a business trip with Mr. Smith, who is owner and operator of Marvin A. Smith Oil and Well Servicing Company, serving Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas, and 4-S Production Company.

After meeting many people from all walks of life, the Selbys say they realized that the majority of Texans are possibly the most secure and prosperous of all.

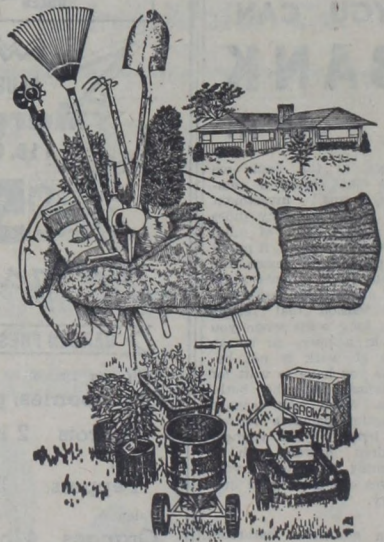
