The high school youth of Muenster were treated to two retreats, one evening and one day-long. Both retreats consisted of music ministry, games, talks by the team, dramas, witnessing, small group sharing, and, finally, prayer for each person attending. Each retreat also included the celebration of the Mass.

Even the ice, sleet and cold weather did not chill the warmth and love that NET spread throughout the community. On Saturday, approximately 100 attended the Christian Family Outreach Seminar. Many families, young and old, were there. The day of fun, sharing and prayer ended with the 5:00 Mass where NET members provided the music.

A Junior High Retreat was held Sunday, Feb. 5, in the Community Center. Later that evening, Sacred Heart Prayer Group hosted NET for supper and prayer meeting.

Monday was also filled with activity. They led the 8 a.m. Mass and at 2:30 that afternoon they held an all-school rally at Sacred Heart. During the day, the members of NET visited with classes and friends they had made during their stay.

Monday evening, there was an All-Community Rally at MHS Auditorium after the MHS District Championship game. A large crowd enjoyed the music, dramas, testimonies and the love that was freely given.

On Tuesday, Feb. 7, the NET Team provided music for the 8 a.m. Mass. Afterwards, the host families and the NET Team had a farewell breakfast at Rohmer's. Both of the Sacred Heart priests and several friends attended.

During their week-long stay, the young people of NET formed many friendships and touched many lives. They have moved on to Fort Worth, then San Antonio, but what they brought to Muenster remains behind.

Council discusses policy, fire zones

The short agenda, for Monday night's City Council meeting included the following actions and discussion:

- Eddie Ramsey was appointed as a Zoning Board member.

- The second reading was held for the proposed city employee policy. Areas of sick leave and personal appearance received detailed discussion.

- Chamber of Commerce president Charles Bayer requested extension of the fire zone in City Block 40 to include the Muenster Enterprise building which houses the Chamber of Commerce office. It is a city ordinance that only entities within the city fire zone may apply for liquor licenses. The Chamber of Commerce is seeking to obtain a liquor license to legally dispense beer at Germanfest and other festivals. Mayor Henscheid indicated that this is not an actual zoning question and should not require an amendment to the zoning ordinance. But, the matter will be checked out before the extension is granted.

- Acting as a businessman, Bayer requested that the city petition the State Highway Department to extend the city speed limit to the current city limits. He said

that with the current posted limit, traffic was at highway speed in front of his business, Bayer's Kolonialwaren, and entry and exit were hazardous. City Administrator Joe Fenton will pursue the issue.

- The Council accepted the Park Board recommendation allowing the Chamber of Commerce to use the City Park for Germanfest including set-up and recovery from April 24 till May 4. They specified that vehicular traffic must stay off the grass and the Jaycees must also obtain a park use permit to cover the swimming pool building.

- Mayor Henscheid ordered the city election for May 6 this year. The mayor's position and council places 3 and 5, occupied by Al Hess and Willie Wimmer are open for filing.

- The Council approved payment of monthly bills totaling \$51,256.66. Included is a \$15,000.00 payment to the highway department for one-half of the city's share of the cost of construction of the new Ash Street bridge over the Brushy Elm Creek.

- The Council met in executive session. No binding action was taken.

Hornets win 3rd district championship

The Muenster Hornets continued to set standards for the future Monday night when they defeated the Valley View Eagles 81-60 to win their third consecutive district title. With a title in football and basketball in the same year, dubbed the "Doubleheader" by Topher Klement, this group became the first at MHS to accomplish this feat. Wednesday they were named the 20th ranked team in the state by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches out of a possible 326 Class A teams.

"These guys have been working for three years to break into the rankings. They have earned the respect," said Coach Ted Heers. "We'll see if we can stay there. We've got Midway this Friday, then the 16th ranked team Santo, and 3rd ranked Graford. Win or lose, we hope to improve before we meet Alvord on the 24th."

Muenster will meet District 33A runner-up Alvord on Feb. 24. The two teams will tip-off at 7:30 p.m. at Justin-Northwest High School. The 33A Champions, the Slidell Greyhounds, will play either Collinsville or Lindsay at a site to be determined.

The Hornets ran their record to 20-3 against the Eagles. Mike Pagel scored 21 points, Weldon Hermes 16, J. Shane Wimmer 15, James Hennigan 12, Keith Klement 11, and Chris Klement 6. They finished 9-1 in district play. "A coach has to feel good when five guys get double figures," said Heers. "We were a little worried at the half (29-24) because Valley View had controlled the tempo. Krahl and Mills are very good shooters. The guys picked up the intensity on defense and we got quite a few transition baskets."

Muenster came out and scored

52 second-half points. Keith and Wimmer each got 8 rebounds, and Wimmer added 6 assists. The Hornets also finished the night 16 of 20 from the free throw line.

"Going into the playoffs you can maybe slip by a better team if you can avoid turnovers and hit free throws. We feel we are better this year in both areas."

The Valley View Eaglettes capitalized on 19 of 26 free throws against the Hornetses (6 of 8) to win the girls' district title 45-36. Muenster finished second and will meet the fifth-ranked Lady Greyhounds of Slidell on Feb. 17,

"The game went a little deeper than the free throw line," commented Heers. "They were a determined bunch today. They continually got good position and made the plays in the fourth quarter. After we beat them at their place, they came over here and showed their true spirit. We don't have anything to be ashamed of - Valley View has had an excellent year."

The Hornetses were led by Melissa Bayer with 10 points. Dana Wimmer collected 8, Jenny Wimmer 8 with 10 rebounds, Jennifer Carroll 6 and Denise Bayer 4.

Super Pit doubleheader features four ranked teams

Saturday night, Feb. 18, the Muenster Hornets will play the Santo Wildcats at the University of North Texas Super Pit. The Wildcats are ranked 16th while Muenster is 20th in the TABC poll.

The other game will feature the third-ranked Graford Jackrabbits against the fourth-ranked Class A team, the New Summerfield Hornets.

Times for the games were not set. There is still a possibility of a third game. But Hornet Coach Ted Heers said MHS-Santo will tip-off between 6:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. He added there was a possibility that 2 or 4 more teams could be invited, making it a Quadrupleheader.

I would like to ask a favor of you, especially of the parents of teenagers and young adults. I say favor, but I guess I should say I have an invitation which I am now extending toward you.

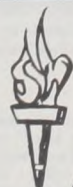

The sponsor is the National Geographic Society, who also developed the contest in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States.

A nine-country Gallup Survey conducted for the Society last year

found that people in the U.S., ages 18 to 24, the youngest surveyed, knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries.

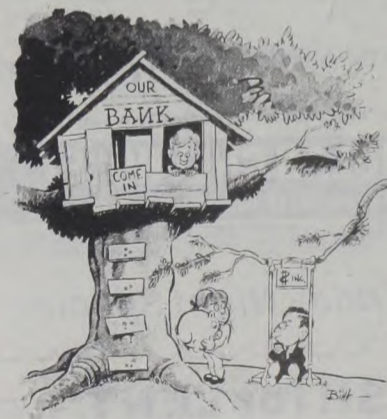

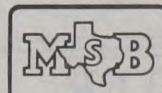

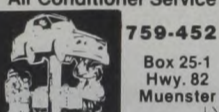

Knots To Hold Terminal Tackle Improved Clinch Knot

This is a good knot for making terminal-tackle connections and is best used for lines up to 20-pound test. It is a preferred knot by professional fishermen and angling authorities.

1. Pass line through eye of hook, swivel, or lure. Double back and make five turns around the standing line. Hold coils in place; thread end of line around first loop above the eye, then through big loop as shown.
2. Hold tag end and standing line while coils are pulled up. Take care that coils are in spiral, not lapping over each other. Slide tight against eye. Clip tag end.

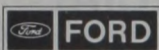

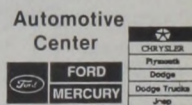

County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

The time to topdress small grains is almost here, so producers need to begin to think about the sources, rates, and timing of fertilizers.

The major nitrogen fertilizers are: Anhydrous ammonia (82 percent N), Urea (46 percent N), Ammonium sulfate (4 percent N), and Ammonium phosphate (variable percent N). As their names imply, most of these contain nitrogen in the ammonium form or in the case of urea is soon converted to that form when applied to the soil. The exceptions to this are ammonium nitrate and nitrogen solutions.

When considering the application of nitrogen as a topdressing,

both the rate and time of application are important in obtaining satisfactory results. The rate of nitrogen to use must take account (1) fertilization to date, (2) yield potential as affected by stand, soil moisture, grazing and any other conditions that can be expected to limit grain production. Generally, 30-60 lbs. of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered for grain, using the low rate where nitrogen was applied last fall and no grazing, and the high rate where fall and winter grazing has been practiced. If the grain looks pale green and shows evidence of low nitrogen and the market for your product looks good, a higher rate may be preferable.

Nitrogen topdressing requirements are determined by the type of management. Rates from 30-120 lbs./acre may be needed. The higher amount may be divided into two applications and be used where the grain is "grazed out."

Research has proven that topdressing phosphorus and potassium late into the season is of little value.

Timing of the application is of utmost importance. For small grains to make the most effective use of topdress nitrogen, it should be applied in January or February. Applying this early will provide a high probability of getting sufficient precipitation to

dissolve and incorporate the fertilizer and make it available to the plant at the proper time.

Liquid N is not more available or will not incorporate quicker than the solid forms. Since soil nitrogen has its greatest effect on grain yield by increasing tillers, it is desirable to have the nitrogen available during the late tiller producing stage of growth. This stage occurs between mid-February and mid-March. So, for maximum effectiveness, topdressing should occur before stem elongation (jointing) begins in March.

It is especially important that the application is evenly applied. Under today's nitrogen costs and grain value, streaking is very costly.

Where solutions are used, it is preferable to dribble or use methods that put the fertilizer in contact with the soil, rather than on the leaves.
