Council discusses policy, fire zones

The short agenda for Monday night's City Council meeting included the following actions and

cluded the following actions and discussion:

- Eddie Ramsey was appointed as a Zoning Board member.

- The second reading was held for the proposed city employee policy. Areas of sick leave and personal appearance received detailed discussion.

- Chamber of Commerce president Charles Bayer requested extension of the fire zone in City Block 40 to include the Muenster Enterprise building which houses the Chamber of Commerce office. It is a city ordinance that only entities within the city fire zone may apply for liquor licenses. The Chamber of Commerce is seeking to obtain a liquor license to legally dispense beer at Germanfest and other festivals, Mayor Henscheid indicated that this is not an actual zoning question and should not require an amendment to the zoning ordinance. But, the matter will be checked out before the extension is granted.

- Acting as a businessman.

- Acting as a businessman, Bayer requested that the city peti-tion the State Highway Depart-ment to extend the city speed limit to the current city limits. He said

that with the current posted limit, traffic was at highway speed in front of his business, Bayer's Kolonialwaren, and entry and exit were hazardous. City Administrator Joe Fenton will pursue

- The Council accepted the Park Board recommendation allowing the Chamber of Commerce to use the City Park for Germanfest inthe City Park for Germanfest including set-up and recovery from April 24 till May 4. They specified that vehicular traffic must stay off the grass and the Jaycees must also obtain a park use permit to cover the swimming pool building.

- Mayor Henscheid ordered the city election for May 6 this year. The mayor's position and council places 3 and 5, occupied by Al Hess and Willie Wimmer are open for filing.

- The Council approved payment of monthly bills totaling \$51,256.66. Included is a \$15,000.00 payment to the highway department for one-half of the city's share of the cost of construction of the new Ash Street bridge over the Brushy Elm Creek.

Hornets win 3rd district championship

The Muenster Hornets con-tinued to set standards for the future Monday night when they defeated the Valley View Eagles 81-60 to win their third con-secutive district title. With a title in football and basketball in the same year, dubbed the in football and basketball in the same year, dubbed the "Doubleheader" by Topher Klement, this group became the first at MHS to accomplish this feat. Wednesday they were named the 20th ranked team in the state by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches out of a possible 326 Class A teams.

"These guys have been working for three years to break into the rankings. They have earned the respect," said Coach Ted Heers. "We'll see if we can stay there. We've got Midway this Friday, then the 16th ranked team Santo, and 3rd ranked Graford. Win or lose, we hope to improve before we meet Alvord on the 24th."

The time to topdress small grains is almost here, so producers need to begin to think about the sources, rates, and timing of

fertilizers.

The major nitrogen fertilizers are: Anhydrous ammonia (82 percent N), Urea (46 percent N), Ammonium sulfate (4 percent N), and Ammonium phosphate (variable percent N). The rate of nitrogen to use must take account l)fertilization to date, 2) yield potential as affected by stand, soil moisture, grazing and any other conditions that can be expected to limit grain production. Generally, 30-60 lbs. of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered for grain, using the low rate where nitrogen was applied last fall and no grazing, and the high rate where fall and winter grazing has been practiced. Nitrogen topdressing requirements are determined by the type of management. Rates from 30-120 lbs./acre may be needed. The higher amount may be divided into two applications and be used into two applications and be us-ed where the grain is "grazed

Research has proven that top-dressing phosphorus and potassium late into the season is of

little value.

Timing of the application is of utmost importance. For small grains to make the most effective use of topdress nitrogen, it should be applied in January or February. Applying this early will provide a high probability of getting sufficient precipitation to

tilizer and make it available to the plant at the proper time.
Liquid N is not more available or will not incorporate quicker than the solid forms. Since soil nitrogen has its greatest effect on grain yield by increasing tillers, it is desirable to have the nitrogen available during the late tiller producing stage of growth. This stage occurs between mid-February and mid-March. So, for maximum effectiveness, topdressing should occur before stem elongation (jointing) begins in March.


