Muenster 4-H and FFA Show a success, prepare for county

Despite having to be rescheduled, the Muenster 4-H and FFA Show proved to be successful last Thursday night. Both the 4-H and FFA members turned out in full force to try their hand at exhibiting their projects.

From rabbits to steers, the evening proved exciting.

The judging began with Sherilyn Sicking claiming Showmanship honors and Grand Champion honors in the Rabbit Show. Weldon Bayer claimed Champion Dairy Goat honors, and Heath and Jared Bayer claimed Junior and Senior Showmanship honors respectively.

The Sheep Show followed with the show being dominated by the Vogels of Myra. In the Ewe Lamb class, Marcia Vogel was named Champion. Scot, Amber and Rodney claimed blue ribbons and Betty Balthrop claimed a red. In the Aged Ewe class, Amber Vogel claimed Champion. Rodney, Scot and Marcia Vogel followed with blue ribbons, while Betty Balthrop claimed a red. Marcia's lamb was chosen the Grand Champion Ewe and Rodney Vogel received Reserve Grand Champion.

In the Market Lamb class, there were two divisions: the Lightweight class saw Amber Vogel winning first. Philip Reiter and Marcia Vogel followed with blue ribbons. In the Heavyweight class, Rodney Vogel won first, followed by Scot in second place. Betty Balthrop placed with a red ribbon. Rodney Vogel won Grand Champion overall and Scot Vogel won Reserve Grand Champion.

The Showmanship class again saw Rodney Vogel claiming a trophy for Junior Showmanship and Scot Vogel claiming Senior Showmanship.

In the Dairy Heifer show, Rodney Vogel won Grand Champion and Showmanship with his Brown Swiss Heifer, and Heath Bayer won Reserve Grand Champion with his Holstein Heifer. Weldon Bayer claimed Grand Champion honors with his Simmental Beef Heifer.

Following the show of these animals, attention turned to the largest part of the show. The local show had 27 hogs exhibited. The Lightweight class of 12 hogs produced Jeniffer Lippe's hog as the Champion and Becky Fette as second. Receiving Blue Ribbons in the class were Daniel Knabe, Joey Serna, Mark Rigsby, John Bednarcik, Marshall Smith, Ricky Walterscheid and Amy Fette. Doug Hennigan, Joe Walterscheid and Tara Walterscheid placed with red ribbons.

Klement produced the Lightweight Champion, followed by Jason Biffle, Jeremy Bayer and Mike Vogel.

The Middleweight class saw Tracey Vogel claim Champion. She was followed by Shawn Vogel, Jordan Bayer, Jeremy Bayer, Jared Bayer and Chad Cheaney.

Misty Vogel claimed the Heavyweight class. Keith Vogel placed second followed by Melissa Biffle and Jefflyn LeFevre.

First Texas consolidates to G'ville

Muenster's branch of First Texas Savings will close its doors at 2 p.m. March 24, with all accounts being transferred to a Gainesville bank, officials said.

Ruth Lack, senior vice president and director of public relations for First Gibraltar Bank, FSB, on Wednesday said customers were notified of the closing by mail about one week ago. It is the result, Lack said, of First Gibraltar acquiring several savings associations last year and consolidating branches that serve overlapping markets.

"It's not a great distance to Gainesville. We hope to save all accounts," she said. "We've been pleased with other consolidations."

Transfer of accounts will take place automatically from Muenster's branch office to the First Gibraltar office at 101 E. Broadway in Gainesville. According to notices customers receiving, service to accounts will not be interrupted. "It will be business as usual -- just at a new location."

Services offered by First Gibraltar include banking by telephone and by mail. All accounts are protected by the FSLIC.

Mary Lou Hess, former branch manager in Muenster, will become assistant branch manager in Gainesville.

Chief addresses in-city burning

Muenster Volunteer Fire Chief Herb Knabe told the City Council Monday night that designated burning within city limits is becoming more trouble-prone, therefore, less acceptable. In the past, he said, burning trash or grass for residents was maybe a way for some on-the-job training for the firemen but now it's definitely more trouble than it's worth. Neighbors complain about smoke. Liability problems abound and firemen can no longer spend valuable drill time babysitting someone's in-town trash or weedlot burn. They must use all available time training on new equipment and becoming more proficient to satisfy insurance requirements.

Knabe said he didn't want to make anyone mad, but they had no alternative but to refuse clean-up burns and he hoped the Council would back the fire department. The Council said yes; no more trash burns for practice. Mayor Henscheid emphasized that no burning is permitted within the city limits.

In other council action: -Valerie Vogel and Vickie Schmitt were approved as pool

managers. They will attend a pool manager's school in Arlington at a cost of \$25.00 each.

- The Council approved a park board recommendation to allow extra entries in the City Park east fence for Germanfest.

- A penalty of \$110.24 was deleted from Jeff Gerstberger's property tax for 1987 because they had never been informed that a penalty problem existed, after purchasing the property, until the present.

- The much-discussed tax abatement ordinance for the City of Muenster was finally passed after it was determined that Cooke County seemingly has no intention of trying to cooperate with Muenster. City Administrator Joe Fenton commented that Muenster's development level cannot presently be on a par with Gainesville level. The county program, which was initiated after Muenster officials approached the commissioners with the idea, requires such high levels of investment and employment that Muenster can't qualify. "We don't have much of a chance of attracting a plant like the Borden plant which the county tax

abatement program seems custom made for," he said.

- The Council rejected a county proposal to allow a small discount for early payment of 1989 taxes.

- Jim Roark, Al Walter and Dan Luke were appointed to the Water District Board of Directors.

- Monthly bills totaling \$27,029.71 were approved for payment.

- The possibility of the optional county sales tax was discussed.

- David Fette asked the Council to consider methods of sweeping city streets. He cited improved appearance of the city, longer life of street surfaces, and reduced maintenance for electronic office equipment as important reasons. He added that the good example and help to private citizens would encourage them to better maintain their own properties. Fette said, "I know money is tight but the city staff and council have proven very resourceful when they identify real problems. I think our dirty streets are more than just a cosmetic problem."

- The Council closed the public meeting and met in executive session.

Wimmer, Pagel, Carroll named All-District players

J. Shane Wimmer and Mike Pagel became the sixth and seventh Hornet basketball players to earn first team All-District honors during the last three seasons. Both were unanimous selections. Wimmer is a repeat first teamer from last year. His 20.4 points, 11.4 rebounds, 3.0 steals and 5.9 assists avg. per game gave the senior impressive totals and a chance for possible region and state mention.

"The TABC voted on the teams this weekend at the state tournament," said Coach Ted Heers. "We should get the tabulations this week. A lot of coaches told me they were pushing for his selection. His numbers and our 3-year record should get him some votes."

Heers was honored by his peers as the Boys' District Coach of the Year. It was the third consecutive year he has received such honor. Joining Wimmer, Pagel and Heers was James Hennigan. Hennigan was voted second team All-District and is the only Hornet junior to receive mention.

Gaining honorable mention recognition were seniors Keith Klement, Chris Klement and Weldon Hermes.

All six players have lettered over the last three years as Muenster has won 66 games and lost 18 while winning three consecutive district championships.

"We've said a lot about these kids this year and everyone knows how much they've accomplished. I just wish I could coach them all another year."

The Hornets, the district runners-up, saw senior Jennifer Carroll earn first team All-District honors. The senior standout set a school record for three-pointers in a game (4) and for a season (23). Senior Denise Bayer and junior Dana Wimmer also earned recognition as they were voted to the second team. Juniors Jenny

Wimmer and Shonna Reiter earned honorable mention recognition as did sophomore Melissa Bayer.

"Jennifer and Denise had fine seasons," said Heers, "and they came through with some clutch baskets. Jennifer's buzzer beater at Lindsay was a memorable one."

Both MHS teams were playoff teams for the third year in a row. The Hornets will return one starter and the Hornets will return three starters.

"Not to worry," added Heers, "we've lost several starters every year and we come up with capable replacements. Next year, we'll have some fun and play some more exciting games. It will be here before you know it."

Filing for school board places is March 22

The Muenster School District has been approached by officials of newly opened Lakeview Hospital to provide education services to the school-aged patients of the center.

The district is working with the hospital and Barbara Marshall, special education director for the Cooke County Education Co-op, in making arrangements and are negotiating a possible contract,

said Superintendent Charles Coffey. Some of the students at the center could be there as long as six weeks, and need to have some access to continuing their education during their stay, Coffey said. Nothing final has been agreed upon, he said.

In other business at the board's regular March meeting, the 1989-1990 textbooks were approved as recommended by the district's text-

book committee. The board cast its ballot for W.O. Echols of Lake Kiowa as a representative on the Region 11 Education Service Center Board. Trustees also decided against granting discounts for early payment of property taxes, the same as in the past.

All teacher contracts as recommended by the administration were renewed for another year. The board also accepted the resignation of Priscilla Phillips, band director, effective the end of this year.

School district residents are reminded that the filing deadline for two places on the school board is this Wednesday, March 22. The election is scheduled for May 6. The three-year terms of Dennis Hess and Jerry Bynum are available. Hess has filed for reelection. Anyone interested may file at the administration office.

CCC calls for entries for 1989 creative writing contest

Cooke County College has issued the call for entries for the 1989 edition of its popular "Creative Writing Awards" competition for amateur authors.

Deadline for submitting entries is noon March 27, announced Linda Coolen, CCC faculty member who is assuming responsibility as director of the competition this year, taking over for Dr. Ona Wright.

"I'm very excited about being more actively involved in this wonderful competition," Coolen said. "I have always considered it one of the very finest programs our Division of Communication and Fine Arts here at CCC has carried on outside the classroom."

"And Dr. Wright certainly deserves a lion's share of the credit for its continuing success."

Although she is stepping aside as director, I know she will remain keenly interested."

It's also very likely that she will be present for the traditional awards ceremony at which top winners in each of the various categories are formally recognized. The ceremony this year is scheduled for 11 a.m. April 19 in the Little Theater on campus. The general public is invited.

Contest entries may be delivered in person to Coolen's office in Room 119 on campus, or they may be mailed in, addressed to Linda Coolen, Creative Writing Contest, Cooke County College, 1525 W. California, Gainesville, TX 76240.

Entries also may be submitted in person to any member of the CCC Communication and Fine Arts Division faculty.

Winning entries in both categories for all four divisions of competition will be given cash awards of \$30, and cash prizes of lesser amounts also will be given to second and third place winners in two divisions. Special certificates of recognition will be awarded as well.

People entering the competition may submit only one entry in each category - poetry and short story. Poetry entries are limited to no more than 100 lines. Short stories must not exceed 3,500 words. "Good taste" in both language and subject matter is required; entries must be typed and double spaced.

Special information sheets containing other format requirements and entry procedures are available in Coolen's office on campus, or contestants may request that one be mailed to them.

Senator Bentsen bill assures equity for rural hospitals

Washington, D.C. - Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, introduced legislation on Jan. 31 designed to correct an inequity in Medicare reimbursement that threatens the survival of rural hospitals.

Bentsen was joined by Senate Republican Leader Robert Dole in offering the Equity for Rural Hospitals Act of 1989.

"The bill provides urgently needed short-term relief for the escalating problems faced by rural hospitals and long-term structural reforms as well," Bentsen said in remarks accompanying his legislation.

"In 1988, 43 rural hospitals closed across the United States, 19 of those in my home state of Texas. Hospital administrators surveyed recently by Touche Ross suggest that as many as 600 hospitals could close their doors in the next five years."

Bentsen said inequities in Medicare's prospective payment system (PPS), which was in-

augurated in 1984, are a big part of the problem. Under PPS, reimbursements to hospitals are no longer based on individual costs but on a system of average costs. In 1987, half the rural hospitals in the U.S. lost money on their Medicare patients.

Because rural hospitals have historically incurred lower average costs than city hospitals, their Medicare payment rates are currently 12-13 percent lower than the payments received by their urban counterparts.

Under the Bentsen bill a new uniform reimbursement will be phased in, beginning in 1991, to insure equity for rural hospitals. During the interim, Medicare will guarantee that rural hospitals with large numbers of elderly patients and 100 beds or less receive reimbursement for their full costs.

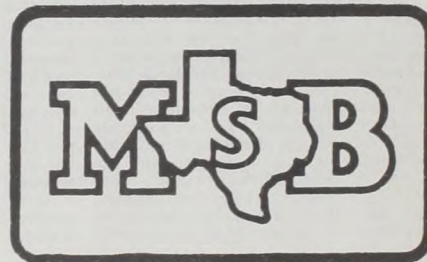
The Bentsen bill also creates a special review board to look into complaints by "border" hospitals - located near cities - that they are unfairly treated by Medicare; increases funding for the new "tran-

sition grant" program which helps rural hospital administrators improve services; expands a demonstration program under which teaching hospitals are encouraged to send resident physicians to rural areas for training; and adds new demonstration programs which encourage students to enter the nursing profession.

"Rural hospitals are the cornerstones of health care delivery systems in their communities. Without them, people residing in small, often isolated areas can be denied vital health care services. This is particularly true for older Americans enrolled in Medicare. The elderly comprise 12 percent of the nation's populations as a whole, but 25 percent of the population of rural areas," Bentsen said.

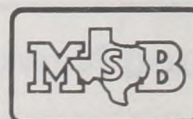
"I encourage my colleagues to join in supporting this effort to give rural hospitals a new lease on life by assuring them of equity under Medicare," Senator Bentsen said.

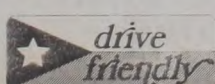

the Moving Wall ...

A moving experience

More than 5,000 people visited the Moving Wall, a half-scale replica of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial located in Washington, D.C., during its stay in Pilot Point for a week.

More than 58,000 names scaled the wall, some of local casualties. Several Muenster residents traveled to Pilot Point to find names on the wall. Among those listed were Glenn Fleitman of Muenster, a casualty of Vietnam, and Stanley Seavers, a graduate of Subiaco Academy who was killed in Vietnam, but still remembered by several of his classmates who live in this area.

People were able to find the name of their loved ones in a directory, which listed rank, service,

hometown and various other information about the serviceman. They were directed to the panel number and line number and were easily able to locate the names.

Another very interesting part of the visit was a Vietnam photo display set up in a building on a square, and a Vietnam Awareness Exhibit that displayed more than 2,000 items on the war's legacy, including letters from missing soldiers or prisoners of war.

Of particular interest were two displays, one of a Catholic priest, Father Vincent Capodanno, who was killed while administering the last rites to soldiers on the battle field. "No matter how fierce the battle, Father Capodanno was there with the Marines, and he

never carried the weapon," a story read.

A second major display was that of Captain Donald Cook, who died on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception in 1967 while still in captivity. He was captured after only one month in Vietnam. A fellow prisoner of war was released in February of 1967, and was able to smuggle out a letter from Capt. Cook to his wife and four children along with a rosary the captain had made by tying knots in a small piece of string attached to a piece of bamboo shaped into a cross. "Death does not disturb me because I believe I am near to salvation," Capt. Cook wrote in that last letter. "I am very close to God and have been comforted."

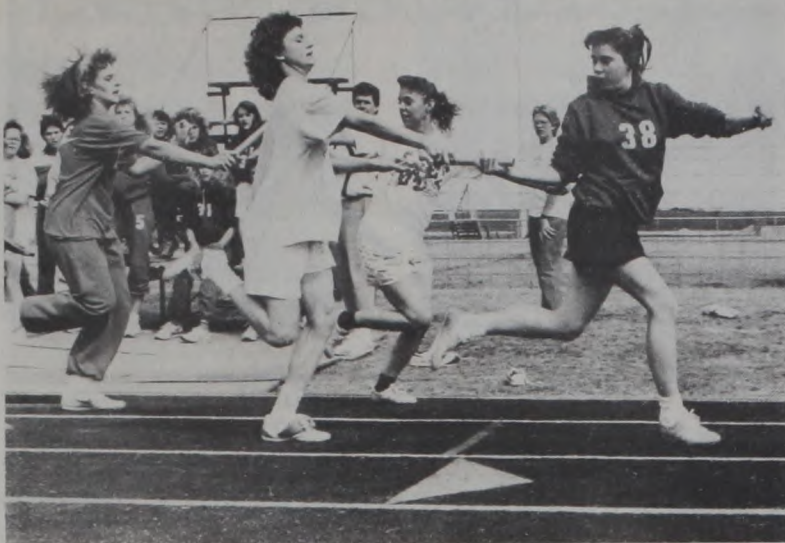

1st high individual trophy; Buck Moseley, 2nd individual and Marvin Jones.

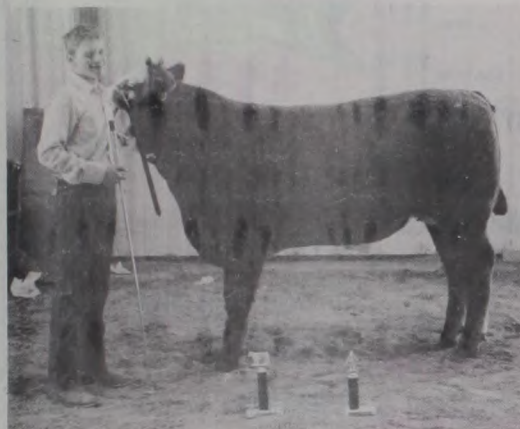
Billy Covington, Vernon Forrester, Toby Yann and Dee Bell were the No. 2 senior team placing third.

Expansion: how many?

As cattlemen begin rebuilding herds this year, the question comes to mind — just how large a cattle herd can we have and maintain profitable prices?

Since 1975, or during the past 14 years, we have been liquidating cattle herds 11 of those years. As U.S. consumer demand for beef spiraled downward like a wounded duck, cattlemen had no other alternative than to cut beef supplies back to levels where they equated with consumer beef demand at profitable prices.

In 1986 cattle prices began to improve, after U.S. cattle and calves numbers had dropped to 105.5 million head and cow numbers had declined to 44.8 million head. By 1987, U.S. cattle and calves inventories had been reduced to 102 million head, with cow numbers at 44.3 million head.

In 1987 this figure, beef supplied per person, had dropped to 73.4 pounds. Also, in 1987 cattle and calf prices rose to profitable levels for the first time since 1979.

One must remember, however, these were years of herd liquidation when beef production per cow was at its highest level. In 1986 the U.S. cattle industry plus beef imports supplied 78.4 pounds of beef (retail weight equivalent) per person in the U.S.

The cattle industry, at least, must maintain a stabilized demand for beef. Then it should supply something less than 78.4 pounds of beef per person per year, say 74-75 pounds, to expect cattle prices at profitable levels. Presently, this would only require a U.S. cattle and calf herd of 103-104 million head and about 44-45 million cows.

U.S. cattle and calves inventories are not much below those levels now. Jan. 1, inventories were 99.5 million head, with 43.9 million cows.

In the past, once the expansion phase gets in full swing it has been easy to increase cattle and calves inventories by 2 or 3 million head. If that rate of expansion is attained, we would have too many cattle by the beginning of 1991, given a stable demand for U.S. beef.

To increase U.S. cattle herds beyond 104 million head without wrecking the market, the beef industry must increase the demand for U.S. beef, either domestically or internationally. With an aging U.S. population (the older we get the less we eat), expanding the demand for U.S. beef internationally might be the best strategy.

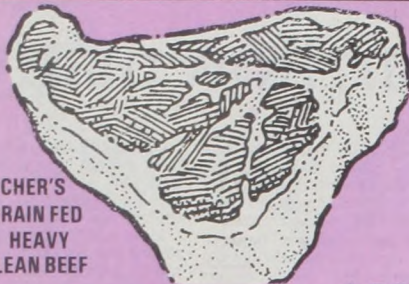
