Bike Rally enjoys growth

Co-chairmen of the Eighth Annual Metric Century Bicycle Rally, Susan Apple and Judy Tompkins of the Bluebonnet Extension Homemakers, said Tuesday that 1,611 riders have pre-registered.

If the present rate continues, compared with last year, they expect 2,000 registrations by Friday and 3,000 by Sunday.

Those Germanfest guests who have not witnessed the take-off at 11 a.m. Saturday, or the sight of wave after wave of bicycle riders cresting a hill south of town, will surely find this a most memorable event.

Growth of the Bike Rally, from its beginning of scarcely 150 riders to the present more than 3,000 has been spectacular.

Registration Sunday will be at the Community Center.

Sag Wagons, rest stops, aid stations with assistance from Muenster Volunteer Fire Department, medical facilities, Cooke County EMS and a Bicycle Rally Party and two free gate passes to Germanfest for riders at end of rally are all features of the bike rider.

Proceeds will be used to benefit several charities, several county organizations, youth scholarships, families in need, senior citizens, and community projects.

The Bluebonnet Extension Homemakers Club has extended special thanks to Coca Cola Bottling Co., Cooke County Distributing, Richardson Bike Mart, Quaker Oats Co. and Dole Co. for their assistance.

Volksmarch features special appeal

The Centennial Germanfest Volksmarch holds special appeal for obvious reasons, not the least is earning an official Centennial Volksmarch patch.

However, because interested walkers frequently have great demand on their time during Germanfest weekend, the sponsoring Kiwanis Club has opened the 10 kilometer course for Muenster walkers only. It may be walked anytime this week, but walkers must receive their start cards from Ben Bindel at the D1 One Stop on Hwy. 82. The start cards must be returned to him at the same place for AVA-IVV credit or medal.

Participation in Volksmarch, whose trail is well marked, is a quite pleasant experience, an opportunity to view the countryside, chat with friends, greet or meet new friends, wave to neighbors and become re-acquainted with others who may not have met for a long time ago.

Ben Bindel and Kiwanis sponsors repeat that many more walkers are needed.

J. Shane Wimmer on Academic All-State

The Texas Association of Basketball Coaches announced their All-State Academic teams at their annual banquet this weekend and Muenster senior J. Shane Wimmer was elected to the elite 10-member squad.

Ten boys and girls are selected from each classification.

"It's pretty select company on these teams," said Coach Heers. "You just about have to be a valedictorian or salutatorian, and then have made All-Region or All-State. Other than Mr. and Miss Basketball, this is the premier TABC award."

Of the 10 winners in Class A, Wimmer had the highest GPA, and second highest SAT score. Seven of the players were All-Staters, while all 10 had received All-Region recognition.

Wimmer is currently trying for a third consecutive trip to the state golf tournament. He is strongly considering attending Texas Tech this fall, where he'd join Muenster's All-State Academic selection from last year, Brian Hess.



Muenster hosts Centennial Germanfest

Muenster's Centennial Germanfest, to be unveiled this weekend, has "the best lineup we've ever had," says longtime entertainment chairman Monica Hess.

And indeed there is something for everyone, from children on up, and from local residents to faraway visitors. In keeping with the community's 100th anniversary, a special puppet show for the children, telling the history of Muenster in an entertaining way, will be featured in the Kinder Theater on the southeast area of the Muenster City Park, where the festivities are held.

With the construction of tennis courts taking place, part of the park area will not be available for activities, causing some rearrangements of booths, according to booth chairman David Fette. Arts and crafts this year will be displayed under four separate tents at the southwestern edge of the park, rather than in one large tent, as they were last year. The main tent will feature food booths only, except for Tops & Teams T-shirts. Chamber headquarters, selling Centennial souvenirs, and the information booth will be set up near the main entrance gate.

From among the 36 booths, visitors can sample all sorts of food from German sausage to Mexican fajitas, snack on funnel cakes, cinnamon rolls, stredel, snow cones, pretzels, beef jerky, shishkabobs, or gourmet cookies

and candy, to name a few of the culinary choices.

The gate admission had to be hiked to \$4 this year in order to cover the costs of added entertainment, security personnel, maintenance and liability insurance, Fette said. "The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission required the Germanfest committee to get its own liquor license and liability insurance this year. We must adhere to the beer rules and only two cups can be purchased at one time. There will be no more buckets of beer sold. And, of course, IDs will be necessary at the ticket sales and serving areas," he said. "This is in the interest of safety for the general public and, in order to honor the liability restrictions, we have to do these things. We also are trying to make the event more family-oriented."

The carnival rides, always a popular attraction for teenagers and others, will be nicer, as well as a better value, Fette added.

Entertainment acts will follow Muenster's slogan, "Where Texas Hospitality and German Customs Meet," presenting a mixture of the two. Ethnic groups primarily perform in the pavilion, while a country-western flavor will prevail on the Texas Stage.

A "German-style" beard contest, set for 4 p.m. Sunday on the Texas Stage, will be featured this year, marking the Centennial observance. "These should be

Police Chief Tompkins:

Don't tempt thieves!

"Basically, we are ready for Germanfest," Police Chief Helen Tompkins said Monday. "We have upgraded security to a fine-tuned service for the festival. We have experienced police dispatchers on duty full-time, to handle all police calls, requests for information, calls to City Hall, etc. from 10 a.m. Saturday and as long as needed on Sunday."

The dispatcher will handle any other calls, such as "lost child," or "arrest pick-up at the gate requests" from Germanfest security personnel. The dispatcher will function as a "central" connection for anyone needing help of any kind.

However, Chief Tompkins, warned: "Put your bicycles, four-wheelers, boats, trailers, lawn mowers, children's toys, large flower planters, etc. out of sight. Don't offer potential thieves a temptation to steal."

"Most importantly," she added, "Parents! Please don't let your children go to Germanfest unsupervised, day or night! And please don't let them walk home alone or even in groups late at night."

"We've been comparatively lucky so far. But don't let that lull you into complacency. The possibility of danger always lurks nearby, and occurs so suddenly, without a moment's warning."

Run expected to surpass '88

As countdown for Germanfest nears, Ronnie Hess, co-chairman with Dan Hamric of the Knights of Columbus-sponsored German Fun Run, said Monday that pre-registrations are coming in at about the same rate as last year.

With prospects of ideal weather, total registrations are expected to surpass the 1988, three-thousand, one-hundred, seventy-five registered before the start of the race Sunday.

Ag Tour '89 set for May

Sponsored by the Gainesville Area Chamber of Commerce and its Agriculture Committee, Cooke County College Agriculture Department, the Valley View Young Farmers Chapter and T U Electric, the 1989 Agriculture Tour will be held on Tuesday, May 2.

The schedule as announced through their brochure is as follows: Beginning at 1 p.m. the tour will depart from the Gainesville Area Chamber of

Commerce building and visit at 1:15 the Kupper Brothers Dairy in Valley View, ranked in the top 3 percent in production in the state. In 1988 the Kupper Dairy won the Master Dairyman Award, one of only two given per year in Texas.

The Brewer Family Miniature Horse Farm will be next on the tour, at 2:15 p.m. Starting in 1981, the operation has grown from six mares to 175 horses, whose heights is no more than 34 inches. The farm has shown seven National Guard Champions among their winners.

At 3:15 the group will tour the Kenneth Rivoire Sheep Farm, a showplace now that was once a run down farm house and old dairy barn in need of repair. The Rivoires in 1960 started with six head of sheep; were running 100 within two years and in 1973 held the first registered suffolk dispersal sale in Texas.

At 4:10 p.m. the group will depart for Agriculture Demonstration Plots that are set up as practical research plots for evaluation. The Cooke County Crops Committee includes: Clinton Bayer, Wm. Hermes, Gary Fetsch, Jerry Hudspeth, Henry Popp, Doug Robison, Frank Sandmann, Greg Selby, Albert Zimmerer, and Rudy Zimmerer. The plots this year compare

various oat varieties, barley, triticale, and rye, and eight wheat varieties.

The tour will depart for Lindsay City Park at 4:40 and supper will

"It Came As A Vision"...

Historical novel on seven German colonies sold at museum

John Hartman, a grandson of Emil Flusche, has written a book on the six Flusche brothers and the seven German Catholic colonies that they founded. The book will be sold at the Muenster Museum during Germanfest. The author will be at the museum to talk about the book to anyone who is interested.

The book is called "It Came As A Vision," and is the culmination of many years of research by the author. John Hartman first became interested in the story of the Flusche brothers 12 years ago. At that time, he was sent a copy of the "Autobiography of Emil Flusche," from Emil's daughter, Sister Lambertine Flusche. This autobiography served as a

guideline to enable the author to uncover a wealth of information about the Flusche brothers. The author traveled to the home of the Flusche brothers in Wamge, Ger-

many to gather background information for the book. He also visited each of the colonies started by the brothers to research parish records and interview residents.

"It Came As A Vision" begins in Attendorf, Germany with the early life of Stephen Flusche, the father of the six Flusche brothers. The story reveals the reasons behind their immigration to America and how the brothers' lives and destinies were intertwined by their colonization efforts. The story traces the lives and activities of the brothers from Germany and across the Midwest United States and ends with the death of the last brother in 1930.

"It Came As A Vision" is 160 pages in length and contains 12 pen and ink drawings of the scenes of the story done by Jean Hartman, the author's aunt. The book also contains 30 photographs that include the Flusche home in Wamge, Germany and the steamship "Hermann" on which the brothers traveled to America in 1872.

John Hartman is a Doctor of Naturopathic Medicine and works as a natural health consultant in Houston, Texas. His wife, Michelle, works as a nurse midwife for Baylor College of Medicine. John and Michelle have

three children and are expecting a fourth in July.

In researching this book, the author became especially interested in the type of frontier medicine practiced by Carl and Anton Flusche. Both of these brothers had been trained in botanical medicine in Warrendorf, Germany. Mr. Hartman has a copy of a handwritten formulary of herbal remedies written by Anton Flusche, the founder of Lindsay, Texas. The Germans were almost wholly responsible for the natural healing doctors of 19th century America.

"It Came As A Vision" may be ordered by writing to John Hartman at 5547 Huisache Street in Bellaire, Texas 77401. The book cost is \$7.95 plus \$8.00 postage. For any books sold at the Muenster Museum, the author is donating 10 percent of the book cost to the museum.

Muensters Siedler kamen aus Handorf

AB. Münster. Paris/Texas ist nun eine fiktive Filmgeschichte - die Kombination Münster/Dallas hat Chancen, mit handfestem Leben erfüllt zu werden. Oberbürgermeister Dr. Jörg Twenhöfen flatterte nämlich in diesen Tagen eine Einladung in die Stadt der texanischen Oligarchen auf den Tisch. Schuld daran hat das kleine aber feine Städtchen Münster, 60 Kilometer nördlich von Dallas gelegen. Der winzige Unterschied in der Schreibweise zur Westfalenmetropole liegt lediglich daran, daß die Amerikaner sich einfach nicht an den Umlaut gewöhnen können. Denn des texanischen Münsters "roots", seine Wurzeln also, haben eine ganze Menge mit dem westfälischen Münster zu tun. Waren doch die ersten Siedler des heute so prosperierenden Ölstädtchens die Brüder Theodor und Joseph Wiesmann aus Handorf. Und das war am 1. November 1889. Münster/Texas feiert in diesem Jahr somit sein Hundertjähriges.

Die Feierlichkeiten der traditionspflegenden Muensteraner schwappen selbst bis in die texanische Hauptstadt über. Der "German Day", alljährlich begangen im Rahmen einer großen Wirtschaftsmesse, ist dieses Jahr zum speziellen "Muenster Day" (15. Oktober) erkoren worden. Eingeläutet wird er am 14. Oktober mit der Gala "German Pioneers Ball" im Kempinski Hotel in Dallas. Neben dem OB erreichte auch den muensterschen Fabrikanten Joachim Korth und dessen Ehefrau Maria eine Einladung nach Dallas. Korth war es, der rührig Münster/Muenster-Kontakte knüpfte, in muensterschen Archiven Bilder und Dokumente aufstöberte, die den texanischen Namenbrüdern von Interesse waren. Das Ehepaar Korth tritt allemal im Oktober die Reise über den großen Teich an. Der OB zögert noch mit seiner Zusage. Denn vor "Celebrating 100 Years Muenster" mit "Gemütlichkeit" liegt immerhin die Kommunalwahl.

Good news from Münster!

Last week, the Centennial Committee received a copy of the **Münstersche Zeitung** from our special friend, Joachim Korth in Münster/Westfalia, with the following article highlighted:

Translated, it states:
A Little Town In Texas Is 100 Years Old: Invitation To Oberbürgermeister Muenster Settlers Come From Handorf

Today a letter fluttered onto the desk of Oberbürgermeister Dr. Jörg Twenhöfen from the Texas oil barons. Behind the letter is the little but fine town of Münster, Texas, located 60 kilometers north of Dallas. (The small difference between Münster/Westfalia and Muenster, Texas is only the umlaut.) Münster and Muenster are closely related because the first settlers of Muenster, Texas were Joseph and Theodore Wiesmann, who arrived in Texas on Nov. 1, 1889 from Handorf.

Muenster, Texas celebrates its 100-year Jubilee this year. On Oct. 15, the traditional German Day at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas has been designated "Muenster Day!" On Oct. 14, the church bells ring in the gala German Pioneer Ball at the Kempinski Hotel in Dallas.

In addition to the Oberbürgermeister, the manufacturer Joachim Korth and his wife, Maria, also received an invitation to Dallas and Muenster. It was he (Korth) who lovingly instigated and made the contacts, sending to Muenster pictures and books and documents for inclusion in the library.

Herr and Frau Korth will certainly make the trip across the big waters. The Oberbürgermeister is uncertain of his plans because of local elections in Westfalia.

Lindsay ISD and City make Sixth St. one way

The Lindsay School District has approved an agreement with the city that Sixth Street become a one-way designated street while school is in session beginning with the 1989-1990 school year.

The street, which runs between the elementary school and kindergarten buildings, will be designated one-way going east between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. for greater safety, officials said.

Trustees, in their regular April meeting last week, accepted the resignation of high school English teacher Jean Arendt, who wishes to spend more time with her family. The board hired Craig Hertel as her replacement. Hertel, who graduated with high honors from Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, has been a teacher in Vernon for the past five years. He brings with him extensive experience in University In-

terscholastic preparation and competition. He has been a director of the one-act play competition in UIL also.

In other business, the board:

- Changed the meeting time for future board meetings from 7:30 to 8 p.m. because of the change to daylight savings time.
- Set May 8 as the date to canvass election returns from the May 6 school board election.
- Approved a contract with the region 11 service center for media services for the school for 1989-1990.
- Set the 1989-1990 school calendar providing for 174 days. Make-up days will be April 14 and 21.
- The All-Awards Banquet has been set for 7 p.m. on May 7 at the school cafeteria.

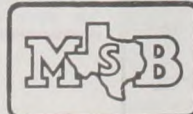

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Police hope television will help investigation

Law enforcement officials are hoping Hollywood may help them in providing new leads in a case of four brutal slayings, believed to be connected, that occurred a year ago in North Central Texas and Arkansas.

John Joseph, a coordinator of the NBC weekly broadcast, "Unsolved Mysteries," featuring actor Robert Stack, visited with Cooke County sheriff's authorities in Gainesville this past week. Joseph will travel on to Collin County and Arkansas to meet with law enforcement officials there to complete paperwork and film arrangements, officials said.

The program deals with the reenactment of unsolved crimes throughout the nation. Filming could begin as early as next month in Gainesville. The show will probably air next fall, possibly in September or October, officials said.

"All the departments involved in the investigation sent in a formal request that this case be featured," said Cooke County Sheriff John Aston. "Maybe there's something that somebody's heard or seen who doesn't live around Gainesville, but just hasn't reported it," said Cooke County Investigator Kent McKee. "Any kind of a clue would be helpful."

A series of four brutal murders that occurred over a two-day period in March 1988, the first beginning near Gainesville, are believed to be linked because of witness descriptions and items found in stolen vehicles that have been recovered, officials said.

Deana Andrews Woodard, 23,

of Gainesville was found dead by her husband on March 7, 1988, in her mobile home in a wooded area of northern Cooke County. Her one-year-old son was found in the trailer unharmed. Woodard's vehicle was stolen.

Later that same day, Cecil Floyd Morrison, 85, and his son, Cecil Leonard Morrison, 65, were fatally shot at their rural Farmersville home.

A truck belonging to the younger Morrison was taken and driven 200 miles to the Saratoga community, Hope, in Hempstead County, Ark., where Kenneth Olden, 34, was shot three times and killed on March 8, 1988.

Olden's body was found about a half mile from his home after his girlfriend said he had offered a ride to two men matching the descriptions of those seen in Gainesville, officials said.

Morrison's pickup was recovered in southwestern Arkansas. A prescription of Woodard's car was found in the vehicle. Olden's car was found in a lake near Marietta, Okla. Woodard's vehicle has never been recovered.

Despite hundreds of leads and the arrest of two suspects, who were later both released, authorities are still looking for help from the public in solving the crimes, said Cooke County Investigator Kent McKee. Officials believe both the suspects are believed to be white males between the ages of 17 and 20.

"It's not every day you have an opportunity to have national attention," he said. "We want everybody to see this because someone might know something that will help us."

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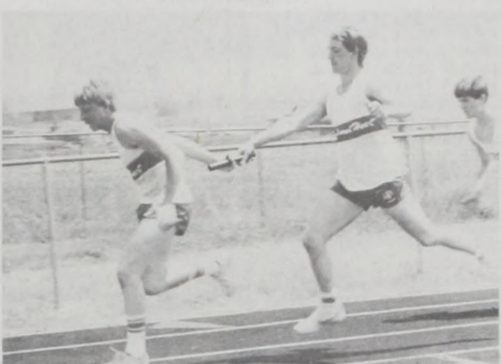

Threshing machine is added to antique club

Old farm days came alive again recently on the Rad Ware ranch near Woodbine as members of the Cooke County Antique Farm Machinery Club found another prize to add to their store of treasures from the past to be shown during this year's annual show in August.

Untouched from its resting place in an old barn for the past 50 years, members spent a Sunday afternoon pulling an old Advanced Rumley wooden threshing machine out and putting it on a truck. It will now be restored as closely to its original condition as possible, down to the parts, belts and wood, members said.

Ware remembers when his father, Pat, used to harvest crops with the machine on what was once one of the largest spreads in Cooke County. Both Ware's father and grandfather were born in the old log cabin, now sitting empty atop a hill on the ranch. The Ware spread once took in some 3,000 acres, which included some of the original stake for what is now Lake Kiowa. Ware was named after an uncle, Rad

Ware, for whom the school in that small community is also named.

"Dad used to do the threshing, and he pulled it with a little steam engine," Ware remembers. "We also had an old cook shack that is now deteriorated that I used to play in when I was a kid."

The threshing machine has been on the Ware ranch since the early 1900s. Ware was born in 1919, and remembers it being a part of the place ever since he can remember.

The old machine has spurred Ware's interest in farm antiques, and he's visited several shows in search of an old Romley steam tractor that his father also once used. "He cut up a Romley during World War II for scrap metal," Ware said. "All that's left is the cab. That really broke my heart."

There's lots of work to do in acquiring the parts and getting the machine in top running condition. Antique club members, however, expect the machine to be ready for the show at the end of August. The show, which will be in its fourth year, has become one of the top antique farm machinery shows in Texas and Oklahoma.

May 5 is date for wheat and small grain tour

Small grains are currently heading and many observations concerning diseases, growth habits, and other cultural factors are becoming evident in small grains over the county. A Wheat and Small Grain Tour will be held Friday, May 5, in the county to observe various varieties and their reactions to this year's growing

season.
The tour will begin at 9 a.m. at the Wheat Variety Plots located on the Jerry Hudspeth Farm one mile east of Valley View on FM 922. The second stop will be at 10:30 at the Wheat Variety Plots located on the Richard Schumacher Farm at Highway 1630 and the Hood Road intersection. The third stop will be at

11:30 at the J. H. Bayer & Sons Wheat, Oat, Rye, and Barley Plots located next to the Cooke County Electric Co-op on Highway 82 at Muenster. A lunch will follow the Muenster stop. This year we have seen very definite Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus showing up in certain varieties and the freeze damage will be severe in some varieties.

Extension agronomist, entomologist, and other specialists will be on hand to answer and

discuss various questions and problems. Producers in the county are invited and urged to attend.

County Agent's Report

Gardening season is just around the corner, and with it the need for early preparation against insect pests that are sure to be around.

First, gardeners should inspect insecticides left over from last year to determine if they are still good. If properly stored, most products should have at least a two-year shelf life once they begin to be used. Dusts sometimes have a tendency to absorb moisture if the bag is not sealed tightly after each use; they should not be used if lumpy.

Place bags containing insecticides in a clear, polyethylene bag and seal it with a rubber band to keep moisture out.

If dusts are two years old or older and there is any doubt about their storage, dispose of them according to label directions and buy new insecticides.

Although liquid materials are not as likely to absorb moisture, storage is still important. Caps should be resealed tightly on the product after each use. Do not use liquids which are cloudy or milky in color or which have sediments on the bottom of the container.

Do not store pesticides on a shelf in front of a window, especially if the window gets strong afternoon sun. Do not store liquids in an area subjected to extreme temperature fluctuations. Extremes from summer to winter temperatures may not hurt the active ingredient in the insecticide, but it may damage the ability of the product to mix properly in water.

If the liquid materials are at least two years old and have not been stored properly, monitor vegetables closely after spraying to determine if the pesticides are controlling insects.

It's important to anticipate pesticides that will be needed for the crops to be grown. Select insecticides by considering the plants and the period for insect control before repeating the application. This also will affect time from application until a safe time for harvesting.

Finally, know exactly what is being sprayed on plants and the amount. Don't jeopardize plants by spraying first and then checking for possible plant damage.

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Memorandum signed for Texas-Egypt trade

(WASHINGTON, D.C.) -- "States have long played an important role in international marketing, and as the state of Texas is doing today, are recognizing the advantages of entering into their own formal bilateral trade agreements with foreign countries," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said here, signing a "Memorandum of Understanding" that creates the Texas-Egypt Exchange.

"From sponsoring their own trade missions to attending international trade shows, and from hosting delegations of foreign buyers to developing export promotional programs, states are becoming more aggressive in identifying new international marketing opportunities for their farmers, ranchers and small food businesses."

Hightower made the comments at the Egyptian Embassy here, during a brief ceremony with Abdel Raouf El-Reedy, Egyptian ambassador to the United States, and Dr. Abdel Azeem El-Gazzar, Egyptian agriculture consul to the United States.

"Egypt is an important agricultural market for Texas," Hightower said, noting that with a population of over 50 million, Egypt now has about six million acres in cultivated crop production and must import close to 50 percent of its food supply.

"During the last six years, the Texas Department of Agriculture has aggressively pursued new markets for

Texas agricultural products in Egypt," Hightower said. "The largest single international livestock sale ever assisted by TDA, in 1987, involved a \$24 million agreement by Gore's Dairy of Comanche to sell 12,000 head of top-quality Texas dairy cattle and appropriate dairy production technology to the Al Helal Group of Egypt.

TDA's International Marketing staff has also helped find new markets in Egypt for Texas-grown and Texas-processed picante sauce, honey, peanuts, non-alcoholic beer and citrus juices. More recently, TDA has worked with a Texas rancher and an Egyptian importer on the pending purchase of 160 Texas Angora goats and breeding technology valued at nearly \$200,000.

"Through aggressive, comprehensive international marketing, Texas will prove itself as a 'world player' on the international market, not just one of the 50 United States," Hightower said. "More importantly, fulfilling more of our export potential will create hundreds of small and medium-sized enterprises that will bring new wealth, good jobs and a positive balance to the Texas economy."

Wheat prices continue to rise on international front

International prices for wheat and coarse grains continue to rise, reflecting tighter supplies and strong import demands, according to Food Outlook, a publication of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.

In late January, prices were at the highest level since 1982 and some 35 percent higher than a year ago.

FOA's estimate of world output in 1988 has been raised by 9 million tons, to 1,743 million tons. Nevertheless, global production in 1988 remains 3 percent lower than the previous year's poor crop and some 110 million tons below consumption.

World cereal stocks are expected to fall by 28 percent in 1988-89, to 287 million tons. This would

represent only 16 percent of trend consumption in 1989-90, the lowest level since the world food crisis of the early 1970s.

World cereal output needs to increase by 12 percent in 1989 to restore consumption to trend and rebuild stocks to minimum levels necessary to safeguard global food security. Although it is too early for even a preliminary forecast of harvest outcome, early indications suggest this increase will not be realized and good weather is needed in major growing areas to avert further deterioration of world food security.

Of particular concern is the uncertain outlook for the winter wheat crop in the U.S.
