## Taxpayers begin fundraising for fees

Members of the Cooke County Taxpayers Association have begun fundraising efforts to pay for future legal fees, but stopped short of making a commitment to file a lawsuit against the Cooke County Commissioners Court until they have a chance to confer with an attorney.

CCTA members met in a special meeting last Friday. They were organizers of a petition drive requesting a county rollback election that has been denied on a 4-1 vote by the commissioners court.

Owen Fulton, a member of the Denton Taxpayers Association, told CCTA members what they'd be facing should they decide to file suit against Cooke County. The DCTA was successful in reversing a decision by the Denton County Commissioners that resulted in a rollback vote last month. Should they decide to file suit, the CCTA plans to work with Denton Attorney Bill Trantham, who was successful in fighting the Denton County suit for the Denton taxpayers group, said Virgil Welch, CCTA president.

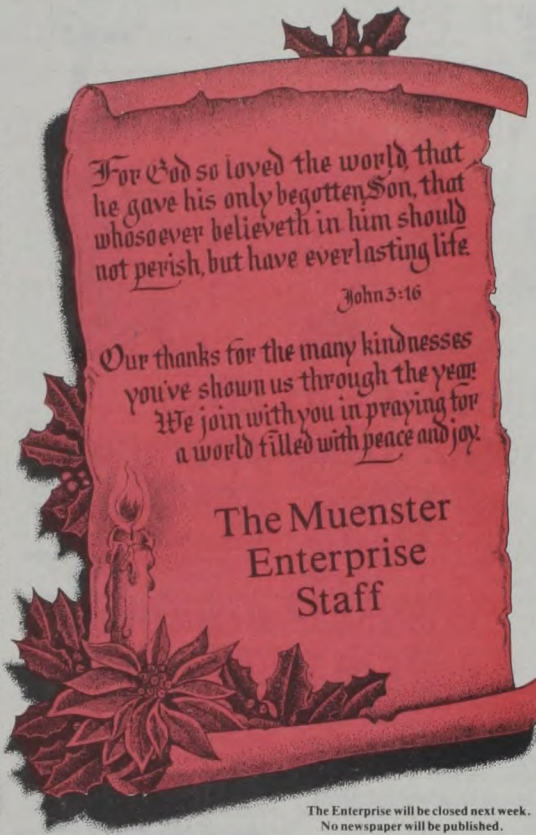
"As you know, it was a long, drawn-out affair between Denton County and the Denton County Taxpayers," said Fulton, who said the case took almost three years to resolve.

He told the group that their case could very well go to the Texas Supreme Court, as did Denton County's case, because there are still many provisions of the state's property tax code which governs rollback petitions that have never been tested in court.

Since the 8-1 Supreme Court decision in the Denton County taxpayers' favor, legislation has been enacted to clarify further the provision of the code referring to the collection of signatures on petitions, he said.

Cooke County commissioners rejected petitions requesting a rollback election last week after an attorney told them that, in his opinion, supplemental petitions submitted by organizers were invalid. CCTA members claim they were forced to submit supplemental petitions by mail because the courthouse was closed for four consecutive days during the Thanksgiving holidays. The tax assessor-collector told the commissioners the original petitions, submitted Nov. 22, did not contain the 1,640 valid signatures of registered voters required to call the election.

Should legal action be pursued, there would be several areas that would be checked on the initial petitions, said Welch. Among Please See TAXPAYERS, Pg. 2

## Chamber spearheads industry recruitment

Last year's adoption of tax abatement guidelines by the city merely touched the surface of what some residents want done to attract new industries to the area.

An ad hoc committee of the Chamber of Commerce's Industrial Board met three times this week -- revealing the enthusiasm and desire of the group to promote Muenster, yet somewhat of an uncertainty in how to begin.

"Whether it works for Valenite, what we've got to do is start attracting industry, or at least working toward that, year-round, and succeeding," city manager Joe Fenton said Tuesday night.

Charles Bayer, Chamber president, earlier this month sent a letter about the city to Gene Pelzel, a manager for GTE Valenite Corp. Valenite, with two branches in Muenster, is consolidating its Texas operations, Pelzel confirmed Wednesday.

The committee, composed of about 15 members, met Wednesday evening and divided into sub-committees: land, utilities and statistics.

Samples of information needed for any type of package presentation were shown in a handout distributed Tuesday: type of government, local services, population, housing, medical

facilities, education, labor, transportation and pipelines.

Craig Throckmorton of Private Database Systems, a new industrial recruitment service, spoke to the group Tuesday.

"In Arkansas, Kansas, Nebraska you see a great deal of industry going into small communities. And the interest is there," Throckmorton said. "The hardest job is just getting industry attention. Industrial prospects, if they would come here, would be really surprised by what they see."

"The smaller the community, the more importance that is placed on cooperation and consensus."

On Monday, the school board for Muenster Independent School District adopted tax abatement guidelines that mirror those of the city. These are: minimum commitment of an industry requesting an abatement be a cash outlay of \$500,000. The total commitment of the industry was set to be \$1,000,000 with the industry getting credit of \$30,000 for each employee that is added or retained.

The city of Muenster was the first taxing entity in Cooke County to adopt tax abatement guidelines. Fenton and several others agreed that these guidelines are more liberal than those established later by the county.

## Dry weather sparks area grass fires

Six Cooke and Montague county fire departments battled unseasonable cold, windy, dry weather last Friday afternoon in an attempt to keep a raging grass fire under control.

The fire started along the county road north of the Meador Hay Meadow, burning approximately 120 acres of grassland and a number of large round hay bales. The fire departments prevented the flames from reaching a hay barn and equipment located on the Meador pasture.

High winds and tall dry grass along the old MKT railroad allowed the blaze to jump over the Copper Switch road in several places, burning an undetermined amount of acreage on the old Ed Wolf farm, with fire reaching the yard

of the Charlie Wolf home.

The extreme cold hampered fire fighting efforts: though departments' equipment remained operational, local ranchers' sprayers froze. Wet sacks used by volunteers and neighbors would freeze between fighting one hot spot to another.

"Insulated fire suits helped tremendously in battling the cold," said Muenster Chief Herbie Knabe.

An unknown amount of water was used, with Muenster's truck estimated spraying around 5,000 gallons of water. "We loaded from a pond on the farm three times," Knabe said.

Sunday morning the Muenster Fire Department responded to a small grass fire at the Oscar

Walter farm east of town. The blaze, caused by burning trash, was quickly extinguished.

Monday afternoon Myra's Volunteer Fire Department answered a fire call at Ron Page's, south of Myra. An aerosol can exploded in a burning trash barrel, starting a grass fire. No one was at home at the time and high winds spread the fire to 157 big round hay bales, all of which were lost.

"They (Myra department) were here quickly," Page said, "but it was too late."

Volunteers prevented the flames from spreading by lighting back fires around the blazing hay.

"As long as it doesn't rain and the low humidity and wind continue, everything is crispy dry," Knabe warned.

## City will not tax goods

The Muenster City Council voted unanimously Wednesday evening to follow the lead of the state of Texas in exempting "freepoint goods" from taxation.

Texas voters recently passed a constitutional amendment (Proposition 5) that exempts from taxation all goods acquired in Texas or imported into the state and subsequently shipped out within 175 days of acquisition or import.

However, the amendment permits individual taxing entities to tax these goods if their governing bodies so choose.

Council members agreed that

they want to encourage, not discourage, industry to locate in Muenster.

In other action:

- the council accepted the high bid from Hartman and Son to lease the farm property north of Muenster, now owned by the city and intended to be a future landfill site. Terms are \$15.90 per acre for three years, eight months.

- Muenster will tax motorcycles, campers, boats, recreational vehicles, etc. beginning Jan. 1.

- set the next council meeting for 7:30 p.m. Jan. 8.

## Mishap leads to help for woman

Somebody's Guardian Angel was working overtime Wednesday morning, either Tony Grewing's or an elderly lady's in Marysville.

On exemption from a test dur-

ing finals at Sacred Heart High School, Tony Grewing, accompanied by Mike Reiter, was driving toward Marysville looking for deer when they had a flat tire on their vehicle. Having no jack in the pickup, they started walking to find a house with a telephone.

After walking a mile and a half on a very cold morning, and passing several unoccupied houses, they came to a home that seemed lived-in.

A knock on the door brought this response: "I can't come to the door. I fell and am hurt. Please go around to the back, punch in the screen and unlatch the door. Then come in and help me."

Upon entering they found Mrs. J.R. Moon lying on her living room floor. She told them she wasn't sure when she fell, except that she missed attending a gathering with friends Tuesday, and that she had been on the cold floor all night.

Her phone rang several times,

she said, but she was unable to crawl to the phone, or to stand up from her prone position, and no one came to check on her. So she remained on the floor all night, getting colder and colder.

Tony said: "Although she almost fell again after we picked her up, she declined help and just asked for a cup of hot coffee. We got a stove started to get heat back into the house, and told her we'd come back to bring a meal. She just wished us a Merry Christmas."

They returned later to SHHS. Tony alerted Principal Jack Murdock to the story, and went in to the classroom to take another final, this one in speech and drama. And he made an A+, he said.

"I feel they saved her life," Murdock said. "I'm afraid that lady would have frozen to death if she'd spent another night on the cold floor." The weather forecast

## A message to the community

from the pastor of Sacred Heart Church

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In response to many, many requests (verbal, written and phoned), for printed or taped copies of the homily presented by Father Victor Gillespie at the funeral of Travis Klement, the pastor of Sacred Heart Church has graciously submitted a copy of his statements reflecting his heartfelt thoughts at the funeral Mass for the young man. Travis Klement died at age 18, following a long struggle with leukemia.

Funeral of Travis Lee Klement, Dec. 13, 1989

There are those who will say that our prayers for Travis were not answered, that there was no miracle, that Travis is dead. May I submit to you that all three of those statements are false. Our prayers were answered. Though there was no miraculous cure for Travis, I truly believe that we have witnessed many other miracles in answer to our prayers, and that Travis still lives.

I saw a miracle last Sunday evening. We had gathered here for the conferral of the Sacrament of Confirmation on 34 of our young people, and we made the first public announcement of Travis's death earlier that afternoon. And numerous heads visibly bowed and tears welled in many eyes at this sad news. But we had just sung in the entrance hymn: "Jesus is life! Jesus is life!" And we knew in our hearts that Travis was not really dead, but that he was with Jesus, and Jesus is life.

"Pure coincidence, Father," some may say. But there were too many coincidences last Sunday evening as we continued the liturgy of Confirmation and sang hymns that were meant for us, but they must have also been meant for Travis, for Robert and Gloria, their other children and the grandparents. Let me try to illustrate by tying together some of the words we sang Sunday evening with what I believe were miracles of grace.

I saw in Baylor Hospital the miracle of a Mother's love for her critically ill son, a Mother's love which would not permit her to sleep for more than a few minutes at a time. But we sang these words, and surely these same thoughts came to Gloria in the dark of night: "Be still, be still, and know that I am your God. Be still, be still, and know that I am with you." And to her son, we sang in God's name: "Before you were born, Travis, I knew you; within your mother's womb, I formed you ... By name I have called you, Travis, by name I will save you; by name you are Mine, you are precious to me ... forever, with you I will be."

I saw the miracle of a Father who must have felt so utterly helpless as he saw his son grow weaker and weaker. And so we sang for Robert: "Comfort, comfort my people; speak, speak to Robert's heart; speak tenderly, speak tenderly to him." And Robert's heart had spoken to us that day in the hospital of the immense gratitude that he felt for all who had helped them in this, their greatest time of need.

I saw the miracle of the tender love of Travis's brothers and sisters as they held his hand and talked to him hour after hour, though he was so ill that he could not respond. And we sang: "Lay your hands gently upon him; let your touch fill him with strength ... Lay your hands; gently, lay your hands."

I saw the miracle of friendship in the hospital that same day. I was waiting to catch the elevator down from the fourth floor where Travis was. The elevator doors opened and out stepped four high school seniors from here in Muenster. They were a bit taken aback, especially since, according to the time of day, they were supposed to be back here in the classroom. But they and their principal knew there are some things more important than being in class. And we sang last Sunday night of these four and many others: "In the Spirit they were baptized in one body ... They were called to witness to your faithfulness." And they did witness to the miracle of true friendship.

I saw the miracle of prayer spreading throughout this whole community as countless numbers of people prayed for Travis; for you, Robert and Gloria; for you, Scott and Melody; for you, Leslie, Shelley and Justin. We sang Sunday night, and we say now to you: "Seek the face of the Lord and long for him ... He will bring you His light and His peace ... He will bring you His joy and His hope ... He will bring you His care and His love."

I saw, or at least, heard of the miracle of the courage of Travis and the power of God when last Sunday afternoon, Travis's weakened heart would not stop beating until Scott had gotten there for their last meeting on this earth. And we sang: "Send the Spirit of counsel and courage. Send your Spirit, your Spirit of love," the love of one brother for another.

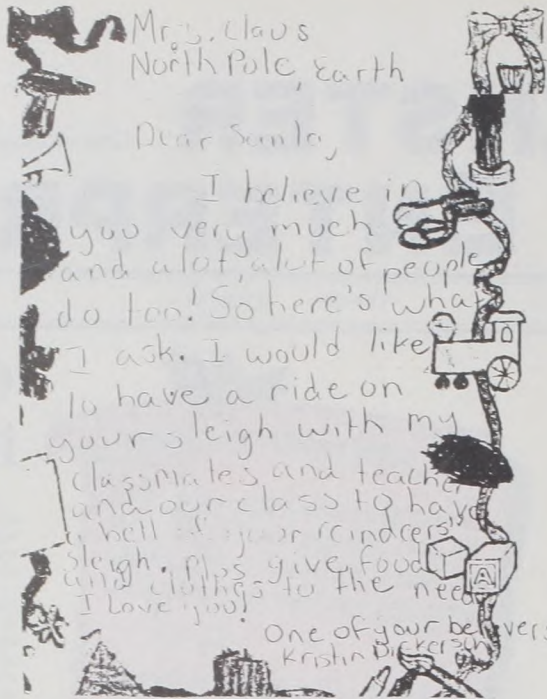
At the time of Antioch Weekend last March, I didn't see the miracle. But now I do. Now I see the miracle of the Prince of Peace acting in and through Travis. Being a rather quiet person, Travis didn't preach about loving everyone, no matter which school they went to. But he didn't need to preach, for he was friendly with all, and unfriendly with no one. I have here a poster that one group made last March to show what the Antioch Weekend meant to them. It's too small for you to see clearly, much less read it, so I will explain it. Across the top in large letters is "GOD UNITES." Over here on the left-hand side is the outline of a building, labeled "Muenster Public School." On the right side is another building, labeled "Sacred Heart School." And down here at the bottom are the stick figures of six students, linking hands across Seventh Street. They are just stick figures but, by the hair, one can tell that there are three girls and three guys. And the group said: "the one on the end, the one with the cowboy hat on, that's Travis." And last Sunday night, we sang at the presentation of gifts: "In the day of the Lord, we will put our hands together. Every tear will be wiped away. I believe it will come when we put our hands together. I believe that we can find the way."

There are two things I ask each one of you to do in memory of Travis. First, be detached from the glittering material things of this world. Now Travis would not have used those words; he might not have known what I was talking about. But Travis would say, as he did say to his parents, "I don't need a fancy, new pickup; just something that will get me there and back." This was such a good example of Travis who was happy with the simple things in life, things like God's good earth, fields of grain, bales of hay, newborn calves, and a good riding horse.

The second thing I ask of you to do in memory of Travis is much more difficult. I ask each of you to love and respect everyone in this community, no matter which school they choose. I beg you to root out of your lives all the anger, and, yes, the hatred that has divided this community for decades because of our school situation. Let us, like Travis, be friendly to all, and unfriendly to none. Let not a derogatory word about either school, or any teacher, or any parent, or any student ever sully our lips. I am speaking principally to you adults; remember that the students in that poster have already joined hands; you are the ones who have fed this cancer that has contaminated our community for years. But now, let us forgive one another; let us forget the past; let us be reconciled with one another; let us strive with all our might to bring peace and unity to this parish.

I believe we can find the way. Let us do what we sang last Sunday evening: "in the day of the Lord, we will put our hands together ... I believe it will come when we put our hands together. I believe we can find the way. I believe we can find the way." I believe that Travis wants us to find the way. I believe, by his suffering and death, he has started us on the way. I believe that he now wants to help us on the way. And to find that way to peace and unity in our community would be the greatest miracle of all, done in the memory of Travis Lee Klement.

## Lindsay City gives notice to cable company

The Lindsay City Council has directed its attorney to give 30 days notice to the Houston company that holds the city's cable franchise that it is proceeding with legal steps to be released from its contract.

The city has been complaining to officials of WGA Cable Co., located near Houston, about continual poor service to the city's approximately 120 customers. After meeting with officials last month, detailing the problems of alleged poor reception and requesting a written timeline of when corrections would be made, there has been little, if any progress, said Lindsay Mayor Don Metzler.

"We can't see the improvement at all, and we're tired of dealing with them," said Metzler. He said the city will proceed with legal steps to get released from the contract, and is awaiting a reply from the company.

The council, at its regular December meeting, turned down a zoning change requested by Frank Haverkamp. Haverkamp was requesting that a large lot on the east end of Main Street be divided into two smaller lots for building sites. The council unanimously turned down the request, stating that adjacent property owners were concerned that houses built on a divided site would not fit in with those houses already in that section of town.

The city's street paving project is proceeding. Cole and Smithen of Denison began work last week. The city is considering a change order, which would widen a section of Willow Street from a planned 20 feet to 30 feet. Officials will obtain cost estimates

## Cold dry air shocks vegetation, people

With the only precipitation for December being a trace of snow that wasn't even measurable, and only small amounts of rainfall since late spring, Muenster and surrounding areas are suffering from a lack of moisture.

According to area ranchers, this moisture shortage is creating problems. Ranchers are not keeping their calves to feed out on wheat pasture because there is not sufficient growth to feed them. Farmers and ranchers are worried about the lack of rainfall, coupled with recent freezing temperatures and the damage that could be done to grain crops.

Roger Taylor, owner of

Muenster Garden Center, likens the damage done to trees and plants during freezing temperatures with inadequate moisture to freezer burn.

"An ice cube left outside overnight during subfreezing temperatures will be gone by morning," Taylor said. "It evaporates. Cold temperatures cause moisture to evaporate more quickly and cause more damage."

Plants with adequate moisture can withstand much colder temperatures.

To prevent plant damage, people are urged to take advantage of times when temperatures are above freezing to water their plants and trees. All plants, even dormant ones, need water, Taylor said.

Evergreens and winter hardy

flowers such as pansies, daisies and snap dragons should be given more care to ensure enough moisture to survive on. Trees and shrubs that were planted this summer, as well as any planted this winter, should be provided with ample water. It takes about a full year for plants to take hold.

"In this part of the country roots continue to develop all winter long," he commented. "Many people may not be aware that they can continue to use underground water sprinkler systems year-round as long as they don't use them during sub-freezing weather."

Dry, itchy skin, dry nasal membranes and numerous shocks are among discomforts people are afflicted with during such cold, dry weather.

## Thief nabs coats at Valenite party

Suede and fur coats, valued at about \$1,000, were stolen Saturday night during a Christmas party at the SH Community Center for employees of GTE Valenite. Muenster Police Chief Helen Tompkins said the coats, which belonged to Gainesville residents, were taken between 5:45 p.m. and 12:30 a.m. from a coat rack near the front entrance of the building.

"That whole front area was well manned. We feel like it was a disgruntled employee," Tompkins said Tuesday.

Theft of that type is uncommon, she said, adding that police have neither leads nor a suspect in the crime.

Tompkins reported minor damage to Christmas lights on a residence as the only other recent criminal activity in Muenster.

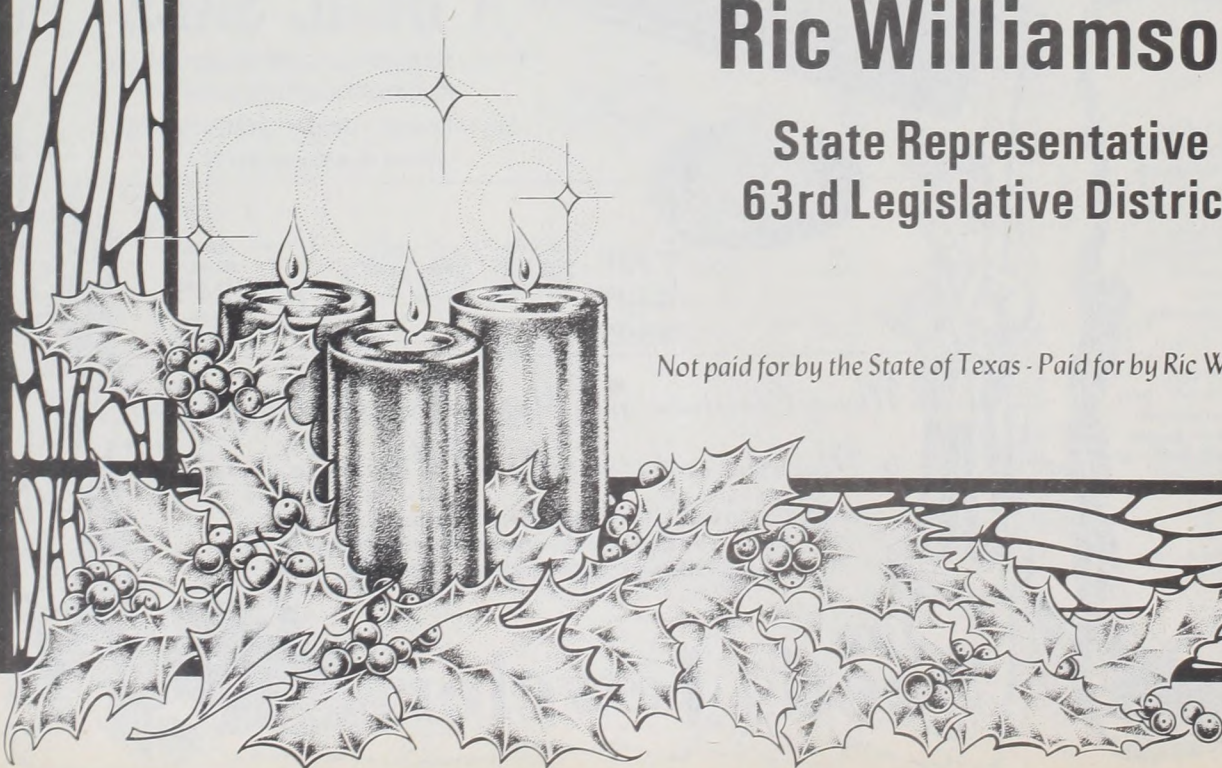

# Home Hospice sponsors grief seminar

Abraham Lincoln said, "In this sad world of ours, sorrow comes to all ... It comes with bitterest agony ... (Perfect) relief is not possible, except with time. You cannot now realize that you will ever feel better."

"And yet this is a mistake. You are sure to be happy again."

"To know this, which is certainly true, will make you feel less miserable now."

Home Hospice of Cooke County and its licensed professional counselor, Michelle Ann Rigler, have helped many through the grief process, in addition to the care given to terminally ill patients.

Locally, a number of families

have praise for Home Hospice and its trained professional personnel who aided in the care of the terminally ill.

Among the most recently ministered to was Leo Becker. Family members including Hilda Sicking said: "Home Hospice is great! Anyone who needs them should never hesitate to use them. They will help or send help in more ways than we ever imagined."

A follow-up to the care of terminally ill patients will be a series of programs offered by Home Hospice, a Grief Recovery Seminar, on Jan. 4, 11, 18, 25 and Feb. 1 and 8.

Aware that many people find it difficult to accept and cope with

the emotion of grief, personnel offering the Grief Recovery Seminar say that it is designed to be an educational and non-judgmental support group.

Rigler, social worker for Cooke County Home Hospice, will be facilitator of the seminar, which is inclusive of all forms of grief -- not just for someone who's lost a loved one to death, but also the very personal grief caused by job loss, divorce, child loss, etc.

Seminar participants will meet weekly. All sessions will be at Cooke County College's Little Theater, except Jan. 11 and Feb. 8 will be in room 806 of CCC.

The Grief Recovery Seminar is open to all in need of attaining a positive direction. It is free. Participants may pre-register by completing a form available at the Hospice office, 1001 E. Broadway, Gainesville. Forms have been distributed to area doctors' offices, pharmacies, library and hospitals.

Seminar topics include: Week one -- introductions, goals, purposes, guidelines and assignment tasks for the six weeks; normal

reaction to loss; film on grief reactions; and learning to keep a journal.

Week two -- Early vs. late grief; nature of loss; barriers to grieving; personal assets and liabilities for the future; problems associated with grieving; children and the grieving process; personal needs.

Week three -- Factors affecting personal coping mechanisms; the "unmentionable" losses; impact of suicide; film on widowhood; starting the "goodbye" process.

Week four -- Problems associated with denial, anger and guilt; changes in physical, emotional, psychological and spiritual perspectives due to loss; loss of faith; personal loss history profiles; film on denial; permission to grieve; permission to stop grieving.

Week five -- Long-term effects of grief, long-term recovery process; controlling depression; the positive side of loneliness; coping with anniversary dates and holidays; support groups.

Week six -- Pot luck supper; expositions by various local clergy; local program.

## Holiday travelers should keep safe motoring

Motorists planning to drive across rural stretches of Texas during the holidays should be on the lookout for one more traffic hazard - deer and occasionally cattle on the roadways foraging for winter food.

Traffic statistics kept by the Texas Department of Public Safety show that over the last four years animal-vehicle collisions have accounted for an average of 4,100 accidents and nearly a dozen deaths annually. In 1988, for example, nine people were killed and 901 people were injured in 3,891 accidents.

Most of these accidents occur in rural areas, and many involve deer and cattle, said Thomas D. Valco, a safety expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Drivers should be particularly vigilant this winter, he said, because drought conditions in many parts of Texas will attract deer and other animals to roadways in search of food.

Valco said some motorists who drive frequently in deer country have installed ultra-high frequency warning devices on their cars. Several of these gadgets are on the market; typically one is mounted on a bumper, and it emits a high-pitched signal caused by the force of air when the vehicle is in mo-

tion. The noise is supposed to frighten a deer as the vehicle approaches.

"They could be helpful for motorists driving at night or when fog reduces visibility," he said.

Extension Wildlife Specialist Charles Ramsey said motorists should not be lulled into a false sense of security by use of the ultrasonic "fright devices."

"The warning device will not be effective if a deer is hungry or a buck is interested in following the doe ahead of him," Ramsey said. "Winter is the mating season for deer."

Animal-vehicle accidents are not a high-percentage traffic risk; in 1988, for example, the nine people killed accounted for only 0.3 percent of all traffic fatalities. Even so, Valco said, many of these accidents may be prevented by taking some precautions.

He said that slowing down when approaching "Deer Crossing" signs along the highway is prudent defensive driving. "Deer also tend to travel in groups, so if you spot one, look about for others."

"If you see a deer on the road, don't try to drive around it because it might dodge in front of you," Valco said. "Blow your horn and flip your headlights from low to high beam."

## 1988 rabies overview detailed

Laboratory confirmed rabies in Public Health Region 5 (PHR5), consisting of 50 counties in the North Central Texas area, totaled 113 cases during 1988, an increase over the 79 cases reported in 1987. Skunks comprised 95 percent of the total, but of most interest was the increase in cat and dog rabies, detailed below.

During 1988 there were 11 cats and five dogs in PHR5 confirmed by laboratory examination to be rabid. This represents almost a two-fold increase for each of these species over the previous year. These cases occurred at residences in small urban localities and farms. Eight of the 11 rabid cats and one of the rabid dogs bit a total of 11 people including some veterinary personnel. As a consequence of the bites, exposure to saliva and direct contact with these rabid animals, 41 individuals received post-exposure rabies prophylaxis.

Whereas all of the five dogs were owned, two of the cats were strays and the remaining nine cats were characterized as barnyard cats. Six (55 percent) of the cats and three (60 percent) of the dogs were three months of age or younger. The remaining cats and dogs were described as adults.

None of the eligible animals were vaccinated against rabies except for one dog which had been vaccinated with Endurall-R, modified live rabies virus vaccine about 13 months prior to the onset of rabies. Nine (82 percent) of the cats and three (60 percent) of the dogs were females.

Three of the dog cases and three of the four cat cases had histories suggestive of exposure to possibly rabid skunks. The estimated period of incubation in dogs ranged from 11 to 35 days and in cats from 14 to 19 days. All monoclonal antibody identification of rabies virus isolates from dogs and cats in this region point to infection with rabies virus of skunk origin.

Although eight of the cats were involved in biting accidents of humans, there were, with one exception, no known attacks on other animals. Only two of the biting cats were described as ag-

gressive. Generally some behavioral changes were noted in the cats followed by weakness and paralysis of the hindquarters. One of the five dogs, a Doberman mix, was described as aggressive, attacking three family dogs and five neighbor's dogs. Subsequently, it scaled a six-foot cement wall and viciously attacked and killed a dog in an adjoining kennel of the veterinary clinic where it had been confined. The dog died shortly after the last attack.

Fortunately all of these cases were observed, veterinary assistance sought and suspicion of rabies confirmed. The persistence of rabies in our native wild skunks poses a continuous threat to small animals and livestock which live in the natural habitats of skunks. We cannot overemphasize the importance of responsible animal ownership, awareness and annual vaccination of dogs and cats by licensed veterinarians.

## County Agent's Report

Fruit growing in the home grounds provides an interesting hobby which can also be profitable. Although many of the fruits that the homeowner can grow are obtainable in the market, the quality of homegrown fruit, which is allowed to ripen on the tree, is by far of better quality. In addition, many fruiting plants are ornamental, particularly during spring bloom and add much enrichment to the landscape planting.

Many home gardens are small, and planting the garden to utilize the available space is of primary importance. Most gardeners have little choice in the location of the fruit tree planting. One of the first and primary considerations in choosing home fruit trees is to consider the demands of upkeep and care and to select the type of planting and number of plantings in accord with the time and interest for fruit tree production. All fruit tree plantings demand care, and neglected plantings will profit very little. A small planting that receives proper care will produce more desirable fruit than a large neglected planting.

All fruit trees must have sun and demand a sunny, open location. Most fruiting plants must go through a period of inactivity called the "rest period" which usually occurs due to cold temperatures in the winter. The length of rest or cold exposure varies with various fruit and accounts for the fact that one's choice of fruit tree must be adaptable to available winter cold in a given area.

The home gardener should also consider the time of ripening of the various fruit varieties. By including several different varieties that ripen at different times, the grower has a longer period of production.

Many homeowners are not prepared to spray for the control of insects and diseases on fruiting plants and for this reason should plant only those fruits that can be expected to produce a reasonable crop with a limited insect and disease control. Careful variety selection may ensure a disease resistant tree.

Some fruit trees will not bear unless the flowers are pollinated by another variety. Often times, pears, apples, and some grape and plum varieties require a second variety for pollination purposes. In selection the pollinator, one must find a variety that blooms at the same time as the one to be pollinated.

Varietal recommendations for the home fruit garden cannot be rigidly specific. Planting conditions may vary from place to place even within a short distance, and the cultural or growing practices often differ with homeowners. Variety selection will also depend to a large extent on individual and personal desires in a fruit variety. For example, a pear variety may make an excellent ornamental tree, yet have a poor quality fruit.

Winter is fruit tree planting time; these plants, which are purchased bare-root, are available at nurseries and should be selected for quality and by desired variety. The following are some recommended fruiting varieties for North and North Central Texas:

-Peaches: Springold, Bicentennial, Sentinel, Ranger, Harvest, Redglobe, Milam, Denman, Loring, Dixiland, Redskin, Jefferson, Surecrop, Belle of Georgia.

-Plums: Morris, Methley, Ozark Premier, Bruce, Allred.

-Apricots: Bryan, Hungarian, Moorpark.

-Pears: Orient, Moonglow, Kieffer, LeConte, Ayers, Garber, Maxine.

-Chinese Persimmon: Eureka, Hachiya.

-Figs: Texas Everbearing Celeste.

-Blackberries: Brazos, Womack, Roseborough, Brison, Cheyenne, Shawnee, Hull.

-Grapes: Hybrid, Vinifera, and American varieties.

-Strawberries: Sunrise, Cardinal, Allstar.

# Centennial celebrations claim attention all year long... YEAR IN REVIEW

January 1989 to December 1989

Highlighting news in December 1988 into January 1989 was the announcement that a peaceable joint agreement selected a site for the proposed new Red River Bridge south of Courtney, Oklahoma. In sharp contrast was the disappointing announcement that Muenster Memorial Hospital has discontinued obstetrical services. Joy of Centennial celebrations overshadows most other news.
