# Statement to Depositors In The Citizens National Bank

We wish to express our sincere appreciation of the cordial cooperation given us by an overwhelming majority of our depositors, and by many other friends who have helped us in this emergency in which we are trying to safeguard the interests of our customer and of our community.

We wish to point out, however, that all the work done during the past ten days is now menaced by the failure of refusal of a few depositors to agree to the plan of restricted withdrayals which has been devised by the Banking Department as a means of paving the way for resumption of business on a basis of stability and permanence. We do not question the integrity or the community spirit of these few depositors, who are acting according to their own judgment; but we do wish to point out, to them and to the public, that unless these depositors give us their cooperation it is extremely unlikely that the bank can be reopened.

Justice and equity would not permit us to have any preferred depositors, who could withdraw their finds in full on demand, while others waited until the terms of the restriction agreement can be met. If the bank is reopened, common fairness will require that all depositors be treated alike.

Our purpose in making this statement is to point to the fact that the future of this institution is in the hands of its friends, and the few depositors who have failed or refused to cooperate with us and with a vast majority of our customers have the responsibility for success or failure, either by helping us or refusing to do so.

We make this public appeal for assistance, therefore, believing that prompt action by the few depositors thus far not enrolled in the restriction plan will save a tremendous loss to Brownwood as well as to themselves. We have two alternatives—to reopen with all accounts restricted so that we may work out liquidation in an orderly way, or to go under receivership with its attendant sacrifice of our assets and heavy discounting of all our deposits. The choice is being made by a few depositors—and we hope they will choose the course leading to the protection of the interests of all concerned.
