The restriction on deposits has been fixed by the Federal Reserve Department as a condition for the resumption of business and an overwhelming majority of the bank's customers have assigned the agreement cards, indicating that which began last week.

Among the several out-of-town depositors of the bank who have agreed to the restricted withdrawal plan is the United States Bank of Detroit, which has real estate loans in Brownwood. A letter from W. W. Smith, president of the bank, to the examiner in charge of the National Bank, today said: "Detroit Bank's opinion is enclosing signed depositors' agreement in connection with the reopening of the Citizens National Bank. We wish you to effect today as requested by John H. French—confirmation of telegram attached. We trust it will be successful in reopening the bank; and we feel confident the depositors through such arrangement will realize much more than the bank put through the process of liquidation. Similar letters have come from a large out-of-town carrying accounts at the bank."

There are a few depositors who have not yet been seen, because of their absence from town, or for similar reasons, it was stated by the director of the bank this morning. A few who thus far have refused to agree to restricted withdrawal. 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JACK HALLORAN NAMED AS AID BY RUTH JUDD

PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 18.—Winnie Ruth Judd, condemned "tiger woman," threatened to commit suicide yesterday at the height of an hysterical court appearance in which she directly accused John J. (Happy Jack) Halloran of aiding her after the murder of Agnes Ann Lerol.

Goaded to angry tears by "tricky questions" of Halloran's counsel, the slight blonde convict screamed in exasperation, "I'm telling you God's truth—I'm telling you what I will write when I intend to commit suicide."

Her outburst interrupted a long ordeal on the witness stand at Halloran's preliminary hearing before Municipal Judge W. C. Miles on charges of aiding Mrs. Judd after the slaying of Mrs. Lerol. Mrs. Judd is under sentence to hang Feb. 17 for the murder.

Mrs. Judd lost her outward calm as her story progressed from the time she charged Halloran aided her on the night of Oct. 15, 1931, when Mrs. Lerol and Miss Hedvig Samuelson were shot to death.

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OPTOMETRISTS' STATE MEETING HERE IN APRIL

April 24 and 25 were set as the dates for the state convention of the Texas Optometric Association to be held in Brownwood by the executive committee meeting at Temple Sunday. The committee approved the selection of Brownwood as the convention city by the state convention last year.

Convention arrangements were put in charge of Dr. Mollie Armstrong and Dr. R. A. Ellis of Brownwood. Optometrists in this district, at Coleman, San Angelo, Abilene and other places, will assist Brownwood optometrists as hosts. All the convention committees will be announced by Dr. Nelson Greeman of San Antonio, state president, within a few days. The state executive committee will hold its meeting here Sunday night, April 23, preceding the convention.

Optometrists of district No. 14 will meet in Brownwood Sunday, April 22, in the regular monthly study and research session. Plans also will be made for the state convention at this meeting.

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INDIAN YOUTH SAVES CAPTORS

THEPAS, Man., Jan. 17.—An Indian youth who saved the lives of his injured captors and wrote another epic of bravery into the history of the far north lay in a hospital today awaiting trial on charges of robbery.

Admirers told him he probably would be rewarded with clemency, but he only grunted, turned his face to the wall and waited for "justice" from the white men whom he had befriended.

The Indian, Buster Whiteaway, suffered a broken ankle in an airplane crash in which the pilot, William A. Spence, was killed. His captor, Corporal B. Graves of the Northwest Mounted Police, was injured.

Whiteaway was the only one of five persons in the plane able to seek help. He could have crawled into the raging blizzard and escaped, finding friends among the Indian tribes of the far north. Instead, he crawled toward white men's settlements, found aid and sent it to the crash victims.

Corporal Graves captured Whiteaway last week and on Friday started to bring him back to civilization in Spence's airplane.

In the plane when it took off from Berens River were Spence, Graves, Whiteaway, W. L. Cooke, mechanic, and John Robinson, a prospector who acted as interpreter. Spence attempted to land the plane in a blizzard near Noose Lake. The ship turned over. The engine was driven back into the cockpit. Spence was killed instantly. All the passengers except Whiteaway were knocked unconscious. The Indian was thrown through the top of the plane and into a snowdrift.

He dragged himself out onto the lake seeking fishermen. He saw a sledge but could not make the occupants hear him. Off across the lake he heard a dog bark, dragged himself a long distance until he found a settlement. He told what had happened and sent aid to the injured men.

News of the wreck reached the Tps. Saturday. Officers and a doctor left by sledge and brought the injured men and Spence's body here. It was said all the injured would recover.

Through the interpreter, other police told Whiteaway tonight his bravery undoubtedly would be rewarded by clemency when his case comes to trial. The Indian made no comment. He had made his choice. What happened next didn't seem to matter.

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SENATE JAM ON BANKING BILL BROKEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The senate legislative jam over the Glass banking bill was broken today when an agreement was reached to limit debate voluntarily.

This action came after the cloture rule was rejected by a slight margin. A change of one vote would have clamped on the rule.

After a committee session today, devoted to study of the measure as passed by the house, influential members expressed a view it would not be reported favorably unless it is restricted and greatly simplified.

Even then, they added, a favorable report would be most uncertain.

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\$20,000 BONDS RELEASED FOR USE OF CITY

Announcement was made at city council meeting Tuesday night that the Comptroller of the Currency at Washington had agreed to release \$20,000 worth of United States bonds which were held in Dallas as security for city funds in the closed Citizens National Bank.

Milk Laboratory Equipment More than \$100 worth of equipment for a city laboratory in which to test milk has arrived and members of the council are making arrangements today for location and installation of the laboratory, possibly at city hall.

Council met this afternoon at 1 o'clock to pass a formal order for the sale of \$20,000 worth of bonds which were released to the city by the Comptroller of the Currency.
