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TV commercials tell us that a re-run of the "Roots" serial is scheduled soon, reminding our nation again of its inhuman treatment to black people during earlier periods of our history. A few months ago a similar program entitled "Holocaust" told the horrifying story of Hitler's Nazis in their attempt to exterminate German Jews.

Both programs point emphatically to a nation's violation of human rights, and both leave us wondering why the far more horrible story of Communist mass murder is not being revealed. Of all the chapters in global history, no other has been as cruel and barbarous and immense as the destruction of more than 100 million human beings by the evil force of Communism.

Writing in the current issue of Human Events, Todd Culbertson says that "The free world's abiding failure to depict communism's true face is willful blindness surely equalling the West's blindness to the Holocaust of four decades ago." The author refers to one nation after another and the continuing goal of each to destroy all potential opposition, a condition which helps to explain why the Reds have been very able to maintain themselves in power once they take over a country.

According to the late Sen. Thomas Dodd, Soviet Russia leads all the other Red countries in the record of infamy. He estimates some 35 to 45 million lives were liquidated, and specific examples of the terror included trials and executions of children, the government inspired famine of 1932, which killed five million persons, and Stalin's labor camps which sent 12 million to their deaths.

The same policies of mass murder prevailed wherever the Reds took over throughout Eastern Europe. Soviets machine gunned more than 5,000 unarmed Polish prisoners of war in the massacre of Katyn Forest. Likewise they were responsible for the slaughter of 15,000 persons at Warsaw and as many more in the Hungarian revolt of 1956. Also they executed or sent to slave camps more than 150,000 in Czechoslovakia, and liquidated more than 16,000 in Bulgaria, Rumania and Yugoslavia.

Furthermore, in the Baltic States of Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania during and after the Russian take-over of 1939. More than 1.2 million were liquidated or sent to slave camps. Throughout Eastern Europe the horror story applied. People who had been free, prosperous and proud were victims of executions and slave camps while surviving millions were reduced to fear and poverty.

As regards Red China, the estimate of communist-connected casualties runs as high as 64 million, according to Richard Walker of the Institute of International Studies of South Carolina. Some 30 million of those are believed to have perished in the Political Liquidation Campaigns of 1949-58. Reports of those outrages came out frequently but were consistently omitted or downplayed in the nation's media. The true stories of communist mass murder were kept out of general circulation because too many misguided or detente-minded people did not want to give up on the idea that the Peking rulers were honorable people deserving our cooperation.

The rest of Eastern Asia has been annihilated just like Eastern Europe. Under Ho Chi Minh some 700,000 have been killed or enslaved in North Vietnam. Also the expected reign of terror and blood bath following the war in South Vietnam developed as predicted. Some 30,000 who were dedicated to their homeland's survival were sought out and eliminated, after which the country was reduced to a shambles as a million were sent to concentration camps.

Cambodia Reds are perhaps the worst of the modern breed. They have eliminated some 2.5 million in a savage program of executions and enslavement.

Closer to home, in the neighboring island of Cuba, the Reds are said to hold 20,000 political prisoners while exporting their evilism to Africa and South America. They have led Angolan terrorists in murdering more than 70,000 women and children.

Tigers Will Test Saturday Night in Scrimmage at Era

Something different in Sacred Heart and Era football schedules this year is that they will meet just for practice even though they have a game booked later. The extra encounter developed when both teams came up without an opponent for the first scrimmage date and decided to solve their problems together.

The decision is a happy one for both. With each team anticipating a good season, the occasion looks like a mutual opportunity to get valuable experience. Era, the 7-B defending champ, is favored again in its district. Furthermore the team is traditionally potent regardless of what the prophets say.

Likewise, the Tigers were No. 2 in the TCIL state play-off and have notions of another big season, even though sports guessers set them back to No. 2 in the district.

More significant is the fact that the Tigers are determined and confident about the season while Coach Eddie Stock judges them as equal or better than last year. He describes them as heavier and stronger than before.

While not likely to be equal in breakaway speed, they will be better at the power plays for consistent short gains. Their weight will be greater in both the line and backfield, a combination of crashing runners behind a crashing line. And for variety there will be a pair of rangy ends to snare passes. Stock thinks the Tigers have fine balance and is eager to see them show it in the practice with Era.

Building Notes

Building activity in Muenster continues at a steady pace except that some of the jobs are being delayed while awaiting brick. Ten new homes and three commercial projects are currently under way.

The city hall is well advanced on an enlargement and improvement program that adds a combined council chamber and municipal courtroom and more space for the fire station and firemen's room, along with a complete new look in the front office, police department and jail; also more cooling and heating plus the exterior of brick topped by a Mansard roof.

Muenster Mill is working on a grain buying and storage operation on Cross Street less than two blocks from the grain elevator it has operated for many years. The complex will include four large and seven small storage bins with combined capacity of 120,000 bushels, also a grain dryer and a grain elevator. The new facility is expected to be finished in about six weeks. Storage at the present elevator will continue in use.

Another commercial structure is a car wash just east of the Dairy Inn. It will have four covered wash bays and one uncovered bay for trucks, and exterior will be brick walls and mansard roof to harmonize with the Dairy Inn. Progress is currently delayed by shortage of cement and bricks.

Newest of the new jobs are those of Dwayne Pagel, Dennis Hess and Dr. Bernard Luke, who are either doing foundation work or shaping the ground for it. Pagel, on Ash St. near Sixth will have three bedrooms two baths double garage, fireplace, brick veneer, heating and cooling. Hess, on FM 373 near Adam Wolf, will have similar specifications in different arrangement. Dr. Luke will build on the hilltop south of the corner of Ash and Eddy. His specs were not told.

Muenster Hornets will have their first test of the season Friday night when they take on the huskies of Boyd in scrimmages of both the varsity and junior varsity teams. Action will be on the Hornet field starting at 6 p.m. No charge will be made for admission, however fans are asked to bring soap and towels to provide for the season's shower needs.

City Gets \$1,858 Sales Tax Check

The City of Muenster has received a check for \$1,858.44 from the State Comptroller Bob Bullock as its rebate for city sales tax collected here through the period ending July 27, 1978.

The remittance raises total receipts to \$30,451.22 to date this year, a gain of 4 per cent over last year's total to the corresponding date. The figure then was \$29,118.

In a letter with the remittance, Bullock said that the cities of the state have netted a record of \$236.4 million to date this year, a 14.8 per cent increase over the previous fiscal year. Total of the current remittance is \$20.1 million to 903 Texas cities.

Bullock also pointed out that the big cities of the state are all enjoying substantial increases over last year. Houston to date has received \$49.3 million, up 18 per cent; Dallas received \$27.7 million, up 9 per cent; San Antonio received \$13.6 million, up 10 per cent; Fort Worth received 9.8 million, up 13 per cent.

Receipts to date by area cities and their percentages of increase are shown as follows. Gainesville, \$271,017, up 11%; Lindsay, \$23,229, up 11%; Nocona \$53,830, up 12%; Pilot Point \$16,163, up 17%; Saint Jo \$10,231, up 25%; Sanger \$14,441, up 23%; Whitesboro, \$38,057, up 24%.

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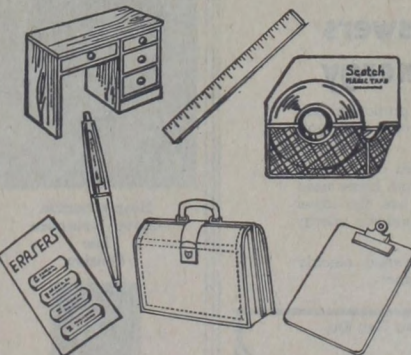
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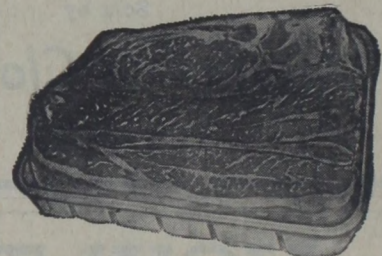
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Myron Hess Hosts Parents at Hill Country Preserve
