ANNOUNCEMENT OF PUBLIC HEARING

TOPIC: Discussion of the environmental assessment for installation of the remaining measures in the Trinity River Watershed (Authorized). These measures consist of 134 floodwater retarding structures, 3 multiple-purpose structures, 15.93 miles of channel modification work, 12 rock riprap grade stabilization structures and critical area treatment and, in addition, providing technical assistance for application of land treatment.

ARRANGEMENT FOR A PUBLIC HEARING:

For convenience of residents and interested persons, the hearing will be held at three locations on the indicated dates. The same material will be presented at each location and statements can be given at any one of these places. The exact location, date and time are as follows:

Table with 3 columns: Place, Date, Time. Includes County Court Room (First Floor), Navarro Co. Courthouse, City Council Meeting Room, District Court Room (Second Floor).

PURPOSE: The public is invited to participate in a hearing to discuss the environmental impacts for the installation of the remaining planned project measures and alternatives for these measures in the Trinity River watershed, authorized by the Flood Control Act of 1944.

Watershed work in the Trinity River watershed (Authorized) began with the preparation and approval for operations of the first plan in 1948. Since that date plans have been developed for 28 subwatersheds covering approximately 6,350,000 acres of the total 8,272,260 acres in the watershed. A total of 840 floodwater retarding structures, 5 multiple-purpose structures, 90.9 miles of channel work, grade stabilization structures, and critical area treatment have been applied within 27 of these subwatersheds. Accelerated technical assistance has been provided in the watershed for the application of effective land treatment on 4,762,600 acres of land. The remaining measures to be discussed at this hearing consist of 134 floodwater retarding structures, 3 multiple-purpose structures, 15.93 miles of channel work and 12 rock riprap grade stabilization structures remaining in 11 subwatersheds. Accelerated technical assistance is to be provided for application of land treatment measures on approximately 865,000 acres of privately owned lands and application of critical area treatment on 27,000 acres of land within the Trinity River watershed. The subwatershed plans were developed by the following sponsoring organizations:

Clear Creek Watershed Authority, Ellis County Levee Improvement District No. 2, Henderson County Levee Improvement District No. 3, Lake Creek Watershed Group, Wise County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, Pilot Grove Creek Improvement Association, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Technical assistance for watershed plan development was supplied by the USDA, Soil Conservation Service (SCS). This is a joint effort by the sponsors and the SCS. The purpose of the hearing is to provide the public information on the nature and extent of the remaining planned works to be installed and the environmental impacts and to solicit information and data pertinent to project action that needs to be incorporated in the environmental impact statement. Written and oral statements will be taken at the hearing or written statements can be sent to the SCS at the following address:

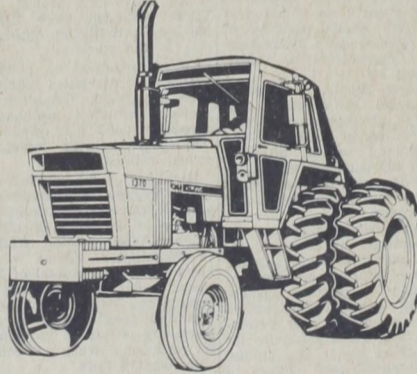

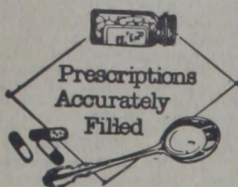

AMPI Head Blasts Administration On Dairy Imports "Ambassador Strauss needs only to look back to 1973-74 to find the dairy industry's choking point", Irvin Elkin, president of AMPI said today in addressing Associated Milk Producers Corporate Board, in session here for its regular monthly business meeting. "The 'Choking Point' was exceeded then, when millions of pounds of unneeded dairy products flooded the U. S. markets and broke farm milk prices. Referring to a report by Representative Richard Noland of Minnesota that Strauss had reported to several members of Congress that the U. S. trade negotiators will agree to increased dairy product imports in "trying to find the 'Choking Point' of U. S. dairy producers", Elkin stated that this willingness to sacrifice the U. S. dairy industry to the less efficient dairy producers of the European common market countries is irrational. "It is not rational to agree to such unfair terms when foreign government subsidies make it possible to ship U. S. produced grain 5,000 miles, feed it to cow-herds of 7 to 10 cows, manufacture it into cheese and ship the cheese back over the same route for distribution to U. S. consumers; while this kind of fast shuffle is going on, consumers in the common market countries are paying higher dairy product prices than are U. S. consumers, but U. S. dairy farmers are excluded from those more lucrative markets while being criticized as 'protectionists'. Further, dairy products dumped by those governments hold world dairy product prices at unrealistically low levels, foreclosing U. S. farmers from competition there". U. S. dairy programs have been designed to provide for "adequate supplies" of milk for the United States only, while several other governments sponsor dairy programs to generate dairy products for export. Elkins stated "If U. S. dairy interests are in fact traded off, farmers will be left with no alternative but to work for and insist upon government sponsored programs comparable to those of exporting nations". "We have an efficient dairy industry and we have a good marketing system. U. S. consumers will pay dearly if our traders give them away", Elkin said.
