There have been many theories advanced as the best method of holding Germany in control in future years. I for one am of the opinion that we had better consider ways of holding Japan. What we actually should do is reduce to a level consistent, with its state of savagery and treachery. Let 'en start all over again on their road to civilization. Perhaps this time their spiritual developm keep pace with their material progress. After all, what can one ex pect of a people that was pathet-ically primitive only two or three generations ago?

As regards our war in Europe we can derive some satisfaction from reports that humane standards are being observed. A current magazine reveals an incident that I heard but could not mention months ago. On a counter attack in Africa the Germans drove the Americans back so fast that a hospital could not be evacuated. Arriving, the Germans found that their wounded and the Yanks were receiving similar treatment, and carried on in the same manner.
