## MISD discusses upcoming year

Muenster school trustees discussed plans for the 1991-1992 school year during their regular April meeting.

The district expects to split both the first and second grade classes next fall due to the 22-to-1 student-teacher ratio requirements. The district received a waiver from the Texas Education Agency this year for the classes, said Superintendent Steve Cooper.

The sixth grade class will be moved back to the elementary to a self-contained classroom. "We feel like we can do a better job in helping the kids, particularly with reading and language arts," said Cooper.

On the wish list for next year will be plans to serve about six special education students in Muenster who are now being transported to Gainesville for classes. If the district is able to set up its own developmental program, two students from Era may also join the Muenster program, said Cooper.

The board looked at a tentative school calendar for 1991-1992. "We'd really like to have input from parents on this calendar," said Cooper. Since the state now allows school to start earlier,

students will head for the classroom on Aug. 19. That will allow the district to complete the first semester before the Christmas holidays. There are plans for a week-long spring break and a couple of days off at Easter, with classes ending about May 20.

Cooper updated the board on current equalization funding plans in the legislature. Muenster could be on the list of schools which may receive less state aid, forcing more pressure on local property taxes, officials said. "We're not expecting any gifts from Santa Claus," said Cooper. "I'm expecting that we may be one of the hardest hit districts in the county."

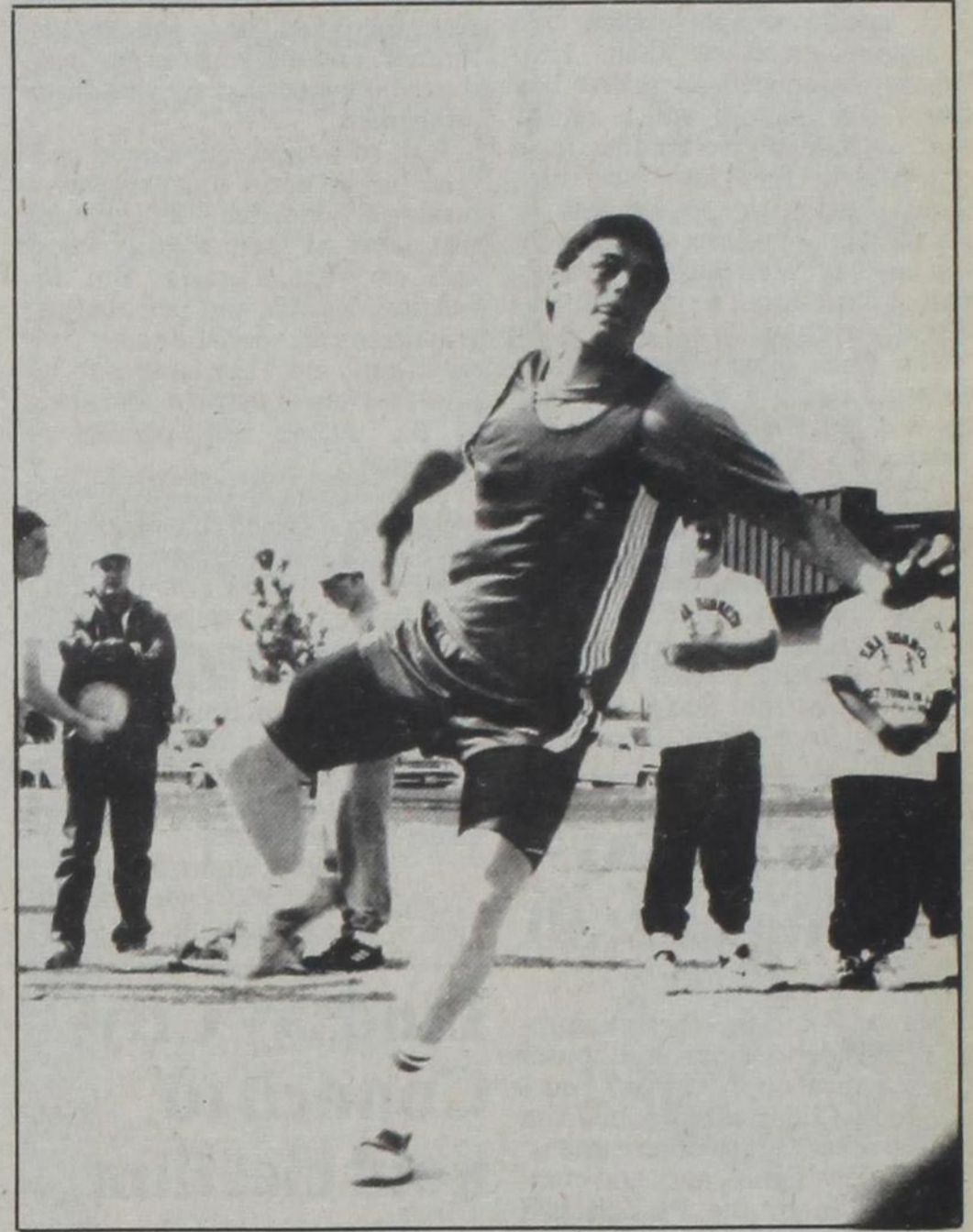
In other business the board: -Accepted the resignation of Tim Ratliff, girls' track coach, junior high basketball coach and assistant football coach.

-Accepted the resignations of second grade teacher Janie Weinzapfel and third grade teacher Carol Dyer. Mrs. Weinzapfel is retiring after 30 years of teaching, and Mrs. Dyer is retiring after 25 years of teaching.

-Approved repairing the roof on the woodshop. The work will probably be done during the summer.

-Reported that several board

## St. Mary's plan celebration with new Centennial Center

The St. Mary's Centennial Center could become a reality by September as the project officially began last week.

Groundbreaking and ground-blessing ceremonies were held last Monday to officially begin construction of a new \$300,000 family center at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Gainesville.

The new 11,000-square-foot facility, to be called the Centennial Center, is expected to be dedicated in September to coincide with the 100th anniversary of the parish school, St. Mary's Catholic School, located on North Weaver Street in the city.

On hand for the dedication were Gainesville Mayor Charles Woolfolk, Mayor Pro Tem Gordon B. Smith Jr. and several city council members. They joined a group of parishioners, many of whom are involved with the planning for the project.

"We thought it would be a fitting Centennial salute," said Father Nicholas Fuhrmann, St. Mary's pastor, who noted that the first sisters came to Gainesville in 1891 to establish a school at St. Mary's. "It'll be a benefit not only to our parish but to the city long into the next century."

### Parents are needed for committee

The impact of the infamous Senate Bill 1 legislation that was passed last Spring is "coming home to roost." This legislation requires schools to establish Academic Excellence objectives and Performance objectives in their Annual Goal Setting Activities. The state set guidelines for each of these areas. The Academic indicators are state generated statistics, the performance indicators are locally generated objectives that conform to state guidelines. These performance goals include the entire spectrum of schooling on each campus in the district. They are to be established with input from parents, community, students, teachers, and administrators. A committee is now being formed to begin work on this process. We are soliciting parent and community volunteers. If you are interested would you contact Steve Cooper, Jerry Metzler, or Gwen Trubebach at 759-2281. We have a minimum requirement of two parents and two community members. Please contact us. We need your input.

Mayor Woolfolk concurred. "I'd like to add the city's thanks and congratulations on this project," he said. "It's a real asset to the city to have a facility such as this."

Father Nicholas said that, by pursuing such an ambitious project at this time, the parish is showing an optimism for the future. "We want to show confidence that our parish can do this and confidence in the city of Gainesville," he said. "We're optimistic." He said the center will also go a long way in promoting the unity of the parish. "The parish that plays together and prays together stays together," he said.

The 125'x75' family center will be built southeast of the existing parish hall, sharing a common wall on the east side. The facility will include a high school regulation basketball court, two volleyball courts, a tennis court, three jogging or walking lanes, an exercise and weight room. An upstairs section of the center will include game rooms and meeting rooms. A rear entrance will tie into the existing school building with a corridor leading to the classrooms. The building will be 25 feet at its highest point.

The center will include an all-purpose urethane turf floor that will be installed to accommodate the different activities that will be involved with the center. The parish is also forming a centennial center ministry team that will oversee functions and supervision of the center.

The project will be paid for through a two-year parish fundraising effort. Since fundraising efforts began on Feb. 28, the parish has received pledges or funds totaling 42 percent of the cost, said Rev. Fuhrmann.

"Everyone is a symbolic owner of this building," he said. The fundraising effort involves parishioners donating to fund a certain amount of square feet. "We present everyone with the possibility of having an actual part of the center," Fuhrmann said.

The project began after 82 percent of parishioner voting said they supported construction of a family center. The parish then contracted with Owens Construction, owned by Henry "Red" Kuhn, to build the facility. Kuhn has estimated the cost at \$30 per square foot. Kuhn has also been the contractor for the junior high addition to the school, the parish hall and renovation of the rectory and church. The Diocesan Commission approved the plans on Feb. 21.

Soil tests have been completed and workers hope to start moving fill dirt into the area soon, said Kuhn.

## Preparations in final stages for Sacred Heart Relays on Saturday

Final preparations are being completed for the 5th Annual Sacred Heart Invitational Relays which will be held this Saturday at the Muenster track. This year's meet will be a two-divisional meet with a boys' division and a girls' division. "With most schools competing for their district championships in the next two weeks we

like the single boys' and girls' divisions to help prepare the small schools for their district meets," said Jon LeBrasseur. "We feel honored that many schools use our meet as a springboard for their district preparation."

The competition should be keen as over 60 boys' and girls' teams will be competing for the championship. "A majority of the schools competing come from the Class A ranks with a hand full of AA and a couple of AAA," said LeBrasseur. "There will be some of the state's top small school athletes in the field to push to some strong performances."

With almost 100 volunteers the meet is scheduled to gun off at 9:00 a.m. with the girls' 3200m, 1600m, and 800m runs and the run and the boys' field events. "We have a great group of

workers, who are experienced, which permits us to have one of the best meets in the state," said LeBrasseur. Final events are scheduled to start at 2:30.

"If conditions are good look for some new marks from this year's meet. Come out and spend an afternoon with the 1,000 athletes expected at this year's meet," said LeBrasseur. The Sacred Heart Alumni Association will provide concessions.

Girls' running preliminaries begin at 9:00 a.m. along with the boys' field events. At 11:00 the boys' running begins and the girls' field events. There will be no preliminaries in the 3200m, 1600m, and 800m runs and the 1600m relay. Finals are scheduled to begin at 2:30 p.m.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

Since my last letter to your paper I've had several people ask me how can we possibly pay off the national debt with no new taxes?

Of course, restraint in spending is a nifty answer and one needing more Dick Arme's to fulfill. But, deeper into the debate comes a simple primer in free enterprise economics. As a rule of thumb, for every 1 percent increase in federal taxes our economy experiences at least a 2 percent reduction in productivity (and less tax revenues!).

A good example: when our employees received their 1990 raises, they ended up taking less home than before which meant that we had to give another raise to offset the loss to new taxes...but to do so we had to reduce our workforce. Effectively the new tax rates caused our company to lose about 8 percent in national growth!

On the other hand, when federal taxes are reduced by that same 1 percent the economy experiences at least 2 percent in real growth. Why? Because when one gets to keep the fruit of their labor, they work harder, longer, and pay more taxes out of the increased income. That's how we raise more revenues everytime we reduce the tax rate itself!

I proposed that Social Security taxes be lowered by 2 percent.

Since this is a tax on almost everyone (except government employees) without exemptions and deductions, such a reduction would have a profound stimulative effect on our national economy while not affecting the stability of our archaic Social Security program.

And the politician's oft repeated lie about the rich getting the breaks if we reduce the capital gains tax! That is pure bunk and they know it. Over 75 percent of those who would benefit from such a decrease earn less than \$50,000 per year! Think of the new factories, new job opportunities, and markets for new products just because of that little adjustment!

But, of course, our liberal congress has no desire to create such a productive climate. I've concluded that most of them already know well of what I speak. But for political reasons and personal aggrandizement, special interest contributions, etc. they choose to ignore it. Hence, they are an enemy of the people they pretend to represent.

Isn't it amazing that this United States has survived the assaults by its elected representatives? Just think where we'd be if we didn't keep taking two steps back for every three forward...another testimony of the miraculous free enterprise system that is melting the iron curtain. While they are embracing it for dear life, we are over here trying to strangle it death with more taxes!

## Pharmacy Topics from Wal-Mart Pharmacy

Spices like cinnamon and cloves may increase the effect of insulin in the body and may lower heart disease risk, new research from the USDA in Beltsville, Maryland, suggests. In a test tube, foods with these spices seem to triple the hormone's ability to metabolize glucose.

Even infants may have migraine headaches, say researchers at the Arkansas Children's Hospital in Little Rock. Those with parents and siblings with migraine are most likely to get them. The most severe symptoms seem to respond to antidepressants and antihistamines.

Researchers in high-tech companies in Silicone Valley are designing new "delivery" systems for retinoic acid, the vitamin A derivative said to smooth away wrinkles. Microsponge version slows down the dose to minimize dryness, stinging and redness.

Dental procedures should be accompanied routinely by antibiotic coverage for people with abnormal heart valves or artificial joints, the American Journal of Medicine reports.

# County Agent's Report

**Use Grass Clippings for Compost**  
Summer rains in many areas should make lawn grass grow rapidly. That means mowing and more grass clippings.

Save those clippings and put them to use in a compost pile.

Besides being a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material and reduces the amount of landfill space needed.

The compost pile should be four to six feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.

A simple composting method is to alternate four to six inch layers of plant matter, such as leaves and grass, with two to four inches of good garden soil. Add manure to

the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per ten square feet.

The compost pile's top layer should be soil and should form a basin to hold water. Then water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer.

Water the pile thoroughly when completed. Add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy, since leaves decompose slowly if too dry.

Turn compost every three to four months to aerate the material and speed decomposition. Within six months to a year, it will be ready to use and you'll be glad you saved those grass clippings and leaves.

## Upper Elm-Red SWCD celebrates anniversary

The Upper Elm-Red Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD), covering all of Montague, Cooke and Grayson counties, is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. On March 20, 1941, Texas Secretary of State William J. Lawson certified the organization of the district.

SWCDs are political subdivisions of state government without authority to tax or take property for public use. Their purpose is to bring about a widespread understanding of the need for soil and water conservation and to inform the public that it is each person's responsibility to conserve soil, water and related natural resources. The creation of SWCDs was made possible by the passage of the State Soil Conservation Law in 1939.

A five-member board of directors governs the Upper Elm-Red SWCD. These officials, called district directors, must be actively engaged in farming or ranching. Their responsibility is to coordinate and administer the conservation activities within their district.

The district's primary land uses are rangeland, 665,000 acres; pastureland, 450,000 acres; cropland, 390,000 acres; recreation or wildland, 87,000 acres; and hayland, 80,000 acres.

Land users receive district technical assistance through the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) offices in Montague, Gainesville and Sherman. Eleven SCS employees and four district technicians provide to help on over 7,000 operating units within the SWCD boundaries.

One of the district's most noteworthy achievements is the large number of flood water retarding structures that have been constructed to help prevent flooding. To date, there are 352 structures in the three-county area with plans for additional structures as funding becomes available. This is thought to be the most structures in any one district in the United States. The SWCD, the Commissioners Court in each county and three separate watershed authorities are responsible for the annual operation and maintenance of the structures.

The Upper Elm-Red SWCD utilizes an active information program and sponsors an annual awards banquet to recognize the efforts of its outstanding conservationists. The 42nd annual awards banquet will be held May 9 at the Gainesville Civic Center.

## Texas farmers attend NFU Convention

The 89th anniversary convention of the National Farmers Union (NFU) was held in Philadelphia, March 3-6, 1991.

Delegates to the NFU convention called for both legislative and administrative changes to the 1990 farm law to improve farm income for the nation's family farmers. The convention urged that commodity loan rates be increased for wheat and feedgrains and the price support levels be improved for milk, cotton, rice and oilseeds.

The Farmers Union members are asking the new Secretary of Agriculture to use the authority given to him by the 1990 farm law

to improve farm prices. The farm organization is also asking Congress to amend the 1990 farm law to correct the inadequacies of that law.

National Farmers Union President Lee Swenson announced the farm group would continue to find ways to call attention to the deepening economic crisis in rural America. He promised the convention the organization would continue to pursue farm program improvements until the nation pays attention to the misdirected and mismanaged policies that are destroying rural America and family farm agriculture.

## News from USDA Cooke County

### Farm Program Signup

Signup for the Farm Program will go through April 26. Signup by appointment will be taken this year. Farmers should contact the SCS office at 665-4397 as soon as possible to schedule appointments.

All signature requirements, by all persons on the farm, on all documents needed to participate, must be in this office the 2nd Friday after the end of signup. Failure to do this will result in an invalid contract. If you want to withdraw from the program, you must do this by April 26.

If you do not have all of your crops planted, you should have an estimate of planting intentions. This will speed things up tremendously. You have to have as much of the basic knowledge of the programs as possible. We have sent out a previous newsletter and held meetings; we hope to have some examples and fact sheets. The County Agent has some, but limited information.

### Haying and Grazing of CU and ACR (layout, set-aside)

ACR and CU acres may be grazed or hayed except during the 5 month non-grazing and haying period from June 1 through October 31.

### Invisible or Ghost Acres

Basically what this means in our area is that if you have a small grain crop that fails for reasons beyond your control, you may plant the acreage back to grain sorghum (or other program crop). This grain sorghum will be considered invisible as far as other grain sorghum planted for program purposes on the farm. You will still be able to participate on your failed small grain. You need to make sure not to plant more "invisible" grain sorghum acreage than your permitted acreage of small grain. You will have to give the ACR requirement for the small grain. Invisible crops are not eligible for price support loans.

### 0/92 Provisions - Wheat and Feed Grain

Producers may devote all or a portion of the maximum payment acres to conserving uses and be eligible to receive deficiency payments on 92 percent of the maximum payment acreage. Deficiency payments made on this acreage will be guaranteed to be no less than the estimated total deficiency payment for 1991. For wheat, this is \$1.47/bu. and for grain sorghum \$1.00/cwt.

### Minimum Size and Width Requirements for ACR or CU for Payment

The minimum size is 5.0 acres and at least 66 feet wide. The exception to this is to give an entire field that is smaller than 5.0 acres and an area per farm may be designated smaller than 5.0 acres to complete the balance of the required ACR or CU.

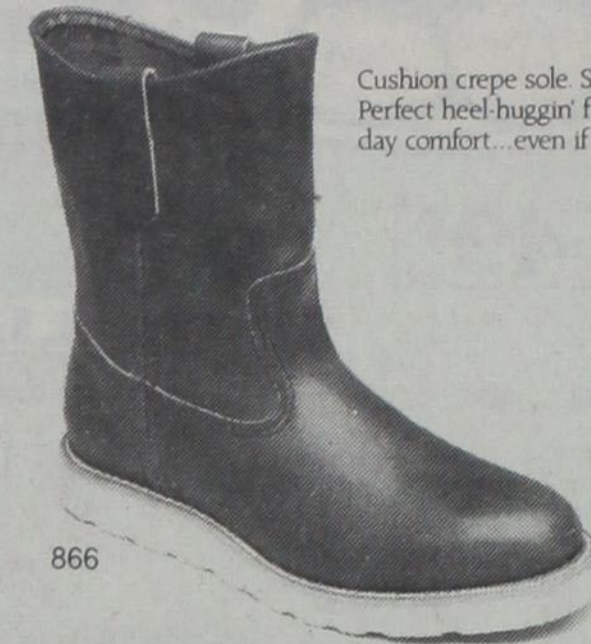

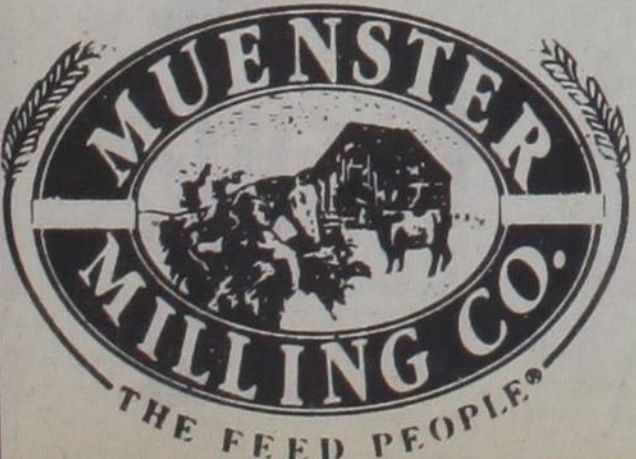
