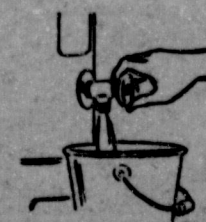

The nasty old habit of throwing light on the shady past of a candidate for federal office must be checked. That's the essence of a bill passed by the house of representatives providing specifically that any newspaper which publishes matter unfavorable to a candidate shall face dire consequences unless said article is signed by its author.

Sounds fair enough; very much like a measure of mutual protection to both press and candidate. Writers are less inclined to be careless in their statements when they have to assume full responsibility, consequently fewer men will be smeared and fewer publishers will have to face the wrath aroused by smears. Nevertheless the bill lends itself to smelly possibilities.

Unfavorable matter comes under two general classifications: Truth and falsehood. Existing libel laws already protect people against the latter, hence a new law to serve the same purpose is superfluous. Obviously then, the only additional protection the new bill can offer is that against

truth. A variety we don't especially care for.

It's easy to understand that a shy cub reporter or a minor employee in a department would hesitate to reveal irregularities that would bring down political wrath on his head, whereas he might say something if his identity could be withheld. A little man has little chance against the power of an organized machine. On the other hand the bill could be most helpful in tracing the origin of libelous statements.

The old story again. The honest man's weapon of defense can be the crook's instrument of aggression. A look at both sides leaves a person wondering which element would profit more by passage of the bill. Or does it? A second look reveals that truth, which should be free, is dangerously restrained by the measure whereas the check on falsehood is increased very little.
