# Muenster double-billed by CCTAD

The Cooke County Tax Appraisal District has completed the mailing of all tax statements.

Chief Appraiser Ross Fry notified the Muenster Enterprise Monday, saying: "We collect taxes for all areas except the City of Muenster and the Muenster Water District. City Hall in Muenster collects taxes for both those entities.

"However, an error in the billing from Cooke County has resulted in double billing to those property owners within the Muenster Water District, that is, within the jurisdiction of Muenster, because the Muenster office had already billed in this

"A new, corrected statement will be printed and mailed in the near future. Taxpayers in the Muenster Water District may wait for the new statements or, if they prefer, may go ahead and pay double-billed," said Ross Fry.

# Where were you on ...? What were you doing when ...?

These questions have been put to countless people on many occasions ... sometimes with great humor, sometimes in jest, sometimes in reference to a great historical event, sometimes relating to a traumatic family experience, and sometimes when one's thoughts just have a way of drifting off to the one most overpowering event of our lifetime, that was initiated by the bombing of Pearl Harbor by the Japanese.

With the approaching 50th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, memories of that day surface sharply for our nation, but most profoundly for the generation of young men already in military service, or facing the draft, and their loved

This week, here at home, wherever groups gathered, conversations turned solemnly to that Sunday morning.

"Where were you that morning?" "What were you doing?" "What were your first thoughts?" were questions said in greeting more times than "Good morning" or "Hello."

Some of the adults who replied to our query were too young at that time to have been affected, some were already in service, others were facing the draft. Here are several examples of the replies we received, each one resurrected from deep-seated memories, some painful and personal.

The last communication we had had with our brother, Ensign Robert J.H. Weinzapfel, was from Pearl Harbor. He was a Navy bomber pilot assigned to the Carrier Lexington at Pearl Harbor, Honolulu, Hawaii.

About three weeks later, we learned the Lexington had pulled out of Pearl Harbor very shortly before that "Day of Infamy" and Robert's plane had crashed in the ocean near Johnson Island on Dec. 9, 1941. It was almost six months before we received his personal belongings and his diary.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Juanita has graciously shared Robert's last entries in the diary on Dec. 7 and Dec. 8, 1941. Robert died in the crash at sea on Dec. 9. He was Muenster's first casualty of WWII, leaving a grieving family, many classmates and hundreds of friends.

At sea, Sunday, Dec. 7, 1941 AT WAR WITH JAPAN

"At 0900, the Lexington (Aircraft Carrier) received a radio message that there was an air raid by Japan on Pearl Harbor. At first everybody thought it was just a false alarm. At 0930 we got word that Manila was bombed a few minutes after Pearl Harbor. At 1000, word was received that a VP-12 plane sighted, bombed and sank enemy submarine one mile south of Pearl Harbor. Message at 1015 that two bombs dropped on Hawaii. Our married men aboard who have families there are worried. Within about 400 miles of Midway Island we turned back for Pearl Harbor. At 1100 - enemy aircraft carrier south of OAHU. VS-2 took off about 1000, but J. Smith, Haulke and I stayed aboard. 1210 - report unconfirmed. Two American warships sunk.

Sunday, Dec. 7, continued:

Reports are that Pearl Harbor has been badly damaged. Ensigns Kock and Wood couldn't find the ship and almost ran out of gas before they did find us. It was dark when they came in. The skipper and all of us were straining our eyes on the horizon hoping and praying they would get in. If they'd go down we would never go after them and they would be gonners. Our first day at war - exciting as hell. We are informed that we shall probably intercept the enemy tomorrow, and our orders are to destroy them. The planes that bombed Honolulu came from Japanese carriers. They certainly caught our army with their pants down. It didn't take this crew long to take the dummy bombs off our planes this morning and put real Please See PEARL, Page 3

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

Frank Felderhoff said, "I was at Sunday afternoon Vesper Services in Sacred Heart Church and, when services were over, several people said they had heard on the radio that Pearl Harbor had been bombed. Everyone was surprised and shocked to hear it. My brother, Lawrence and I were in the first big group drafted from Cooke County after the war started. There were 19 boys from Muenster in that group and we left on Feb. 2, 1942. Lawrence later lost his life in action on Luzon. I served overseas 37 months and 5 days in the European Theater.

Steve and I were coming to Muenster from Gainesville when we heard about the Pearl Harbor attack. It was just too horrible to believe. Of course, we thought of Steve's brother, Frank, who was already in service. Two years and two days later, he made the supreme sacrifice. Steve enlisted two months after Pearl Harbor (Feb. 2, 1942) and Tony enlisted several months later.

# **Grading policy** examined at Muenster High

MISD has scheduled staff inservice programs on Dec. 4 and 18 from 1:15 to 4:15 p.m. On these days, school will dismiss at 1 p.m. so teachers and administrators can participate in several important training programs.

This past Wednesday, Muenster High School staff took time to examine the school's grading policy. For the past several years, all MHS teachers calculated six weeks' grades by adding the daily work average, the test average and the six weeks and dividing by three. Using this method, the six weeks' test counts a great deal in the student's six weeks' average. Daily work, most often consisting of homework and check quizzes, holds the same weight as major tests and projects completed during the grading period. To determine the semester average, the three six weeks' averages are added to the semester test and the total is divided by four. Again, the "final" semester test is weighted heavily in determining the student's grade. Any changes that are recommended by the staff Chris Pagel; Rhonda, Kenny, will be forwarded to the superintendent and school board for consideration. It is possible that some changes could be implemented in the 1992 spring semester.

Parents and students are also encouraged to comment on this > policy. 





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
