



Era School District residents may not be able to have an air conditioned graduation in their new gymnasium come May, school officials said.

This winter's heavy rains have forced construction delays of the new 25,000 square-foot high school campus addition in the southwestern Cooke County community, said Era Superintendent Dale Smiley, who estimated that workers are now some 45 days behind schedule.

The estimated \$1 million project includes the construction of eight classrooms, which includes two science laboratories and a computer laboratory. A gymnasium, cafeteria, restrooms and a bookroom will also be built. The present library will be converted to up to two classrooms after the new building is completed.

Voters last March approved a \$1.2 million bond to fund the project, which is needed due to the district's growing enrollment. Present enrollment is 354 students.



Farmers are rapidly running out of options for disposing of containers that carry pesticides and other agricultural chemicals.

where the new recycling program will operate, for example, farmers generate 400,000 pounds of empty plastic and metal chemical containers each year. How to safely dispose of them has become an increasing con-

Because of limited capacity and more stringent government regulation, many sanitary landfills are refusing to accept these containers. Open burning of pesticide containers has been made illegal in Texas, and specially designed incinerators are often too distant and costly for most farmers to use.

Metal pesticide containers have been recycled for some time, Cowan said, but low demand for recycled plastic has sent many of these containers to landfills.

Chemical companies have pledged to buy back the flaked plastic for use only as starting material for new

As another safeguard, the program will accept only containers that have been thoroughly rinsed to remove any

A permanent collection point for agricultural chemical containers has been established in Edinburg. Four other collection sites will accept containers only at announced dates and times, as demand warrants.

... Seeing these boys come by with enough hay to feed about 18 cows for a day, all in one large round bale riding on a spear mounted on a FWD truck with a heater and closed cab, looks like a breeze.

But, note this: some of the cattlemen are out all day, going from pasture to pasture, sometimes unable to get all the way due to mud that is getting worse with each new rain or snow. I talked to a man, a day or so ago, that took his hay so far with his truck and then used his tractor to finish the job.

... The grain farmers are in bad shape this season. Much of the grain looks fair, but a lot of seed was planted in land that was too wet when worked, and didn't mulch well, or didn't get fine enough to hold the moisture on the seed so it would germinate and come up to a good stand. Then, later plantings received so much

the seed rotted in the ground.

One farmer who is a member of a good-sized partnership told me they have several farms that are still mostly unworked at this time, due to the wet weather. He also said they had not decided what to do with all the land, but indicated they probably wouldn't be paying a lot of income tax for this, this growing season.

...When I was younger, we sometimes had land that we were unable to plant in the fall, so it was usually planted to spring oats, corn or cotton. Several days ago, enroute to Denton, we passed a field of cotton between Valley View and Sanger. It had not been harvested. Looked like it had been a fair crop, so far as yield goes, but it looks pretty worthless at this time.

All in all, this fall and winter have been a bummer for people who are working the land for a living. We hope the next will be

Develop heifers for herd future

The foundation for a sound reproductive future for your cow herd depends heavily upon setting adequate nutritional goals for your replacement heifers," advises Larry Corah, Extension beef cattle specialist at Kansas State University.

"Weaning is the ideal time to set those goals. And understanding and acting on the nutritional needs of replacement stock should help you improve the economic efficiency of your operation. Heifer development is where maintaining optimum reproductive efficiency should

The first step to good heifer development is to target those heifers to weigh between 60 to 70 percent of their mature weight by the time they are bred as yearlings, advises Ron Bolze, northwest area Extension beef cattle specialist. Heifers should reach puberty by 13-14 months of age to be bred at least one heat cycle (21 days) ahead of the rest of the

Once you've established a yearling target weight, Bolze says, record their current weights and determine the rate of gain you can realistically expect during the fall and winter. "Heifers should be able to gain between 1-1 1/2 pounds per head per day,n says Bolze. "Translating that into feed, the females will probably need to receive some high quality forage, some grain, and almost all cases, a protein supplement.

"K-State research also showed that feeding an ionophore would increase daily gain and the percent of heifers cycling at the start of the breeding season.

"Another K-State study showed that deworming fallborn heifers at weaning will increase earlier cycling. Researchers put two groups of fall-born replacement heifers on a marginal nutritional plane after weaning. The group dewormed at weaning experienced a 17.3 percent higher cycling rate at the start of the breeding season compared to the control group that was not treated."

proper heifer development include heavier weaning weights on the heifer's first calf and better rebreeding performance. A three-year study by Purdue University shows that nearly 20 percent more of the heifers that were properly developed from weaning to rebreeding successfully rebred after their first calf. Properly developed heifers also weaned calves that were 38 pounds heavier.

A final benefit from good heifer development is calving ease. Dave Patterson, K-State graduate student, recently compared two groups of differently developed heifers and showed that heifers that were heavier at breeding had half as much difficulty calving as lighter heifers, even though the plane of nutrition from breeding until calving was

The lighter group weighed 55 percent and the heavier group weighed 65 percent of



their mature weights at breeding. All of those studies reaffirm


