For the standard V-Mail letters, the space required to send 150,000 eye singly. of them is 22 mail sacks and they weigh 1,500 pounds. The same number of letters in single sheets, under the old system would require 37 sacks and weigh 2,575 pounds,

If the V-Mail is microfilmed it is reduced for transportation purposes, to 3.15 per cent of its original volume and weight. Thus, 150,000 V-Mail letters microfilmed weigh 45 pounds and fill only one sack.

On reaching destinations, microfilm letters are printed on sheets 4x51/2 inches and delivered. The afternoon and night. Under full film is kept on file until the letter is actually delivered, to avoid possibility of loss, and then destroyed. Men in foreign service will be supplied V-Mail letter sheets at nocharge, and the standard sheets soon will be available through regular stationery outlets for civilians in this country. The Government departments already have distributed 1,000,000 sheets to the armed BEING COLLECTED forces and the first letters have been received in this country on microfilm and are in the process of being prepared for delivery.

A limited number of the V-Mail sheets have been prepared for distribution in this country and soon will be available at the postoffice here in advance of availability of the sheets at local stores where they will be sold for a nominal charge.





The Federal Reserve Board now requires that your charge account "must be paid in full not later than the 10th of the second calendar month following the month in which purchased, or the account is considered in default." When any customer's account is in default we are required by law, which imposes severe penalties for its violation, to refuse further credit to that customer until said defaulted account has been cured.
