Appears on Texas Ballots in November

Sept. 27.—The names of the candidates for the general election in November 8th, Mrs. Jane Y. Secretary of State, announced this afternoon. The names were made following receipt of advice from Attorney General V. Allied on the question of the 42nd legislature to shorten the ballot by deleting the names of the Vice-President and the names of the judges of the supreme court, rather than the names of electors. It is considered too vague to make it advisable to include the names of electors. Mrs. McCallum has advised.

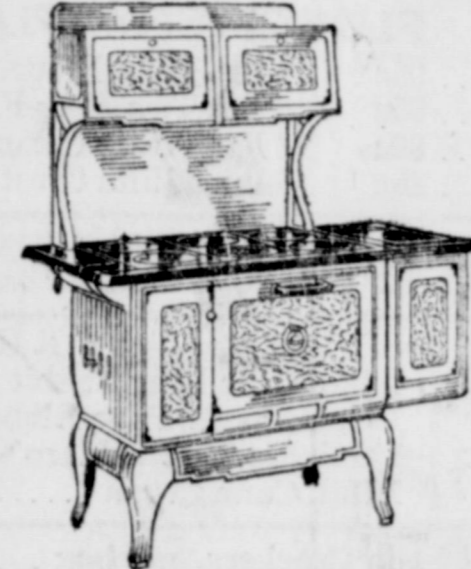

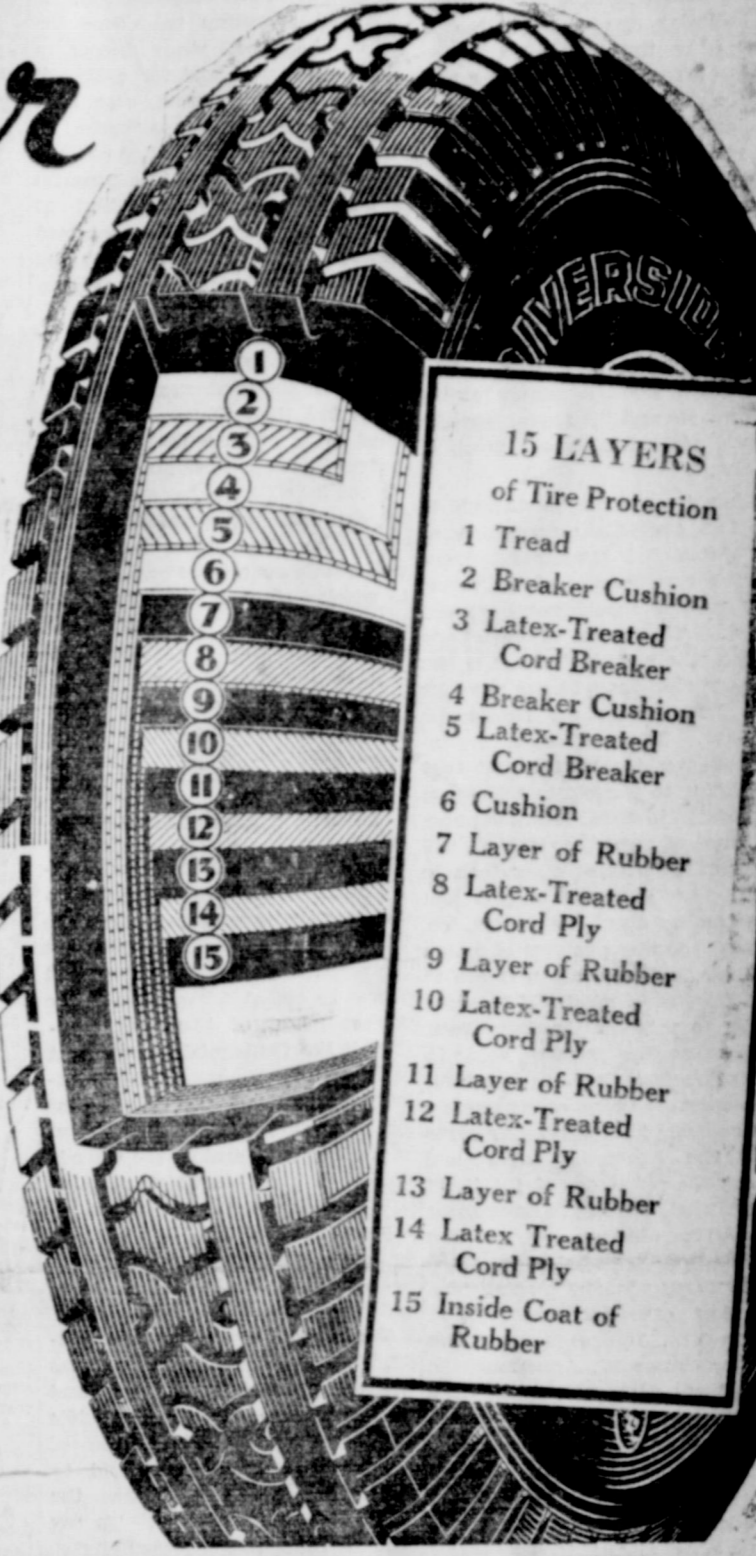

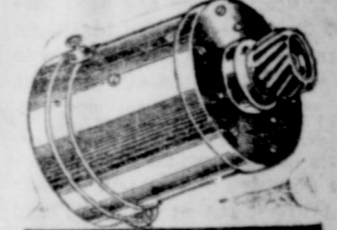

Big Fees Continued

THE LEGISLATURE during the recent special session went far beyond the Governor's instructions in the consideration of a number of matters which had not been submitted to it, and in doing so it is regretted that the law-makers did not go all the way with the passage of a bill restricting the maximum salaries or fees which may be claimed by county office holders.

A bill proposing to reduce the \$42,500 limit had many friends in the Legislature, and for a time it looked as if it would pass both houses easily. But it was "choked to death."

While it seems to be difficult to effect a workable organization of the dissatisfied Democrats, however, the seriousness of the threat they present should not be minimized.

Short-Sighted Economy

THE PUBLIC Expenditures Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce a few days ago adopted a resolution declaring that the proposed Centennial amendment should be defeated.

The purpose of the public expenditures committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been and should be only to create a public understanding of the problem of governmental expenditures and to discourage wastefulness in the handling of public funds.

The "present plight of tax payers" has nothing to do with the situation. The Centennial amendment merely authorizes the Legislature to make provision for an adequate celebration of one hundred years of Texas progress, in such manner and at such time as it may think advisable.

No section of Texas will profit from the Centennial celebration as much as will West Texas. Most of the historic incidents of the past century have been recorded in the eastern half of the state but it is in the west that golden opportunity will be on display for the throngs who will come to Texas to see the state and attend the Centennial.

CITIZENS NAME DIRECTORS FOR RELIEF BUREAU

Ten directors to serve as an advisory board for Brownwood Employment Bureau for Relief for the coming year were elected at the mass meeting of citizens at city hall Friday night.

The ten directors elected were: T. H. Hart, C. A. White, Mrs. Henry Hughes, Mrs. W. A. Bell, John T. Yantis, Dr. Ben Shelton, W. D. Gully, Mrs. J. W. Trapp, W. P. Logan and James L. White.

The board will select an executive committee, not necessarily from their own number, and will elect officers and select an executive secretary.

Between 30 and 40 people attended the meeting. Judge E. J. Miller, president, was in charge. All the directors and officers who have served the bureau during the last year, were retiring with this meeting to turn over the work to the new officers.

In the absence of Miss Carrie Reeves, executive secretary, A. N. Thompson, chairman of the executive committee, made the annual report.

Retiring Officers Thanked Those present unanimously voted thanks and appreciation to retiring officers, doctors and nurses of the city, the Elks Lodge, The Brownwood Hospital and all others who assisted in the work during the year.

Talks were made by W. Lee Watson, H. F. Mayes, O. E. Winebrenner, Hilton Burks, County Judge Courtney Gray, Mayor W. A. Butler, Rev. I. K. Floyd, Judge Miller and others.

Red Cross Work

Mr. Winebrenner, county Red Cross chairman, told of the work of that organization in this county. For drought relief the Red Cross spent more than \$6,000 in the county, more than 4,000 twenty-five sacks of Red Cross flour have been distributed and now 10,000 yards of Red Cross cloth is being made into clothing for the needy.

Annual Report Made

The annual report of the executive committee, covering activities from October 1, 1931, to September 23, 1932, is in part as follows: Cash balance October 1, 1931, \$102.54; collections from subscriptions, donations, refunds, etc., \$5,476.29; total cash received, \$5,578.83. Disbursed, \$5,550.50. Balance \$28.33.

Disbursements include the following items: Food, \$3,038.29; medicine, \$524.41; hospitals, \$190.25; nursing, \$76.50; housing, including patients at Welfare Home, \$122.31; utilities, \$139.17; transportation, \$88.26; salaries, \$775; labor, including fees for collection, \$171.06; office supplies, \$34.65; miscellaneous, \$190.38; total disbursed, \$5,550.50.

Total number of days work done for city for food, 1,031; total number of cases in welfare home, 15; total number of major operations, 12; children immunized against diphtheria, 909.

It was pointed out that although the bureau received less money last year than was received the year before, more families were assisted.

The bureau this year also will not have as much help from the water district, which the year before gave many people work by having brush cut at Brownwood Dam.

HUGH LAWSON LEACH

Hugh Lawson Leach, 75, prominent rancher and farmer of Brown county for almost 40 years, died at his home seven miles southwest of Brownwood Friday afternoon at 6:50 o'clock after an illness of about two weeks.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Clear Creek Cemetery with Rev. Rucker of Bangs in charge, assisted by Rev. J. M. Parker of Brownwood. Interment was made in Clear Creek Cemetery with White & London Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Leach was born in Tennessee July 21, 1857, and came to Texas with his parents at the age of two years. The family settled in Collin county and Mr. Leach lived there until 37 years ago when he moved to Brown county.

Mr. and Mrs. Leach were married in Collin county fifty years ago and to this union ten children were born. Mr. Leach's death is the first in the immediate family.

He has been engaged in the ranching and farming business most of his life.
