## Muenster Favors Kennedy 2-1 in Record Election

Muenster voted with the state and the nation in favoring Kennedy and Johnson in Tuesday's general election. It also shared the record set by the state and nation in setting an all time voting record.

In another respect, however, this community differed sharply from the over-all record. Kennedy's majority here was a decisive 484-267 whereas the national contest was so close that his victory was not definitely decided until about noon Wednesday

Local voters also set another record . . . in casting the highest number of invalid ballots in their history. A total of 822 persons cast their ballots but 71 of them voted improperly and could not be counted. The most frequent mistake this year, as in past elections, was ignoring candidates of the minor parties. After voting for either Democratics or Republicans some failed to cross off the Constitution and Prohibition parties leaving their ballots with more than one name for the office concerned. The north box had 62 improperly marked ballots and the south box 9. The two boxes combined had 46 invalid

votes in 1952 and 35 in 1956. The percentage of potential votes cast here is known to be high but cannot be definitely determined because of persons past poll tax age who are not listed on the official poll list. Shown as qualified voters at both boxes were 770 with poll tax or exemption receipts. The total number of actual voters was 822. North box with 588 on the list had 647 voters. South box, with 182 on

#### **Knabe** and Prescher Herds Lead DHIA In BF Production

Herds belonging to Tommy Knabe and Pete Prescher tied for top honors with the average high pounds of butterfat for September according the DHIA report for the month. The figure was 35. Prescher's cows also led in milk production with that figure at 945 pounds.

Fifteen herds were tested during September. The Felderhoff & Sicking herd had the high number of cows in milk, 43, while Knabe had the most dry cows, 16.

Ben Davis had the high individual milk producer which chalked up 3,020 pounds and owns another cow that tied for first in test pounds of milk with 4.7. The other cow belongs to Richard Frasher. W. H. Frasher owns the

cow which produced the most pounds of butterfat, 105. Two of the Davis cows were close with an even 100 pounds of butterfat for the month.

Nine cows produced more that a ton of milk during the month. They are owned by Jerry Hoenig, Tommy Knabe, Pete Prescher, W. H. Frasher and Ben Davis.

Sixty-four cows in the association produced 50 pounds or more of butterfat with the average for the month at 28. Average pounds of milk per cow was 773.
