One of the Most Orderly in Texas, Says Bank Examiner

Directors and stockholders were well pleased with the condition of the Muenster State Bank as reported in the regular annual meeting at the bank on Tuesday, January 12.

Of special interest was the report on the bank's deposits which revealed a steady increase to double its figure in the past four years. On December 31, 1932, the bank's deposits were \$91,808.86, and on corresponding days for the following years, were as follows: 1933, \$107,-258.82; 1934, \$113,334.87; 1935, \$155,042.94; 1936, \$193,534.16. This increase in bank deposits serves as a fairly good indication of the general increase in volume of business that Muenster has enjoyed since 1932.

J. M. Weinzapfel, cashier of the Muenster State Bank, advises that at the present time the institution is twice as secure as when it was first opened as is revealed by the increase in capital stock and by accumulated surplus and profits. 
