Any person under the sun can drive faster than a safe speed or reverse crazily away from a curb, or skid his machine in loose gravel, but only a nit-wit overlooks
the danger to himself and others or the punthe danger to himself and others or the pun-
ishment he gives his car. ishment he gives his car.

Muenster is made up of a group of normal human beings who feel they have a right to live. Since fatal accidents have been few, most of the citizens think little about the dangers of "dumb driving." But it is time that Muenster people did think
about a method of making conditions safer. about a method of making conditions safer.

Many cities meet our situation by pass-
ing laws with teeth in them, and then enforcing. Muenster has room for worlds of progress in that direction.

Another possible solution is to take an idea from those reckless drivers themselves. Most of them are seeking to make a big imdrivers that they are making an impression -a very bad impression-they might try a change of habits. Think of the effect on the driver who steps from his car to be greeted with "You're headed for an early death," "Any sap can be reckims, 'retorts. Sooner or later the reckless driver will realize that he's not so smart after all and that if he wants the respect of persons who count, he will have to earn it by sensible action.

If carried out by everyone in town that plan should work. At any rate it is worth a trial. Are you, citizens of Muenster, will-
