The message states that farmers everywhere are reluctant to buy baby chicks this season and adds that the high price of feeds is the principal reason for lack of interest in poultry raising. Another deterrent is the unprecedented supply of dressed poultry all over the country which in all probability will

Cooke County Farmers Adopt Range Building Plan for Coming Year

A new feature of the soil conservation program in Cooke County is treasury for use on equipment and the range building program which in the past was effective in the grazing areas of Western Texas and Western Oklahoma and in 1937 was extended to include Cooke County

At a meeting last Saturday, April 10, in County Agent Clark's office, 25 Cooke County, range men signed nity will soon have a new lustre and up for participation in the program and elected S. H. Doty and Jake Bezner as range committeemen and Jake Biffle as range inspector.

The range building program is similar in many respects to the soil conservation program applying to tillage crop fields. Payments are made by the Federal government on the basis of grazing capacity, for extensive repair program on the approved improvement features. As in the soil program the purpose of payments is to encourage range building practices by providing some money to meet the expenses incurred.

Since the outstanding reasons for range depletion are soil erosion, overgrazing, rodents, and noxious plants, provisions for overcoming

A maximum of \$1.50 is allowed by the Government for each unit of grazing capacity, by which is meant the area sufficient to graze one horse or one cow during a 12month period without injury to forage or watershed.

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EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES HERE

DURING his recent visit here the Deputy State Superintendent of Public Schools in this district expressed surprise at finding Muenster's educational program so far behind the actual development of the city and its surrounding community.

That Muenster has continued in its march of progress while numerous other cities were declining is a matter of general knowledge. That its educational facilities have been at a standstill, whereas they should have been developed with the community, is also a matter of general knowledge.

Being aware of this condition, every progressive citizen of this community should begin to think of what the future holds in store unless provisions are soon made to offer students here what is being offered elsewhere. There can be no denial of the fact that Muenster has grown consistently through the lean years; but unless some adequate provision is made for the children of today her progress will soon reach its limit.

Every year some of the local people are making sacrifices to send their children to schools away from here, and at the same time others are forced to discontinue their children's education because they cannot afford the added expense. In either case the situation creates a serious handicap.

To encourage greater activity in Muenster a more adequate educational opportunity must be offered. There are possibilities of varied industries here but few people will consider them seriously until they know that Muenster is considering the welfare of their children.

If greater activity is not promoted here Muenster's youngsters will have to move to other places. With the educational background that is now offered here would they be able to compete with the youngsters of other localities?
