Our do-gooders are apparently devoid of any understanding that our "wealth" is not a matter of good fortune at all but that it is directly related to production. Americans have more because we produce more.

And we produce more because personal incentive and wealth are less restricted here than overseas. Yet we are told to charitably hand over the fruits of our own labor to those who are moving in the wrong direction.

And isn't there something about taking from one nation and giving to another that smacks of "from each according to his ability; to each according to his need"? If this isn't one of the basic tenets of communism, then Karl Marx was the biggest exponent of free enterprise this planet has ever know.

Isn't it time to return to some good old-fashioned "horse sense" and quit trying to fight fire with gasoline? Instead of trying to deter communism with communistic practices, shouldn't we be mounting a massive redediction to the free enterprise system? And shouldn't we begin by putting an end to the foolishness known as foreign aid?
